Title of Bill:SB 1009, SD2, HD1 RELATING TO FLAVORED TOBACCO
PRODUCTS.

Purpose of Bill: Bans the sale of flavored tobacco products except for menthol or mentholated products. Prohibits mislabeling of e-liquid products containing nicotine. Establishes fines and penalties for violations. (SB1009 HD1)

Department's Position:

The Department of Education supports SB 1009, SD2, HD1, provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities as indicated in our BOE approved budget.

The 2017 Hawaii Youth Risk Behavior Survey data indicate that almost half of our high school students have tried e-cigarettes and 25% are now regular users. Although traditional cigarette use has declined in recent years, it is still concerning, with one out of every four youth saying that they have smoked a cigarette.

Flavored tobacco products are disproportionately used by youth, partially due to the false perception that fruit- and menthol-flavored products are less harmful than those that are tobacco-flavored. A 2013 US FDA report on the health impact of menthol cigarettes determined that menthol cigarettes lead to increased smoking initiation among youth and young adults, greater addiction and decreased success in quitting smoking.

The nicotine in tobacco products has been found to be addictive and is especially harmful to youth neurologic development. There are numerous other negative health consequences associated with the use of tobacco products and second hand exposure to tobacco smoke and e-cigarette vapor, including higher rates of asthma and respiratory infection. These health conditions may limit a student's ability to attend and participate fully in school and may have long term effects on their educational attainment.

The Department of Education is committed to supporting all students' well-being by providing a safe learning environment and helping them to develop health literacy skills in order to help them reach optimal academic success.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony.

- 1 **Fiscal Implications:** Hawaii saved one billion dollars in total health care savings from 2000 to
- 2 2017 through tobacco use prevention with youth and pregnant women and adult cessation efforts.
- 3 Reducing the initiation of tobacco use and helping people to quit tobacco products will
- 4 ultimately reduce health care costs and improve health outcomes.

Department Testimony: The Department of Health (DOH) supports Senate Bill 1009, Senate
Draft 2, House Draft 1 (S.B. 1009, SD2, HD1) which proposes to amend Chapter 712, Hawaii
Revised Statutes (HRS) by prohibiting the sale or distribution of all flavored tobacco products,
excluding products with menthol, prohibiting mislabeling of e-liquid products containing
nicotine as nicotine-free, and clarifying the fines and penalties for unlawful sales of flavored
tobacco products in the State of Hawaii, effective July 1, 2050. The Department defers to the
Department of the Attorney General (AG) for enforceability.

The availability of flavors is amongst the top reasons given by youth nationally, and the
number one reason in Hawaii for the use of e-cigarettes, also called electronic smoking devices
(ESDs). Moreover, a higher rate of Hawaii high school students than their national peers, 28

percent believe that ESDs are not dangerous. Peer influence is also a significant factor, with 44
 percent of youth reporting their four closest friends are ESD users.^{1,2}

Youth vaping is a serious public health issue. Only 4.7 percent of adults report current use of electronic smoking devised (ESDs) as compared to 26 percent of Hawaii public high school students.^{3,4} Nationally, youth vaping surged 78 percent in one year between 2017 and 2018.⁵ Flavors serve as the enticement factor to lure youth through candy and fruit flavors along with cartoon characters.⁶ Many ESDs and their refill liquids come in sweet flavors, such as mango, chocolate, gummi bear, and strawberry. In 2017, researchers were able to identify more than 15,500 unique e-cigarette flavors available online.⁷

While flavors attract youth to vaping, nicotine drives their addiction. Many youth are 10 unaware of the addictive properties of nicotine. The brain continues to develop until age 25 and 11 is the last organ to fully mature in the human body. Adolescence is a period of significant brain 12 13 development, and nicotine exposure can disrupt the growth of brain circuits that control attention, learning, lead to increased impulsivity and mood disorders, and increase susceptibility 14 to addiction.⁸ Besides the impact on brain development, more youth who never tried cigarettes, 15 are now using ESDs, and research shows these youth are more likely to initiate cigarette use. 16 17 Smoking is still the leading cause of preventable deaths in Hawaii and the nation.

In Hawaii, from 2011 to 2015, experimentation with vaping among middle school 1 students increased six-fold, and amongst high school youth the increase was four-fold.⁹ 2 According to the Hawaii 2017 Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS), 16 percent of middle 3 school and 26 percent of high school youth are current ESD users, and the rates are even higher 4 on the neighbor islands with Hawaii County at 34 percent, Maui County at 32 percent, and Kauai 5 County at 31 percent.¹⁰ These percentages are over twice as high as the national average of 13 6 percent, and data show that Hawaii has been leading the trend in ESD use by youth.¹¹ The 7 National Youth Tobacco Survey (NYTS) that reported the 78 percent increase from 2017 to 2018 8 9 was the first national survey to reflect the impact of rising sales of JUUL and other USB-shaped 10 ESDs.

11 The Department supports this legislation to ban flavored tobacco products, to prohibit the 12 mislabeling of any e-liquid product that contains nicotine as nicotine-free, and to clarify the fines 13 and penalties for unlawful sales of flavored tobacco products. Ending the sale of flavored 14 tobacco products is an issue of both health and social justice. Candy and fruit flavored tobacco 15 products are marketed to youth intentionally to replace smokers of traditional cigarettes.

The major tobacco companies continue to invest heavily in flavored products with their own brands and are acquiring existing ESD companies. The global ESD industry has grown dramatically and in 2017 was valued at 10.24 billion U.S. dollars. Altria, parent company of Phillip Morris, invested 12.8 billion dollars for a 35 percent stake in JUUL, a product so popular with youth that, "to JUUL" has become a synonym for vaping. A single flavored pod of JUUL contains as much nicotine as 20 regular cigarettes.

On March 5, 2019, U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) Commissioner Scott
Gottlieb resigned. He described teen vaping as an "epidemic" and was a harsh critic of ESD
companies and the proliferation of kid-friendly flavors. The Department respectfully requests the

The Office of the Prosecuting Attorney, County of Hawai'i submits the following testimony in SUPPORT of Senate Bill No. 1009, SD 2, HD 1.

This measure bans the sale of flavored tobacco products.

Electronic smoking device (ESD) use among youth in Hawai'i has reached epidemic levels, and ESDs have surpassed cigarettes as the most used tobacco product among youth.

The tobacco industry claims they are not targeting children, but their actions tell a different story. The rise in youth use of EDSs has been in conjunction with the targeted branding of sweet, candy-flavored tobacco products. The toxic combination of enticing flavors and nicotine have led to a generation of youth addicted to tobacco products.

It is encouraging that the FDA has recognized flavors and ESDs as a national public health concern. It is also clear that we must act NOW to protect Hawai'i keiki from the enticement of candy-flavored tobacco products and a lifetime of addition.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in SUPPORT WITH REVISIONS of this important measure. The purpose of this measure is to ban the sale of flavored tobacco products.

According to the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, flavored products play a major role in young people trying tobacco for the first time. Although there has been significant progress in reducing cigarette use amongst youth, overall use of tobacco products remains high due to the popularity of flavored products available for e-cigarettes. With over 15,000 flavors on the market, restricting the sale of kid-friendly flavors is necessary to protect them from a lifetime of nicotine addiction.

According to the Hawaii's 2017 Youth Risk Behavior Survey, the percentage of Hawaii high school and middle school students who have tried vaping are 42.3% and 27.0%, respectively. The percentage of Maui County high school and middle school students who have tried vaping are even higher at 50.7% and 32.1%, respectively. These figures show that the prevalence of e-cigarettes is a serious problem and more needs to be done to prevent the use of tobacco products amongst students.

The most current version of this measure includes an exception to the ban on flavored products for menthol and mentholated products. Menthol is a particularly insidious compound since its cooling properties mask the harshness of tobacco smoke and nicotine, making it the starter product of choice for new tobacco users. I would suggest banning the sale of all flavored tobacco products, including menthol and mentholated products.

Chair Takumi, Chair Lee, and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Primary Care Association (HPCA) is a 501(c)(3) organization established to advocate for, expand access to, and sustain high quality care through the statewide network of Community Health Centers throughout the State of Hawaii. The HPCA <u>SUPPORTS</u> Senate Bill No. 1009, House Draft 1, RELATING TO FLAVORED TOBACCO PRODUCTS.

The bill, as received by your Committee, would:

- (1) Prohibit the sale, offer for sale, or possession with the intent to sell or offer to sell a flavored tobacco product beginning January 1, 2020;
- (2) Prohibit the mislabeling of e-liquid containing nicotine as nicotine-free;
- (3) Clarify that a statement or claim is made to the consumer or public that the product has or produces a characterizing flavor be prima facie evidence that the tobacco product is a flavored tobacco product beginning January 1, 2020;
- (4) Provide that any tobacco product or electronic smoking device in the retailer's possession at the time of the violation be seized and forfeited to the State, and following administrative or judicial proceedings finding that the violation was committed, be destroyed by law enforcement;
- (5) Authorize penalties on a retailer whose agent or employee violates the foregoing not to exceed \$500 for the first offense, and not less than \$500 but not more than \$2,000 for any subsequent offense;

- (6) Allow any county to adopt rules or ordinances that place greater restrictions on the access of tobacco products and provide that the more stringent restriction prevail;
- (7) Include both savings and severability clauses ; and
- (8) Take effect on July 1, 2050.

Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) provide desperately needed medical services at the frontlines in rural communities. Long considered champions for creating a more sustainable, integrated, and wellness-oriented system of health, FQHCs provide a more efficient, more effective and more comprehensive system of health.

FQHCs have long seen first-hand how tobacco has literally destroyed the lives of our patients and their families. Because of the ubiquity of cigarettes, chewing tobacco, and now electronic smoking devices, the impacts of tobacco affect our citizenry on a generational basis with people experimenting at even earlier ages. From our perspective, the development of flavored products are intended specifically to introduce these products to younger consumers for the purpose of grooming the next generation of smokers, chewers, and vaporers.

