- 1 **Fiscal Implications:** Hawaii saved one billion dollars in total health care savings from 2000 to
- 2 2017 through tobacco use prevention with youth and pregnant women and adult cessation efforts.
- 3 Reducing the initiation of tobacco use and helping people to quit tobacco products will
- 4 ultimately reduce health care costs and improve health outcomes.
- 5 **Department Testimony:** The Department of Health (DOH) supports Senate Bill 1009, Senate
- 6 Draft 2 (S.B. 1009, SD2) which proposed to amend Chapter 712, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS)
- 7 by prohibiting the sale or distribution of all flavored tobacco products, including products with
- 8 menthol, and clarifying the penalties for unlawful sales of flavored tobacco products in the State
- 9 of Hawaii, effective January 1, 2020. The Department defers to the Department of the Attorney
- 10 General (AG) for enforceability.

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- The availability of flavors is the amongst the top reasons given by youth nationally, and
- highest in Hawaii for the use of e-cigarettes, also called electronic smoking devices (ESDs).
- Moreover, a higher rate of Hawaii high school students than their national peers, 28 percent
- believe that ESDs are not dangerous. Peer influence is also a significant factor, with 44 percent
- of youth reporting their four closest friends are ESD users. ^{1,2}
 - Youth vaping is a serious public health issue. Only 4.7 percent of adults report current
- use of electronic smoking devised (ESDs) as compared to 26 percent of Hawaii public high

- school students.^{3,4} Nationally, youth vaping surged 78 percent in one year between 2017 and
- 2 2018.⁵ Flavors serve as the enticement factor to lure youth. Flavors are designed to be
- 3 appealing to youth through candy and fruit flavors along with cartoon characters. 6 Many ESDs
- 4 and their refill liquids come in sweet flavors, such as mango, chocolate, gummi bear, and
- 5 strawberry. In 2017, researchers were able to identify more than 15,500 unique e-cigarette
- 6 flavors available online.⁷

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While flavors attract youth to vaping, nicotine drives their addition. Many youth are unaware of the addictive properties of nicotine. The brain continues to develop to age 25 and is the last organ to fully develop in the human body. Adolescence is a period of significant brain development, and nicotine exposure can disrupt the growth of brain circuits that control attention, learning, lead to increased impulsivity and mood disorders, and increase susceptibility to addiction. Besides the impact to brain development, more youth who never tried cigarettes, are now using ESDs, and research shows these youth are more likely to initiate cigarette use. Smoking is still the leading cause of preventable deaths in Hawaii, and the nation.

In Hawaii, from 2011 to 2015, experimentation with vaping among middle school students increased six-fold, and amongst high school youth the increase was four-fold. According to the Hawaii 2017 Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS), 16 percent of middle school and 26 percent of high school youth are current ESD users, and the rates are even higher on the neighbor islands with Hawaii County at 34 percent, Maui County at 32 percent, and Kauai

- 1 County at 31 percent. 10 These percentages are over twice as high as the national average of 13
- 2 percent, and data show that Hawaii has been leading trend in ESD use by youth. 11 The National
- 3 Youth Tobacco Survey (NYTS) that reported the 78 percent increase from 2017 to 2018 was the
- 4 first national survey to reflect the impact of rising sales of JUUL and other USB-shaped ESDs
- 5 and the erosion of tobacco prevention progress. 12

The tobacco industry has long used and adjusted the level of menthol to appeal to younger smokers, and a 1986 R.J. Reynolds document observed "…once a smoker adapts to smoking a menthol product, the desire for menthol increases over time." ¹³ Menthol is a chemical compound used to mask the harshness of cigarette smoke due to its characteristic cooling effects on the mouth and throat. ^{14,15} Longitudinal studies show that the initiation with menthol cigarettes facilitates progression to cigarette use among young smokers. ^{16,17} Nationally, the youngest cigarette smokers use menthol at the highest rates. ^{18,19}

In Hawaii, menthol use is problematic. A 1983 document from R.J. Reynolds declared that Hawaii was a "menthol market." According to the 2010 study, *Smoking and Tobacco Use in Hawaii*, 78 percent of Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander adult smokers and 42 percent of

1 Caucasian smokers consumed menthol cigarettes.²¹ 2017 data showed that 54 percent of Hawaii

2 high school students who smoke usually smoke menthol cigarettes.²²

The 2009 Federal Family Smoking and Prevention Act prohibited the sale of cigarettes with characterizing flavors, other than menthol or tobacco, including candy and fruit flavors with the purpose of deterring youth smoking. (Among cigarette flavors available was Camel's "Kauai Kolada" described as, "Hawaiian hints of pineapple and coconut," in special edition packaging featuring a recumbent dark-haired young woman wearing a lime-slice lei, bikini top, and hula skirt.) This prohibition only extended to flavored cigarettes and their flavored cigarette component parts, such as tobacco, filter, or paper.²³ It did not apply to non-cigarette tobacco products, nor the flavors of menthol or tobacco. The absence of regulation has led to the proliferation of flavored tobacco products in the marketplace, enticing new users, particularly youth, to a lifetime of nicotine addiction. This growing market for flavored tobacco products is undermining the nation's overall progress in reducing tobacco use.

The Department supports this legislation to ban flavored tobacco products and to clarify the penalties for unlawful sales of flavored tobacco products in Hawaii. Ending the sale of flavored tobacco products is an issue of both health and social justice. Candy and fruit flavored tobacco products are marketed to youth intentionally as a way of replacing smokers of traditional cigarettes.

The major tobacco companies continue to invest heavily in flavored products with their own brands and are acquiring existing ESD companies. The global ESD industry has grown dramatically and in 2017 was valued at 10.24 billion U.S. dollars. Altria, parent company of Phillip Morris, invested 12.8 billion dollars for a 35 percent stake in JUUL, a product so popular

- with youth that, "to JUUL" has become a synonym for vaping. A single flavored pod of JUUL
- 2 contains as much nicotine as 20 regular cigarettes.
- On March 5, 2019, U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) Commissioner Scott
- 4 Gottlieb resigned. He described teen vaping as an "epidemic" and was a harsh critic of ESD
- 5 companies and the proliferation of kid-friendly flavors. His departure can seriously interrupt
- 6 national momentum in tobacco control and makes state level policies and initiatives even more
- 7 urgent. The passage of S.B. 1009, SD1 would be a significant policy to close the market of
- 8 appealing products that are addiction our youth and young adults to nicotine.

Chair Mizuno and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General appreciates the intent of the bill and provides the following comments and suggested amendments.

The bill seeks to address the health dangers caused by the use of flavored tobacco products. The bill creates a new criminal offense for retailers whose agents or employees sell a flavored tobacco product. In addition the bill defines "E-liquid" and "Flavored tobacco product."

We note three legal inconsistencies in the bill that should be addressed. First, the bill makes it "unlawful for any retailer <u>or any agents or employees</u> of the retailer" to sell the flavored tobacco products. Page 5, lines 10 - 13. The penalty section, however, specifies that only "[a]ny retailer whose agents or employees violate this section may be sentenced to a fine not exceeding \$500. Any subsequent offenses shall subject the <u>person</u> to a fine of not less than \$500 nor more than \$2,000." Page 6, lines 8 - 11. This wording would appear to make only the retailer and not its agents criminally liable. Because retailers selling tobacco products are often incorporated, and

to better align the wording of the penalty with the offense, we suggest that the penalty section be amended to read "any retailer, including a corporation, and any agents or employees of the retailer who violate this section may be sentenced to a fine not exceeding \$500. Any subsequent offenses shall subject the offender to a fine of not less than \$500 nor more than \$2,000." These amendments will also bring the new offense in compliance with the requirements of section 702-227, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) (requiring a clear indication of a legislative purpose to impose criminal liability on a corporation) and section 702-228, HRS (a person performing conduct on behalf of a corporation is legally accountable for that conduct "to the same extent as if it were performed in the person's own name or behalf.")

Second, the bill (page 6, lines 12 - 17) allows counties to "adopt a rule or ordinance that places greater restrictions on the access of tobacco products than provided for in this section," with the more stringent restrictions prevailing in the case of a conflict. This wording conflicts with section 328J -11.5, HRS, which states in part that "[a]II local ordinances or regulations that regulate the sale of cigarettes, tobacco products, and electronic smoking devices are preempted, and existing local laws and regulations conflicting with this chapter are null and void." Although the intent of the legislature might be interpreted to give the newer law its intended effect, we suggest that to make the legislature's intent clearer, the phrase "Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary," be inserted in the beginning of the subsection, before the phrase "[a]ny county" (page 6, line 12).

Third, the use of the phrase "tobacco products" (page 6, lines 13 and 16) is broader than the title of the bill, "Relating to <u>Flavored</u> Tobacco Products," raising a concern about the single subject requirement of article III, section 14 of the state constitution. A suggested solution would be to add the word "flavored" before the phrase "tobacco products" in lines 13 and 16.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments and recommend amendments on this bill.

Purpose of Bill: Bans the sale of flavored tobacco products. Effective 1/1/2020. (SD2)

Department's Position:

The Department of Education supports SB 1009, SD2, provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities as indicated in our BOE approved budget

The 2017 Hawaii Youth Risk Behavior Survey data indicate that almost half of our high school students have tried e-cigarettes and 25% are now regular users. Although traditional cigarette use has declined in recent years, it is still concerning, with one out of every four youth saying that they have smoked a cigarette.

Flavored tobacco products are disproportionately used by youth, partially due the false perception that fruit- and menthol-flavored products are less harmful than those that are tobacco-flavored. A 2013 US FDA report on the health impact of menthol cigarettes determined that menthol cigarettes lead to increased smoking initiation among youth and young adults, greater addiction and decreased success in quitting smoking.

The nicotine in tobacco products has been found to be addictive and is especially harmful to youth neurologic development. There are numerous other negative health consequences associated with the use of tobacco products and second hand exposure to tobacco smoke and e-cigarette vapor, including higher rates of asthma and respiratory infection. These health conditions may limit a student's ability to attend and participate fully in school and may have long term effects on their educational attainment.

The Department of Education is committed to supporting all students' well-being by providing a safe learning environment and helping them to develop health literacy skills

in order to help them reach optimal academic success.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) <u>SUPPORTS</u> SB1009 SD2, which seeks to ban the sale of flavored tobacco products. This bill would help protect Native Hawaiian adults and youth—who already exhibit high rates of tobacco use and chronic diseases, including those associated with or exacerbated by tobacco use—from the cumulative and harmful health consequences of e-cigarettes and other tobacco products.

OHA has long advocated for meaningful policies which reduce health inequities faced by Native Hawaiians. Most recently, OHA spearheaded the State effort to codify "social determinants of health" through Act 155 (Reg. Sess. 2014) and require state agencies to take a holistic and systemic approach to addressing health disparities seen in Native Hawaiian and other communities. In furtherance with our strategic plan and advocacy efforts, we now seek to improve the conditions of Native Hawaiians by reducing substance abuse, including tobacco and nicotine products.

Smoking and tobacco use have had severe consequences for Native Hawaiians. For example, Native Hawaiian women have the highest rates of asthma in the State,¹ and exposure to tobacco smoke exacerbates such respiratory issues. Moreover, health data reveals that lung and bronchus cancers associated with tobacco use kill more kāne (31.3%) than any other form of cancer; this trend has remained steady since 1975.² Alarmingly, nearly one in five Native Hawaiians is a current smoker;³ and Native Hawaiian youth are more likely than any other ethnic youth group in Hawai'i to use electronic vaping products, with adolescent Native Hawaiian females comprising one in three vaping product users.⁴

E-cigarette use in particular has become "a major health concern" among youth nationwide, according to the United States Surgeon General. To address the skyrocketing rates of vaping in high schools and middle schools, the FDA has recently moved toward a ban on flavored e-cigarettes, menthol cigarettes, and flavored cigars; national advocacy is

also prompting efforts to ban flavored tobacco products that are clearly marketed toward and popular among youths. By prohibiting the sale of flavored tobacco products, including e-cigarette "juice," SB1009 SD2 will place Hawai'i at the lead of such efforts to protect children and adults alike, while promoting the well-being of the Native Hawaiian community and a healthier Hawai'i overall.

Accordingly, OHA urges the Committee to **PASS** SB1009 SD2. Mahalo nui for the opportunity to testify on this measure.

Dear Representative Mizuno and Members of the Committee on Health:

I am writing this letter in strong support of the Youth Council's initiative to ban flavored tobacco/nicotine products.

We, as the responsible adults in our "family" that is the State of Hawaii, must stand up for our children and young people. The industry says it wants to keep tobacco out of the hands of our children, but they don't want to do anything about it. The surest proof that candy-flavored tobacco is infiltrating our schools is from the DOE. With 168,000 young people in our schools and with 42% of all high school students and 27% of middle schoolers reporting ever having used an "electronic vaping product" in 2017, we have an urgent need to act. All our young people deserve protection from a lifetime of addiction.

