Purpose of Bill: Establishes the Hawaii three to six out-of-school program for grades

kindergarten through twelve. Authorizes the department of education to contract with private providers to furnish out-of-school programs for grades kindergarten through twelve, conducted during after-school hours, on weekends, and during inter-sessions on the premises of the private providers. Specifies the Hawaii three to six out-of-school program special fund is to be administered by the department of

education. Makes appropriations.

Department's Position:

The Department of Education (Department) strongly supports SB 1515 related to establishing the Hawaii three to six out-of-school program for the grades kindergarten through twelve, authorizing private providers to furnish out-of-school programs during the after-school hours, on weekends, and during intersessions.

The Department recognizes the demand for quality out of school time programs by parents, families and communities currently outweighs existing resources that fund the majority of programs through the Department of Education currently: Afterschool Plus (A+), 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21CCLC), United Peers Learning, Integrating New Knowledge (UPLINK), and Resources for Enrichment, Athletics, Culture, and Health for Hawai'i (R.E.A.C.H.). The Community Engagement Branch, which oversees these programs, also recognizes that as educators and partners increasingly collaborate to provide innovative learning experiences for students during non-school hours, the demand for sufficient resources to provide quality programs is increasing.

The additional funds proposed in this bill, combined with these programs, would strongly support the importance of quality out of school time programs that keep kids safe, help working families, and inspire learning.

RELATING TO EDUCATION

Senate Bill (S.B.) No. 1515: establishes the Hawaii Three to Six Out-of-School Program for grades kindergarten through twelve; authorizes the Department of Education (DOE) to contract with private providers to furnish out-of-school programs; establishes the Hawaii Three to Six Out-of-School Program Special Fund to be administered by DOE; appropriates an unspecified amount of general funds for deposit into the special fund; and appropriates an unspecified amount of special funds for implementation and expenses of the program.

As a matter of general policy, the department does not support the creation of any special fund which does not meet the requirements of Section 37-52.3, HRS.

Special funds should: 1) serve a need as demonstrated by the purpose, scope of work and an explanation why the program cannot be implemented successfully under the general fund appropriation process; 2) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries or a clear link between the program and the sources of revenue; 3) provide an appropriate means of financing for the

program or activity; and 4) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. In regards to S.B. No. 1515, it is difficult to determine whether the proposed special fund would be self-sustaining.

On a technical note, Section 302A-B (on page 6, lines 8 through 13) does not clearly define a purpose for the fund.

<u>**DEPARTMENT'S POSITION**</u>: The Department of Human Services (DHS) appreciates the intent of this measure and offers comments.

<u>PURPOSE:</u> This measure proposes to establish the Hawaii three to six out-of-school program for grades kindergarten through twelve. Authorizes the Department of Education (DOE) to contract with private providers to furnish out-of-school programs for grades kindergarten through twelve, conducted during after-school hours, on weekends, and during inter-sessions on the premises of the private providers. Specifies the Hawaii three to six out-of-school program special fund is to be administered by the DOE. Makes appropriations.

The DHS regulates programs that are operating as child care facilities and are required to be licensed by or registered with DHS. If the out-of-school programs as proposed are providing care, which is defined by section 346-151, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), as "... those situations where a person or organization has agreed to assume and has been entrusted with the responsibility for the child's supervision, development, safety, and protection apart from the parent or guardian," then the program may be operating a child care facility, which is defined as "a place maintained by any individual, organization, or

agency for the purpose of providing care for children with or without charging a fee at any time. It includes a family child care home, group child care home, and group child care center."

If the proposed out-of-school program operated by a private provider is not exempt from licensure by DHS, as allowed under section 346-154(a), HRS, then the private provider will also need to be licensed by DHS as a child care facility when the out-of-school program is caring for children attending elementary schools.

If the DOE will be responsible for licensing or certifying the out-of-school program directly, then the proposed program would not need to be licensed by DHS, in accordance with section 346-152(a) (3), HRS.

Additionally, DHS currently has a contract with the DOE to fund the A+ Program services with Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) funding for families that meet Purpose Two of TANF, to end the dependence of low-income employed families by promoting job preparation, work and marriage. The Department is able to claim on behalf of the State the A+ subsidies towards the State's TANF Maintenance of Effort (MOE) requirement in accordance with 45 Code of Federal Regulations section 263.1. Eligibility screening is required to ensure State TANF MOE claims are limited to expenditures incurred for TANF-eligible families.

DHS also contracts with the DOE for the Uniting Peer Learning, Integrating New Knowledge (UPLINK) Program. UPLINK is an existing after-school program for intermediate and middle school students in grades 6, 7, and 8. The State Fiscal Year 2019 funding for the UPLINK Program, totaling \$3,171,000 in Federal TANF funds, is provided by DHS and administered by the DOE through an agreement established in 2006. Beginning school year 2018-2019, 30 out of 53 (56%) intermediate and middle schools provide UPLINK.
