RELATING TO TRAILS

Senate Bill 1068 proposes to appropriate funds to Nā Ala Hele, the Hawaii Statewide Trail and Access Program, by improving access to and maintaining state controlled recreational trails statewide and promoting hiker safety and hiker etiquette education and outreach. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this measure, provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities indicated in the Executive **Budget request.**

The Department's Division of Forestry and Wildlife has a current statewide inventory of 128 trail-and-road features spanning approximately 855 miles. These trails and access routes have experienced record numbers of users. Increased use has led to trail degradation, trail-head conflicts with residents, and an increase in mountain rescues.

The proposed \$1.8 million appropriation would be applied to improving access to and maintaining state-controlled recreation trails statewide, including planning, trail design, construction, and rehabilitation, as well as promoting public education and outreach relating to hiker safety and etiquette. Many of the current challenges associated with trails are due to heavy use, exacerbated by social media, drawing attention to formerly little-known trails. When these trails and their trailhead areas are located in residential areas, conflicts can arise due to parking, early morning visitors, and infringement on private property. Moreover, some trail users are unaware or unprepared for the specific trail conditions of the area they are visiting. Education is needed to help alleviate trailhead congestion and conflicts, improve safety for trail users, and minimize impacts to rescue personnel by making sure hikers are better prepared for backcountry

We write to you from Maunawili Estates Community Association, MECA, a residential community of 254 homes built mostly in the 1970's. Our community is made up of local families and Kupuna who have long been good contributing residents to Hawaii. For over 20 years our residents have personally experienced the great need for our beautiful State to better Malama our Aina while continuing to provide desired recreation options for tourists and local people.

In 1986 the City and the State's DLNR opened a trail to Maunawili Falls directly in our residential community on private land. In the beginning things were not too bad, a few hikers enjoying the tropical rain forest.

With tourism booming and Hawaii's population rising, today, over 1,000 hikers per week converge on our once peaceful community onto this small unmaintained trail with no resources. Today, the Aina has been destroyed. Here are a few examples of the aftermath after over 20 years of neglect:

The trail is destroyed, it is muddy and gross with human waste and pollution running down our streams into our marshes.





Several Japanese websites say "don't go to this trial it is filthy". Is this what we want?

Our keiki can't play in their own front lawns as hikers race along residential streets looking for parking.

Hikers get hurt on the damaged trail using 1st responder resources.





Criminals come into the community and bust hiker windows looking for easy pickings. Many of these are tourist rental cars.

Our list goes on.

The attached petition of 269 signatures collected last year was done to support SB2331- "Funding for hiking trails", this petition is directly applicable to SB1068 and is a small sampling of residents who are very dismayed at the sorry state of Hawaii's trails due to poor funding for the State's Na Ala Hele trail program.



Chairman Kahele and members of the Senate Committee on Water and Land: Thank you for the opportunity to testify in favor of SB 1608, which makes an appropriation for Na Ala Hele to improve access to and maintenance of state controlled recreational trails statewide. My name is Edwin Mersino. I am an interested member of the community.

For over forty years I have hiked Hawaii's trails leading various groups in valleys, on ridges and along the shorelines. Many of the hikes have been for the purpose of clearing and rebuilding trails, planting native species and removing invasive ones. Often the hikes been for educational or recreational purposes.

Over the years I have seen how the trails have been left to deteriorate from the natural processes and overuse. Long ago few ventured onto the trails and they suffered from neglect and were kept from disappearing entirely by the efforts of volunteers and the small Na Ala Hele staff. In the last ten years trail use has sky rocketed. This is due in large part because of the increase in visitors who like to hike and enjoy our wonderful natural environment.

Many trails have become very eroded to the point where they are hazardous to those using them and damaging to the environment. It has almost become impossible for the volunteers and the minimal Na Ala Hele staff to keep up. It has also come to my attention that Na Ala Hele has been unable to hire a contractor to help keep the trails open for over a year. The \$1.8 million in this bill is the minimum the State should devote to trail maintenance.

Many of the trails are in disrepair due to lack of funding. There is a constant battle to keep the trails safe: fallen trees, landslides, and fast growing vegetaion create many hazards for hikers. Many lost hikers, injuries, and deaths, could be avoided if the trails were properly cleared of overgrown vegetation and signs were posted to warn of dangers.

