Aloha to the Chairs, Vice-Chairs and members of the committees.

Papa Ola Lōkahi (POL)—the Native Hawaiian Health Board established 30 years ago—is in support of HB 2506, which calls for the Department of Health to issue a certificate of stillbirth to the parents or parents named on a fetal death certificate issued in case of a stillbirth, upon request of the parents.

Papa Ola Lōkahi is authorized by the federal Native Hawaiian Health Care Improvement Act (Title 42 USC 122), or NHHCIA, to address the health and well-being of native Hawaiians, which we do through multiple strategies: policy, research and data, traditional Hawaiian healing, education and training, workforce development, and more. Our sister programs include the Native Hawaiian Health Scholarship and the five Native Hawaiian Health Care Systems that serve seven islands by providing primary, behavioral health, outreach and enrollment services. Additionally, our kuleana with the State includes protecting and perpetuating traditional Hawaiian healing practices and practitioners, per HRS 453-2(c) and Act 32 (2019).

The State of Hawai'i reports Native Hawaiian infant mortality at 7 deaths per live births, 1.3 times higher than the overall rate. The infant mortality rate for Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders is 60% greater compared to others, according to CDC (2019).

In addition, the cycle of life for Native Hawaiians begins at conception and extends beyond death. Motherhood is honored whether the child lives to adulthood or born live or still.

A fetal death certificate devalues the significance of the mother who has carried, delivered, buried, and experienced all postpartum symptoms absent the baby. For those with these beliefs, a certificate of stillbirth might reduce the indignity of a sole certificate of fetal death.

We urge the compassionate passage of this bill. Mahalo nui for the opportunity to provide testimony IN SUPPORT of HB 2506.

She did, eventually have the baby and as most experience in these situations, given the certtificate of fetal death. Even though, she had the experience of giving birth to her child.

Parents, need closure and the documentation of birth is a huge piece to healing when there is a stillborn birth. It gives honor to the Mother, who has carried; nurtured and in many cases given birth to a child.

Whenever we celebrate my sons birthday, I think of this child. Thank you for your time.



I gave birth to my beautiful baby girl, a beautiful angel, Kaʻaiʻōhelo, four years ago on June 8, 2015 at Kauaʻi Veterans Memorial Hospital. My due date was set for July 8, 2015. We were so excited for the arrival of our baby. She was my first born and baby grew inside of me for 36 weeks and was perfect in every way. We went in for a checkup and after the ultrasound the doctor told me that the baby didn't have a heartbeat. I looked at my husband and what do we say, what do we do, we were at a lost for words, we just lost our baby. So now what?

The next step was giving birth to our baby girl. The hānau (birthing) was an amazing process to experience, one that I will never forget and it was beautiful in every way. I experienced all the contractions, I did my breathing, my water broke, and she was ready to enter into this world. Once baby was born, my husband followed the nurse and baby got weighed and measured. He then brought Kaʻaiʻōhelo to her mommy and I welcomed her with open arms and with tears in my eyes I greeted her with a honi and said, "Aloha e Kaʻaiʻōhelo."

As we stared at her beauty and looked at each of her features, yes, I took off her hat and looked at her hair, I wanted to see her fingers and her toes.

I was surprised to have received a memory box from the hospital and I didn't leave the hospital with a baby but with a memory box w/ hand prints, foot prints, a lock of hair, and a few pictures. We now pay it forward and on behalf of baby Ka'ai'ōhelo, our 'ohana donates memory boxes for other parents.

I completed all the required paperwork before leaving the hospital including the information for a birth certificate like every other parent would.



He lei poina 'ole ke keiki na ka makua.

We also buried our daughter at the local cemetery next to her grandfather and uncle and were surrounded by family and friends.

Eventually I made my way to the Department of Health to request a copy of the birth certificate and death certificate and to my surprise they only issued me a Certificate of Fetal Death. I was hurt because I knew that I gave birth to my baby and like many other moms and dads I wanted to have a birth certificate and a death certificate.

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For Native Hawaiians the cycle of life begins from conception, on to birth, death and beyond. We honor all mothers who have given birth to a child whether they were born live or still. The loss of a baby due to stillbirth remains a sad reality for many families and takes a serious toll on families' health and well-being. The mother carried the baby from conception, endures natural childbirth, has milk in her breasts, leaves the hospital without their child and later deals with the burial of their child. It is a troubling and oppressive reminder of a woman's failure to produce a healthy, living baby by having only a certificate of fetal death. Respect and honor should be shown for both the birth and death of the baby.

Our family respectfully urges the Committee to **PASS HB 2506**.