In addition, the industry claims they're not targeting our youth, but their actions tell a different story. With 15,500 flavors and growing, these products are not being responsibly marketed. Candy flavors such as Fruit Hoops, Sour Straws, and Cookie Monsta are designed to appeal to our children, and make nicotine go down easier. The packaging and ads are attractive, and the products smell and taste good. All of these help to hook our youth and make them repeat customers. Addiction is the opposite of freedom. We're fighting to keep our children free from the deadly addiction to these products. The health of Hawaii's keiki must be protected from the predatory marketing of tobacco companies.

Included in the flavor ban would be menthol which has cooling properties that mask the harshness of tobacco smoke and nicotine, making menthol cigarettes another popular starter product. The tobacco industry has a long history of marketing menthol cigarettes to youth and vulnerable groups, such as the African American community. In Hawaii, 78% of Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander smokers use menthol cigarettes. In the Philippines, market share of menthol cigarettes was 55%. The consequences of this are while nicotine and tobacco addiction are deadly for everyone, Native Hawaiians and Filipinos die at higher rates of lung cancer than other groups.

Although some adults claim ESDs have helped them to "quit", ESDs are not FDA-approved tobacco cessation products. We have yet to see any scientific evidence, beyond anecdotal data, that e-cigarettes have helped smokers to quit completely from tobacco use. The issue is with the aggressive and deceptive marketing of these products, we're seeing other things happening: 1) people who have never smoked are using e-cigarettes, 2) children are picking them up as a path to smoking, and 3) smokers are using them to perpetuate their habit instead of to completely quit. Even more troubling is because of the historic declines in smoking, big tobacco has decided to focus on candy flavors and nicotine delivery solutions. Tobacco giant Altria, maker of Marlboro, is investing in the popular vaping company Juul, which has 76% of the e-cigarette market share and is worth \$16 billion.

If Hawaii's tobacco stores are truly supportive of keeping the community healthy, then they must be fine offering products for sale other than cotton candy or gummy worm-flavored e-juice. Our residents are proud to support local, but not when these products directly contribute to the youth vaping epidemic. If we don't remove candy flavors, the cost to our kids will be a lifetime of addiction to tobacco.

This measure bans the sale of flavored tobacco products.

Electronic smoking device (ESD) use among youth in Hawai'i has reached epidemic levels, and ESDs have surpassed cigarettes as the most used tobacco product among youth.

The tobacco industry claims they are not targeting children, but their actions tell a different story. The rise in youth use of EDSs has been in conjunction with the targeted branding of sweet, candy-flavored tobacco products. The toxic combination of enticing flavors and nicotine have led to a generation of youth addicted to tobacco products.

It is encouraging that the FDA has recognized flavors and ESDs as a national public health concern. It is also clear that we must act NOW to protect Hawai'i keiki from the enticement of candy-flavored tobacco products and a lifetime of addition.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in SUPPORT this important measure. The purpose of this measure is to ban the sale of flavored tobacco products.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, preventing tobacco product use among youth is critical to ending the tobacco epidemic in the United States.

Tobacco product use is started and established primarily during adolescence. Nearly 9 out of 10 cigarette smokers first try cigarette smoking by age 18, and 98% first try smoking by age 26. Each day in the U.S. about 2,000 youth under 18 years of age smoke their first cigarette and more than 300 youth under 18 years of age become daily cigarette smokers.

Flavorings in tobacco products can make them more appealing to youth. In 2014, 73% of high school students and 56% of middle school students who used tobacco products in the previous 30 days reported using a flavored tobacco product during that time.

Recent increases in the use of e-cigarettes is driving increases in tobacco product use among youth. The number of middle and high school students using e-cigarettes rose from 2.1 million in 2017 to 3.6 million in 2018—a difference of about 1.5 million youth.

For the foregoing reasons, I believe it is important to restrict the sale of kid-friendly flavored tobacco products that appeal to youth. I support this measure.

My name is Jamil Folio, I am the Administrative Manager for "The Man Cave" retail business in Kihie, Hawaii. I am a property owner, father of young keiki, concerned citizen and a small business advocate who is proud to call Maui my home.

I am writing in STRONG support of SB1009, the tobacco flavor ban. We sell tobacco products in our store, and understand the trepidation of other business owners/operators concerning potential lost revenue. BUT, we cannot jeopardize the health of our youth and our community by focusing on short term profit.

An alarming number of Maui high school students, 30%, are using flavored vapor products, or e-cigarettes. A good portion of them will go on to use more traditional tobacco products and in case you are unaware that carries significant health risks. Children are 3 to 10 times more likely to start smoking having had exposure to vaping or e-cigarettes in the past.

21,000 children under the age of 18 currently living in Hawaii will die prematurely from smoking.

If you could please read the previous sentence one more time. Then consider the financial cost associated with long term cancer and end of life care. Any lost short term revenue from banning the sales of flavored tobacco products is a minor rounding error in the long term costs associated with cancer for tens of thousands of Hawaii's citizens.

We are not talking about the rights adults have to make informed discussions. We are talking about middle school children being hooked on bubble gum and cotton candy flavored addiction. And that is what is being sold: addiction. This is a tried and true campaign of influence from tobacco companies who have been marketing to children for decades (as proven in their own internal documents multiple times).

For every potential sale that would be lost, a life might be saved. So please represent your constituents, our community and our island ohana by doing the right thing. No child or adult needs candy flavored cancer causing products.

Additionally, human lung cells that are exposed to ESD aerosol and flavorings are show increased oxidative stress and inflammatory responses.



The FDA Commissioner, Scott Gottlieb recently released a statement on what they are doing to combat the epidemic that is teenage use of ENDS. It states that the use of electronic nicotine delivery systems (ENDS) has contributed to a decline of combustible tobacco which is known to cause cancer. It also clearly states that it intends on limiting flavored cigarettes, and or flavored e-liquid, to age restricted stores or areas. There is also talk of restricting online sales. Most vape shops In Hawaii do not do online sales, so they understand why this would help limit access to teens ability to gain access to ENDS. The majority of teens getting their hands on these products are not coming from Vape Shops (Mom & Pop's/Brick & Mortar). They are coming from Internet sales from retailers that do not have a robust age verification in place, or from stores that have no age restriction. All vape shops have a strict age verification(s) in place. Following what the FDA is suggesting/recommending is a much better solution. If all flavors are banned, it will create an increase in adult use of combustible tobacco, which would be a step backwards. If adults no longer have access to the flavor(s) they used to stop using combustible tobacco, they will ultimately go back to the use of combustible tobacco. We agree that teenage use of ENDS products is unacceptable, and Vape Shops throughout Hawaii have, and are taking steps towards stopping this. Almost all shops in Hawaii have stopped selling JUUL. The Vape community, as a whole, has a high distain for JUUL. They have solely created such a negative tone for the Vape community that most vape shops around the country, just as in Hawaii, have stopped selling their products. JUUL has always been a "Gas Station" product. As a community we can help put a stop to teens use of ENDS, without punishing responsible adults that have successfully stopped combustible tobacco by using flavored e-liquids. Just as with flavored alcohol, which there is no shortage of, teens should not be easily able to get their hands on any product deemed to be for adult use. If we work together, we can stop, and prevent this from happening without it being at the expense of responsible adults that have successfully quit smoking by using flavored e-liquid(s). Let's work together as a community, not against each other. We should all be able to work together. I can guarantee that vape shops don't want teenagers vaping more than anyone. Elimination of flavored tobacco products across the state of Hawai'i will prevent addiction, reduce continued use of tobacco products throughout one's lifespan, and prevent chronic health conditions such as COPD and cardiovascular disease.

It is important to ban flavored tobacco products as today's marketing targets and encourages youth to take part in this unhealthy behavior. Hawaii has the fifth highest amount of vaping in the United States. E-cigarettes continue to grow in popularity leading to a potential health epidemic. - 70% of middle and high schoolers have recently seen e-cigarette advertising

Members of the Committee,

Flavors are a very important part of the success story of vapor products in getting thousands of Hawaii residents off of cigarattes. Throughout my life I have never seen anything more effective at helping people stop smoking. Vaping is estimated to be at least 95% less risky than smoking, so this is a huge win for public health.

A recent study, attached, confirms what I have seen firsthand. Ecigarettes are proven scientifically to be better than standard nicotine replacement therapy -- therapy which is supported by insurance companies and workplace policies across the state. Surveys of vapor product users confirms the near-universal importance of non-tobacco flavors in their replacement of combustible tobacco. People do not stop liking tasty flavors after age 18 -- ADULTS LIKE FLAVORS.

As a practical matter, flavor bans are unenforceable. Almost all eliquid is artificially flavored, including tobacco-flavor eliquids. Thus to define what a "tobacco flavor" is will have to identify specific chemical compounds that make up the flavor. Judging what those compounds are and measuring them will be effectively impossible and very expensive to even attempt.

The proposed legislation is misguided and misinformed, and should not be adopted.

A Randomized Trial of E-Cigarettes versus Nicotine-Replacement Therapy

ABSTRACT

BACKGROUND

E-cigarettes are commonly used in attempts to stop smoking, but evidence is limited regarding their effectiveness as compared with that of nicotine products approved as smoking-cessation treatments.

METHODS

We randomly assigned adults attending U.K. National Health Service stop-smoking services to either nicotine-replacement products of their choice, including product combinations, provided for up to 3 months, or an e-cigarette starter pack (a second-generation refillable e-cigarette with one bottle of nicotine e-liquid [18 mg per milliliter]), with a recommendation to purchase further e-liquids of the flavor and strength of their choice. Treatment included weekly behavioral support for at least 4 weeks. The primary outcome was sustained abstinence for 1 year, which was validated biochemically at the final visit. Participants who were lost to follow-up or did not provide biochemical validation were considered to not be abstinent. Secondary outcomes included participant-reported treatment usage and respiratory symptoms.

RESULTS

A total of 886 participants underwent randomization. The 1-year abstinence rate was 18.0% in the e-cigarette group, as compared with 9.9% in the nicotine-replacement group (relative risk, 1.83; 95% confidence interval [CI], 1.30 to 2.58; P<0.001). Among participants with 1-year abstinence, those in the e-cigarette group were more likely than those in the nicotine-replacement group to use their assigned product at 52 weeks (80% [63 of 79 participants] vs. 9% [4 of 44 participants]). Overall, throat or mouth irritation was reported more frequently in the e-cigarette group (65.3%, vs. 51.2% in the nicotine-replacement group) and nausea more frequently in the nicotine-replacement group (37.9%, vs. 31.3% in the e-cigarette group). The e-cigarette group reported greater declines in the incidence of cough and phlegm production from baseline to 52 weeks than did the nicotine-replacement group (relative risk for cough, 0.8; 95% CI, 0.6 to 0.9; relative risk for phlegm, 0.7; 95% CI, 0.6 to 0.9). There were no significant between-group differences in the incidence of wheezing or shortness of breath.

CONCLUSIONS

E-cigarettes were more effective for smoking cessation than nicotine-replacement therapy, when both products were accompanied by behavioral support. (Funded by the National Institute for Health Research and Cancer Research UK; Current Controlled Trials number, ISRCTN60477608.)

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WITCHING COMPLETELY FROM CIGArette smoking to e-cigarette use would be expected to reduce risks to health. There are questions about risks and benefits of use of e-cigarettes for different purposes, but an important clinical issue is whether e-cigarette use in a quit attempt facilitates success, particularly as compared with the use of nicotine-replacement therapy.

A Cochrane review showed that e-cigarettes with nicotine were more effective for smoking cessation than nicotine-free e-cigarettes.⁴ A trial that compared e-cigarettes with nicotine patches for smoking cessation used cartridge e-cigarettes with low nicotine delivery and no face-to-face contact. It showed similar low efficacy for both treatments.⁵ (For further details of previous trials, see the Supplementary Appendix, available with the full text of this article at NEJM.org.) Our trial evaluated the 1-year efficacy of refillable e-cigarettes as compared with nicotine replacement when provided to adults seeking help to quit smoking and combined with face-to-face behavioral support.

METHODS

DESIGN AND OVERSIGHT

We conducted a two-group, pragmatic, multicenter, individually randomized, controlled trial. National Health Service (NHS) stop-smoking services are available free across the United Kingdom.⁶ This trial was conducted in three service sites from May 2015 through February 2018. The Health and Lifestyle Research Unit that delivers the service for two London boroughs (Tower Hamlets and City of London), along with the Leicester and East Sussex services, recruited participants and delivered the interventions. Participating services included trial information in their advertising. Participants were also recruited through social media. Adult smokers were invited to participate if they were not pregnant or breast-feeding, had no strong preference to use or not to use nicotine replacement or e-cigarettes, and were currently not using either type of product.

