- 1 **EOA's Position:** The Executive Office on Aging (EOA), an attached agency to the Department
- of Health, would like to provide comments on HB0581. We support the intent of this measure
- 3 provided that its enactment does not reduce or replace priorities within the Administration's
- 4 executive biennium budget.
- 5 **Fiscal Implications:** This measure appropriates unspecified funds for SFY20 and SFY21 for the
- 6 Executive Office on Aging to fund a dedicated staff position to coordinate the provision of
- 7 public and private Alzheimer's disease and related dementia services.
- 8 **Purpose and Justification:** Alzheimer's disease is the sixth leading cause of death in the
- 9 United States and it affects 27,000 Hawaii residents, a number that will increase to 35,000 by the
- year 2025. In addition, an estimated 66,000 unpaid caregivers in Hawaii provide 74,000,000

- 1 hours of unpaid care each year. While the Hawaii 2025: State Plan Alzheimer's Disease and
- 2 Related Dementias identifies strategies in addressing the multifaceted issues in dealing with the
- disease, the services and activities needed requires leadership and coordination at a systemic
- 4 level. Resources are needed to better facilitate and coordinate the collaborative activities to
- 5 implement and update the Alzheimer's disease and related dementias state plan.
- 6 During the 2018 Hawaii State Legislative Session, Governor Ige signed Act 146 Relating to
- 7 Health. This act added a new section to the EOA Statute, HRS349 to prepare an update of the
- 8 State Plan on Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementia (ADRD). However, no funding was
- 9 appropriated to EOA to fund a dedicated position to carry out the mandate, update the State
- ADRD Plan, and coordinate the provision of public and private Alzheimer's disease and related
- 11 dementia services.
- 12 **Recommendation**: Funding for a dedicated staff position to update the ADRD State Plan and
- coordinate the provision of public and private Alzheimer's disease and related dementia services
- is not a part of the Admininistration's budget request. We support advancing this measure
- provided that its enactment does not reduce or replace priorities with the Admininstration's
- 16 budget request.

Dear Chair Mizuno, Chair San Buenaventura, and Members of the Committees:

On behalf of the Alzheimer's Association, Aloha Chapter, I am pleased to extend our **strong support** for House Bill 581, with amendments. This bill appropriates funding for one full-time equivalent Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementia Coordinator within the Executive Office on Aging. This position was established by Act 214, Session Laws of Hawaii 2013.

The State of Hawaii recognized the public health crisis of Alzheimer's Disease in 2013 and developed Hawaii 2025: State Plan on Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias. Unfortunately, while the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementia Services Coordinator position remains unfilled, insufficient progress is being made towards adopting the recommendations and strategies.

Alzheimer's disease is a growing epidemic and is now the nation's sixth leading cause of death. Since the year 2000, there has been a 258% increase in Alzheimer's deaths in Hawaii. Today, more than 28,000 individuals live with Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia. This public health crisis costs \$17,617 per capita to Medicare and an additional \$207 million to Medicaid each year. Hawaii's 66,000 caregivers carry the heaviest burden, providing an estimated \$944,000,000 in unpaid care.

There is an urgent need to address these issues. The current number of individuals affected will only continue to rise as baby boomers age. The increase in individuals affected will continue to take a toll on families and on our community as we are left to pay hefty costs for the care of individuals with dementia. Providing funding for the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementia Coordinator will allow for our community to lessen the negative impact that this disease poses if left unaddressed.

Additionally, we humbly request that this measure be amended to also create and appropriate funds for a Program Specialist IV position within the Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion Division.

Alzheimer's is now viewed as a midlife disease, in that it occurs along a continuum typically beginning in midlife or earlier and results in dementia later in life. Research now demonstrates that there are ways to improve brain health and reduce risk of cognitive decline. The Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion Division works to promote health and reduce the burden of chronic disease for the people of Hawaii by empowering the community, influencing social norms and supporting and encouraging healthy lifestyle choices. Programs under the Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion Division utilize public health strategies including: strategic partnership development and community linkages; awareness and education; surveillance; evidence-based best practices; evaluation; and promoting health equity. For these reasons, we believe that a position focused on Alzheimer's and related dementias within the Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion Division would be well suited to mitigate some of the growing burden.

I appreciate the opportunity to testify in **strong support** of this legislation and applaud your leadership in bringing it forward.

STATEMENT OF THE ILWU LOCAL 142 ON H.B. 581 RELATING TO HEALTH

The ILWU Local 142 **supports** H.B. 581, which appropriates funds for the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementia Services Coordinator position within the Executive Office on Aging.

Alzheimer's and dementia are chronic diseases in every sense. A 2013 state plan called for a coordinator to assist the State with this growing and inevitable problem, but funding has yet to be provided. The fact is one coordinator is not enough, considering the scope and magnitude of the problem. However, one coordinator will be a good start.

Alzheimer's Disease and dementia are extremely costly. The cost of care for patients with Alzheimer's and dementia are astronomical in terms of dollars as well as emotional and physical costs for family caregivers. Hundreds of thousands of hours are spent each day by family caregivers, resulting in the likelihood of diminished economic security for their own retirement. And, as the number of patients with Alzheimer's Disease and dementia continues to grow, the likelihood of Medicaid dollars, half of which is funded by the State, being funneled to pay for such care will grow exponentially.

Although Alzheimer's and dementia may not be preventable, there may be ways to mitigate the impact of the growing number of patients with these conditions. Medical treatment and medication for the patient and education for the family are options that a dedicated coordinator can offer to families coping with the ongoing stress and strain of caring for patients with Alzheimer's and dementia.

I strongly support HB581.

Families rarely talk about how Alzheimer's disease is impacting them. But I am compelled to provide this testimony in memory of my father and on behalf of the literally thousands of individuals and unpaid family caregivers that are affected by Alzheimer's disease and related dementias.

My family has personally experienced the devastating impact of Alzheimer's Disease. My late father passed away from the disease. Caregiving at home involved myself, my mother, my wife, my son, and my daughter. We personally saw how the disease robbed my father of his ability to control his emotions; behavior; mobility; bodily functions, and ultimately his ability to speak and show his love and appreciation to my mother. He passed away one week short of my parent's 60th wedding anniversary.

We are just one family. With similar, but uniquely different situations are the 28,000 Hawaii residents living with Alzheimer's Disease and 66,000 unpaid family caregivers helping their loved ones with the Disease. This makes almost 100,000 Hawaii residents impacted by the Disease right now, that are largely dealing with the Disease on their own.

The State recognized in 2013 the public health crisis of Alzheimer's Disease. A State Plan on Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias was developed. Unfortunately the Plan has NOT been implemented and is sitting on the shelf.

This bill would appropriate funds for the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementia Services Coordinator position. My hope is that with this position the recommendations of the Plan can be turned into actual policies that are carried out. Hawaii families are living every day the nightmare of this disease. We need to help them now.

I urge you to pass this bill. Thank you for the opportunity to provide this testimony.