In the past decade or so, the numer of people using the trails has skyrocketted, due in large part to social media and hiking blogs which show the spectacular sights on Hawaii's trails. What these sites do not show however as the dangers and pitfalls many hikers encounter on our trails. Many people embark on the trails ill-prepared or ill-equipped to deal with the pitfalls which could be prevented by a proactive program to maintain the trails.

Please allocate the necessary funds to make Hawaii's trails a recreational resource for visitors and residents. I strongly support SB SB1068 to fund the Na Ala Hele program. Thank you for this opporunity to express my strong support for this bill.

Committee Chair and Members;

This testimony is being submitted in support of SB1068 to provide additional support for Hawaii's trail system.

I am no longer a resident of Hawaii. I lived in Hawaii for my entire adult life, 1975 - 2017, and only left these beautiful islands because of my wife's increasingly acute allergic reactions to the VOG. But living again on the West Coast of the Mainland, where I grew up, has provided me with a unique perspective on some of Hawaii's problems.

As I've recently re-hiked some of the trails on the mainland that I remember from my youth, I am struck by the high quality of the trails, and the obvious maintenance that has gone into preserving them. This contrasts sharply with the continually deteriorating conditions of trails that I've hiked in Hawaii over the past 42 years. In the past year I've hiked well maintained trails in California, Oregon, Nevada, and Utah. Why are the trail systems in these states so well maintained, but in Hawaii they are not? Aloha,

My name is Jeff Tanaka and I am writing in support of the SB 1068 which will increase the budget for NAH. I am an avid hiker and member of the local hiking club HTMC (Hawaii Trail and Mountain Club). I believe an increase in the NAH budget is long overdue and the consequences of neglecting or failing to increase the budget would be felt throughout the community.

First, I would like to thank you for your previous and continued support of funding for recreational trails in Hawai'i. Please help continue that important work by again supporting the Department of Land and Natural Resources' budget request for improving access to and maintaining state controlled recreational trails and creating a hiker safety and etiquette outreach campaign.

The Na Ala Hele Trails and Access Program has been actively managing 128 trail and road features that span approximately 855 miles since 1991. We as members of the trail using community make up a diverse group of public and private entities who use Na Ala Hele trails for recreational, subsistence, and cultural purposes. We understand the importance of protecting these accesses and their users.

Some of the issues that our state trails currently face are related to the increase in popularity and use. It is increasingly obvious that the daily use of our trails has exceeded the rate in which we can effectively manage and maintain them as well as educate the public about the safety and hazards of hiking in Hawaii. Every year we hear of the tragedies of ill-equipped hiker's due to the lack of knowledge of trail and environmental hazards. An increased budget that would allow for a safety and etiquette outreach program would help minimize these situations that can easily be avoided.

A budget increase would also allow for NAH to fortify the trails that receive the most use. For example, the work they did on the Kaiwa Ridge Trail (Lanikai "Pill Box" Trail) was to insure hiker safety. This is a trail that receives a high amount of daily traffic and with no doubt benefitted from the work that was done on it. Another trail that could benefit from this increase would be Manoa Falls, which is the closet waterfall to town and receives high traffic for that reason.

Lastly, the increased budget also creates opportunities for new trails on land like the Helemano Wilderness Area, which was acquired by the DLNR last year. For the last several years, we have seen more and more trails closed due to access disputes and safety. The creation of new trails would benefit the surrounding community and trail users by giving them more options of places to hike.

Maintaining and creating safe recreational trails becomes apparent as more people begin to enjoy these resources. Support for those who manage Hawai'i's trails must also proportionately reflect these growing needs. We understand that as trail use has increased within the past 10 years, funding for the Na Ala Hele Program and recreational trails in general has not. SB 1068 will greatly help the Na Ala Hele Program to successfully achieve these goals.



First of all I would like to introduce you to the Hawaiian Trail & Mountain Club. We are a club of about 500 dedicated hikers incorporated in the State of Hawai'i. The Club was organized in 1910 and has over 100 year history of providing organized hiking in Hawai'i. The Club also has a long history of volunteer work on the trails in the foothills and mountains of Hawai'i. We have not been active in lobbying the Legislature in the past but certain conditions exist at this time that causes us to take a stand for the benefit of the trails and forest regions of the State.

