In consideration of HOUSE BILL 454 RELATING TO KAHO'OLAWE ISLAND RESERVE

House Bill 454 appropriates funds to the Department of Land and Natural Resources to support native dryland restoration, management and maintenance on the Kaho'olawe Island Reserve. The Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission (KIRC) strongly supports this measure.

Decimated of its natural environment through years of over-foraging and military bombing, an estimated 1.9 million tons of soil is lost annually on Kahoʻolawe to erosion. Severely eroded landscapes cover one-third of the island, with runoff choking Kahoʻolawe's pristine reefs and significantly impacting the ocean ecosystem. With only 25 inches of rain falls annually at the summit, with perhaps less than 10 inches per year at the coast. Most plants on Kahoʻolawe are hardy alien species that easily outcompete the few, fragile native plant populations for water and nutrients.

Since the end of the Navy's unexploded ordnance cleanup in 2004, the KIRC has begun a race against time to stem erosion and further degradation. The KIRC has since initiated numerous restoration projects, funded by various grant opportunities, that has made significant changes to transforming the desolate hardpan into vibrant living landscapes.

The Kahoʻolawe Native Dryland Forest Project seeks to conduct native plantings on the leeward, upland slopes of Kahoʻolawe to reestablish native forest watersheds, increase ground water recharge, reduce surface water runoff and reduce coral reef sedimentation. This project began with initial state funding in fiscal year 2018 with fieldwork starting in the summer of 2018. Since that time, the KIRC has been able to install a new solar-powered, water pump to move water from our water catchments to the new planting site, install irrigation piping, remove invasive alien brush and bore holes for the new plants. Since our winter planting season started

this past fall, we have planted close to 5,000 native plants with a goal of planting 15,000 by the end of this first season.

Funding this project will allow the KIRC the unique opportunity to make a major leap forward in its long-term goal of restoring the Island of Kahoʻolawe. The results of this project will allow us to return the natural environment of Kahoʻolawe back to its former existence prior to the centuries of abuse, misuse and neglect from modern societies.

TESTIMONY IN OPPOSITION

This bill proposes to transfer \$6,000,000.00 taxpayer dollars to the Department of Land and Natural Resources to provide funding for construction of infrastructure for drylands forestspecified programs of the Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission at the rate of \$3,000,000.00 for each of two fiscal years 2019-2020 and 2020-2021.

Please do not place this burden on the taxpayers of the State of Hawaii.

Let OHA pay all costs associated with the rehabilitation of Kaho'olawe -- an island which this legislature and OHA both believe will be handed over in the near future to the Hawaiian tribe which OHA has been working so hard to create for at least 19 years.

As the language of HB455 points out (another bill you have under consideration right now), "Pursuant to section 6K-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the management and control of the Kaho'olawe island reserve will be transferred to a sovereign Native Hawaiian entity upon its recognition by the state and federal governments. This event is anticipated to occur within the timeframe of the 2026 strategic plan."

In Act 195 (2011) this legislature set in motion a process now underway to create a Hawaiian tribe. The U.S. Department of Interior recently proclaimed a regulation whereby that tribe can get federal recognition -- the final rule 43CFR50 proclaimed by the U.S. Department of Interior by publication in the Federal Register on October 14, 2016. Both Act 195 and the Department of Interior regulation insist that the Hawaiian tribe must be exclusively for Native Hawaiians, and that anyone lacking a drop of the magic blood must be ruthlessly excluded.

According to OHA trustee Lei Ahu Isa, OHA has used approximately \$33 Million of state government money over the years to lobby for federal recognition of a Hawaiian tribe either through the Akaka bill or through advertising and racial registration programs both in Hawaii and on the mainland. OHA provided the entire funding for an election of delegates and a monthlong meeting in 2006 which produced a proposed constitution for the tribe. OHA has repeatedly pledged that when a Hawaiian tribe has achieved federal recognition, OHA will transfer all its assets to the tribe.

