- 7 program. The State's small population, prohibitive land and infrastructure costs, and current
- 8 recycling participation rates create significant challenges to operate a recycling facility in the
- 9 State. An established grant program that could alleviate some of these market challenges may
- facilitate the Department's landfill diversion efforts and potentially reduce the State's reliance on
- 11 landfills and exports to manage its municipal waste.
- The Department respectfully requests funding and approval for one permanent full time
- position (Contracts Specialist, Program Specialist, or equivalent) to fulfill the procurement and
- contractual functions necessary to implement this grant program.

Re: HB 2404 – Relating to Grants for Local Recycling Facilities – Support

The Honorable Nicole Lowen:

We write to express our support of HB 2404 – Relating to Grants for Local Recycling Facilities (Wildberger) that will be considered in your committee. It is no secret the that the recycling supply chain is evolving to respond to market changes. These changes include dissipated traditional export markets compounded by new and increased demand by large consumer brand companies. However, bills like HB 2404 show that the state is serious about supporting sustainable manufacturing and materials management. The establishment of a recycling facility grant program will help the state achieve its waste reduction goals.

Today's recycling infrastructure needs significant improvements to keep up with the evolving waste stream and to meet the stringent quality specifications required by users of this recycled material. These improvements vary based on the age of the existing infrastructure, the condition of the inbound material, and the destination of the resulting material streams. Additionally, there may already be some really effective infrastructure in place that simply needs to be expanded. That is why legislation like this which establishes a grant program that can then be appropriated for varying but specific uses is so successful and necessary. It's also why we are supporting similar legislation at the national level that will assist states in much the same way.

An example of the small infrastructure improvements that are needed, and their potential, is an industry-sponsored project we funded in the Portland, Oregon region to capture previously difficult-to-recycle items like polystyrene. A small, portable system was established in the region (known as a secondary sort) to process the residual material from the region's existing material recovery facilities that would under normal conditions be sent to landfill. These streams are known to obtain material that was meant to be captured and other material that maintains value. For a variety of technological, economical and logistical reasons, these may sometimes go inadvertently to landfill. However, as our demonstration project showed, we were able to capture some of this material. Results show that 50,000 tons per year of additional recyclable materials could be recovered from the region, including 800 tons of polystyrene. We hope that similar systems can be implemented in regions across the country where appropriate. More can be found at PNWSort.org.

We hope that the legislature will recognize the opportunity and importance of legislation like H. 2404. We support the fact that the state is considering these issues and wants to play a role in finding a solution to the waste and litter problems that exist. All parties – consumers, manufacturers, governments, recyclers and more – need to play a part in the solution.
