S.B. 160 - RELATING TO TORT LIABILITY

The Hawaii Government Employees Association, AFSCME Local 152, AFL-CIO supports the purpose and intent of S.B. 160 which permanently reestablishes an exemption for the State and counties from tort liability for lifeguard services.

After years of extensions granted by the Legislature, the protections afforded to lifeguards under Act 170, Session Laws of Hawaii 2002 sunset on June 30, 2017. While we are unaware of any current lawsuits that have arisen since then, we respectfully request the Legislature pass S.B. 160 and reestablish limited liability protections for county lifeguards while acting within the scope of their duties and responsibilities, with the exception of gross negligence or wanton acts of omissions. This protection from liability ensures that critical lifeguard services will be provided and that ocean safety officers are given much deserved peace of mind so they can focus their energy on their jobs: saving lives.

Dear Chair Nishihara, Vice Chair Wakai and Members of the Committee,

The Maui Hotel & Lodging Association (MHLA) is the legislative arm of the visitor industry. Our membership includes 195 property and allied business members in Maui County – all of whom have an interest in the visitor industry. Collectively, MHLA's membership employs over 25,000 residents and represents over 19,000 rooms. The visitor industry is the economic driver for Maui County. We are the largest employer of residents on the Island - directly employing approximately 40% of all residents (indirectly, the percentage increases to 75%).

MHLA is **in support of SB 160**, which makes an exemption from tort liability for the State and counties arising from lifeguard services, except for gross negligence or wanton acts or omissions.

Lifeguards provide a critical service to both residents and visitors. This liability protection enables lifeguard services to be provided by the counties without the threat of costly litigation. Furthermore, continued placement of county lifeguards at State-owned beaches will help reduce the number of deaths and injuries at these beaches.

Permanently reinstating the liability protections previously afforded for lifeguard services would further encourage counties to expand recreational safety education and public awareness programs, rather than expending time and monies on defending costly litigation.

Aloha Chair Nishihara and Members of the Committee:

I thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of SB 160, relating to tort liability. My testimony is submitted in my individual capacity as a member of the Hawai'i County Council and Chair of the Committee on Public Safety.

The purpose of this measure makes an exemption from tort liability for the state and counties arising from lifeguard services, except for gross negligence or wanton acts or omissions and reinstate the liability protections.

Act 170 provided liability protection for lifeguard services on the beach or in the ocean, except for gross negligence or wanton acts or omissions. This limited liability was necessary as counties would not provide lifeguard services at state beaches due to the potential liability that might ensue. Act 170 was repealed on June 30, 2017 leaving our state beaches with no lifeguards available when an emergency occurs. Supporting SB 160 would address this shortfall of services needed at our state beaches.

For the reasons stated above, I urge the Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs to support this measure as well. Should you have any questions, please feel free to contact me at (808) 323-4267.

Chair Nishihara,

I am the Co-Chairperson of the state Drowning and Aquatics Injury Prevention Advisory Committee and a recently retired Battalion Chief of the Hawaii Fire Department. As the past Battalion Chief of Special Operations, part of my duties was to oversee the Ocean Safety division on the island of Hawaii. I am also a board member of the Hawaiian Lifeguard Association. I am submitting this testimony in support of SB160 to protect our lifeguards from liability.

Hapuna beach is one of the most popular beaches in Hawaii averaging over 600,000 people who visit there annually. We currently have six full time lifeguards assigned there providing coverage seven day a week, including every holiday. Our lifeguards currently cover three towers there and perform preventative actions for approximately 22 thousand patrons annually. In spite of these preventative actions, they still perform an average of 100 rescues annually.

From 2001 to 2006, Hapuna beach was the number one location for spinal injuries in the state, yes even more than Sandy beach or Waimea Bay. Since 2006, Hapuna still remained in the top 10 beaches where spinal injuries occurred. This is a major concern because if someone with a spinal injury is not attended to immediately or handled improperly, they could become partially or completely disabled, or in the worse case scenario, become a fatality.

As we all know, every county is financially challenged, so if this measure should fail, lifeguard services and ultimately public safety may be jeopardized. Thank you for your consideration.


This measure is included in the HSAC Legislative Package. Therefore, I offer this testimony on the Maui County Council's behalf.

I am Kilipaki Vaughan, Deputy Fire Chief of the Kaua'i Fire Department (KFD). The KFD strongly supports the purpose of this Act to permanently reinstate the liability protections previously afforded for lifeguard services.


