Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Kitagawa and members of the Committee.

The Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism offers **comments** on House Bill 539. This measure appropriates \$74,000 for staffing, interisland travel, and other related operating expenses associated with the Small Business Regulatory Review Board (SBRRB).

SBRRB's base budget funds are included in HB1563 which includes two permanent civil service positions assigned to staff the SBRRB. The Administration is requesting an additional \$10,000 for inter-island travel and website improvements to help strengthen the SBRRB's ability for outreach purposes.

DBEDT appreciates the over-all intent of this bill to create a stronger public awareness for the SBRRB to assist those small businesses in need of regulatory relief, but we are concerned that its passage not replace or adversely impact the Administration's financial plan.

The Legislature established the SBRRB in 1998 and reaffirmed its belief in its importance by making it a permanent body in 2001. Since its inception, the SBRRB has enjoyed many successes and is perhaps the single most important voice on regulations within the government for the approximate 96% of the State's employers with fewer than 100 employers.

On behalf of the Small Business Regulatory Review Board (SBRRB), I am providing testimony in strong support of House Bill 539, Related to the Small Business Regulatory Review Board. This measure appropriates funds to DBEDT to provide additional resources for the SBRRB as there is no budget reserved in DBEDT for the SBRRB's operations.

The SBRRB is required to review requests from small business owners for review of any rule adopted by a state agency, and to organize and hold conferences on problems affecting small business. Statutorily, the board is required to have "at least one representative from each county," which requires adequate travel and transportation costs.

Annual expenses for travel alone approximate \$15,000. Without a budget, the SBRRB volunteers have been challenged to provide sufficient outreach to the small business community to provide a valuable, needed service to promote and defend the continued growth of small businesses in Hawaii.

While I am proud of the accomplishments of this very hardworking and dedicated group of volunteers, the SBRRB has had a moderate level of success reducing expensive impacts on small business, which would greatly improve with sufficient funds for marketing and outreach to the small business community.