The trial was approved by the National Research Ethics Service (reference number, 14/LO/2235). Collective unblinded data were seen only for the purposes of the meetings of the data

monitoring and ethics committee. Data analyses were conducted with blinding to treatment assignments. All the authors contributed to the trial design, participated in the interpretation of the data, vouch for their completeness and accuracy, and made the decision to submit the manuscript for publication. All the authors vouch for the fidelity of the trial to the protocol, available at NEJM.org.

PROCEDURES

Smokers were provided with trial information, prescreened for eligibility, and, if eligible, invited to a baseline session. There, eligibility was confirmed, written informed consent and baseline data were obtained, and participants set up their quit date (normally the following week).⁷

Randomization took place on the quit date to limit differential dropout. Randomization sequences (1:1 ratio in permuted blocks of 20, stratified according to trial site) were generated with the use of a pseudorandom number generator in Stata software and were embedded into an application that only revealed the next treatment assignment once a participant had been entered into the database.

Product use started immediately after randomization. All the participants received the same multisession behavioral support as per U.K. stopsmoking service practice.^{7,8} This support involved weekly one-on-one sessions with local clinicians, who also monitored expired carbon monoxide levels for at least 4 weeks after the quit date.

Participants were contacted by telephone at 26 and 52 weeks. Interviewers asked about product use and thus were aware of the treatment assignments. Participants who reported abstinence or a reduction in smoking of at least 50% at 52 weeks were invited back to provide a carbon monoxide reading. Participants were compensated £20 (\$26 U.S.) for their travel and time at the 52-week validation visit.

Nicotine-Replacement Group

Participants were informed about the range of nicotine-replacement products (patch, gum, lozenge, nasal spray, inhalator, mouth spray, mouth strip, and microtabs) and selected their preferred product. Use of combinations was encouraged, typically the patch and a faster-acting oral product. Participants were also free to switch

products. The way that nicotine replacement was provided differed slightly among trial sites (see the Supplementary Appendix). Supplies were provided for up to 3 months, as per standard practice. The cost to the NHS of a 3-month supply of a single nicotine-replacement product is currently approximately £120 (\$159 U.S.).

E-Cigarette Group

A starter pack, called One Kit (Aspire, U.K. Ecig Store), was provided to facilitate initial use and teach participants how to use refillable e-cigarette products, along with one 30-ml bottle of Tobacco Royale flavor e-liquid purchased from U.K. Ecig Store, containing nicotine at a concentration of 18 mg per milliliter. The kit had a 2.1-ohm atomizer and 650-mAh battery. During the trial, the company discontinued this kit, so One Kit 2016 (Innokin, U.K. Ecig Store), with a 1.5-ohm atomizer and 1000-mAh battery, was used for 42 participants. Participants were asked to purchase their future e-liquid online or from local vape shops and to buy a different e-cigarette device if the one supplied did not meet their needs. They were encouraged to experiment with e-liquids of different strengths and flavors. Those who were unable to obtain their own supply were provided with one further 10-ml bottle, but this was not offered proactively. Participants received oral and written information on how to operate the e-cigarette.

The original One Kit, including five atomizers, U.K. adapter, spare battery, and e-liquid, was purchased wholesale for £19.40 (\$26 U.S.). The cost of One Kit 2016, including the same extras, was £30.25 (\$40 U.S.).

Participants in the e-cigarette group and those in the nicotine-replacement group were asked to sign a commitment to not use the non-assigned treatment for at least 4 weeks after their quit date. This was to minimize contamination between the trial groups.

MEASURES

At trial visits, the following data were recorded: smoking status, expired carbon monoxide level (at baseline, 4 weeks, and 52 weeks), use and ratings of trial products, ratings of withdrawal symptoms (weeks 1 through 6), adverse reactions (presence or absence of nausea, sleep disturbance, and throat or mouth irritation), and

respiratory symptoms (presence or absence of shortness of breath, wheezing, cough, and phlegm). The Supplementary Appendix provides further details of trial measures.

The primary outcome was 1-year sustained abstinence, calculated in accordance with the Russell Standard⁹ as a self-report of smoking no more than five cigarettes from 2 weeks after the target quit date, validated biochemically by an expired carbon monoxide level of less than 8 ppm at 1-year follow-up and not contradicted by any previous self-report or validation result. Carbon monoxide validation is the standard measure in trials assessing nicotine-containing products (see the Supplementary Appendix). Participants who died (one in each group) were excluded. Participants who were lost to follow-up or did not provide biochemical validation were classified as not being abstinent in the primary analysis.

Secondary abstinence outcomes included sustained abstinence from 26 to 52 weeks, at 4 weeks, and at 26 weeks and the percentage of participants without sustained abstinence from 26 to 52 weeks who reduced their cigarette consumption by at least 50%. We also assessed 7-day abstinence at 4, 26, and 52 weeks. In addition, we compared the trial groups with respect to relapse rate and time to relapse and with respect to the measures listed above.

STATISTICAL ANALYSIS

We calculated that a sample of 886 participants would provide the trial with 95% power (at a two-sided alpha level of 0.05) if the true percentages of 1-year abstinence were 23.8% in the e-cigarette group and 14.0% in the nicotine-replacement group (relative risk, 1.7). Since trial setup, the abstinence rate in stop-smoking service clinics declined to 10%, but the sample of 886 participants would provide 85% power if the percentages were 17.0% and 10.0% in the respective groups.

The primary and secondary abstinence outcomes were analyzed by regression of smoking status at each time point onto trial group. Primary analyses were adjusted for trial center to account for the stratification factor. In sensitivity analyses, each model was further adjusted for baseline covariates selected with the use of stepwise regression. Binary regressions were conducted by means of the generalized linear model




Figure 1. Screening, Randomization, and Follow-up.

with binomial distribution and logarithmic link to estimate the relative risk for e-cigarettes as compared with nicotine-replacement therapy.

To assess the effect of missing data on the primary outcome, we conducted four prespecified

sensitivity analyses, which excluded participants who did not attend at least one behavioral-support session, excluded participants who used the nonassigned product for at least 5 consecutive days, excluded participants who did not complete the 52-week follow-up, and imputed missing information with the use of multiple imputation by chained equations.¹⁰ Missing data were imputed for 136 participants in each group, and 50 data sets were imputed.

We also estimated mean differences and 95% confidence intervals between trial groups in product ratings and in change scores between baseline and follow-up time points in withdrawal symptoms, as well as between-group differences in the percentage of participants who had adverse reactions or respiratory symptoms, using binomial regression with adjustment for trial center (see the statistical analysis plan, available with the protocol at NEJM.org). Analyses were conducted with the use of Stata software, version 15 (StataCorp).

RESULTS

PARTICIPANTS

A total of 2045 clients of stop-smoking services were screened, and 886 underwent randomization (439 to the e-cigarette group and 447 to the nicotine-replacement group). Of the randomly assigned participants, 78.8% completed the 52-week follow-up (Fig. 1). The sample was composed largely of middle-aged smokers, with 40.7% entitled to free prescriptions (a marker of social disadvantage or poor health) (Table 1, and Table S1 in the Supplementary Appendix).

EFFECTS OF TREATMENT ON ABSTINENCE

The rate of sustained 1-year abstinence was 18.0% in the e-cigarette group and 9.9% in the nicotine-replacement group (relative risk, 1.83; 95% confidence interval [CI], 1.30 to 2.58; P<0.001) (Table 2). The absolute difference in the 1-year abstinence rate between the two groups was 8.1 percentage points, resulting in a number needed to treat for one additional person to have sustained abstinence of 12 (95% CI, 8 to 27). The result did not change substantially in the four sensitivity analyses (relative risk, 1.75 to 1.85; P≤0.001 for all comparisons) (Table S2 in the Supplementary Appendix). Abstinence rates were higher in the e-cigarette group than in the nico-

was not achieved, more had a carbon monoxide-validated reduction of smoking by at least 50% in the e-cigarette group than in the nicotine-replacement group (Table 2). Time to relapse and relapse rates at 52 weeks among participants with sustained abstinence at 4 weeks did not differ substantially between the two trial groups (hazard ratio for time to relapse, 1.14; 95% CI, 0.96 to 1.34; relative risk of relapse at 52 weeks, 1.27; 95% CI, 0.93 to 1.73).

TREATMENT ADHERENCE AND RATINGS AND EFFECTS ON WITHDRAWAL SYMPTOMS

Overall adherence was similar in the two groups, but e-cigarettes were used more frequently and for longer than nicotine replacement (Table 3). In the nicotine-replacement group, 88.1% of participants used nicotine-replacement combinations. In the e-cigarette group, practically all participants used refillable e-cigarettes (Table S4 in the Supplementary Appendix).

Among participants with 1-year abstinence, 80% (63 of 79) were using e-cigarettes at 52 weeks in the e-cigarette group and 9% (4 of 44) were using nicotine replacement in the nicotine-

replacement group. Further details of product use (including the use of nonassigned products) are provided in the Supplementary Appendix, including Tables S4 and S5.

Both e-cigarettes and nicotine-replacement products were perceived to be less satisfying than cigarettes. However, e-cigarettes provided greater satisfaction and were rated as more helpful to refrain from smoking than nicotine-replacement products (Table S6 in the Supplementary Appendix).

Among participants with abstinence at 1 week after their quit date as well as participants with abstinence at 4 weeks, those in the e-cigarette group had less severe urges to smoke than did those in the nicotine-replacement group (Table 4). They also reported a smaller increase from baseline in irritability, restlessness, and inability to concentrate than those in the nicotine-replacement group during the first week of abstinence. Between-group differences in hunger and depression were in the same direction but less substantial. By week 4, participants in either group who were abstinent reported little withdrawal discomfort (Table S7 in the Supplementary Appendix).

SAFETY EVALUATION

Two participants died during the trial. One died from ischemic heart disease in the e-cigarette group and one from traumatic spine injury in the nicotine-replacement group.

There were 27 serious adverse events in the e-cigarette group and 22 in the nicotine-replacement group (Table S8 in the Supplementary Appendix). No serious adverse event in either group was classified by the trial clinician as being related to product use, but we noted 1 respiratory event in the nicotine-replacement group and 5 in the e-cigarette group (2 in participants who were smoking and not vaping, 2 in participants who were smoking and vaping, and 1 in a participant whose status with respect to smoking and vaping was not known) (see the Supplementary Appendix).

Of the prespecified adverse reactions of interest, nausea was reported more frequently in the nicotine-replacement group (37.9%, vs. 31.3% in

the e-cigarette group) and throat or mouth irritation more frequently in the e-cigarette group (65.3%, vs. 51.2% in the nicotine-replacement group). There was little difference between the two groups in the percentage of participants reporting severe nausea (6.6% in the e-cigarette group and 6.5% in the nicotine-replacement group) or severe throat or mouth irritation (5.9% and 3.9%, respectively) (Tables S9 and S10 in the Supplementary Appendix).

Regarding the prespecified respiratory symptoms of interest, the incidence of cough and phlegm production declined in both trial groups from baseline to 52 weeks. However, among participants who reported cough or phlegm at baseline, significantly more were symptom-free at the 52-week follow-up in the e-cigarette group than in the nicotine-replacement group (Table 5). To determine whether this was due to the higher abstinence rate in the e-cigarette group, we ran an exploratory analysis that controlled for

abstinence status at 52 weeks. This did not change the results (relative risk for cough, 0.8; 95% CI, 0.6 to 0.9; relative risk for phlegm, 0.7; 95% CI, 0.6 to 0.9).

DISCUSSION

E-cigarettes were more effective for smoking cessation than nicotine-replacement therapy in this randomized trial. This is particularly noteworthy given that nicotine replacement was used under expert guidance, with access to the full range of nicotine-replacement products and with 88.1% of participants using combination treatments.¹¹

Our trial showed a stronger effect of e-cigarettes than previous trials. 5,12,13 This could be due to the inclusion of smokers seeking help in quitting, the provision of face-to-face support, and the use of refillable e-cigarettes with free choice of e-liquids. Previous trials provided limited or no face-to-face support and used first-generation cartridge products. Refillable devices are generally more efficient at nicotine delivery. 14

The trial provides some indications of why e-cigarettes had better results than nicotine-replacement treatments. As in previous studies, 5,15 e-cigarettes were more effective in alleviating tobacco withdrawal symptoms and received better ratings than nicotine-replacement therapy. They may also have allowed better tailoring of nicotine dose to individual needs.

