- 1 **EOA's Position:** The Executive Office on Aging (EOA), an attached agency to the Department
- of Health, supports this measure, provided that its enactment does not reduce or replace priorities
- 3 within the Administration's executive biennium budget.
- 4 **Fiscal Implications:** This measure appropriates \$3,100,000 for the Aging and Disability
- 5 Resource Center (ADRC) for SFY 2020 AND \$3,100,000 for SFY 2021.
- 6 **Purpose and Justification:** EOA notes that the appropriation is a priority of the Ige
- 7 Administration. Governor Ige's budget request proposes \$3,100,000 for EOA's base budget for
- 8 the ADRC FOR SFY2020 and \$3,100,000 for SFY 2021. The ADRC assists individuals and
- 9 their families to identify their long term services and support needs based upon a person centered
- 10 process, understand their service options which include publicly funded services such as Kupuna

- 1 Care and the Kupuna Caregivers, and assist in developing and implementing comprehensive
- 2 support plans. These funds will help to sustain the capacity for EOA and the four county based
- 3 Area Agencies on Aging to operate as a statewide, fully functional ADRC. During SFY 2017, a
- 4 total of 35,007 calls were made to the ADRC statewide, a 30% increase in call volume from SFY
- 5 2016. The ADRC linked 11,039 older adults to federal and State publicly funded long term
- 6 services and supports, a 35% increase over SFY 2016.
- 7 **Recommendation:** EOA supports \$3,100,000 for SFY 2020 AND \$3,100,000 for SFY 2021 in
- 8 the base budget for ADRC and humbly requests advancing this measure, provided that its
- 9 enactment does not reduce or replace priorities within the Administration's executive biennium
- 10 budget.

SUBJECT: HB 0466 – Making an Appropriation for the Aging and Disability Resource Center.

The State Council on Developmental Disabilities **SUPPORTS HB0466.** The purpose of the bill is to provide funding to support the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC).

The Council was a member of the State ADRC Advisory Board back in April 2006 and assisted the Executive Office on Aging (EOA) with receiving a Federal grant to embark on establishing a one-stop single entry point for older adults and persons with disabilities. Since then, the project has established a one-stop center on the Islands of Hawaii, Kauai, and Maui, and is in the process of developing the Honolulu site. The Council has a Memorandum of Agreement between the Hawaii County Office of Aging, ADRC, which defines the partner roles and responsibilities related to services provided by ADRC and the Council.

As a systems advocacy agency responsible for statewide planning, coordination, monitoring, evaluation, and advocacy on behalf of individuals with DD and their families, we support a streamlined and user-friendly process for older adults and individuals with disabilities to receive information and be able to navigate the service system to access services and supports. The Council, as well as individuals with disabilities, advocates, public and private service providers, need to be continually involved with the planning and implementation of the ADRCs. We believe identifying and engaging partnerships with all stakeholders will contribute to a seamless approach of accessing long-term services and supports in a manner that respects individual choice and desire, is person-centered, promotes independence and dignity, and provides individual control over the person's life.

The Council defers to EOA regarding the appropriation amount needed to support the ADRC.

HCOA's Position: The Hawaii County Executive Office of Aging is in support of all three

bills.



Fiscal Implications:

-HB 465 **Kupuna Care Program** appropriates, out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii, the sum of \$9 million which is then put into a weighted formula to **Hawaii County of approximately 1.2 million per year**.

-HB 466 **ADRC Program** appropriates, out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii, the sum of \$3,100,000 which is then put into a weighted formula to **Hawaii County of approximately \$500,000 per year.**

-HB 467 **Kupuna Caregiver Program** appropriates, out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii, the sum of \$2,000,000 which is then put into a weighted formula to **Hawaii County of approximately \$125,000 per year.** HCOA agrees with the modification of line 5 with \$350 per week instead of \$70 per day. HCOA would also like to suggest a modification to line 14 to include the word 'and'/or because in Hawaii County respite for caregivers are more than providing the care recipient with a single service. For example, a care recipient might get homemaker services on Tuesday and personal care services on Wednesday of the same week.

Hawaii County has several different approaches towards achieving the same goals as the rest of the state when it comes to caring for Kupuna. One approach is to invest in the county's RSVP program which helps seniors find "purpose", and much of these kupuna are caregivers so their volunteerism also serves as their respite making it a "win-win". Hawaii County has over 1,000 seniors in the RSVP program, 3 times more than Oahu.

Second, HCOA looks at Kupuna Care services as a "short-term" (6-12 months) service in which caregivers are told at intake that although services are based on need, caregivers are encouraged to establish their informal support networks while learning self-care strategies, increasing their caregiving knowledge, applying for Medicaid if eligible, and increasing their knowledge of other private, public, and community resources to further support the long-term needs of kupuna. This is how we've been able to stretch the KC dollar.

However, with the growing population of kupuna and the added State contractual expectations of assessments, data entry, and "no wrong door" mandates, HCOA will be in need of increased funding to the requested amount above in 2022. Until then, we can manage with the funding stated in these bills.

The O'ahu County Committee on Legislative Priorities (OCCLP) of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i (DPH) hereby submits its testimony in **SUPPORT of HB 466 relating to Making an Appropriation for the Aging and Disability Recourse Center.**

HB 465 appropriates out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$3,100,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 for the aging and disability resource center. Funding for the aging and disability resource center will be used for the ongoing implementation of a fully functional statewide aging an disability resource center network to serve as a single entry Point for access to public long-term support programs and benefits.

Hawai'i faces a long-term care crisis that prevents too many seniors and people with disabilities from being able to live with dignity at home or in their communities. The vast majority of people who are aging or living with a disability want to do so at home, but face challenges finding and affording the support they need to do so. Programs that emphasize independence rather than institutionalization must be better structured to support them. DPH will take steps

to strengthen and expand the home care workforce, give seniors and people with disabilities access to quality, affordable long-term care, services, and supports, and ensure that all these resources are readily available at home or in the community. *Democratic Party of Hawai'i Platform* (2018), p. 12, In. 44-50.

For the foregoing reasons, i.e., to strengthen and expand the home care workforce, give seniors access to quality, affordable long-term care, services, and supports, and ensure that all these resources are readily available at home or in the community, OCCLP supports HB 466 and urges its passage out of the Committee on Human Services and Homelessness and Committee on Health.