It is for this reason that the HPCA joins the Hawaii Public Health Institute and other advocates in strong support of all efforts to rid the marketplace of these products.

The Hawaii State Teachers Association <u>strongly supports SB 1009, SD2, HD1</u> banning the sale of flavored tobacco products.

This measure would ban the sale of flavored to bacco products in the state of Hawaii starting on 1/1/2020.

Flavored tobacco products have been proven as the entry point for youth to start smoking. According to the FDA's 2018 National Youth Tobacco Survey over two-thirds (67.8 percent) are using flavored e-cigarettes, which is a significant increase from 2017. The 2017 CDC, Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System reported 8.1% of high school students smoked on at least one day in the past 30 days.

Locally the Hawaii's Youth Risk Behavior Survey of public high school students disclosed the following: over 42% of Hawaii high school students have tried using vapor products; over 25% of Hawaii high school students indicated that they are regular users; and neighbor islands high school students reporting even higher numbers with over 31% of Kauai students, over 32% of Maui students, and over 34% of Hawaii county students reported to be regular users.

This data is clear and the reason the Hawaii State Teachers Association asks your committee to **support** SB 1009, SD2, HD1. We need to protect our youth.

On behalf of Hawaii Children's Action Network (HCAN), I am writing in SUPPORT of S.B. 1009, which bans the sale of flavored tobacco products. Effective 1/1/2020.

Tobacco use remains a serious threat to public health. Each year, Hawaii spends \$526 million in health care costs and \$141.7 million in Medicaid costs due to smoking. Tobacco products with menthol, sweet flavors, and colorful packaging are designed to attract teens and young adults. With 81% of youth starting with a flavored product, regulating the flavors designed to capture and addict new customers prioritizes the health and safety of our community over tobacco's special interests.

This measure helps to protect our keiki from a lifetime of addiction. Hawaii is experiencing a vaping epidemic among our young people. The State Legislature has worked hard to protect our residents from the harms caused by tobacco use, but the rapid growth of e-cigarette use is alarming. With 42% of all high school students and 27% of middle schoolers reporting ever having used an "electronic vaping product" in 2017.

Prohibiting the sale of flavored tobacco products can help to keep kids from ever starting to smoke or vape, and can encourage those addicted to these products, to quit. We appreciate Hawaii's leadership in tobacco control and the legislature's actions to protect our young people from a deadly addiction.

For these reasons, HCAN respectfully requests that the committee pass this bill.

HCAN is committed to building a unified voice advocating for Hawaii's children by improving their safety, health, and education.

HPHA strongly supports SB1009 SD2 HD1, which would end the sale of flavored tobacco products, including flavored e-liquids and menthol cigarettes.

Hawai'i is already experiencing a youth vaping epidemic. Studies have shown that 8 in 10 kids start with a flavored tobacco product. It's no coincidence that the rise in youth vaping has coincided with an explosion of sweet e-liquid flavors used to hook kids. With more than 15,500 flavors, these products are being irresponsibly marketed – who is the industry really targeting with flavors like Fruit Hoops, Sour Straws, or Cookie Monsta?

It's also critical to include menthol cigarettes in the flavored tobacco ban. Menthol cigarettes are a popular starter product, as it has cooling properties that mask the harshness of tobacco smoke and nicotine. The tobacco industry has a long history of marketing menthol cigarettes to youth and vulnerable groups, such as the Native Hawaiian community, and has led to health disparities.

We must end the sale of candy-flavored tobacco to protect our youth from a lifetime of addiction. The industry is promoting flavors that mimic popular food or candy to hide the fact that they contain nicotine and with more kids who were never smokers using these products, we have an urgent need to act. HPHA strongly supports SB1009 SD2 HD1 and ask you to pass this out of committee.

The Hawaii Dental Hygienists' Association (HDHA) strongly **supports Senate Bill 1009 SD2, HD1** which proposes to prohibit the sale or distribution of all flavored tobacco products, including products with menthol, in the State of Hawaii effective January 1, 5 2020.

We congratulate the Legislature for introducing a measure that seeks to address the health dangers caused by flavored tobacco products in Hawaii. The marketing of flavored tobacco products, clearly targets sales to Hawaii's youth as an initiation into the use of other nicotine products. In contrast to the positive decline in combustible tobacco smoking, use of electronic smoking devices (ESDs), also known as vaping or e-cigarettes, has increased dramatically over the last decade, making ESDs and flavored tobacco products the most common tobacco product used among youth.

HDHA believes that the nicotine in tobacco is clearly addictive and has been proven to be especially harmful to the oral health of those using it. Current research shows a direct correlation between smoking and periodontal disease. It has been shown to significantly increase the risk of tooth loss over time and decrease the ability for oral soft tissue to heal.

As the largest association representing Hawaii's licensed dental hygienists', HDHA strongly **supports SB 1009 SD2**, HD1 to ban the sale of flavored tobacco products in Hawaii. Dental hygienists strive daily to educate patients on ways to improve their oral health, which includes discussing the harmful effects of smoking and tobacco related products. American Heart Association Testimony Supporting the INTENT of SB 1009, SD2, "Relating to Flavored Tobacco Products,"

The American Heart Association supports the intent of SB 1009, SD2, HD1 "Relating to Flavored Tobacco Products" but strongly recommends amending the bill to include menthol as a flavor included under the restrictions.

The 2014 Surgeon General's Report projects that if current trends continue, 5.6 million of today's youth under 18 will die prematurely in adulthood from smoking-related illness. To protect this vulnerable population, policymakers need to move quickly and ban the use of characterizing flavors, including menthol, from all tobacco products.

The evidence supporting a flavor ban is clear. As we discuss below, flavored tobacco products are highly attractive to youth and have led to increased initiation and use among children and adolescents. The number of flavored products on the market has also increased substantially with the tobacco industry marketing thousands of fruit, candy, and mint flavored products that appeal to children. Allowing these products to remain on the market puts a new generation at risk of a dangerous addiction.

While we understand that some adult tobacco users report using flavored products to transition or switch from combustible cigarettes, there is little evidence supporting their use as a cessation tool. In addition, there is some evidence that flavored tobacco products have enticed adult never smokers to try tobacco for the first time – just as they have with children. We encourage legislators to make protecting children its top priority when considering legislative options for flavored tobacco.

AHA feels that a blanket flavoring ban is needed because a wide array of flavors appeal to youth and young adults, which increases the risk of initiation and continued tobacco use. Also, many of the flavorings, including some of the most popular, contain known toxins. We believe this would make it extremely difficult to identify specific flavors to ban. Studies show that menthol cigarettes increase initiation, especially among youth.

The number of flavored tobacco products on the market increased substantially after flavored cigarettes were banned. After the 2009 federal ban on flavored cigarettes took effect, the tobacco industry started producing different types of flavored tobacco products that were

not subject to the prohibition. This lead to the rise in in the number of youth using flavored cigars, and especially in Hawaii, e-cigarettes. Both the tobacco industry and youth adjusted to the cigarette ban by moving to other tobacco products where flavors were still allowed. If the legislature were to pass a flavoring ban, but limit it to certain types of products or flavorings, we are likely to see the same thing happen again.

The availability of flavors is one of the main reasons youth and young adults use ecigarettes and other noncombustible products. If the legislature wants to decrease

youth tobacco use, removing flavors from noncombusted products is key. In addition, current smokers will

be motivated to move to noncombusted products – even if they are unflavored – when the nicotine content in cigarettes is reduced through federal regulation.

In Hawaii alone, tobacco use claims 1,400 lives each year and creates \$526 million in annual health care costs directly caused by smoking (\$141.7 million of that is covered by the state Medicaid program). Hawaii residents' state & federal tax burden from smokingcaused government expenditures is \$836 per household. Hawaii's estimated tobacco tax revenue, estimated to be approximately \$110 million per year, does not come close to offsetting the losses to the state caused by tobacco use. Smoking declines caused by state cigarette tax increases directly reduce these smoking-caused economic burdens for all taxpayers, and Hawaii businesses which bear the brunt of employee healthcare costs in our state.

Those who might quit tobacco addiction as a result of a comprehensive flavor ban would then have additional money to spend on taxable products that don't result in over a \$500 million in healthcare costs to the state. The money doesn't go up in smoke or vapor; instead it will likely be spent on more productive things that can benefit the smokers' and/or their families and our state.

It's time to end the use of candy flavors and menthol to entice our children into a deadly addiction.

The American Heart Association asks for your support of SB 1009, SD2, HD1 with the suggested amendment to restore menthol as part of the flavor ban.

Aloha,

My name is Cori Takesue and I am a member of the Coalition for Tobacco-Free Hawai'i as well as a Behavioral Health Specialist and Tobacco cessation treatment provider at Lana'i Community Health Center. I'm writing today to request your support of our 2019 legislative priority to ban flavored tobacco, including e-cigarette products in Hawai'i.

Our Coalition supports the Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawaii Youth Council, which is made up of high school and college students from across the state. This year our Youth Council and the Coalition have selected this as our policy priority because we believe something must be done to stop the epidemic of vaping amongst youth. Hawai'i has some of the highest rates of vaping in the country, with 25% of high school students and 15% of middle school students reporting they vaped in the past 30 days. 81% of kids nationwide use a flavored tobacco product as their introduction to tobacco, including vaping. 30% of vapers start using combustible tobacco within 60 days of starting to vape and 95% of current smokers started before the age of 21. It's clear to the members of our Youth Council and our Coalition that banning flavored tobacco is key to breaking this cycle. Flavored tobacco has no place in Hawai'i and we hope you feel the same. We don't need candy flavored tobacco to entice youth into starting a potentially life-long addiction to nicotine.

Elimination of flavored tobacco products across the state of Hawai'i will prevent addiction, reduce continued use of tobacco products throughout one's lifespan, and prevent chronic health conditions such as COPD and cardiovascular disease.