The rate of continuing e-cigarette use was fairly high. This can be seen as problematic if e-cigarette use for a year signals ongoing longterm use, which may pose as-yet-unknown health risks. On the positive side, ongoing e-cigarette use may ameliorate withdrawal symptoms, such as constipation,16 mouth ulcers,17 and weight gain,18 and continue to provide some of the positive subjective effects previously derived from smoking.19 Provided that ongoing e-cigarette use has similar effects to long-term nicotine-replacement use, for heavy smokers with a high risk of relapse, long-term e-cigarette use may also assist with preventing relapse.²⁰ Among participants in our trial in whom full abstinence was not achieved, those in the e-cigarette group were more likely to reduce their smoke intake than those in the nicotine-replacement group, but it is unclear whether this affects future abstinence.

E-cigarettes caused more throat or mouth irritation, and nicotine replacement caused more nausea; these effects were mostly mild. There were mixed signals regarding the effects of e-cigarettes on the respiratory system. More participants in the e-cigarette group than in the nicotine-replacement group reported respiratory serious adverse events, although the difference was not significant and some of the affected participants were not vaping. Meanwhile, we detected positive effects of e-cigarette use on some respiratory outcomes. Similar positive effects were reported previously. A switch to e-cigarettes was accompanied by a reduction in respiratory infections in an online survey,21 and two case studies described nonsmokers with chronic throat and nose infections that resolved after they started to vape. Antibacterial effects of propylene glycol and glycerin were suggested as possible explanations. 22,23 (For more on e-cigarettes and the respiratory system, see the Supplementary Appendix.)

The trial had several limitations. Product assignments could not be blinded. Positive expectations have limited effects on long-term abstinence, but if nicotine replacement was seen as an inferior option, participants in the nicotinereplacement group could have put less effort into their quit attempt than those in the e-cigarette group. We tried to limit expectation effects by recruiting only participants with no strong product preference. Abstinence rates in the nicotinereplacement group were also at least as high as in usual practice²⁴ (see the Supplementary Appendix). Nevertheless, lack of blinding could affect the results. Carbon monoxide validation detects smoking only over the past 24 hours, so there may have been some false negative results. Several participants in the nicotine-replacement group used e-cigarettes during the trial, but this would dilute rather than amplify any effects of e-cigarettes. The 1-year follow-up rate of 79% was similar to the rates of 78%, 19 79%, 5 and 75%²⁰ observed in other studies involving the same general population and setting. Achieving higher follow-up rates among smokers engaged in face-to-face treatment is difficult, because they tend to feel embarrassed if they do not guit, and some avoid further contact. Multiple imputation showed consistent results; nevertheless, incomplete follow-up represents another limitation of the trial.

The findings are likely to be valid for depen-

dent smokers who seek help but may not be generalizable to smokers who are less dependent or who try e-cigarettes for reasons other than quitting smoking. In addition, they may not be generalizable to less effective first-generation e-cigarettes. Moreover, not all service clients want e-cigarettes. In a previous study, 69% accepted the offer of an e-cigarette starter pack.²⁵ (For comparison, 57% of service clients opt for nicotine replacement and 25% for varenicline.²⁶)

Further trials are needed to determine whether our results generalize outside the U.K. services. In addition, e-cigarette studies are needed that compare different levels of support. This is important for focusing public health messages on either encouraging smokers to switch to e-cigarette use within support services or recommending use with less intensive or no support.

In our trial, refillable e-cigarettes had greater efficacy than nicotine-replacement therapy, even though nicotine replacement was provided in combinations and under expert guidance.

I am writing to express my strong support for SB1009.

Hawai'i is already experiencing a youth vaping epidemic. Our state has one of the highest per capita uses of flavored tobacco products among middle school and high school students in the US. After the tremendous success of the Tobacco Free Coalition, the legislature, and many others in drastically reducing teen tobacco use in Hawaii, tobacco use among teens has made a drastic U-turn with the introduction and promotion by tobacco companies of flavored, "cool," e-cigarettes. These products have deliberately targeted children by adding many, many flavors with candy names like "Fruit Hoops", using colorful candy-like packaging directed toward children, and advertising that stresses good taste and smell of these products. In fact, the taste and packaging of flavored tobacco products are so enticing that young children have ingested the flavored juice with tragic results.

These electronic products were originally marketed as a safe way to wean off cigarettes. This assertion has no scientific evidence to back it up and misleads our keiki who feel that using ESP's is not only cool, but also safe. Ironically, tobacco companies have cynically taken advantage of gullible consumers by significantly increasing the nicotine concentration in the flavored "juices" so that new users are instantly hooked on nicotine, which is one of the most addicting substances known to man. This means that our keiki are rapidly becoming addicted to nicotine, instantly creating a life-long market for tobacco companies.

Unfortunately, the FDA has been slow to recognize the harmful potential of vaping despite frantic warnings from the American Academy of Pediatrics. Finally the head of the FDA has suggested some control of flavored ESP's in gas stations and convenience stores, which doesn't at all cover on line or tobacco store purchases, and there is no review of sales to minors until 2022. Also, flavored smokeless tobacco and hookah are not addressed. This is reminiscent of the long and difficult push to control tobacco sales, which was violently opposed by tobacco companies and their lobbyists. I am sure we all

remember the insistence by Big Tobacco that there was no health risk from tobacco products.

It's also critical to include menthol cigarettes in the flavored tobacco ban. Menthol cigarettes are a popular starter product, as it has cooling properties that mask the harshness of tobacco smoke and nicotine. The tobacco industry has a long history of marketing menthol cigarettes to youth and vulnerable groups, such as the Native Hawaiian community, and has led to health disparities.

We must end the sale of candy-flavored tobacco to protect our youth from a lifetime of addiction. I strongly support SB 1009 and ask you to pass this out of committee.

I humbly ask you to consider creating a WORKING GROUP including LOCAL small businesses that are impacted by this and other legislation regarding e-cigarette usage to come up with appropriate policies to ensure that our keiki are not going to use e-cigarettes. Speaking with many local small mom & pop vape shops, it is clear that NO ONE wants our under-age youth to vape and they are eager to work with organizations like the DOE to address youth vaping. Banning electronic devices and e-liquids will NOT solve the problem. Kids will still be able to access these through the internet because most of the small businesses do not sell on the internet. Banning e-cigarettes/e-liquid will only hurt our local small businesses.

This bill, while well-intentioned is NOT the solution and has very negative unintended consequences.

1. NOT ALL E-LIQUIDS CONTAIN NICOTINE

I started at the highest level of nicotine (over 24 mg) and am now at ZERO nicotine. If you ask many of the local vape shops, their biggest sellers are 0 and 3 mg.

- 2. E-LIQUIDS ARE NOT TOBACCO
 - Those against e-liquids consistently mix-up the terms "tobacco", "nicotine" and "e-liquids". E-liquids are flavored fluid that produce vapor.
- BANNING E-LIQUIDS WILL DECIMATE HAWAII'S LOCAL MOM & POP STORES

Anecdotally, there are about 200 local vape shops in Hawaii – each with about 10 employees. Banning e-liquids will close these local businesses, cause about 2000 workers to lose their jobs, and significantly reduce tax revenues to the state.

- 4. LOCAL VAPE STORES DO NOT WANT KIDS VAPING

"I am a doctoral clinical psychology student in the final year of my program, and work with many kids with ADHD. One aspect to the debate around vaping that is often ignored is that of addiction in general. By definition, anything, whether chemical or behavioral, that exerts a psychoactive effect on the brain, is a drug or addiction, and operates on the same pathway in the brain. This would include drugs, gambling or excess screen time. This dopaminergic pathway is also critical to attention, learning and sense of reward, but is depleted via chronic addictive behaviors. Kids today already struggle with short attention spans due to the prevalence of smart phones/internet connectivity. Other addictions such as vaping, combined with neurotoxic effects, are likely to add to the ADHD problem, which has implications for further stimulant use (e.g. Ritalin) with their own set of health risks. Furthermore, unchecked ADHD is a risk factor (not a guarantee of) later life antisocial personality traits. The connection on these points may seem tenuous, but it is real nonetheless, and significantly compounded by other environmental factors (e.g. stress, inadequate quality of nutrition) that conspire to weaken the health of the developing brain in childhood."

Aloha House Committee on Health,

As a father, community member and health professional, I am writing in **strong support of SB1009 SD2**, which bans the sale of flavored tobacco products in Hawai'i.

Hawai'i is in the midst of a youth vaping epidemic, with 25.5 percent of high school and 15.7 percent of middle school students vaping regularly. To put this into perspective, less than 5 percent of adults in Hawaii vape.

Flavors attract kids. More than 80 percent of youth who vape say that they started because of the flavors and continue because of the flavors. 75 percent say that if flavored vape was not available they would quit. The reality is that youth who start vaping don't seek nicotine – many don't even know that most vape products contain nicotine, which is derived from tobacco plants.

Menthol is a particularly insidious flavor in tobacco and vape products. Its cooling properties mask the harshness of tobacco smoke and nicotine, making it the starter product of choice for new tobacco users. The tobacco industry's long history of marketing menthol cigarettes to vulnerable populations has led to higher tobacco use and higher rates of lung cancer among Native Hawaiians and Filipinos.

Although many teenagers may vape with what manufacturers claim is "just flavored fluid," the crux of the issue is the exposure of youth to the highly-addictive drug, nicotine, which is as addictive as heroin and cocaine. Nicotine doesn't just interfere with brain development into the mid-20s, it permanently changes kids' brains who are exposed to it. Kids who use nicotine products will experience impaired behavior and learning, reduced development impulse control, as well as increased anxiety and depression. Once nicotine changes their brains, kids are at higher risk for other addictions in their youth and in adulthood.

Because advertising of vape products targets them, kids think vaping is harmless. If it is legal to sell it must be safe, right? What kids don't appreciate is that vape products are not regulated. Federal rules to regulate vaping products that were set to start in 2018 were pushed back to 2022. To this day, no vape product has been reviewed by FDA for safety or quality. We see this in the regular reports of

exploding e-cigarettes, including 133 documented injuries between 2009 and 2016, and a recently reported death.

After more than 20 years of consistent reductions in youth tobacco use, from 36 percent of high school seniors smoking in 1997 to 8 percent in 2018, the fast-growing youth vaping epidemic is threatening public health. With the confluence of thousands of fun-sounding flavors and new generation, sleek, easily-concealable devices, kids are vaping in unprecedented numbers in school and at home. Considering that vaping was essentially a non-existent habit in 2011, the best indicator that we are not doing enough is that U.S. high school student use of ecigarettes jumped 78 percent in just one year, from 2017 to 2018.

Proponents of vaping will argue that using e-cigarettes has helped them to quit smoking tobacco cigarettes. For long-time established adult smokers, e-cigarettes may lower health risks for the individual user compared with the risk of smoking cigarettes or using other forms of tobacco. However, while any health benefits of switching have yet to be proven, this should not outweigh the overwhelming evidence that e-cigarettes are addicting kids who have never smoked to nicotine in record numbers.

Given the rapid escalation of youth vaping in Hawai'i, SB1009 SD2 is our best chance to reverse this disturbing and harmful trend. SB1009 SD2 does not ban vaping for adults – it will significantly reduce the appeal and attraction of vaping to young people. Adults will continue to have access to tobacco-flavored and unflavored products if they choose. We need this bold policy action to protect current youth from a lifetime of addiction and harm.

Think of your kids or kids you know and love. Think of how bright their future could and should be. Hawai'i has a long history of putting the well-being of our keiki first.

Arguments against the flavor ban are distractions from the real issue. The sad reality is that youth who vape may never reach their full potential and the long-term health consequences of vaping will not be known for many years. It is time to end the sale of all flavored tobacco products throughout Hawai'i for the sake of our kids and future generations.

I **strongly support SB1009 SD26** and respectfully ask you to pass this bill out of committee.

Chair Mizuno, Vice Chair Kobayashi, and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Primary Care Association (HPCA) is a 501(c)(3) organization established to advocate for, expand access to, and sustain high quality care through the statewide network of Community Health Centers throughout the State of Hawaii. The HPCA <u>SUPPORTS</u> Senate Bill No. 1009, Senate Draft 2, RELATING TO FLAVORED TOBACCO PRODUCTS.

The bill, as received by your Committee, would:

- (1) Prohibit the sale, offer for sale, or possession with the intent to sell or offer to sell a flavored tobacco product;
- (2) Clarify that a statement or claim is made to the consumer or public that the product has or produces a characterizing flavor be prima facie evidence that the tobacco product is a flavored tobacco product;
- (3) Provide that any tobacco product or electronic smoking device in the retailer's possession at the time of the violation be seized and forfeited to the State, and following administrative or judicial proceedings finding that the violation was committed, be destroyed by law enforcement;
- (4) Authorize the levying of civil fines not to exceed \$500 for the first offense, and not less than \$500 but not more than \$2,000 for any subsequent offense;
- (5) Allow any county to adopt rules or ordinances that place greater restrictions on the access of tobacco products and provide that the more stringent restriction prevail;
- (6) Include both savings and severability clauses; and

(7) Take effect on January 1, 2020.

Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) provide desperately needed medical services at the frontlines in rural communities. Long considered champions for creating a more sustainable, integrated, and wellness-oriented system of health, FQHCs provide a more efficient, more effective and more comprehensive system of health.

FQHCs have long seen first-hand how tobacco has literally destroyed the lives of our patients and their families. The 2014 Surgeon General's Report projects that if current trends continue, 5.6 million of today's youth under 18 will die prematurely in adulthood from smoking-related illness. To protect this vulnerable population, policymakers need to move quickly and ban the use of characterizing flavors, including menthol, from all tobacco products.

The evidence supporting a flavor ban is clear. As we discuss below, flavored tobacco products are highly attractive to youth and have led to increased initiation and use among children and adolescents. The number of flavored products on the market has also increased substantially with the tobacco industry marketing thousands of fruit, candy, and mint flavored products that appeal to children. Allowing these products to remain on the market puts a new generation at risk of a dangerous addiction.

While we understand that some adult tobacco users report using flavored products to transition or switch from combustible cigarettes, there is little evidence supporting their use as a cessation tool. In addition, there is some evidence that flavored tobacco products have enticed adult never smokers to try tobacco for the first time – just as they have with children. We encourage legislators to make protecting children its top priority when considering legislative options for flavored tobacco.

AHA feels that a blanket flavoring ban is needed because a wide array of flavors appeal to youth and young adults, which increases the risk of initiation and continued tobacco use. Also, many of the flavorings, including some of the most popular, contain known toxins. We believe this would make it extremely difficult to identify specific flavors to ban. Studies show that menthol cigarettes increase initiation, especially among youth.

The number of flavored tobacco products on the market increased substantially after flavored cigarettes were banned. After the 2009 federal ban on flavored cigarettes took effect, the tobacco industry started producing different types of flavored tobacco products that were

not subject to the prohibition. This lead to the rise in in the number of youth using flavored cigars, and especially in Hawaii, e-cigarettes. Both the tobacco industry and youth adjusted to the cigarette ban by moving to other tobacco products where flavors were still allowed. If the legislature were to pass a flavoring ban, but limit it to certain types of products or flavorings, we are likely to see the same thing happen again.

The availability of flavors is one of the main reasons youth and young adults use ecigarettes and other noncombustible products. If the legislature wants to decrease youth tobacco use, removing flavors from noncombusted products is key. In addition, current smokers will

be motivated to move to noncombusted products – even if they are unflavored – when the nicotine content in cigarettes is reduced through federal regulation.

In Hawaii alone, tobacco use claims 1,400 lives each year and creates \$526 million in annual health care costs directly caused by smoking (\$141.7 million of that is covered by the state Medicaid program). Hawaii residents' state & federal tax burden from smoking-caused government expenditures is \$836 per household. Hawaii's estimated tobacco tax revenue, estimated to be approximately \$110 million per year, does not come close to offsetting the losses to the state caused by tobacco use. Smoking declines caused by state cigarette tax increases directly reduce these smoking-caused economic burdens for all taxpayers, and Hawaii businesses which bear the brunt of employee healthcare costs in our state.

Those who might quit tobacco addiction as a result of a comprehensive flavor ban would then have additional money to spend on taxable products that don't result in over a \$500 million in healthcare costs to the state. The money doesn't go up in smoke or vapor; instead it will likely be spent on more productive things that can benefit the smokers' and/or their families and our state.

It's time to end the use of candy flavors and menthol to entice our children into a deadly addiction.

Our children need to be protected from this epidemic. We can be that change, and start with banning the sale of flavored tobacco. This will not only make it easier to enforced laws and restrictions of sale to underage users, but also lessen the effect the flavors have. Less people will want to vape without the variety and diversity of flavors. I want to thank you for taking the time to consider passing this bill. The Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawai'i, a program of the Hawai'i Public Health Instituteⁱ is in **Strong Support of SB 1009** which would end the sale of all menthol and flavored tobacco products in the state.

This measure will help to save lives.

Tobacco use remains a serious threat to public health. Each year, Hawaii spends \$526 million in health care costs and \$141.7 million in Medicaid costs due to smoking. Tobacco products with menthol, sweet flavors, and colorful packaging are designed to attract teens and young adults. Menthol has cooling properties that mask the harshness of tobacco smoke and nicotine, making menthol cigarettes a popular starter product. A report by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, issued in 2013, found that menthol cigarettes led to 1) increased smoking initiation among youth and young adults; 2) greater addiction; and 3) decreased success in quitting smoking.

In addition, candy flavors such as Fruit Hoops, Sour Straws, Gummy Bears, and Cookie Monsta are designed to appeal to kids, and make nicotine go down easier. With 81% of youth starting with a flavored productⁱⁱ, regulating the flavors designed to capture and addict new customers prioritizes the health and safety of our community over tobacco's special interests.

This measure helps to protect our keiki from a lifetime of addiction.

Hawaii is experiencing a vaping epidemic among our young people. The State Legislature has worked hard to protect our residents from the harms caused by tobacco use, but the rapid growth of e-cigarette use is alarming. With 42% of all high school students and 27% of middle

schoolers reporting ever having used an "electronic vaping product" and 4.3%ⁱⁱⁱ of adults regularly using ESDs in 2017, we have an urgent need to act.

The industry claims that they're not targeting kids, but their actions tell a different story. With 15,500 e-cigarette flavors and growing, these products are not being responsibly marketed. The industry selects colorful packaging and ads that appeal to taste and pop culture. Tobacco companies have a long history of using these same tactics to entice new and younger users and make them repeat customers. In addition, despite our Tobacco 21 law, several stores to continue to sell to underage minors, as reported in the FDA Compliance Check inspections site^{iv}:

These new products are glamorizing nicotine addiction.

The vaping industry has taken full advantage of delays by the FDA to regulate these products. Large volume (30-60mL), highly concentrated (5-5.9%) nicotine sale e-liquids have entered the market in youth-oriented flavors. Most recently, pod-based systems such as Juul and Suoprin have disrupted the e-cigarette market by creating an easily concealable sleek device that can deliver higher concentrations of nicotine. Tobacco giant Altria, maker of Marlboro, spent \$12.8 billion to purchase a third of Juul, which has 76% of the e-cigarette market share and is worth \$38 billion.



Example of a high-dose nicotine e-liquid – 60mG/mL or 6% nicotine in gummy bear flavor.



JUUL introduced 5% nicotine salt solutions in 0.7mL pods (about the size of your thumb). The company claims that it releases the same amount of nicotine found in a pack of cigarettes.

At the risk of allowing these products to remain on the market, we are addicting a new generation to these deadly products. The health of Hawaii's keiki must be protected from the predatory marketing of tobacco companies.

Hawai'i has an opportunity to act now and be the first state to end the sale of flavored tobacco.

Over 180 localities^v have passed restrictions on the sale of flavored tobacco products, and over two dozen restrict the sale of menthol cigarettes. FDA's proposed plan aims to restrict the sale of flavored e-cigarettes in convenience stores and gas stations, however, it still allows e-cigarette products to stay on the market and online without review by the FDA until August 2022. Since recognizing flavors and vaping as a national public health concern, the FDA has only sent warning letters to 18 manufacturers since May 2018. We know rulemaking at the federal level is often a long process, which is why state-level action on menthol and other flavored products is needed now. E-cigarettes are not FDA-approved tobacco cessation products. We have yet to see any scientific evidence, beyond anecdotal data, that e-cigarettes have helped smokers to quit completely from tobacco use. The concern is that with the aggressive and deceptive marketing of these products, we are seeing other consequences: 1) people who have never smoked are using e-cigarettes, 2) children are picking them up as a path to smoking, and 3) smokers are using them to perpetuate their habit instead of to completely quit.

Prohibiting the sale of flavored tobacco products can help to keep kids from ever starting to smoke or vape, and can encourage those addicted to these products, to quit. We appreciate

Hawaii's leadership in tobacco control and the legislature's actions to protect our young people from a deadly addiction. We respectfully urge the committee to pass SB1009 SD2.

Keiki Injury Prevention Coalition (KIPC) supports SB 1009 SD2 which bans the sale of flavored tobacco products.

My name is Lisa Dau, RN, Injury Prevention Coordinator, and I represent KIPC.

E-cigarettes, particularly JUUL products that come with appealing flavors are very popular with tweens and teens. Marketing and peer pressure have led to this popularity. Flavoring and the sweet odors of these products mask the dangers of using JUUL and other products that contain flavored tobacco. Consuming these potent addicting products can lead to live-long illnesses. Vaping entrepreneurs have been using strategies from tobacco companies to market their products directly to children. Add-on products like flavored tobacco make the product very appealing to tweens and teenagers. Friends and younger siblings are eager to try a new cool activity, this increases peer pressure of being a part of the "in group" which might lead a teen's decision to use tobacco products.

There is significant dangers associated with nicotine. According to JUUL (e-cigarette product), a single pod (flavored tobacco) contains the same amount of nicotine as a pack of cigarettes. The *American Journal of Medicine* linked teen e-cigarette use with future cigarette use. There is a perception that vaping is unoffending, and even a healthy way to wean off of cigarettes, however it has been reported that 63% of young adults who use JUUL products with flavored nicotine did not know the substance contains nicotine (Safe Kids Worldwide).

If this bill passes, Hawai'i will lead the nation in showing how we value our keiki health and safety by banning flavored tobacco products. Please pass this bill, SB 1009 SD2.

Dear Chair Mizuno, Vice Chair Kobayahsi, and Members of the Committee:

At Blue Zones Projects we are working to make Hawaii a happier, healthier place to live, work and play. We support SB1009 SD2, which will ban the sale of all flavored tobacco products, ultimately reducing the number of users and potential users.

Youth are highly attracted to the variety, 15,500 + and growing, flavors. These are marketed to appeal to young people. With names like Fruit Hoops, Cali Colada, Space Jam, TrollzE, and Blizzard Berry-BRRRST, clearly the industry is targeting children under 21. By attracting young people, the next generation of consumers is being cultivated.

It is targeted, and the messaging is working phenomenally well. Nationally, there was a 78% increase from 2017-2018 in current e-cigarette use among high school students and 48% increase among middle school students. Bringing the total number of middle and high school students currently using to 3.6 million, 1.5 million more than the previous year. Hawaii youth are part of this trend, 42% of HIDOE high school students and 27% of middle school students report having ever used an electronic vaping product.

"Each day more than 2800 adolescents aged 12-17 try smoking with 10.9% of students trying before the age 13. Roughly 700 adolescents transition to daily smoking each day and more than 60% of teen smokers still smoke 5 years later." The fruity flavors are favored by teens because they mask the taste of the bitter nicotine. Children are the target consumer with these flavors that is shown by the increase in products by young people. Our children are becoming addicts, and although the schools have been given the ability to take ESDs away from students and turn the devices over to the police, it is impossible to stop addiction by simply removing the device. We need to target the source of the adolescent addiction.

The fact that young people are the target of the industry through flavored tobaccos to get them hooked, makes sense. "Preventing youth from smoking is important because 90% of smokers start before the age of 18, and very few adults will begin to smoke or use smokeless tobacco products after age 26. An estimated 5.6 million youth <18 will die prematurely from a smoking-related illness; these deaths can be averted through concerted public health measures and regulatory measures." We cannot address this epidemic nationally, but we can address it here for our Hawaii youth, and be an example for others.

This situation is a public health crisis that costs our state. The trajectory of teen vaping rates will surpass those of teen smoking rates at their peak. The levels of nicotine in one JUUL are making kids addicts immediately. It is not smoking, coughing and gagging on a combustible cigarette. It is enjoying the flavor of something that has the nicotine equivalent of 20 cigarettes. And most teens think they are only vaping flavors, not nicotine.³

As a state, we do not have the time to take a "wait and see" approach. The crisis is now. For years, we have done our keiki a disservice by ignoring the numbers and trusting that the industry has been acting ethically. We are allowing a generation to become addicted to nicotine through the hook of flavored eliquids.

This measure is the top priority of the youth council. Our children are asking the adults to address the issue of their health and well-being; we can't fail them. We are grateful to the committee for hearing SB1009 SD2 and hope that you will consider passing this bill.



Dear Representative Mizuno, Representative Kobayashi, and members of the Health Committee:

This measure is extremely critical to the health of the children of our state and our entire state as well. Please vote in favor of SB1009, SD2 banning all flavored tobacco products in Hawaii.

