This also gives more patients at home a chance to grow their own medicine and a lot of patients want to grow at home, but do not have access to cannabis/hemp plant starters. Every patient should have access to plant starters and the right to grow as much as they should dried medicinal flower.

A question I have on the plant buying limit would be what would happen if a patient buys their 10 plants to grow but they die in a week or 2? A lot of patients that want to grow have never grown before, they lack experience, so they would have to wait until 30 days pass to buy another set of 10? There will need to be an educational component offered also if patients are new growers and want to be successful at home.

Testimony in OPPOSITION to H.B. 2633 RELATING TO CANNABIS FOR MEDICAL USE

- 1 **Fiscal Implications:** Unable to determine at this time.
- 2 **Department Testimony:** The Department of Health (DOH) appreciates the intent of this
- 3 measure to improve patient access by amending the State's medical cannabis dispensary system
- 4 to authorize licensed dispensaries to distribute cannabis propagules and cuttings, however, DOH
- 5 OPPOSES HB2633 for following reasons:
- 6 (1) Does not appear to comport with the Legislature's intent in establishing the regulated
- 7 **statewide dispensary system.** In 2015, the Hawaii Legislature established a statewide
- 8 dispensary system for qualifying patients who lacked the ability to grow their own supply of
- 9 cannabis. Authorizing licensed dispensaries to distribute propagules or cuttings to allow
- patients to grow cannabis plants appears to be a departure from the Legislature's intent of
- establishing a dispensary system for patients who are unable to grow cannabis plants.
- 12 (2) Potential for patients to exceed their statutory limit of medical cannabis. "Adequate
- supply" is defined in section 329-121, HRS, as an amount not to exceed "ten cannabis plants,
- whether immature or mature, and four ounces of usable cannabis at any given time."
- Although a patient or caregiver's home grown plants are required to be tagged with the

- patient's registration number, home grow plant counts are not tracked within the state's
- electronic seed-to-sale tracking system. HB2633 would allow a patient to acquire up to ten
- propagules or cuttings every thirty days, in addition to any home grow plants, creating the
- 4 potential for patients to exceed their statutory plant count limits.
- 5 (3) **Risk for encouraging the illegal cannabis market.** Allowing the sale of propagules and
- 6 cuttings with no means to track these could tempt the diversion of legally obtained cannabis
- 7 intended for medical use to other than registered patients. This could significantly jeopardize
- 8 public health and safety.