It is important to ban flavored tobacco products as today's marketing targets and encourages youth to take part in this unhealthy behavior. Hawaii has the fifth highest amount of vaping in the United States. E-cigarettes continue to grow in popularity leading to a potential health epidemic. With up to 15,500 flavors, ecigarettes are of particular interest and attraction to Hawai'i's youth. Along with the enticing flavors and packaging, youth perceive e-cigarettes to be less harmful than other nicotine filled tobacco products. Students have shared that vaping is a popular activity that occurs both inside and outside of the academic setting. Youth have the ability to access flavorless tobacco through social media accounts, vape stores without regulation of the 21-year-old age law, and online orders with their parent's credit cards.

Youth do not understand the dangers of this harmful product. E-cigarettes contain toxic chemicals These ingredients result in chronic health consequences including lung cancer, addiction, central nervous system damage, and delay of proper adolescent brain development.

808novape researchers have found that:

- 26% of Hawai'i high school students are using e-cigarettes
- 94% online purchases of e-cigarettes have been successful amongst teens

- 60% of teens believe occasional use of e-cigarettes does little to of harm
- 70% of middle and high schoolers have recently seen e-cigarette advertising

Four of five young people who use tobacco start with a flavored product. Tobacco is one of the leading causes of death and should not be accessible to Hawai'i's youth. Please ban the sale of flavored tobacco products.

The Hawaii Food Industry Association is comprised of two hundred member companies representing retailers, suppliers, producers, and distributors of food and beverage related products in the State of Hawaii.

The federal government already has in place adequate regulations regarding flavored cigarettes. Tobacco regulations are handled at the federal level for good reason. Enforcing this type of ban on very specific kinds of a product, which are legal at the federal level would be a potentially logistically difficult and very expensive process. Any additional regulations of these types of products should occur at the federal level.

At the state level tobacco use in Hawaii is already restricted to those who are 21 and older. Kids and adults under 21 don't have legal access to these products and businesses already take measures to ensure that only those 21 and older are buying nicotine products.

This bill unfairly targets and penalizes those who choose to use certain types of products, and the businesses that serve these customers. This type of regulation is not really necessary and can be obtrusive. We thank you for the opportunity to testify.

Dear Chairs Takumi & Lee, Vice-Chairs Ichiyama & San Buenaventura, and Members of the Committees:

At Blue Zones Projects we are working to make Hawaii a happier, healthier place to live, work and play. We support SB1009 SD2 HD1, which will ban the sale of flavored tobacco products, ultimately reducing the number of users and potential users.

Youth are highly attracted to the variety, 15,500 + and growing, flavors. These are marketed to appeal to young people. With names like Fruit Hoops, Cali Colada, Space Jam, TrollzE, and Blizzard Berry-BRRRST, clearly the industry is targeting children under 21. By attracting young people, the next generation of consumers is being cultivated.

It is targeted, and the messaging is working phenomenally well. Nationally, there was a 78% increase from 2017-2018 in current e-cigarette use among high school students and 48% increase among middle school students. Bringing the total number of middle and high school students currently using to 3.6 million, 1.5 million more than the previous year. Hawaii youth are part of this trend, 42% of HIDOE high school students and 27% of middle school students report having ever used an electronic vaping product.

"Each day more than 2800 adolescents aged 12-17 try smoking with 10.9% of students trying before the age 13. Roughly 700 adolescents transition to daily smoking each day and more than 60% of teen smokers still smoke 5 years later."¹ The fruity flavors are favored by teens because they mask the taste of the bitter nicotine. Children are the target consumer with these flavors that is shown by the increase in products by young people. Our children are becoming addicts, and although the schools have been given the ability to take ESDs away from students and turn the devices over to the police, it is impossible to stop addiction by simply removing the device. We need to target the source of the adolescent addiction.

Young people are the industry's target through the sale of flavored tobaccos. This tactic gets children hooked. "Preventing youth from smoking is important because 90% of smokers start before the age of 18, and very few adults will begin to smoke or use smokeless tobacco products after age 26. An estimated 5.6 million youth <18 will die prematurely from a smoking-related illness; these deaths can be averted through concerted public health measures and regulatory measures."² We cannot address this epidemic nationally, but we can address it here for our Hawaii youth, and be an example for others.

This situation is a public health crisis that costs our state. The trajectory of teen vaping rates will surpass those of teen smoking rates at their peak. The levels of nicotine in one JUUL are making kids addicts immediately. It is not smoking, coughing and gagging on a combustible cigarette. It is enjoying the flavor of something that has the nicotine equivalent of 20 cigarettes. And most teens think they are only vaping flavors, not nicotine.³

There has been recent backstepping at federal level regarding this epidemic. As a state, we do not have the time to take a "wait and see" approach. The crisis is now. For years, we have done our keiki a disservice by ignoring the numbers and trusting that the industry has been acting ethically. We are allowing a generation to become addicted to nicotine through the hook of flavored e-liquids.

This measure is the top priority of the youth council. Our children are asking the adults to address the issue of their health and well-being; we can't fail them. We are grateful to the committees for hearing SB1009 SD2 HD1 and hope that you will consider passing this bill.

Kapi'olani Smokefree Families, the tobacco & nicotine cessation program at Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children, **strongly supports SB 1009 to ban the sales of flavored tobacco products in Hawaii.**

At Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children, we often see pediatric patients who are adversely affected by tobacco products in multiple ways. There are babies in the NICU (neonatal intensive care unit) who were born early due in part to the effects of smoke exposure during pregnancy. We see young children routinely coming in with asthma and ear infections because they are being exposed to secondhand and thirdhand smoke. Now, we have teenagers and young kids who are screening positive for e-cigarette or vape use.

One of the biggest concerns with e-cigarettes is the lack of longitudinal studies on health and safety of these products. It took decades for the harmful side-effects of combustible cigarettes to become well-known, and we do not want our youth to be the ones to suffer from any potential health effects of e-cigarettes or vape products.

Initiation of e-cigarette use is almost always associated with a flavored product. Studies have shown that flavored tobacco-use is particularly enticing to youth. The e-cigarette and vape companies use attractive packaging and flavors that are very similar to candy products and sweets that are easily recognizable by children and teens. These flavors include common candies like cotton candy, sweet tart, blue raspberry, and even local Hawaii-inspired flavors like POG (passion orange guava), Hawaii Sweet Roll, and Pele's Papaya.

In the best interest of our local youth, we would like to **request the ban of flavored tobacco products** that have been enticing to the youth. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on this measure.



TESTIMONY OF TINA YAMAKI PRESIDENT RETAIL MERCHANTS OF HAWAII March 20, 2019 Re: SB 1009 SD2 HD1 Relating to Flavored Tobacco Products

Good afternoon Chairperson Takumi, Chairperson Lee and members of the House Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce and the Committee on Judiciary. I am Tina Yamaki, President of the Retail Merchants of Hawaii and I appreciate this opportunity to testify.

The Retail Merchants of Hawaii (RMH) as founded in 1901 and is a statewide, not for profit trade organization committed to the growth and development of the retail industry in Hawaii. The retail industry is one of the largest employers in the state, employing 25% of the labor force.

We OPPOSE SB 1009 SD2 HD1 Relating to Flavored Tobacco Products. This measure would ban the sale of flavored tobacco products except for menthol or mentholated products; prohibits mislabeling of e-liquid products containing nicotine; and establishes fines and penalties for violations.

This bill would essentially ban all electronic vapor products and e-liquids. As a result, people would be compelled to purchase these goods online, on the black market, trying to mix flavored e-liquids themselves and essentially force many small local businesses who sells these items to shut down, thus leaving many of our family, friends and neighbors out of work.

Furthermore, it is our understanding that electronic vaping devices has no "natural tobacco" taste, or any taste for that matter, without the addition of flavorings. And although almost every electronic vaping device and eliquid available worldwide is "flavored" not all of the flavors contain nicotine and those that do, not all nicotine strengths are the same. And flavored e-liquids are enjoyed by many adults.

In addition, vapor products and e-liquids are NOT the same as a tobacco product. Many electronic vaping devices contains NO tobacco and NO smoke is emitted when vaporized. The New England Journal of Medicine published an article recently that found that electronic vaping devices were nearly twice as effective as conventional nicotine replacement products, like patches and gum, for quitting smoking. The study was conducted in Britain and funded by the National Institute for Health Research and Cancer Research UK.

We are also aware that the US Food & Drug Administration has recently "deemed" various tobacco products, including e-vapor, to be subject to federal regulation. Under FDA's regulatory authority, e-vapor products will face a number of important requirements, such as domestic manufacturer establishment registration, ingredient disclosures, reporting of harmful or potentially harmful constituents, and prohibitions on selling to minors. We urge you to hold this measure until the Federal product regulations come out.

I am Jim Yates, president of the Hawaii Petroleum Marketers Association ("HPMA"). HPMA is a non-profit trade association comprised of members who directly market liquid motor fuel products across the Hawaiian Islands. Our membership includes individuals and companies who operate as independent marketers, jobbers or distributors of petroleum products and who buy liquid motor fuel products at the wholesale level and sell or distribute products to retail customers, other wholesalers, and other bulk consumers. HPMA's primary purpose is to protect and advance its members' legislative and regulatory interests in Hawaii and Washington, DC.

Senate Bill 1009, Senate Draft 2, House Draft 1 bans the sale of flavored tobacco products except for menthol or mentholated products; prohibits mislabeling of e-liquid products containing nicotine; and establishes fines and penalties for violations.

HPMA is opposed to certain provisions in S.B. 1009, S.D. 2, H.D. 1 and asks for the committees' consideration of two amendments.

