Chair Yamane, Vice Chair Todd, and Members of the House Committee on Water, Land, and Hawaiian Affairs.

The Office of Planning (OP) **supports** SB 1471, SD1, which authorizes the issuance of CIP funds to the County of Maui for a Wailuku-Kahului Transit Corridor Master Plan. The project is one of several transit-oriented development (TOD) funding requests the Hawaii Interagency Council for Transit-Oriented Development (TOD Council) has recommended for funding in Fiscal Year 2020.

This investment could have a transformative effect on the region: it would create a plan for redevelopment and transit improvements to increase community livability and accommodate affordable housing along the transit spine between Wailuku Town and Kahului—essentially linking key State and County of Maui TOD projects in the TOD Council's *Strategic Plan for Transit-Oriented Development*. The funds would provide a forum for the State and the County to work together to promote growth in compact, mixed-use communities that are integrated with public transit.

This effort would also allow the State to re-examine how State investments in State facilities and lands along the corridor—including State facilities in Wailuku, affordable housing at Central Maui Transit Hub, Maui Community College, and various schools in proximity to transit nodes and stops along corridor—can contribute to creating more sustainable, complete communities that locate affordable housing in proximity to civic institutions, schools, jobs, goods, and services.

OP respectfully requests the bill be amended to appropriate \$500,000—the sum requested by the County—for the plan preparation.

The Hawaii Interagency Council for Transit-Oriented Development (TOD Council) **supports** SB 1471, SD1, which would authorize the issuance of CIP funds to the County of Maui for the preparation of the Wailuku-Kahului Transit Corridor Master Plan. The TOD Council is comprised of 22 members representing State agencies, the counties, the Senate and House of Representatives, the Honolulu office of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, and affordable housing, business, and development interest groups. The TOD Council is charged with coordinating and facilitating State agency TOD planning, and facilitating consultation and collaboration between the State and the counties in support of State and county TOD and Smart Growth initiatives.

This project is one of several TOD funding requests that the TOD Council has recommended for funding in Fiscal Year 2020. A copy of the TOD Council recommendations to the 2019 Legislature of its TOD CIP request endorsements is attached for your reference.

The proposed project would examine the redevelopment potential and corridor improvements needed to increase community livability and accommodate affordable housing along the transit spine between Wailuku Town and Kahului—essentially linking key State and County of Maui TOD projects in the TOD Council's *Strategic Plan for Transit-Oriented Development*.

The funds would provide a forum for the State and the County to work together to promote growth in compact, mixed-use communities that are integrated with public transit. This effort would allow the State to examine how State investments in State facilities and lands along the corridor—including State facilities in Wailuku, affordable housing at Central Maui Transit Hub, Maui Community College, and various schools in proximity to transit nodes and stops along corridor—can contribute to creating more sustainable, complete communities that locate affordable housing in proximity to civic institutions, schools, jobs, goods, and services.

The Maui County project funding request would fund planning for a transit corridor master plan that would link major TOD projects included and discussed in the *Plan*.

As co-chairs of the TOD Council, we are fully cognizant of the budgetary constraints the State faces. We respectfully submit that State investment in these TOD projects will provide long-term benefits to the communities they will serve—laying the groundwork for more affordable housing, better access to State services, more livable communities, new business opportunities, and more revenue-generating opportunities for the State and its counties.

- DLNR 101—Proj LNR906—ENVTL STUDIES VARIOUS PROJECTS, STATEWIDE: [East Kapolei Master Plan EIS] ▶ \$1M DLNR Request, East Kapolei Lands TOD: \$1,000,000 in Lump Sum CIP for preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement for the East Kapolei Lands Master Development Plan. DLNR is currently preparing a master plan for approximately 175 acres of prime State lands at and surrounding the Keone`ae rail transit station at UH West Oahu. East Kapolei is a priority TOD area for the State. Revenues generated will help the DLNR to fund its conservation programs. The master plan is expected to be completed in late 2019, after which an EA/EIS will need to be prepared for subsequent development of these prime parcels. Funds to be allocated from Lump Sum CIP as needed.

Dear Representative Yamane, Representative Todd and members of the House Committee on Water, Land and Hawaiian Affairs:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in **support** of SB1471. The purpose of this bill is to appropriate funds to the Office of Planning for the planning and devlopment of the Wailuku-Kahului Transit Corridor Master Plan in the County of Maui.

A Wailuku-Kahului Transit Corridor Master Plan would enable Maui County to apply for a federal BUILD grant to finance the construction of multimodal transportation improvements. Kaʻahumanu Avenue serves over 50,000 vehicles daily, connecting Maui's primary commercial area in Kahului to its government seat in Wailuku. Imagine Kaʻahumanu Avenue transformed into a bus rapid transit corridor with safe walking and biking connections from surrounding communities and institutions to the transit stops. This is one of many alternatives the study would vet through technical analysis and public involvement.

Providing residents and visitors with multimodal options will help alleviate traffic congestion and encourage good health through walking and biking. County of Maui, Maui MPO, and community partners are working in coordination to promote walkable communities and transportation options through Hele Mai Maui 2040 Transportation Plan, Maui Bus service, Complete Streets and Community Plan updates. We are prepared to plan and implement a Wailuku-Kahului Transit Corridor.