I am Executive Director of the Hawaii COPD Coalition and serve 46,015 Hawaii adults diagnosed with COPD in Hawaii (with an estimated equal number still undiagnosed). Since 2007, I have worked in Hawaii, nationally and internationally with countless people who have had their lungs and lives horribly affected by tobacco and nicotine.

We are grateful that this legislature has been the first in the nation to pass legislation banning the sale of tobacco and electronic smoking devices to people under 21 in Hawaii. Unfortunately, that doesn't stem the growing epidemic of young people and adults in our state who are smoking electronic smoking devices, commonly referred to as ESDs, e-cigs, or vaping.

With 168,000 young people in our schools and with 42% of all high school students and 27% of middle schoolers reporting ever having used an "electronic vaping product" in 2017, we have an urgent need to act. All our young people deserve protection from a lifetime of addiction.

While the FDA's proposed plan aims to restrict the sale of flavored e-cigarettes in convenience stores and gas stations, it still allows e-cigarette products to stay on the market and online without review by the FDA until August 2022. We know rulemaking at the federal level often takes a long time which is why state-level action on menthol and other flavored products is

needed now. We can't wait to protect our keiki. Additionally, the new proposed policies do not address flavors in any form of smokeless tobacco or hookah.

The chemicals used in e-juice and other products have NOT been tested nor approved for inhalation, particularly butter flavors which has been known to cause popcorn lung, otherwise known as bronchiolitis obliterans (which is a very serious progressive lung condition, basically causing the lungs to disappear from the bottom of the lungs upwards). The people using these products SAY they don't FEEL different and aren't currently having symptoms but the studies show otherwise. The most recent study is the FIRST study to show an independent association of e-cigarette use with chronic respiratory disorders and it's a Hawaii study. Sadly, addicted tobacco smokers often also said they were "fine," up until they were hospitalized with a severe COPD "lung attack" and put on supplemental oxygen for the rest of their lives as well. The over 15,000 flavors of ESDs are designed to entice and attract youth with flavors and designs and packing like sweet candies they love, like gummy bears, jolly ranchers, and more!

We already have over 46,000 Hawaii adults with COPD. The study showing that e-cigarettes cause respiratory disorders shows why it is imperative that this bill be passed NOW, to prevent our state from having ever more young and older people with COPD and the accompanying reduced quality of life.

Please help protect the lungs and lives of our children from these very harmful products that are spreading virally in our schools, from elementary through high school and beyond. We urge you to please vote in favor of SB1009, SD2 and pass it out of committee so it can become law. The Hawaii COPD Coalition thanks you very much for your careful consideration of this most important and timely bill.

My name is Michael Robinson, Vice President, Government Relations & Community Affairs at Hawai'i Pacific Health. Hawai'i Pacific Health is a not-for-profit health care system comprised of its four medical centers – Kapi'olani, Pali Momi, Straub and Wilcox and over 70 locations statewide with a mission of creating a healthier Hawai'i.

<u>I write in support of SB 1009, SD2</u> which would ban the sale of flavored tobacco products effective as of January 1, 2020.

Tobacco use remains the leading cause of preventable disease and death in the United States and in Hawai'i. Tobacco use is a serious public health problem in terms of the human suffering and loss of life it causes, as well as the financial burden it imposes on society and our healthcare system. Annually, \$526,000,000 in health care costs are directly attributed to smoking in the State. Flavored tobacco products promote youth initiation of tobacco use and help young occasional smokers become daily smokers by reducing or masking the natural harshness and taste of tobacco smoke, thereby increasing the appeal of tobacco products. Menthol, in particular, is used by the tobacco industry because it has a cooling and numbing effect and can reduce the throat irritation from smoking, thus making menthol cigarettes an appealing option for youth who are initiating tobacco use. Candy and fruit flavors improve the taste and reduce the harshness of tobacco products, making them more appealing and easier for beginners to try tobacco products and ultimately become addicted. The popularity of electronic cigarettes among youth is concerning, as these products contain nicotine.

E-cigarette use or vaping among youth and young adults has become a national public health concern. E-cigarettes are now the most popularly used tobacco product among youth and young adults, surpassing cigarettes. While smoking rates in Hawaii have decreased through the years, ESD use has rapidly increased, threatening significant

public health gains through our Tobacco 21 law and tobacco youth access laws. This is particularly concerning because e-cigarettes provide a new way to deliver the addictive drug nicotine. No matter how it is delivered, nicotine exposure can lead to addiction and harm the developing brain. Studies are also finding that ESDs can lead to smoking cigarettes for new users, including kids. Marketing strategies by the tobacco industry and electronic smoking device industry have significantly increased the introduction and marketing of flavored non-cigarette tobacco products, especially ESDs. Products are glamorized in order to appeal to our youth, using flavors such as candy, fruit, chocolate, mint, Kona coffee, Maui Mango, Shaka strawberry, and Moloka'i hot bread.

Recognizing the increasing public health concerns of flavored tobacco products, other jurisdictions have enacted bans on the sale of those products. Hawaii should also take the step to impose a similar ban.

The Student Health Advisory Council has played a pivotal role in the development and implementation of health policies and tobacco education on the UH System campuses. Tobacco use remains a serious threat to public health. Each year, Hawaii spends \$526 million in health care costs and \$141.7 million in Medicaid costs due to smoking. Tobacco products with menthol, sweet flavors, and colorful packaging are designed to attract teens and young adults. With 81% of youth starting with a flavored product, regulating the flavors designed to capture and addict new customers prioritizes the health and safety of our community over tobacco's special interests.

This measure helps to protect our keiki from a lifetime of addiction. Hawaii is experiencing a vaping epidemic among our young people. The State Legislature has worked hard to protect our residents from the harms caused by tobacco use, but the rapid growth of e-cigarette use is alarming. With 42% of all high school students and 27% of middle schoolers reporting ever having used an "electronic vaping product" in 2017.

Prohibiting the sale of flavored tobacco products can help to keep kids from ever starting to smoke or vape, and can encourage those addicted to these products, to quit. We appreciate Hawaii's leadership in tobacco control and the legislature's actions to protect our young people from a deadly addiction.

The Hawaii State Teachers Association <u>strongly supports SB 1009, SD2</u> banning the sale of flavored tobacco products.

This measure would ban the sale of flavored tobacco products in the state of Hawaii starting on 1/1/2020.

Flavored tobacco products have been proven as the entry point for youth to start smoking. According to the FDA's 2018 National Youth Tobacco Survey over two-thirds (67.8 percent) are using flavored e-cigarettes, which is a significant increase from 2017. The 2017 CDC, Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System reported 8.1% of high school students smoked on at least one day in the past 30 days.

Locally the Hawaii's Youth Risk Behavior Survey of public high school students disclosed the following: over 42% of Hawaii high school students have tried using vapor products; over 25% of Hawaii high school students indicated that they are regular users; and neighbor islands high school students reporting even higher numbers with over 31% of Kauai students, over 32% of Maui students, and over 34% of Hawaii county students reported to be regular users.

This data is clear and the reason the Hawaii State Teachers Association asks your committee to **support** SB 1009, SD2. We need to protect our youth.

SB 1009, SD2 – RELATING TO FLAVORED TOBACCO PRODUCTS

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of SB 1009, SD2, which prohibits the sale of flavored tobacco products beginning January 1, 2020.

Every year in Hawaii over 6,700 people are diagnosed with cancer. Despite the fact that US cancer death rates have decreased by 26 percent from 1991 to 2015, not all have benefited equally from the advances in prevention early detection, and treatments that have helped achieve these lower rates. Significant differences persist in cancer incidence, survival, morbidity, and mortality among specific populations. Lung cancer remains the leading cause of cancer deaths in Hawaii.

Smoking not only causes cancer, it can damage nearly every organ in the body, including the lungs, heart, blood vessels, reproductive organs, mouth, skin, eyes, and bones. Smoking accounts for about 30 percent of all cancer deaths in the United States, including about 80 percent of all lung and bronchus cancer deaths. The impact of tobacco use goes beyond health. The annual health care costs in Hawaii directly caused by smoking are over \$500 million.

Flavored Tobacco Products

The 2009 Family Smoking Prevention and Tobacco Control Act implemented a federal prohibition of characterizing flavors other than tobacco or menthol in cigarettes. The prohibition included candy-and fruit-flavors. However, the federal law exempts "tobacco, menthol, mint or wintergreen flavors" and flavored electronic cigarettes.

While cigarette smoking rates have declined significantly in recent years, the use of electronic cigarettes has been skyrocketing, especially among youth. During the one-year period between 2017 and 2018, among high school students who currently used ecigarettes, use of flavored e-cigarettes increased as well. Use of any flavored e-cigarette went up among current users from 60.9 percent to 67.8 percent, and menthol use increased from 42.3 percent to 51.2 percent among all current e-cigarettes users —

including those using multiple products – and from 21.4 percent to 38.1 percent among exclusive e-cigarette users. Flavors in tobacco products are frequently listed as on the top three reasons youth use e-cigarettes. Additionally, kids whose first tobacco product was flavored are more likely to become current tobacco uses than those whose first product was tobacco flavored. Furthermore, evidence indicates that many young people who use e-cigarettes also smoke cigarettes. There is some evidence that young people who use e-cigarettes may be more likely to smoke cigarettes in the future. Using nicotine in adolescence may also increase risk for future addiction to other drugs.

Recent spikes in the use of e-cigarettes makes clear that more must be done to regulate tobacco products and the industry's deceptive marketing practices.

Menthol use in tobacco products

Menthol is a chemical compound that creates a cooling effect, reduces the harshness of cigarette smoke and suppresses coughing. Those effects may make menthol cigarettes more appealing to young, inexperienced smokers. Research shows that they are more likely to addict youth and more difficult to quit than regular cigarettes. Many people who smoke think menthol cigarettes are less harmful. In fact, there is no evidence that cigarettes, cigars, or smokeless tobacco products that have menthol are safer than other cigarettes. This myth has been perpetuated via a decades long campaign by the tobacco industry.

The disparities in flavored tobacco products use in the state are contributing to the negative health disparities that exists and must be addressed. ACS CAN strongly recommends implementing evidence-based policies to prevent the initiation and use of all tobacco products. The use of products containing nicotine in any form among youth is unsafe and can harm brain development.

My name is Cori Takesue and I am a member of the Coalition for Tobacco-Free Hawai'i as well as a Behavioral Health Specialist and Tobacco cessation treatment provider at Lana'i Community Health Center. I'm writing today to request your support of our 2019 legislative priority to ban flavored tobacco, including e-cigarette products in Hawai'i.

Our Coalition supports the Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawaii Youth Council, which is made up of high school and college students from across the state. This year our Youth Council and the Coalition have selected this as our policy priority because we believe something must be done to stop the epidemic of vaping amongst youth. Hawai'i has some of the highest rates of vaping in the country, with 25% of high school students and 15% of middle school students reporting they vaped in the past 30 days. 81% of kids nationwide use a flavored tobacco product as their introduction to tobacco, including vaping. 30% of vapers start using combustible tobacco within 60 days of starting to vape and 95% of current smokers started before the age of 21. It's clear to the members of our Youth Council and our Coalition that banning flavored tobacco is key to breaking this cycle. Flavored tobacco has no place in Hawai'i and we hope you feel the same. We don't need candy flavored tobacco to entice youth into starting a potentially life-long addiction to nicotine. Thank you for helping to keep Hawaii's keiki safe.

Chair Mizuno, Vice-Chair Kobayashi, and the Members of the Health Committee,

I strongly support SB1009, SD2. SB1009, SD2 would ban the sale of flavored tobacco products.

The US Surgeon General has declared youth e-cigarette use/vaping a national epidemic. He is emphasizing the importance of protecting our children from a lifetime of nicotine addiction and associated health risks by immediately addressing the epidemic of youth e-cigarette use. Current e-cigarette use has increased nationally to 78% among high school students during the past year. In Hawaii County, 49% of our kids are trying e-cigarettes at the high school level and about 35% of middle school students. There is a daily use rate of 34% amongst high school students. At the state level, about 27% of high school students are trying these devices. E-cigarette aerosol is not harmless. Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine-the addictive drug in regular cigarettes, cigars, and other tobacco products. A typical JUUL cartridge or pod contains about as much nicotine as a pack of 20 regular cigarettes. Nicotine exposure during adolescence can harm the developing brain -which continues to develop until about age 25. Nicotine exposure during adolescence can impact learning, memory, and attention. Now the e-cigarettes industry has produced kid-friendly flavors. In addition to making e-cigarettes more appealing to young people and addicting them, some of the chemicals used to make certain flavors may also have health risks.

Please support SB1009, SD2. As the Surgeon General stated earlier this year we need to protect the health of our nation's young people. We can stop addiction that is promoted through flavored tobacco products now or pay for the healthcare costs later.

