SUBJECT: House Bill No. 788, Relating to the Statewide Traffic Code

I am Andre Peters, Acting Captain of the Traffic Division of the Honolulu Police Department (HPD), City and County of Honolulu.

The HPD supports the passage of House Bill No. 788, Relating to the Statewide Traffic Code. For years, individuals have purposely not registered their vehicles knowing that if they received a citation, it would be dismissed in court because they are not the registered owner on file. This legislation would close the loophole that only registered owners can be held liable for not updating their vehicles. It clearly defines that anyone who operates a vehicle within the state must have a current tax and safety inspection emblem. Currently, the system is able to print the license plate or vehicle identification number on the tax and safety emblems, which eliminates the excuse that the operator did not know the vehicle that they were operating was not registered. It puts sole responsibility on the operator to ensure that the emblems are current before driving within the state.

The only concern we have with this bill is the language on line 11 where it states that the law enforcement officer "shall" issue a citation to any person that violates this section. The HPD believes that it should read "may" to give officers the discretion whether to cite the person or not.

The HPD urges you to support House Bill No. 788, Relating to Statewide Traffic Code