While HPMA does support strict enforcement of laws governing underage tobacco product sales, this bill goes too far in banning most types of flavored tobacco products. The bill does exempt menthol and mentholated tobacco products from the ban. We believe all smokeless tobacco products should be exempt, as well. This group of products includes snuff and chewing tobacco, most of which are flavored beyond menthol and are labeled and marketed toward a narrow set of adult users.

Additionally, having a uniform statewide law in banning tobacco products is preferred. We believe allowing a county to adopt ordinances that place greater restrictions on the access to tobacco products than the State law may lead to an uneven regulatory landscape from county to county that would complicate compliance.

Therefore, HPMA respectfully requests including the following amendments in the bill:

§ 712 - ____ Sale of flavored tobacco products

[(5) Any county may adopt a rule or ordinance that places greater restrictions on the access of tobacco products than provided for in this section. In the case of a conflict between the restrictions in this section and any county rule or ordinance regarding access to tobacco products, the more stringent restrictions shall prevail.]

(6) For the purpose of this section:

"Flavored tobacco product" means any tobacco product that contains a constituent that imparts a characterizing flavor<u>,</u> <u>except for menthol or mentholated products and all smokeless</u> tobacco products that are flavored.

The Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawai'i, a program of the Hawai'i Public Health Instituteⁱ is in **Strong Support of SB 1009** which would end the sale of all flavored tobacco products in the state.

This measure helps to protect our keiki from a lifetime of addiction. Hawaii is experiencing a vaping epidemic among our young people. The State Legislature has worked hard to protect our residents from the harms caused by tobacco use, but the rapid growth of e-cigarette use is alarming.



With 42% of all high school students and 27% of middle schoolers reporting ever having used an "electronic vaping product" and 4.7%ⁱⁱ of adults regularly using ESDs in 2017, we have an urgent need to act.

In addition, the latest report released in Feb 2019 by the CDC (attached) is very concerning:

- E-cigarette use increased from 11.7% to 20.8% among high school students and from 3.3% to 4.9% among middle school students from 2017 to 2018.
- There were 1.5 million more current youth e-cigarette users in 2018 than in 2017.

The industry claims that they're not targeting kids, but their actions tell a different story. With 15,500 e-cigarette flavors and growing, these products are not being responsibly

marketed. Candy flavors such as Fruit Hoops, Sour Straws, Gummy Bears, and Cookie Monsta are designed to appeal to kids, and make nicotine go down easier. With 81% of youth starting with a flavored productⁱⁱⁱ, <u>regulating the flavors designed to capture</u> <u>and addict new customers prioritizes the health and safety of our community over tobacco's</u> <u>special interests.</u> The industry selects colorful packaging and ads that appeal to taste and pop culture. Tobacco companies have a long history of using these same tactics to entice new and younger users and make them repeat customers. In addition, despite our Tobacco 21 law, several stores to continue to sell to underage minors, as reported in the FDA Compliance Check inspections site^{iv}:

These new products are glamorizing nicotine addiction.

The vaping industry has taken full advantage of delays by the FDA to regulate these products. Large volume (30-60mL), highly concentrated (5-5.9%) nicotine sale e-liquids have entered the market in youth-oriented flavors. Most recently, pod-based systems such as Juul and Suoprin have disrupted the e-cigarette market by creating an easily concealable sleek device that can deliver higher concentrations of nicotine. Tobacco giant Altria, maker of Marlboro, spent \$12.8 billion to purchase a third of Juul, which has 76% of the e-cigarette market share and is worth \$38 billion.



At the risk of allowing these products to remain on the market, we are addicting a new generation to these deadly products. The health of Hawaii's keiki must be protected from the predatory marketing of tobacco companies.

Hawai'i has an opportunity to act now and be the first state to end the sale of flavored tobacco.

Over 180 localities^v have passed restrictions on the sale of flavored tobacco products, and over two dozen restrict the sale of menthol cigarettes. FDA's proposed plan aims to restrict the sale of flavored e-cigarettes in convenience stores and gas stations, however, it still allows e-cigarette products to stay on the market and online without review by the FDA until August 2022. Since recognizing flavors and vaping as a national public health concern, the FDA has only sent warning letters to 18 manufacturers since May 2018. We know rulemaking at the federal level is often a long process, which is why state-level action on menthol and other flavored products is needed now. E-cigarettes are not FDA-approved tobacco cessation products. We have yet to see any scientific evidence, beyond anecdotal data, that e-cigarettes have helped smokers to quit completely from tobacco use. The concern is that with the aggressive and deceptive marketing of these products, we are seeing other consequences: **1**) people who have never smoked are using e-cigarettes, **2**) children are picking them up as a path to smoking, and **3**) smokers are using them to perpetuate their habit instead of to completely quit.

Prohibiting the sale of flavored tobacco products can help to keep kids from ever starting to smoke or vape, and can encourage those addicted to these products, to quit. We appreciate

Hawaii's leadership in tobacco control and the legislature's actions to protect our young people from a deadly addiction. We respectfully urge the committee to **pass SB1009 SD2**.

E-cigarette use increased from 11.7% to 20.8% among high school students and from 3.3% to 4.9% among middle school students from 2017 to 2018. - E-cigarettes are still the most commonly used tobacco product, ahead of cigarettes, cigars, smokeless tobacco, hookah, and pipes.
- E-cigarettes are the most commonly used product in combination with other tobacco products.

Re: Testimony in Support of SB 1009, SD2, HD1 **Relating to Flavored Tobacco Products**

My name is Michael Robinson, Vice President, Government Relations & Community Affairs at Hawai'i Pacific Health. Hawai'i Pacific Health is a not-for-profit health care system comprised of its four medical centers - Kapi'olani, Pali Momi, Straub and Wilcox and over 70 locations statewide with a mission of creating a healthier Hawai'i.

I write in support of SB 1009, SD2 which would ban the sale of flavored tobacco products effective as of January 1, 2020.

Tobacco use remains the leading cause of preventable disease and death in the United States and in Hawai'i. Tobacco use is a serious public health problem in terms of the human suffering and loss of life it causes, as well as the financial burden it imposes on society and our healthcare system. Annually, \$526,000,000 in health care costs are directly attributed to smoking in the State. Flavored tobacco products promote youth initiation of tobacco use and help young occasional smokers become daily smokers by reducing or masking the natural harshness and taste of tobacco smoke, thereby increasing the appeal of tobacco products. Menthol, in particular, is used by the tobacco industry because it has a cooling and numbing effect and can reduce the throat irritation from smoking, thus making menthol cigarettes an appealing option for youth who are initiating tobacco use. Candy and fruit flavors improve the taste and reduce the harshness of tobacco products, making them more appealing and easier for beginners to try tobacco products and ultimately become addicted. The popularity of electronic cigarettes among youth is concerning, as these products contain nicotine.

E-cigarette use or vaping among youth and young adults has become a national public health concern. E-cigarettes are now the most popularly used tobacco product among youth and young adults, surpassing cigarettes. While smoking rates in Hawaii have decreased through the years, ESD use has rapidly increased, threatening significant public health gains through our Tobacco 21 law and tobacco youth access laws. This is particularly concerning because e-cigarettes provide a new way to deliver the addictive drug nicotine. No matter how it is delivered, nicotine exposure can lead to addiction and harm the developing brain. Studies are also finding that ESDs can lead to smoking cigarettes for new users, including kids. Marketing strategies by the tobacco industry and electronic smoking device industry have significantly increased the introduction and marketing of flavored non-cigarette tobacco products, especially ESDs. Products are glamorized in order to appeal to our youth, using flavors such as candy, fruit, chocolate, mint, Kona coffee, Maui Mango, Shaka strawberry, and Moloka'i hot bread.

Recognizing the increasing public health concerns of flavored tobacco products, other jurisdictions have enacted bans on the sale of those products. Hawaii should also take the step to impose a similar ban.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony.

VOLCANO Fine Electronic Cigarettes[®] is the largest retailer & wholesaler of vapor products and vaping accessories in the State of Hawaii. We currently own and operate 15 locations statewide and employ over 110 full-time workers to support sales of our products not only here in Hawaii, but to all 50 states as well as over 30 International countries. We stand in opposition to SB 1009 SD2 HD1 for the following:

- SB 1009 SD2 HD1 would decimate the Hawaiian vapor industry by banning the sale of all electronic cigarette liquids and cartridges. Every electronic cigarette available on the worldwide market is "flavored." Because they do not contain tobacco, electronic cigarettes have no "natural tobacco" taste, or any taste for that matter, without the addition of flavorings. Even electronic cigarettes advertised as coming in "tobacco flavor" are actually just the result of the blending of several different flavorings such as caramel and nut flavors in an attempt to mimic the flavor of tobacco. To use the language of the proposed statute, every electronic cigarette imparts to the user a "distinguishable or distinctive" aroma, or taste other than tobacco. As a result, SB 1009 SD2 HD1 will act as a de facto ban of the manufacture and sale of all electronic cigarettes.
- Even if SB 1009 SD2 HD1 permitted the sale of electronic cigarettes flavored to taste like tobacco, its enactment would still ban the manufacture and sale of the vast majority of our products. This bill would present more than just a competitive disadvantage for local suppliers and retailers. It would be a death knell for vapor industry in Hawaii. Local consumers will either flavor liquids themselves or purchase from out of state, causing a loss of jobs and tax revenues for the state. Similarly, we will be forced to close our stores and move all or most of our business and operations to the mainland, taking with us jobs and tax revenue that has grown every year since our founding.
- Enactment of SB 1009 SD2 HD1 will deal a similar fate to our competitors in the electronic cigarette industry. Between them these businesses have likely created 1000 jobs in Hawaii. All or more of these jobs will be lost as a result of this legislation. Additionally, convenience

stores and other businesses that sell vapor products will feel the impact of consumers purchasing products from the mainland.