Strong Support of SB1009 SD2, Relating to Flavored Tobacco Products

As a public health advocate, I cannot agree more with the Youth Council on this subject of banning flavored tobacco/nicotine products.

We, as the responsible adults in our "family" that is the State of Hawaii, must stand up for our children and young people. The industry says it wants to keep tobacco out of the hands of our children, but they don't want to do anything about it. The surest proof that candy-flavored tobacco is infiltrating our schools is from the DOE. With 168,000 young people in our schools and with 42% of all high school students and 27% of middle schoolers reporting ever having used an "electronic vaping product" in 2017, we have an urgent need to act. All our young people deserve protection from a lifetime of addiction.

In addition, the industry claims they're not targeting our youth, but their actions tell a different story. With 15,500 flavors and growing, these products are not being responsibly marketed. Candy flavors such as Fruit Hoops, Sour Straws, and Cookie Monsta are designed to appeal to our children, and make nicotine go down easier. The packaging and ads are attractive, and the products smell and taste good. All of these help to hook our youth and make them repeat customers. Addiction is the opposite of freedom. We're fighting to keep our children free from the deadly addiction to these products. The health of Hawaii's keiki must be protected from the predatory marketing of tobacco companies.

Included in the flavor ban would be menthol which has cooling properties that mask the harshness of tobacco smoke and nicotine, making menthol cigarettes another popular starter product. The tobacco industry has a long history of marketing menthol cigarettes to youth and vulnerable groups, such as the African American community. In Hawaii, 78% of Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander smokers use menthol cigarettes. In the Philippines, market share of menthol cigarettes was 55%. The consequences of this are while nicotine and tobacco addiction are deadly for everyone, Native Hawaiians and Filipinos die at higher rates of lung cancer than other groups.

Although some adults claim ESDs have helped them to "quit", ESDs are not FDA-approved tobacco cessation products. We have yet to see any scientific evidence, beyond anecdotal data, that e-cigarettes have helped smokers to quit completely from tobacco use. The issue is with the aggressive and deceptive marketing of these products, we're seeing other things happening: 1) people who have never smoked are using e-cigarettes, 2) children are picking them up as a path to smoking, and 3) smokers are using them to perpetuate their habit instead of to completely quit. Even more troubling is because of the historic declines in smoking, big tobacco has decided to focus on candy flavors and nicotine delivery solutions. Tobacco giant Altria, maker of Marlboro, is investing in the popular vaping company Juul, which has 76% of the e-cigarette market share and is worth \$16 billion.

If Hawaii's tobacco stores are truly supportive of keeping the community healthy, then they must be fine offering products for sale other than cotton candy or gummy worm-flavored e-juice. Our residents are proud to support local, but not when these products directly contribute to the youth vaping epidemic. If we don't remove candy flavors, the cost to our kids will be a lifetime of addiction to tobacco.

Hawaii's Youth Risk Behavior Survey found that over 42% of Hawaii high school students have tried using vapor products; over 25% of Hawaii high school students indicated that they are regular users; and neighbor islands high school students reported even higher numbers with over 31% of Kauai students, over 32% of Maui students, and over 34% of Hawaii county students said to be regular users. With a majority of kids starting with a flavored tobacco product, restricting the sale of kidfriendly flavors will help to protect them from a lifetime of nicotine addiction.

Aloha, my name is Alexis Cortes and I am currently a senior at Hawai`i Pacific University studying Public Health and a member of the Hawai`i Public Health Institute's Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawai`i's Youth Council. I am testifying in support of Senate Bill 1009 to end the sale of flavored tobacco products in Hawai`i.

Our Youth Counsel's top priority this year is to end the sale and distribution of flavored tobacco, including menthol, in Hawai'i. Vaping is currently a common trend that I am witnessing in my community. In the US, 81% of youth have used some form of tobacco product and these flavors contribute to this rate. Flavors like cotton candy, iced gummy bear, Hawai'i sweet roll, and even POG are attracting our youth to try tobacco products. There are currently around 15,500 different flavors available for purchase. In addition, the packaging of flavored tobacco products is often mistaken as actual candy products. Tobacco industries are aware of how to market towards our youth with colorful and "cool" packaging and they are their current targets. When doing presentations with the Youth Council, our props are primarily donations of confiscated vaping products from schools. Our vaping rates are three times the national average for middle school students and twice the national average for high school students in Hawai'i.

As a public health major, I know that Hawai`i has made great efforts on tobacco preventative measures like increasing the age of purchasing tobacco products to 21 years old. However, the tobacco industry is using the flavored tobacco as a tactic to hook a new generation that lead to a lifetime nicotine addiction. Within the Hawai`i Youth Risk Behavior Survey, 25% of high school students choose to vape is because of the availability of the flavors. Although combustible cigarettes are at an all time low, e-cigarettes use has skyrocketed by 78% from 2017 to 2018. Flavored tobacco is clearly responsible for the high spike of e-cigarette use.

By ending the sale of flavored tobacco, we are considering the quality of life for our keiki here in Hawai`i. I strongly urge lawmakers to keep our generation tobacco-free by ending the sale of flavored tobacco.

Aloha!

I have been fortunate to meet, work and guide thousands of children, parents and co-workers for four decades in various roles in the private and public sectors.

Through these experiences, I have seen the devastating effects of tobacco use on health, family life, academics, hygiene and interpersonal relationships. Because of this, I will do my part to prevent the onset or addiction of children or adults towards a career in tobacco use. Please consider a ban on candy flavored tobacco products.

TOBACCO TESTIMONY

<u>Work Performance</u> = as a supervisor in the service and transportation industries, I have seen employees terminated for continuing to smoke in restricted areas or regularly calling in sick due to respiratory illness, causing financial hardship for their families.

<u>Non-attendance</u> = as a teacher, I have seen the symptoms of asthmatic and/or sick children worsened by second smoke leading to absenteeism and educational implications when coupled with rising academic standards.

<u>Reckless Behavior</u> = as a high school counselor, I know of minors who chose to run or find other places to stay because they realized the hazards of second hand smoke or could not tolerate the overwhelming stench of their home. In other situations, minors avoided going inside their homes until very late and loitered outside which led to reckless behaviors and tragic events.

<u>Meltdowns</u> = as a middle school counselor, I guided students through emotional episodes and mediated family relationships because children do not fully grasp the addictive nature of tobacco and felt they were being poisoned at home and in their cars.

<u>Athletics</u> = as an athlete, Assistant Athletic Director and coach, I have seen participation and performance of student-athletes diminished by tobacco use or the effects of regular exposure to second hand smoke in family settings.

Chair Mizuno, Vice Chair Kobayashi and members of the Committee,

Thank you for this opportunity to submit written testimony on Senate Bill 1009, Senate Draft 2, Relating to Flavored Tobacco Products. I am Jim Yates, president of the Hawaii Petroleum Marketers Association ("HPMA"). HPMA is a non-profit trade association comprised of members who directly market liquid motor fuel products across the Hawaiian Islands. Our membership includes individuals and companies who operate as independent marketers, jobbers or distributors of petroleum products and who buy liquid motor fuel products at the wholesale level and sell or distribute products to retail customers, other wholesalers, and other bulk consumers. HPMA's primary purpose is to protect and advance its members' legislative and regulatory interests in Hawaii and Washington, DC.

Senate Bill 1009, as worded, would ban the sale of all flavored tobacco products, effective January 1, 2020.

HPMA is opposed to SB 1009 in its current form. We support further restrictions on tobacco product sales to under aged users and ask for the Committee's consideration on the following suggested amendments:

- Exempt menthol and mentholated tobacco products from the ban, as offered in H.B. 276, H.D. 2.
- In addition, exempt all smokeless tobacco products from the ban such as snuff and chewing tobacco, as these products are clearly marketed to adult consumers.
- Delete provision §712-___, (5), as it could lead to disparate laws among county ordinances regulating access to tobacco products that would complicate compliance.

Members of HPMA understand the gravity of the situation and offer the following perspectives:

- Hawaii has already enacted strict laws for the legal age of sale of tobacco products, as
 encouraged by the federal Food & Drug Administration. HPMA member companies that
 sell tobacco products, along with many other responsible retailers in Hawaii, do so in
 compliance with the law. By eliminating flavored tobacco products for sale, this
 proposed bill would deprive adult users of acquiring these products while
 unintentionally leading to predatory online/Internet sales and, even more concerning,
 the potential proliferation of black market products that are fully unregulated.
- HPMA does not argue against banning sales of candy flavored tobacco products such as
 "Bubble Gum" and "Cotton Candy" e-liquids for electronic smoking devices (ESDs), the
 marketing of which can easily be construed as targeting young users. Rather, HPMA is
 primarily concerned that menthol-flavored tobacco products are included in the vast
 array of flavored products being banned in this bill. Menthol cigarettes, for example,
 account for more than half of the tobacco sales for HPMA retailers, and conceivably
 more for some other businesses.
- With Hawaii's strict age restrictions against accessing tobacco products, combined with
 locations where people are prohibited from smoking or vaping, the State has done much
 to safeguard our youth from using these products. Still, HPMA is aware that usage is
 high—and growing—among young people. We feel it is a call for stricter enforcement of
 sellers who violate Hawaii's laws and increased consumer education, more so than
 prohibiting access to consumer products that are intended for adults.
- Should the State proceed with enacting a ban on flavored tobacco products, HPMA
 respectfully requests that menthol flavoring in cigarettes and ESD liquids remain
 available for sale through local retail outlets, along with all flavored smokeless tobacco
 products such as snuff and chewing tobacco that are aimed at adult users. HPMA notes
 that sales conducted through locally established retail locations enable the seller to
 more accurately ascertain a purchaser's age.
- In addition, SB 1009 would allow any county to adopt a rule or ordinance that places greater restrictions on the access of tobacco products than State law, and the more stringent restrictions shall prevail in the event of a conflict. HMPA understands and supports the need for strict enforcement of this statute. We believe, however, that having a uniform State law would better-enable retailers to comply, rather than allowing a mixture of laws to emerge from county to county.

Therefore, HPMA respectfully requests including the following amendments in the bill:

§ 712 - __ Sale of flavored tobacco products

- [(5) Any county may adopt a rule or ordinance that places greater restrictions on the access of tobacco products than provided for in this section. In the case of a conflict between the restrictions in this section and any county rule or ordinance regarding access to tobacco products, the more stringent restrictions shall prevail.]
 - (6) For the purpose of this section:

"Characterizing flavor" means a distinguishable taste or aroma, or both, other than the taste or aroma of tobacco, imparted by a tobacco product or any byproduct produced by the tobacco product. Characterizing flavors include but are not limited to tastes or aromas relating to any candy, chocolate, vanilla, honey, fruit, cocoa, coffee, dessert, alcoholic beverage, [menthol,] mint, wintergreen, herb, or spice. A tobacco product shall not be determined to have a characterizing flavor solely because of the use of additives or flavorings or the provision of ingredient information in the absence of a distinguishable taste or aroma, or both.

"Flavored tobacco product" means any tobacco product that contains a constituent that imparts a characterizing flavor except for menthol or mentholated products and all smokeless tobacco products that are flavored.

With these amendments, and together with diligent enforcement of existing tobacco sales laws, HMPA is able to support restrictions on tobacco products aimed at Hawaii's youth. Thank you for considering the HPMA's suggested amendments and for providing this opportunity to submit written testimony.

HPHA also serves as a voice for public health professionals and as a repository for information about public health in the Pacific.

HPHA strongly supports SB1009 SD1, which would end the sale of flavored tobacco products, including flavored e-liquids and menthol cigarettes.

Hawai'i is already experiencing a youth vaping epidemic. Studies have shown that 8 in 10 kids start with a flavored tobacco product. It's no coincidence that the rise in youth vaping has coincided with an explosion of sweet e-liquid flavors used to hook kids. With more than 15,500 flavors, these products are being irresponsibly marketed – who is the industry really targeting with flavors like Fruit Hoops, Sour Straws, or Cookie Monsta?

It's also critical to include menthol cigarettes in the flavored tobacco ban. Menthol cigarettes are a popular starter product, as it has cooling properties that mask the harshness of tobacco smoke and nicotine. The tobacco industry has a long history of marketing menthol cigarettes to youth and vulnerable groups, such as the Native Hawaiian community, and has led to health disparities.

We must end the sale of candy-flavored tobacco to protect our youth from a lifetime of addiction. The industry is promoting flavors that mimic popular food or candy to hide the fact that they contain nicotine and with more kids who were never smokers using these products, we have an urgent need to act. HPHA strongly supports SB1009 SD1 and ask you to pass this out of committee.

