In consideration of HOUSE BILL 576 RELATING TO BIRDS

House Bill 576 proposes to prohibit the feeding of excessive numbers of feral birds without requiring the Department of Health to determine that bird waste is dangerous or injurious to health. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) appreciates the intent of this measure and offers the following comments with respect to the definition of "Feral bird".

The Department recognizes that feral birds have many negative impacts on public health and our native wildlife. The Department agrees that feral birds should not be fed or otherwise encouraged to congregate or thrive by the public.

However, the Department is concerned with the definition of "Feral bird" in this measure. This measure defines a "Feral bird" as "any bird living in a wild and undomesticated state." This definition will lead to confusion, as all native birds and introduced game birds are also living in the wild in a non-domesticated state and are valuable and are sometimes fed to support them.

The Department recommends that the definition of "Feral bird" in this measure be amended to reflect the definition of "Feral" in the Department's Hawaii Administrative Rules, Section 13-124-2, meaning "having escaped or been released from domestication and reverted to a wild state."

Chair Mizuno and Members of the Committee:

I am Tim Lyons, Executive Director of the Hawaii Pest Control Association and we generally support this bill however we do need a clarifying amendment.

When our pest control operators perform bird control, they oftentimes provide food as a baiting mechanism. While Section 2, subsection (b)(4) says "it will not apply to the feeding of any food that is for reproductive control" we oftentimes do provide food that is not for reproductive control. Therefore we would recommend that this section be reworded to read, "Any food or bait products used by a pest control operator licensed by Chapter 460J HRS". With that amendment we have no problem overall with the bill and we do know that birds are a horrible problem for many people and we have great sympathy with that issue.