- The baseless claims that electronic cigarettes flavors are made to attract children must be weighed against the significant evidence that electronic cigarette flavors are very popular with adult users. The International Journal of Environmental Research and Public Research recently published the most expansive survey performed on the subject. We urge you to read the full text of this study, which we have attached to our testimony. Below are some highlights:
 - Researchers conducted an Internet survey of over 4,500 adult electronic cigarette consumers. The participants' average age was 40 years old. The vast majority (90%) of those surveyed were ex-smokers, with the average respondent having been cigarette-free for approximately one year.
 - Among the survey respondents, the most commonly used flavors were fruits, followed by sweets and tobacco.
 - Those electronic cigarette users who were still smoking ("dual users") were actually more likely to use tobacco flavors than those vapers who had quit smoking.
 - On a scale of 1-5, the average score given by the respondents for the importance of flavor variability in reducing or quitting smoking was 4 ("very important").
 - Almost 50% of the respondents answered that a lack of flavor availability would increase their cravings for tobacco cigarettes and would decrease their chances of remaining abstinent from smoking.

- The use of flavorings in electronic cigarette liquids is one of the driving factors in helping prevent adult former smokers who switch to e-cigarettes from going back to traditional cigarettes. Most users report that after switching to electronic cigarettes and experiencing the pleasant tastes one can enjoy with an electronic cigarette, they no longer find the taste of traditional tobacco cigarettes appealing.
- Enactment of this bill will actually benefit Big Tobacco by stifling their competition. Analysts credit electronic cigarettes, not government intervention, nor traditional nicotine replacement therapy products, with causing cigarette sales to experience larger than forecasted declines in the U.S. and Europe. Regardless of the good intentions involved, every step taken to reduce adult access to electronic cigarettes is really a step towards protecting cigarette markets.
- SB 1009 SD2 HD1 exempts traditional Nicotine Replacement Therapy (NRT) products that contain nicotine even though electronic cigarettes have been shown to be a much more effective tool for helping people quit smoking and have been demonstrated to have a similar risk profile as NRT's.

- The most Recent CDC report has shown e-cigarettes have supplanted all other traditional nicotine replacement therapies and are now the most commonly used product by consumers to quit using traditional tobacco cigarettes

- A recent study published by the New England Journal of Medicine concluded that E-Cigarettes are twice as effective for smoking cessation than traditional nicotine replacement therapy products which are not taxed or controlled the same way this bill proposes to tax and control E-Cigarettes. The state should be creating easier access for adult smokers to these products, not tighter regulations that steers current vapers back to tobacco cigarettes

- If flavors are not important in helping adult smokers switch from, or quit traditional cigarettes, why is GlaxoSmithKline's nicotine gum exempt from this bill and sold in flavors?



• SB 1009 SD2 HD1 would not successfully remove all flavored e-liquid products from the market. It would simply force local customers to go online and purchase them from vendors across the 49 other states who would not be subject to this ban. It would severely impact local based businesses from competing with businesses from the 49 other states who would not be subjected to this law further lowering jobs and revenues already being created in the state.

While we agree that curbing youth usage and enforcing our current laws prohibiting the sale and use of vapor products is of utmost importance, doing so at the detriment to adults who use these products every day as an alternative to traditional tobacco is not the right way to do it. I Strongly OPPOSE SB1009. Vape Kings LLC, which I own and operate, has two branches, one in the McCully District and one in Kapolei. I do not have an online store, and cherish the relationships built between my staff and the community of Adults who frequent my stores. We curate Vaporizers to fit the needs of our customers and sell only quality devices and E-liquids. This is our business, and we have happy customers! Please take a look at our Yelp reviews, we are rated among the best in Hawaii!

I don't currently sell an open system tobacco flavor that would qualify under the proposed new restrictions. The closest flavor I do carry out of roughly 80, is labeled as a vanilla, custard, and tobacco blend, which would not qualify under this proposed bill. Please note that RY4 Flavors, which are traditionally labeled as Tobacco, are a blend of Tobacco base, Caramel, and Vanilla. Labeling, rather than ingredients would determine if an e-Liquid would qualify under this proposed bill. An example would be a bottle of RY4 E-Liquid which states the flavor profile on the retail packaging making it illegal, while another brand may use the same formula, but label only as a Tobacco Flavor, making it legal. The industry standard for a Tobacco Flavor is RY4, so please understand that when we consider Tobacco as a flavor, this is traditionally what is available for legal sale in the US. Smell would be identical, though arbitrary.

Tobacco flavored E-Liquids are more than unpopular, they simply do not sell. I do not understand how artificially forcing a market towards an unfavorable product will reduce underage sales without severely impacting Adult sales. A flavor ban would be a de facto ban on Hawaii based, specialty stores like mine. I have found only one Manufacturer that derives flavoring from Tobacco, and would find it impossible to compete with any online retailer that will be able to sell the same E-Liquid, as well as flavored E-liquids that are FDA regulated through the PMTA process. It is also impossible to sustain a business that only sells ENDs, much in the way a Cigar Store that can only sell one cigar but has a variety of lighters, or a Liquor store that can only sell one flavor of alcohol and a variety of cups.

The FDA has recently released a list of Retailers under the header "Statement from FDA Commissioner Scott Ghottlieb, MD, on Forceful New Actions Focused on Retailers, Manufacturers to Combat Youth Access to E-Cigarettes as Part of FDA's Youth Tobacco Prevention Plan" This statement included some of the worst offenders in the nation, many of which were convenience stores and gas stations. This bill will not punish those types of businesses as their income is not solely dependent on E-Liquids or ENDs.

IF the legislature truly wants to reduce the 526 Million in healthcare costs attributed to Smoking in the state, shouldn't we continue to explore the potential harm reduction of non-combustible systems like ENDS which are very, very promising? There is also further data that was recently published in the New England Journal of Medicine that shows that middle-aged smokers of combustible cigarettes more easily made the switch to vaping versus any other non-combustible nicotine delivery system. The combination of lower costs associated with refillable ENDS (when compared to other nicotine delivery systems) and the availability of flavors, I believe was the deciding factor. My customers actively search out flavors that they enjoy, to continue to Vape rather than to smoke.

Yes, a nicotine addicted pool of youth that may later adopt cigarettes, would be a disaster. It is scary, but I don't believe that a reduction in responsible business owners like myself will help the situation at all. The only way to truly curb underage use of tobacco products is a combination of responsible LOCAL business owners, public education, and further legislation that penalizes under-age sales and transfer. I believe that we as a state can continue to explore vaping as a viable alternative to combustible cigarettes, while minimizing youth access to tobacco products. In this respect, I believe we can have our cake and vape it too.

	law by illegally selling tobacco products to kids. As we <u>noted last month</u> , in total, the company's stores have racked up almost 1,800 violations across the country. They're currently the top violator among pharmacies that sell tobacco products, with 22 percent of the more than 6,350 stores that we inspected having illegally sold tobacco products to minors. Both the rate of violations and sheer volume of violative inspections of Walgreens stores are disturbing, particularly since the company positions itself as a health-and-wellness-minded business. This cannot possibly come as a surprise to corporate leadership, which is why I want to sit down with them to discuss the important role they	
	play, as a nationwide retailer, in curbing this epidemic.

But we know that Walgreens isn't alone. We plan to similarly hold them accountable. We will ask them to share with us what policies they have in place and what more they can commit to do to prevent youth tobacco sales. Companies should be on notice that the FDA is considering additional enforcement avenues to address high rates of violations.

Ignoring the law and then paying associated fines and penalties should not simply be viewed as a cost of doing business. The stakes are too high for our young people and our country's decades-long fight to reduce the morbidity and mortality that accompanies tobacco product use. Retailers are on the frontlines of these efforts to reduce the health consequences of tobacco use and nicotine dependence. Walgreens, and other retail chains, should take seriously not only their legal obligations, but also the substantial public health importance of preventing tobacco product sales to minors at their stores.

Today, we're also announcing that we've sent <u>letters to more than 40 companies</u> seeking information about whether more than 50 products – including a variety of flavored e-cigarette products – are being illegally marketed and outside the agency's current compliance policy. Some of these companies may be attempting to capitalize on the troubling popularity of products like JUUL among kids by illegally selling similar products and outside of the compliance policy. We also need to determine if any of these products may be counterfeit knockoffs. If tobacco products are being unlawfully marketed and sold outside the FDA's compliance policy, we'll take action. We simply cannot tolerate this behavior and will take additional action as needed. We also today sent our first <u>warning letters</u> to several companies for, among other things, selling electronic nicotine delivery system (ENDS) products and a waterpipe tobacco product with labeling and/or advertising that failed to include the required nicotine warning statement. This is an important public health warning and it's imperative that consumers are adequately informed of the presence of nicotine in tobacco products and understand the risks – especially kids, who research shows are mistaken or unaware of the risks and the presence of nicotine in e-cigarettes. We're requesting these companies to submit a written response within 15 working days describing corrective actions, including dates on which the company discontinued the violative labeling, advertising, sale, and/or distribution of these tobacco products. Continued failure to comply with the law could result in enforcement action.

Part of our enforcement work also includes ensuring retailers know their responsibilities under the law and the consequences for violating them. Toward that end, the FDA continues to utilize our voluntary national retailer education program called "This is Our Watch," which includes free resources designed to support retailers' efforts to educate their staff on enforcing federal laws and regulations. We hope retailers will partner with the FDA to protect youth in their communities by knowing the law and making use of tools that make it easier to prevent underage sales. The FDA has also developed a retailer education online platform to provide state and territorial officials with educational tools and information on retailer regulations. The program also facilitates peer-to-peer sharing, and fosters conversations around promising practices, lessons learned, and program feedback.