I strongly support SB 1009-SD2, which would ban the sale of flavored tobacco products.

I support this bill because previous research has shown that flavorings make tobacco products, particularly e-cigarettes, attractive to adolescents. Recent data from Hawaii and other states have shown that e-cigarette use is quite prevalent among school students, even among middle school students who are 12-14 years of age. This is resulting in a high rate of addiction to nicotine, which was previously not known in Hawaii because rates of cigarette smoking were relatively low and the high taxes on cigarettes in Hawaii result in less frequent smoking among students who do smoke. It looks like e-cigarettes are changing this situation and that a number of students may graduate from school being addicted to nicotine.

In addition to showing that e-cigarette use is prevalent among Hawaii school students, our studies have shown that e-cigarette use is linked to several adverse outcomes. Using e-cigarettes is related to initiation of cigarette smoking among previous nonsmokers, hence is contributing to nicotine addiction through another mechanism. It is also related to asthma and bronchitis.

Recent authoritative articles by physicians and pharmacologists in the New England Journal of Medicine have emphasized that nicotine is as addictive as heroin, that flavored tobacco products increase the likelihood of adolescents becoming addicted, and that there is increasing evidence of harmful respiratory effects from e-cigarette vapor. (See, for example, "The Dangerous Flavors of E-Cigarettes," New England Journal, January 30, 2019.) Many public health experts have noted that the current epidemic of e-cigarette use among adolescents is creating risk for public health and that steps should be taken to reduce use among teenagers. All the research I have seen indicates that eliminating flavorings would be a large and effective step toward this goal.

I have heard some people argue that the FDA is going to take action against flavorings soon.

I don't believe it. I have heard similar arguments for years about tobacco policy. The tobacco companies agreed in 2006 to run ads about the risks of cigarette smoking and nicotine addiction, but IT TOOK 12 YEARS before they finally agreed to do this. (You are just seeing the se ads in the newspapers now.) The FDA tried to use its legal authority to put graphic warning labels on cigarette packages beginning in 2010, but THIS NEVER HAPPENED because the tobacco companies kept filing lawsuits against it. The writing on the wall is that if FDA tries to take action against flavored tobacco products, the tobacco companies will just do the same thing all over again and delay action for 10 or 20 years. Meanwhile a new generation of teenagers will become addicted to nicotine.

For the reasons given above, I strongly support SB 1009-SD2 and ask you to pass this out of committee.

VOLCANO Fine Electronic Cigarettes[®] is the largest retailer & wholesaler of vapor products and vaping accessories in the State of Hawaii. We currently own and operate 15 locations statewide and employ over 110 full-time workers to support sales of our products not only here in Hawaii, but to all 50 states as well as over 30 International countries. We stand in opposition to SB 1009 SD2 for the following:

- SB 1009 SD2 would decimate the Hawaiian vapor industry by banning the sale of all electronic cigarette liquids and cartridges. Every electronic cigarette available on the worldwide market is "flavored." Because they do not contain tobacco, electronic cigarettes have no "natural tobacco" taste, or any taste for that matter, without the addition of flavorings. Even electronic cigarettes advertised as coming in "tobacco flavor" are actually just the result of the blending of several different flavorings such as caramel and nut flavors in an attempt to mimic the flavor of tobacco. To use the language of the proposed statute, every electronic cigarette imparts to the user a "distinguishable or distinctive" aroma, or taste other than tobacco. As a result, SB 1009 SD2 will act as a de facto ban of the manufacture and sale of all electronic cigarettes.
- Even if SB 1009 SD2 permitted the sale of electronic cigarettes flavored to taste like tobacco, its enactment would still ban the manufacture and sale of the vast majority of our products. This bill would present more than just a competitive disadvantage for local suppliers and retailers. It would be a death knell for vapor industry in Hawaii. Local consumers will either flavor liquids themselves or purchase from out of state, causing a loss of jobs and tax revenues for the state. Similarly, we will be forced to close our stores and move all or most of our business and operations to the mainland, taking with us jobs and tax revenue that has grown every year since our founding.
- Enactment of SB 1009 SD2 will deal a similar fate to our competitors in the electronic cigarette industry. Between them these businesses have likely created 1000 jobs in Hawaii. All or more of these jobs will be lost as a result of this legislation. Additionally, convenience





stores and other businesses that sell vapor products will feel the impact of consumers purchasing products from the mainland.

- The baseless claims that electronic cigarettes flavors are made to attract children must be weighed against the significant evidence that electronic cigarette flavors are very popular with adult users. The International Journal of Environmental Research and Public Research recently published the most expansive survey performed on the subject. We urge you to read the full text of this study, which we have attached to our testimony. Below are some highlights:
 - Researchers conducted an Internet survey of over 4,500 adult electronic cigarette consumers. The participants' average age was 40 years old. The vast majority (90%) of those surveyed were ex-smokers, with the average respondent having been cigarette-free for approximately one year.
 - Among the survey respondents, the most commonly used flavors were fruits, followed by sweets and tobacco.
 - Those electronic cigarette users who were still smoking ("dual users") were actually more likely to use tobacco flavors than those vapers who had quit smoking.
 - On a scale of 1-5, the average score given by the respondents for the importance of flavor variability in reducing or quitting smoking was 4 ("very important").
 - Almost 50% of the respondents answered that a lack of flavor availability would increase their cravings for tobacco cigarettes and would decrease their chances of remaining abstinent from smoking.

- The use of flavorings in electronic cigarette liquids is one of the driving factors in helping prevent adult former smokers who switch to e-cigarettes from going back to traditional cigarettes. Most users report that after switching to electronic cigarettes and experiencing the pleasant tastes one can enjoy with an electronic cigarette, they no longer find the taste of traditional tobacco cigarettes appealing.
- Enactment of this bill will actually benefit Big Tobacco by stifling their competition. Analysts credit electronic cigarettes, not government intervention, nor traditional nicotine replacement therapy products, with causing cigarette sales to experience larger than forecasted declines in the U.S. and Europe. Regardless of the good intentions involved, every step taken to reduce adult access to electronic cigarettes is really a step towards protecting cigarette markets.
- SB 1009 SD2 exempts traditional Nicotine Replacement Therapy (NRT) products that
 contain nicotine even though electronic cigarettes have been shown to be a much more
 effective tool for helping people quit smoking and have been demonstrated to have a similar
 risk profile as NRT's.

- The most Recent CDC report has shown e-cigarettes have supplanted all other traditional nicotine replacement therapies and are now the most commonly used product by consumers to quit using traditional tobacco cigarettes

- A recent study published by the New England Journal of Medicine concluded that E-Cigarettes are twice as effective for smoking cessation than traditional nicotine replacement therapy products which are not taxed or controlled the same way this bill proposes to tax and control E-Cigarettes. The state should be creating easier access for adult smokers to these products, not tighter regulations that steers current vapers back to tobacco cigarettes

- If flavors are not important in helping adult smokers switch from, or quit traditional cigarettes, why is GlaxoSmithKline's nicotine gum exempt from this bill and sold in flavors?



• SB 1009 SD2 would not successfully remove all flavored e-liquid products from the market. It would simply force local customers to go online and purchase them from vendors across the 49 other states who would not be subject to this ban. It would severely impact local based businesses from competing with businesses from the 49 other states who would not be subjected to this law further lowering jobs and revenues already being created in the state.

While we agree that curbing youth usage and enforcing our current laws prohibiting the sale and use of vapor products is of utmost importance, doing so at the detriment to adults who use these products every day as an alternative to traditional tobacco is not the right way to do it. TESTIMONY OF TINA YAMAKI PRESIDENT RETAIL MERCHANTS OF HAWAII March 12, 2019

Re: SB 1009 SD2 Relating to Flavored Tobacco Products

Good morning Chairperson Mizuno and members of the House Committee on Health. I am Tina Yamaki, President of the Retail Merchants of Hawaii and I appreciate this opportunity to testify.

The Retail Merchants of Hawaii (RMH) as founded in 1901 and is a statewide, not for profit trade organization committed to the growth and development of the retail industry in Hawaii. The retail industry is one of the largest employers in the state, employing 25% of the labor force.

We OPPOSE SB 1009 SD2 Relating to Flavored Tobacco Products. This measure would ban the sale of flavored tobacco products effective 1/1/2020.

This bill would essentially ban all menthol cigarettes, electronic vapor products and e-liquids. As a result, people would be compelled to purchase these goods online, on the black market, trying to mix flavored e-liquids themselves and essentially force many small local businesses who sells these items to shut down, thus leaving many of our family, friends and neighbors out of work.

Menthol cigarettes makes up 66% of the retail market in Hawaii. Banning this flavor of cigarette alone would take away \$76 million in tax revenue to the state.

Currently Hawaii has a law in place that states that it is unlawful for a person under the age of 21 years to purchase electronic vaping devices, e-liquids and tobacco products. However adults that are 21 and older are able to purchase these items and enjoy their menthol cigarettes or electronic vaping device with their favorite flavored e-liquid.

Furthermore, it is our understanding that electronic vaping devices has no "natural tobacco" taste, or any taste for that matter, without the addition of flavorings. And although almost every electronic vaping device and eliquid available worldwide is "flavored" not all of the flavors contain nicotine and those that do, not all nicotine strengths are the same. And flavored e-liquids are enjoyed by many adults.

In addition, vapor products and e-liquids are NOT the same as a tobacco product. Many electronic vaping devices contains NO tobacco and NO smoke is emitted when vaporized. The New England Journal of Medicine published an article recently that found that electronic vaping devices were nearly twice as effective as conventional nicotine replacement products, like patches and gum, for quitting smoking. The study was conducted in Britain and funded by the National Institute for Health Research and Cancer Research UK.

We are also aware that the US Food & Drug Administration has recently "deemed" various tobacco products, including e-vapor, to be subject to federal regulation. Under FDA's regulatory authority, e-vapor products will face a number of important requirements, such as domestic manufacturer establishment registration, ingredient disclosures, reporting of harmful or potentially harmful constituents, and prohibitions on selling to minors. We urge you to hold this measure until the Federal product regulations come out.



Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony. Hawaii Petroleum is an independent petroleum marketer operating on the islands of Maui and Hawaii, and employees approximately 325 people on the two islands. Hawaii Petroleum **OPPOSES SB1009** in its current form. We ask for the Committee's consideration in providing an exemption from the ban for menthol or mentholated tobacco products and all flavored smokeless tobacco products that are clearly marketed to the adult user.

- Hawaii Petroleum does not attempt to argue the merits of tobacco use or to downplay the health risks
 that are involved, especially with Hawaii's youth population. We believe tobacco products are strictly
 for adult use.
- Hawaii has already enacted strict laws for the legal age of sale of tobacco products, as encouraged by the federal Food & Drug Administration. HPMA member companies that sell tobacco products, along with many other responsible retailers in Hawaii, do so in compliance with the law. By eliminating flavored tobacco products for sale, this proposed bill would deprive adult users of acquiring these products while unintentionally leading to predatory online/Internet sales and, even more concerning, the potential proliferation of black-market products that are fully unregulated.
- Hawaii Petroleum does not argue against banning sales of candy flavored tobacco products such as "Bubble Gum" and "Cotton Candy" e-liquids for electronic smoking devices (ESDs), the marketing of which can easily be construed as targeting young users. Rather, Hawaii Petroleum is primarily concerned that menthol-flavored tobacco products are included in the vast array of flavored products being banned in this bill. Menthol cigarettes, for example, account for more than half of the tobacco sales for retailers, and conceivably more for some other businesses.
- Focus on enforcement, to catch the violator(s). With Hawaii's strict age restrictions against accessing tobacco products, combined with locations where people are prohibited from smoking or vaping, the State has done much to safeguard our youth from using these products. Still, we are aware that usage is high—and growing—among young people. We feel it is a call for stricter enforcement of sellers who violate Hawaii's laws and increased consumer education, more so than prohibiting access to consumer products that are intended for adults.
- Should the State proceed with enacting a ban on flavored tobacco products, Hawaii Petroleum respectfully requests that menthol flavoring in cigarettes and ESD liquids remain available for sale through local retail outlets, along with all flavored smokeless tobacco products such as snuff and chewing tobacco that are aimed at adult users. Hawaii Petroleum notes that sales conducted through locally established retail locations enable the seller to more accurately ascertain a purchaser's age.

• In addition, SB 1009 would allow any county to adopt a rule or ordinance that places greater restrictions on the access of tobacco products than State law, and the more stringent restrictions shall prevail in the event of a conflict. We understand and support the need for strict enforcement of this statute. We believe, however, that having a uniform State law would better enable retailers to comply, rather than allowing a mixture of laws to emerge from county to county.

I urge you to consider the above items when considering SB1009 to craft a bill that is effective, yet fair. Mahalo.