If the tribe is successful in creating itself and getting federal recognition, section 6K-9 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes guarantees that the island of Kaho'olawe will immediately be ripped away from the State of Hawaii and handed over to the Hawaiian tribe, to which people with no native blood are forbidden to belong.

This legislature simply must not confiscate tax dollars from 80% of Hawaii's people for a project which they will be racially excluded from.

It would be foolish and immoral for the State of Hawaii to spend taxpayer dollars collected from 100% of Hawaii's people of all races to pay for upgrades to an island which is expected to be removed from the State of Hawaii and handed over to a sovereign "nation" [tribe] restricted by law to one racial group whose people are perhaps 20% of Hawaii's people, most of whom will probably not even join the tribe. Once the tribe has been created there will be negotiations between the State of Hawaii vs. the tribe to decide how much additional land and money the State will give to the tribe. The State should not give away resources before the negotiations even begin.

OHA's most recent annual report (2017) shows that OHA has total assets of more than \$662 million. And it continues getting more payments of state government money (ceded land revenues plus legislative appropriations) every year, including a bill in this year's legislature demanding \$35 million per year from ceded land revenues.

Enough already! OHA can easily afford funding for Kaho'olawe. Let OHA pay whatever money it wishes to pay to KIRC to rehabilitate Kaho'olawe -- an island which this legislature and OHA both believe will be handed over in the near future to the Hawaiian tribe which OHA is working so hard to create.

In 1994 I accompanied my my Kamehameha Schools students on a special access to Kahoʻolawe We hiked the 11 miles across island. Then, the upland hardpan was a barren desert cut by deep gullies created by water runoff. Nothing grew. We walked on the single dirt road across the island, from Hakioawa to Honokanaia, sometimes passing ordnance gathered on the side of the road for later demolition.

Recently, I had the privilege twenty years later to revisit the same terrain in two KIRC accesses this past year. What an amazing transformation. Where nothing grew there are now rows of native vegetation thriving in the harsh upland conditions of an island denuded of topsoil. It is clear that the regeneration of native plants on the hardpan has happened because of the accumulated experience and on-the-ground knowledge of state workers on Kahoʻolawe. That group of dedicated people has succeeded in transforming the eroded upland hardpan into a native garden — an amazing feat.

This transformation has happened because of three factors: 1) a small pool of dedicated people with a vision, 2) their accumulated knowledge and experience, 3) support by the state. Without adequate support, the regeneration of Kahoʻolawe cannot take place. Words cannot express the transformation I have witnessed. I am now a retired Kamehameha Schools photography teacher. As the only Island Reserve set up entirely in trust for a Native Hawaiian Sovereign Entity, the KIRC is well poised ton change the economic landscape and life quality of Native Hawaiians and the communities in which they reside by means of a truly unique experience on the island of Kaho'olawe. The State must maintain the responsibility of supporting the Kaho'olawe Rehabilitation Trust Fund.

As the only island listed on the National Register of Historic Places in its entirety, containing nearly 3,000 archaeological sites and features, it is imperative that the State preserves this important resource for current and future generations through this financial support system.

Without the KIRC's ongoing protection of Kaho'olawe's coastal ecosystem, including the adjacent nearshore environment and coral reefs that can be covered with, and choked by, derelict fishing gear, nets, a huge variety of plastics and other debris items, species including the endangered Hawaiian monk seal, threatened green sea turtle, endangered hawksbill sea turtle, endangered humpback whale, endangered Hawaiian dark-rumped petrel, and endangered Newell's shearwater will be put at risk. It is imperative that a trust fund be stabilized to continue this work.

Kaho'olawe is a unique ecosystem preserving immensely valuable cultural and biological resources. It is surrounded by the richest marine ecosystems remaining in the Main Hawaiian islands and providing replenishment of fish and invertebrates to other islands' waters. The KIRC's massive restoration program designed to revitalize the ecology and cultural history of the island will benefit all of Hawai'i's people for generations to come. Please support this bill.