Our boots-on-the-ground presence across the country is also a critical part of our work to ensure retailers aren't selling tobacco products to minors. This past fall, we marked a historic milestone of conducting a total of one million tobacco retailer inspections since the program began in 2010. This work has resulted in more than 81,570 warning letters to retailers for violating the law as well as the issuance of more than 19,800 civil money penalties and about 145 no-tobacco-sale orders for repeated violations. This major achievement couldn't have been done without the help of our state partners who are often the ones doing our undercover compliance checks to make sure these products aren't being sold to kids. That's why today we sent letters to a number of governors across the country thanking them for their work to support our efforts that led to this significant accomplishment and reminding them we still have work to do to keep tobacco products out of the hands of kids. We're confronting a deeply troubling public health epidemic with youth e-cigarette use that's threatening the progress we've made in reducing youth tobacco use. The sharp rise in the number of teens using e-cigarettes illustrates the need to work together with diverse stakeholders and remain vigilant in our shared effort to reverse these trends.

We all share the important responsibility of keeping harmful and addictive tobacco products out of the hands of kids. And we realize change can also happen at the grassroots level, which is why we are also working on a plan to go into local communities to highlight areas of the country that have high rates of violations, underscore the importance of not selling tobacco products to minors and encourage concerned parents and others to <u>report potential violations</u> to the FDA. We are also exploring ways that we might partner with state attorneys general to help combat youth e-cigarette use in their states.

We'll continue vigorous enforcement activities, with a sustained campaign to monitor, penalize and help prevent e-cigarette sales to minors in retail locations, including manufacturers' internet

storefronts, as well as take additional steps to tackle other concerns related to the youth access and appeal of these products. The FDA is also exploring additional enforcement avenues to target violative sales and marketing practices by manufacturers and retailers.

Soon we'll be providing further information on our proposed new steps announced in November to address youth access to flavored tobacco products, including e-cigarettes and cigars. We're aware that some retailers and manufacturers have taken some initial positive steps aimed at reducing youth access to e-cigarettes and other tobacco products. While we recognize those who have taken some positive steps to confront this epidemic, we also know there's more for them to do and that bad actors continue to put youth at risk despite knowing the law and for their own financial gain.

As illustrated by today's actions, we're using our compliance and enforcement tools as part of our work to combat the epidemic level of youth e-cigarette use we're currently experiencing. But our work is not done. We also have studies underway, including investigations that FDA commissioned, to look at the potential for direct effects of harm from e-cigarettes on the lungs and other health factors. This includes the potential for products to cause changes that could be a precursor to cancer. While we believe that e-cigarettes offer a potentially safer alternative to combustible tobacco for currently addicted adult smokers who completely switch to these products, these products are not without risks. This is one reason why we strongly believe that no child should be using an e-cigarette or any other tobacco product.

We'll also be sharing additional planned policy changes and actions soon. I still believe that ecigarettes present an important opportunity for currently addicted adult smokers to transition off combustible products and onto nicotine delivery products that may not have the same level of risks associated with them. But if these trends of youth e-cigarette use persist, we'll be forced to consider regulatory steps that could constrain or even foreclose some of the opportunities for currently addicted adult smokers to have the same level of access to these products in order to protect youth.

Our opportunity to preserve these opportunities for adults for the long run means that retailers and manufacturers need to take their responsibilities to keep these products out of the hands of kids seriously and ensure these products don't become a gateway to hooking an entire generation of children on tobacco and nicotine.

I am in full support of SB 1009 SD2 HD1. This bill would ban the sale of flavored tobacco products.

The US Surgeon General has declared youth e-cigarette use/vaping a national epidemic. He is emphasizing the importance of protecting our children from a lifetime of nicotine addiction and associated health risks by immediately addressing the epidemic of youth e-cigarette use and flavored tobacco products. Current e-cigarette use has increased nationally to 78% among high school students during the past year. In Hawaii County, 49% of our kids are trying e-cigarettes at the high school level and about 35% of middle school students. There is a daily use rate of 34% amongst high school students. At the state level, about 27% of high school students are trying these devices. E-cigarette aerosol is not harmless. Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine-the addictive drug in regular cigarettes, cigars, and other tobacco products. A typical JUUL cartridge or pod contains about as much nicotine as a pack of 20 regular cigarettes. Nicotine exposure during adolescence can harm the developing brain which continues to develop until about age 25. Nicotine exposure during adolescence can impact learning, memory, and attention. Now the e-cigarettes industry has produced kid-friendly flavors. In addition to making e-cigarettes more appealing to young people and addicting them, some of the chemicals used to make certain flavors may also have health risks.

Please support SB1009 SD2 HD1. As the Surgeon General stated earlier this year we need to protect the health of our nation's young people. We can stop addiction from e-liquid products that are promoted through flavored products now or pay for the healthcare costs later.

Through these experiences, I have seen the devastating effects of tobacco use on health, family life, academics, hygiene and interpersonal relationships. Because of this, I will do my part to prevent the onset or addiction of children or adults towards a career in tobacco use. Please consider a ban on candy flavored tobacco products.

Observations

<u>Work Performance</u> = as a supervisor in the service and transportation industries, I have seen employees terminated for continuing to smoke in restricted areas or regularly calling in sick due to respiratory illness, causing financial hardship for their families.

<u>Non-attendance</u> = as a teacher, I have seen the symptoms of asthmatic and/or sick children worsened by second smoke leading to absenteeism and educational implications when coupled with rising academic standards.

<u>Reckless Behavior</u> = as a high school counselor, I know of minors who chose to run or find other places to stay because they realized the hazards of second hand smoke or could not tolerate the overwhelming stench of their home. In other situations, minors avoided going inside their homes until very late and loitered outside which led to reckless behaviors and tragic events.

<u>Meltdowns</u> = as a middle school counselor, I guided students through emotional episodes and mediated family relationships because children could not fully understand their parent's addiction or why adults would continue to sicken or poison loved ones at home or in their cars.

<u>Athletics</u> = as an athlete, Assistant Athletic Director and coach, I have seen participation and performance of student-athletes diminished by tobacco use or the effects of regular exposure to second hand smoke in family settings.

<u>Cultural Implications</u> = as an urban garden and foodie, it is disheartening when children cannot enjoy the natural fragrances of native and other flora and cuisine because their senses have been compromised.

RE: SUPPORT SB1009 Relating to Flavored Tobacco Products

I support SB1009, which will ban the sale of all flavored tobacco products, ultimately reducing the number of users and potential users.

Youth are highly attracted to the variety, 15,500 + and growing, flavors. These are marketed to appeal to young people. With names like Fruit Hoops, Cali Colada, Space Jam, TrollzE, and Blizzard Berry-BRRRST, clearly the industry is targeting children under 21. By attracting young people, the next generation of consumers is being cultivated.

It is targeted, and the messaging is working phenomenally well. Nationally, there was a 78% increase from 2017-2018 in current e-cigarette use among high school students and 48% increase among middle school students. Bringing the total number of middle and high school students currently using to 3.6 million, 1.5 million more than the previous year. Hawaii youth are part of this trend, 42% of HIDOE high school students and 27% of middle school students report having ever used an electronic vaping product.

In our Maui community, vaping is a problem. Because he could not be here today, I wanted to share a recent testimony from Josh Ooka, Baldwin High School Senior to the Maui County Council.

Every day when I use social media, I see at least one video or image of someone vaping. I see people posting videos of them using vapes at beaches, parks, and in their cars doing tricks and vaping with their friends. The use of social media to showcase vaping popularized it and made it widespread. At school vapes are small and can be easily hidden, so it's not a surprise to me when I'm walking to my next class, and I see someone vaping in the hall because it's become so ordinary and normal to see. When I go into the bathrooms, it is filled with sweet and fruity scents, and I get pressured to try vaping every time I go into the bathroom.

Some may think that only students in regular classes or "the bad kids" vape, but I am involved in athletics, clubs, and take AP and Honors classes and vaping is so widespread it affects everyone at every level in every activity. Even in my top-level classes, there are kids hiding their vape in their hands occasionally taking a "rip" because they can't resist. I see my peers vaping in class when the teacher isn't looking, and they have a trick to breathe it out clear because they are so addicted they have to find a way to do it in class, and it is more common in other classes.

Because of his experience, Josh took it upon himself to coordinate a Breathe Aloha Day, where he hosted vape prevention and awareness activities to help his fellow students fight this growing epidemic.

As a state, we do not have the time to take a "wait and see" approach. The crisis is now. For years, we have done our keiki a disservice by ignoring the numbers and trusting the industry that were acting ethically. We are allowing a generation to become addicted to nicotine through the hook of flavored e-liquids. This measure is the top priority of the youth council. Our children are asking the adults to address the issue of their health and well-being; we can't fail them.

We are grateful to the Committee for hearing SB1009 and hope that you will consider passing this bill.

As a father, community member and health professional, I am writing in **strong support of SB1009 SD2 HD1**, which bans the sale of flavored tobacco products except for menthol or mentholated products; prohibits mislabeling of e-liquid products containing nicotine; and, establishes fines and penalties for violations.

Hawai'i is in the midst of a youth vaping epidemic, with 25.5 percent of high school and 15.7 percent of middle school students vaping regularly. To put this into perspective, less than 5 percent of adults in Hawaii vape.

Flavors attract kids. More than 80 percent of youth who vape say that they started because of the flavors and continue because of the flavors. 75 percent say that if flavored vape was not available they would quit. The reality is that youth who start vaping don't seek nicotine – many don't even know that most vape products contain nicotine, which is derived from tobacco plants.

I ask the Committees to amend SB1009 SD2 HD1 to include menthol in the flavor ban. Menthol is a particularly insidious flavor in tobacco and vape products. Its cooling properties mask the harshness of nicotine, making it the starter product of choice for new tobacco users. The tobacco industry's long history of marketing menthol cigarettes to vulnerable populations has led to higher tobacco use and higher rates of lung cancer among Native Hawaiians and Filipinos.