For the last few years it has become increasingly obvious to those of us who are regular users of our trails the the Na Ala Hele Trails and Access Program has been woefully underfunded. This has reached a point that the trails have not had any coordinated maintenance at all for the past year. This comes at a time when hiking has become more popular with residents and visitors. In short, our trails are being "loved to death". The trails are showing signs of slippage, erosion, and overgrowth. It is vital that Na Ala Hele gets the support needed to do necessary remedial work and keep these trails open and useable for the public. It is also vital that funds be allocated for the development of the additional acreage recently acquired from Dole Foods.

Testimony of Aha Moku Advisory Committee

In **SUPPORT** of Senate Bill 1068 **Relating to Trails**

Senate Bill 1068 makes an appropriation to improve na ala hele, the Hawaii statewide trail and access program, by improving access to and maintaining state controlled recreational trails statewide and promoting hiker safety and hiker etiquette education and outreach. **The Aha Moku Advisory Committee (AMAC) supports this measure.**

Under the Aha Moku Process, a traditional land and ocean management system restored from the translation of oral chants of the 9th century, the eight main Hawaiian Islands have been able to bring forward the voices of the indigenous Native Hawaiian practitioners who have sustained and cared for their lands for thousands of years. When restoring this Process in 2007 via Act 212 SLH 2007, then solidifying it in 2012 via Act 288 SLH 2012, the Legislature stressed the importance of incorporating traditional wisdom into government policy. Aha Moku is attached to the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR), and native Hawaiian communities statewide who have for centuries retained the traditional practices that are unique to each place are now being brought forward by the generational families of these places. These practices have been kept alive from ancient times to current times by the empirical knowledge of the natural and resources that have been handed down generation to generation by expert Native Hawaiian practitioners, particularly in the trails and accesses that lead to important cultural sites whether they be in a forest, a watershed, the coastline or wetlands. Each trail had a significant reason for existing.

One of the most important components for these trails, besides the safety, access and common etiquette education and outreach is the opportunity to educate visitors, tourists and all who use these now public trails on the unique cultural usage and history of the area or ahupua'a that each trail goes through. For this reason, we would like to add the following language to Section 2 of Senate Bill 1068 to read: (2) Developing and implementing a public awareness campaign that promotes hike safety and hike etiquette education and outreach, and includes the accurate Native Hawaiian traditional culture, history and practices customarily used in these places as taught by those lineal families who have been handed down the generational knowledge of the natural and cultural resources of each of these places;

Further, the Aha Moku Process encompasses the traditional 46 moku, which in turn encompasses 606 traditional ahupua'a. Within the State of Hawaii, an inventory of state trails list one hundred twenty-eight trail and road features. Because it is attached to DLNR, and believes in traditional wisdom becoming part of state policy, the Aha Moku is willing and able to assist the Na Ala Hele in working with and documenting the traditional and historic features of each of the Na Ala Hele Trails currently listed. Those who would assist Na Ala Hele would be the generational families and kupuna of the place where the listed trail is.

We are attached to DLNR, and through this venue, our people have been able to collaborate with government to address critical issues that are important to the people. The opportunity to work with the State of Hawaii, through Na Ala Hele and DLNR in sharing the unique cultural histories, methodologies and practices of specific sites would enhance a visitors experience as they hike Hawaii's beautiful hiking areas. This is also a way where the people of that place could participate in sharing their culture and history with others on each island, on each moku, and within each ahupua'a where a Na Ala Hele trail extends.

On behalf of the Aha Moku Advisory Committee, and the Islands of Moku O Keawe (Hawaii), Moku O Piilani (Maui), Moku O Kanaloa (Kahoolawe), Nanai Kaula (Lana'i), Molokai Pule Oo (Molokai), Moku O Kakuhihewa (Oahu), Manokalanipo (Kauai), and Kawelonakala (Niihau), We humbly ask that Senate Bill 1068, relating to trails, be amended to include our recommendation, and as amended, be passed by the Senate Committee on Water and Land.