Although many teenagers may vape with what manufacturers claim is "just flavored fluid," the crux of the issue is the exposure of youth to the highly-addictive drug, nicotine, which is as addictive as heroin and cocaine. Nicotine doesn't just interfere with brain development into the mid-20s, it permanently changes kids' brains who are exposed to it. Kids who use nicotine products will experience impaired behavior and learning, reduced development of impulse control, as well as increased anxiety and depression. Once nicotine changes their brains, kids are at higher risk for other addictions in their youth and in adulthood.

Because advertising of vape products targets them, kids think vaping is harmless. If it is legal to sell it must be safe, right? What kids don't appreciate is that vape products are not regulated. Federal rules to regulate vaping products that were set to start in 2018 were pushed back to 2022. To this day, no vape product has been reviewed by FDA for safety or quality. We see this in the regular reports of exploding e-cigarettes, including 133 documented injuries between 2009 and 2016, and a recently reported death.

After more than 20 years of consistent reductions in youth tobacco use, from 36 percent of high school seniors smoking in 1997 to 8 percent in 2018, the fastgrowing youth vaping epidemic is threatening public health. With the confluence of thousands of fun-sounding flavors and new generation, sleek, easily-concealable devices, kids are vaping in unprecedented numbers in school and at home. Considering that vaping was essentially a non-existent habit in 2011, the best indicator that we are not doing enough is that U.S. high school student use of e-cigarettes jumped 78 percent in just one year, from 2017 to 2018.

Proponents of vaping will argue that using e-cigarettes has helped them to quit smoking tobacco cigarettes. For long-time established adult smokers, e-cigarettes may lower health risks for the individual user compared with the risk of smoking cigarettes or using other forms of tobacco. However, while any health benefits of switching have yet to be proven, this should not outweigh the overwhelming evidence that e-cigarettes are addicting kids who have never smoked to nicotine in record numbers.

Given the rapid escalation of youth vaping in Hawai'i, SB1009 SD2 HD1 is our best chance to reverse this disturbing and harmful trend. SB1009 SD2 HD1 does not ban vaping for adults – it will significantly reduce the appeal and attraction of vaping to young people. Adults will continue to have access to tobacco-flavored and unflavored products if they choose. We need this bold policy action to protect current youth from a lifetime of addiction and harm.

Think of your kids or kids you know and love. Think of how bright their future could and should be. Hawai'i has a long history of putting the well-being of our keiki first.

Arguments against the flavor ban are distractions from the real issue. The sad reality is that youth who vape may never reach their full potential and the long-term health consequences of vaping will not be known for many years. It is time to end the sale of all flavored tobacco products throughout Hawai'i for the sake of our kids and future generations.

I **strongly support SB1009 SD2 HD1**, respectfully ask you to amend this bill to include menthol in the flavor ban and pass it out of committee.

I humbly ask you to consider creating a WORKING GROUP including LOCAL small businesses that are impacted by this and other legislation regarding e-cigarette usage to come up with appropriate policies to ensure that our keiki are not going to use e-cigarettes. Speaking with many local small mom & pop vape shops, it is clear that NO ONE wants our under-age youth to vape and they are eager to work with organizations like the DOE to address youth vaping. Banning electronic devices and e-liquids will NOT solve the problem. Kids will still be able to access these through the internet because most of the small businesses do not sell on the internet. Banning e-cigarettes/e-liquid will only hurt our local small businesses.

This bill, while well-intentioned is NOT the solution and has very negative unintended consequences.

1. NOT ALL E-LIQUIDS CONTAIN NICOTINE

I started at the highest level of nicotine (over 24 mg) and am now at ZERO nicotine. If you ask many of the local vape shops, their biggest sellers are 0 and 3 mg.

- E-LIQUIDS ARE NOT TOBACCO Those against e-liquids consistently mix-up the terms "tobacco", "nicotine" and "e-liquids". E-liquids are flavored fluid that produce vapor.
- 3. BANNING E-LIQUIDS WILL DECIMATE HAWAII'S LOCAL MOM & POP STORES

Anecdotally, there are about 200 local vape shops in Hawaii – each with about 10 employees. Banning e-liquids will close these local businesses, cause about 2000 workers to lose their jobs, and significantly reduce tax revenues to the state.

I strongly support SB 1009-SD2-HD1, which would ban the sale of flavored tobacco products.

I support this bill because previous research has shown that flavorings make tobacco products, particularly e-cigarettes, attractive to adolescents. Recent data from Hawaii and other states have shown that e-cigarette use is quite prevalent among school students, even among middle school students who are 12-14 years of age. This is resulting in a high rate of addiction to nicotine, which was previously not known in Hawaii because rates of cigarette smoking were relatively low and the high taxes on cigarettes in Hawaii result in less frequent smoking among students who do smoke. It looks like e-cigarettes are changing this situation and that a number of students may graduate from school being addicted to nicotine.

In addition to showing that e-cigarette use is prevalent among Hawaii school students, our studies have shown that e-cigarette use is linked to several adverse outcomes. Using e-cigarettes is related to initiation of cigarette smoking among previous nonsmokers, hence is contributing to nicotine addiction through another mechanism. It is also related to asthma and bronchitis.

Recent authoritative articles by physicians and pharmacologists in the New England Journal of Medicine have emphasized that nicotine is as addictive as heroin, that flavored tobacco products increase the likelihood of adolescents becoming addicted, and that there is increasing evidence of harmful respiratory effects from e-cigarette vapor. (See, for example, "The Dangerous Flavors of E-Cigarettes," New England Journal, January 30, 2019.) Many public health experts have noted that the current epidemic of e-cigarette use among adolescents is creating risk for public health and that steps should be taken to reduce use among teenagers. All the research I have seen indicates that eliminating flavorings would be a large and effective step toward this goal.

I have heard some people argue that the FDA is going to take action against flavorings soon.

I don't believe it. I have heard similar arguments for years about tobacco policy. The tobacco companies agreed in 2006 to run ads about the risks of cigarette smoking and nicotine addiction, but IT TOOK 12 YEARS before they finally agreed to do this. (You are just seeing the se ads in the newspapers now.) The FDA tried to use its legal authority to put graphic warning labels on cigarette packages beginning in 2010, but THIS NEVER HAPPENED because the tobacco companies kept filing lawsuits against it. The writing on the wall is that if FDA tries to take action against flavored tobacco products, the tobacco companies will just do the same thing all over again and delay action for 10 or 20 years. Meanwhile a new generation of teenagers will become addicted to nicotine.

For the reasons given above, I strongly support SB 1009-SD2-HD1 and ask you to pass this out of committee.

TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF SB 1009, SD2, HD1 (HSCR 1373), relating to Flavored Tobacco Products

I am a Tobacco Treatment Specialist from Adventist Health Castle, - however, today I am testifying as a former e-cigarette user. I can attest to the extremely addictive effects flavored nicotine had on myself and my adolescent peers just a few years ago - right before vaping exploded in popularity.

Like many others, I was 17 when I first tried vaping and 18 when I bought my first-generation e-cigarette online with no verification of my age or identity. I was drawn to vaping because I was about to start college and falsely thought it would help me fit in with older students, lose weight, and cope with stress. The array of menthol, candy, and fruit flavors tipped my decision (as well as many of my friend's) to initiate vaping. In fact, the first bottle of e-juice I bought was menthol-melon, labeled "0-nicotine" and I told myself "I will just try it out. If I don't like it - I will stop". I began to buy flavored e-juice with higher levels of nicotine than I ever intended, with no knowledge of the potential consequences. Everyone said it was harmless vapor. Marketed as more fun than cigarettes with none of the harm – I, like many 18-year-olds, wasn't informed or mature enough to question it.

Luckily, I went on to get my degree in addiction science, work in drug rehabilitations, and get trained as a tobacco treatment specialist. After some personal experiences, I wanted to help others live balanced and healthy lives free of addiction. I now realize the full extent of what nicotine addiction can do by perpetuating addictive behaviors, financial hardship, and chronic health consequences. This includes new evidence on vaping that points to increases in coughing, wheezing, and exacerbation of COPD in adolescents, as well as the presence of known cancer-causing chemicals. This is not what I intended to sign up for when I was 18 and deciding between watermelon and root beer e-juice.

If I hadn't gotten my education in chemical addiction, I would have remained hooked. I know not all teens will choose to follow the same path as I did. I feel it is my duty to pass on my experience and keep Hawaii youth informed, protected, and on track for their bright futures.

Thank you for allowing me to testify.

More than 20,000 kids now under 18 and alive in Hawaii will ultimately die prematurely from smoking. Smoking kills more people than alcohol, AIDS, car crashes, illegal drugs, murders, and suicides combined — and thousands more die from other tobacco-related causes — such as fires caused by smoking (more than 1,000 deaths/year nationwide) and smokeless tobacco use.

Published research studies have found that kids are twice as sensitive to tobacco advertising as adults and are more likely to be influenced to smoke by cigarette marketing than by peer pressure. One-third of underage experimentation with smoking is attributable to tobacco company advertising.

The flavoring and lower costs of non-cigarette smoked tobacco products and of smokeless tobacco products make them especially appealing to youth. The island of Oahu has many issues concerning its residents and visitors that should be addressed by the board to whom I am writing this to. One of the issues that you are discussing right now pertains to flavored tobacco products and the use of them by residents of the state especially underage users. I do agree that the use of flavored tobacco products by minors is a problem but bill SB1009 which is proposed is not the right way of dealing with the issue. I don't know a right way to address this problem, but I can point out ways that will prevent this bill from working and in return hurting Hawaii's residents and tax payers of this beautiful state.

I started using tobacco products at the age of sixteen and have been using them ever since then. I started smoking Marlboro Lights and later moved to stronger ones like Marlboro Reds. None of the tobacco products that I started with or kept using were flavored in anyway including using menthol. Flavor did not attract me to start using tobacco products, but the curiosity of a sixteen-year-old kid did. The age to use tobacco products at that time was 18 but that doesn't prevent a curious teenager from getting what they want, and if anything, it makes it more desirable if they do. Minors these days are not getting flavored tobacco products from retail stores and they never will till they are of age. The easiest way of getting them today would be to get them online or from someone they know of age and willing to buy it for them. Many online websites don't require much to obtain flavored tobacco products like e-liquid for vaporizers. At the most they require either a birthdate which you select the month, day and date of the year you were born or just clicking the yes button saying that you are over 21 years of age. Any minor that is old enough to order something online will be able to figure out the birthdate they need to put to make it seem like they are of legal age to the site. Once they gain access, the whole inventory of that site is available to them and all they need is a credit card or visa gift card to purchase it. I currently work at a vaporizer store in the city of Honolulu and our establishment is strict on ID checking and making sure that no minor enters/purchases anything form the establishment or that any of the products that we sell are to our knowledge, being bought for a minor. Everyday we have to turn away eighteen to twenty-year-old kids that try to sneak by and hope that we are lenient or can slip by without us knowing. We even must turn away parents and grandparents that come in with minors that try to buy it for them to be the "cool" one in the minor's eyes. We constantly get from guardians that come in with minor why is it that they can't buy

the products since the kid just was telling them what to buy but they are the ones buying it.

Kids are always going to find a way to get what they want and what they are most curious about and in return the adults that are trying to get off from tradition tobacco products are the ones that will be most affected by this bill. Many adults were successful in getting off tobacco products like cigars, cigarettes and chew by switching to vaping. Most cigar and cigarette users were able to make the switch using flavored e-liquid. The flavors helped by making it enjoyable to vape and if they would get the urge to smoke a cigar or cigarette, it would make them taste horrible as well as the smell. Many exsmokers can't go back to cigarettes or cigars after vaping because of how horrible it tastes and the smell that lingers from the smoke. The flavors would help keep them from smoking and stay off the tobacco products that we for sure know kills. The whole reason that smokers switch to vaping is so that they can stay away from traditional tobacco. A flavor ban will take away a very big part of vaping that plays a positive role in helping people switch and not want to go back. Banning flavored e-juice will also force many ex-smokers to get their products online which will result in vaporizer stores statewide to close their doors come January 1, 2020. There will be hundreds of residents that are part of the industry that will be without a job once that happens and all the money that would have been spent in the state would be going elsewhere. Money will be leaving our state economy, hundreds will be out of a job and no taxes can be collected from any of the businesses that were forced to close.

This is the reason why I don't believe that bill **SB1009** will be effective in a positive way for the residents and tax payers of the state of Hawaii. I am writing this testimony because **I STRONGLY OPPOSE SB1009 AND FEEL THAT IT SHOULD NOT BE PASSED**. One group of the population should not have to be sacrificed for the other's sake. Just because some of the population is obese doesn't mean that we should ban everyone from eating rice and gravy. As someone whose husband quit smoking cigarettes, which have a proven plethora of negative consequences (unlike vape juice) with the help of flavored tobacco vape products, I am very opposed to the idea of banning all flavored e-liquid products. I'm not sure he would have given up cigarettes if flavored liquid was not available, as "regular" flavor would not be as appealing to him to draw him away from cigarettes.

I think the statistic that has been used of 8 out of 10 'kids' starting with flavored products is misleading because the majority of e-juice is flavored. (Parentheses used on 'kids' bc over 18 and you're considered an adult, which is how old you have to be to buy tobacco products, if not 21 now)

There are better ways to protect keiki than completely banning an option for adults, that many people use to quit smoking. For example, my husband switched to e-juice that only has 3 mg nicotene in it, a very low amount. Whereas Juul pods, most popular amoung youth, contain 40mg! You could limit the amount of nicotine found in cartridges, as nicotine addiction seems to be the only concern of opponents to ejuice, since THERE HAVE BEEN NO NEGATIVE HEALTH IMPACTS found in connection with vaping. Other options include education and parental involvement for curbing.

I don't understand why we need to limit the choices of fully grown adults conerning something that has not been proven to have negative health impacts. On the other hand, you may be limiting the number of people who leave cigarettes behind in favor of the much safer vaping. Please leave the ability of choice for the citizens of Hawai'i for a product that is helping people quit cigarettes. Adults like flavors too.

Chairs Takumi and Lee and Members of the Committees:

The Department of the Attorney General appreciates the intent of the bill and provides the following comments and suggested amendments.

The bill seeks to address the health dangers caused by the use of flavored tobacco products in Hawaii.¹ The bill makes it unlawful for retailers or their agents or employees to sell a flavored tobacco product or mislabel as nicotine-free or sell as nicotine-free any e-liquid product containing nicotine. The bill creates an exception from the prohibition on the sale of flavored tobacco products for menthol and mentholated products. In addition the bill defines "e-liquid" and "flavored tobacco product."

We note three legal inconsistencies in the bill that should be addressed. First, the bill makes it "unlawful for any retailer <u>or any agents or employees</u> of the retailer" to sell the flavored tobacco products or mislabeled products containing nicotine. Page 4, lines 19 - 20, to page 5, lines 1 - 6. The penalty section, however, specifies that only "[a]ny retailer whose agents or employees violate this section may be sentenced to a

fine not exceeding \$500. Any subsequent offenses shall subject the <u>person</u> to a fine of not less than \$500 nor more than \$2,000." Page 6, lines 1 - 4. This wording would appear to make only the retailer and not its agents criminally liable.

We suggest amendments to the wording of the penalty section to clarify exactly who will be held criminally liable and what the penalty will be. Retailers selling tobacco products are often incorporated. In addition, persons acting on behalf of a corporation are held legally accountable for their own actions. Section 702-228, HRS (a person performing conduct on behalf of a corporation is legally accountable for that conduct "to the same extent as if it were performed in the person's own name or behalf.") To make the wording of the penalty consistent with the described offense, we suggest that the penalty section be amended to read "any retailer and any agents or employees of the retailer who violate this section may be sentenced to a fine not exceeding \$500. Any subsequent offenses shall subject the offender to a fine of not less than \$500 nor more than \$2,000." Because retailers can include individuals, corporations, unincorporated associations and other entities, we suggest including the following definitions:

"Entity" means one or more individuals, a company, corporation, a partnership, an association, or any other type of legal entity.

Additionally, because e-liquids are separately defined in the bill and not included in the definitions of "electronic smoking device" or "tobacco product" as defined in section 712-1258(7), HRS, we suggest amending the definition of "retailer" by adding the words "or e-liquids" after the words "tobacco products" on page 8, line 14, to expressly include the sellers of e-liquids within the definition of "retailer."

Second, the bill (page 6, lines 5 – 10) allows counties to "adopt a rule or ordinance that places greater restrictions on the access to tobacco products than provided for in this section," with the more stringent restrictions prevailing in the case of a conflict. This wording conflicts with section 328J -11.5, HRS, which states in part that "[a]II local ordinances or regulations that regulate the sale of cigarettes, tobacco products, and electronic smoking devices are preempted, and existing local laws and regulations conflicting with this chapter are null and void." Although the conflict might

be interpreted to give the newer law its intended effect,² we suggest that to make the Legislature's intent clearer, the phrase "Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary," be inserted in the beginning of the subsection, before the phrase "[a]ny county" (page 6, line 5).

Third, the use of the phrase "tobacco products" (page 6, lines 6 and 9) is broader than the title of the bill, "Relating to <u>Flavored</u> Tobacco Products," raising a concern about the single subject requirement of article III, section 14 of the State Constitution. A suggested solution would be to add the word "flavored" before the phrase "tobacco products" in lines 6 and 9.

We also note that the wording of the criminal offense states "[b]eginning January 1, 2020," page 4, line 19, therefore the bill's effective date, currently July 1, 2050 (page 9, line 11), will need to take this into account.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments on and recommend amendments to this bill.

Hawai'i is already experiencing a youth vaping epidemic. Our state has one of the highest per capita uses of flavored tobacco products among middle school and high school students in the US. After the tremendous success of the Tobacco Free Coalition, the legislature, and many others in drastically reducing teen tobacco use in Hawaii, tobacco use among teens has made a drastic U-turn with the introduction and promotion by tobacco companies of flavored, "cool," e-cigarettes. These products have deliberately targeted children by adding many, many flavors with candy names like "Fruit Hoops", using colorful candy-like packaging directed toward children, and advertising that stresses good taste and smell of these products. In fact, the taste and packaging of flavored tobacco products are so enticing that young children have ingested the flavored juice with tragic results.

These electronic products were originally marketed as a safe way to wean off cigarettes. This assertion has no scientific evidence to back it up and misleads our keiki who feel that using ESP's is not only cool, but also safe. Ironically, tobacco companies have cynically taken advantage of gullible consumers by significantly increasing the nicotine concentration in the flavored "juices" so that new users are instantly hooked on nicotine, which is one of the most addicting substances known to man. This means that our keiki are rapidly becoming addicted to nicotine, instantly creating a life-long market for tobacco companies.

Unfortunately, the FDA has been slow to recognize the harmful potential of vaping despite frantic warnings from the American Academy of Pediatrics. Finally the head of the FDA has suggested some control of flavored ESP's in gas stations and convenience stores, which doesn't at all cover on line or tobacco store purchases, and there is no review of sales to minors until 2022. Also, flavored smokeless tobacco and hookah are not addressed. This is reminiscent of the long and difficult push to control tobacco sales, which was violently opposed by tobacco companies and their lobbyists. I am sure we all remember the insistence by Big Tobacco that there was no health risk from tobacco products.

It's also critical to include menthol cigarettes in the flavored tobacco ban. Menthol cigarettes are a popular starter product, as it has cooling properties that mask the harshness of tobacco smoke and nicotine. The tobacco industry has a long history of marketing menthol cigarettes to youth and vulnerable groups, such as the Native Hawaiian community, and has led to health disparities.

We must end the sale of candy-flavored tobacco to protect our youth from a lifetime of addiction. I strongly support HB276 and ask you to pass this out of committee.