Passage of SB 160 would make our Kauai beaches accessible and safer by allowing counties to continue posting lifeguards at county and state beaches without the threat of costly litigation for conditions or events outside of human control.

KFD Ocean Safety Bureau (OSB) currently employs a professional workforce of 56 Ocean Safety Officer (OSO) Positions dedicated to the life safety of approximately 71,000+ Kauai residents and around 30,000+ visitors each day. Our KFD OSB faces this challenge each day while the community and people engage with the beauty and mana of our Kauai island shores.

This proposed amendment to add a new section to Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) Chapter 663 would protect County Lifeguards in responsibly performing their kuleana of providing rescue, resuscitative services, or other lifeguard services on the beach or in the ocean in the scope of employment. Our highly-trained personnel, as well as other County Lifeguards on all the Hawaiian Islands, should be afforded the protection of the law in performing their job professionally.

The KFD and our Ocean Safety Bureau urge your committee's support on the passage of SB 160.

TESTIMONY OF NAHELANI WEBSTER FOR THE HAWAII ASSOCIATION FOR JUSTICE (HAJ) IN OPOSITION TO S.B. 160

To: Chair Clarence K. Nishihara and Members of the Senate Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs:

My name is Nahelani Webster and I am presenting this testimony on behalf of the Hawaii Association for Justice (HAJ) in opposition to S.B. 160, Relating to Tort Liability.

Act 181 (2018) already provides the protections that this measure is trying to achieve. Lifeguards, just like all other state employees, are already protected by the State Tort Liability Act, Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS") Chapter 662.

The State Tort Liability Act specifically and explicitly provides in §662-1 that county lifeguards serving on State beaches are considered employees of the State and are subject to the protections of the State Tort Liability Act. Lifeguards are entitled to a defense, at no personal cost, by the Office of the Attorney General under §662-16. The State has assumed liability for negligence of its employees pursuant to §662-2 and therefore pays for all settlements and judgments on their behalf and on behalf of the State itself. There is, and has never been, any instance where a lifeguard acting within the course and scope of their employment has not been protected by the State of Hawaii pursuant to the State Tort Liability Act.



The same is true when lifeguards work on county beaches because the counties are similarly liable for the negligent acts of its employees; and therefore, defend lawsuits and pay settlements and judgments.

The issue of lifeguard responsibility for negligent performance of their duties has been before the legislature for the past 20 years or so. Lifeguards have expressed concern that their personal assets, including their homes and life savings, if they are sued as a result of someone's serious injury or death while they are on duty. It has been, and continues to be, HAJ's position that lifeguards, just like all other state employees, are already protected by the State Tort Liability Act, HRS Chapter 662.

Lifeguards have provided exemplary service on Hawaii beaches for over 100 years. HAJ has not been able to discover a single instance when a lifeguard lost personal assets because of services performed in the course and scope of their duties. HAJ has repeatedly asked proponents to identify cases in which lifeguards have lost personal assets and for 20 years they have not been able to identify even one time this happened in the 100-year history of lifeguards protecting our beaches. And these proponents, who make up the state and county lifeguard agencies and lifeguards themselves, would best know if indeed there were any instances. It therefore becomes obvious that there is no actual problem requiring legislative action.

This bill seeks to absolve both lifeguards and counties from civil liability which is poor public policy and endangers our residents and visitors alike. There is no valid reason to enact such a drastic measure and therefore we oppose this bill.

I am strongly in favor of SB 160. This bill provides tort liability immunity for lifeguards except in cases of gross negligence.

Passage of this bill is necessary because lifeguards work in an unpredictable, chaotic environment. Lifeguards are trained to accomplish rescues amd treat the public in a safe, professional manner. The variability of ocean conditions (surf, wind, bottom contour, tide, strength of current, angle of sun, etc.) however, means that standard text-book procedures are not always possible. They may form a basis for a lifeguard's training but are not the limit of the lifeguard's experience. A lifeguard will rely on his training and all of his ocean experience to accomplish a rescue. A lifeguard has to deal with the mercurial nature of the ocean - unlike other public safety agencies.



In consideration of Senate Bill 160 Relating to Tort Liability

Honorable Chair Nishihara, Vice Chair Wakai, and Members of the Committee:

The County of Kaua'i is in **strong support** of SB160 which proposes to make an exemption from tort liability for the State and counties arising from lifeguard services, except for gross negligence or wanton acts or omissions.

As Mayor of the County of Kaua'i and Ni'ihau I humbly implore you to reinstate the protections of our county lifeguards that were afforded by Act 170, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2002 and repealed on June 30, 2017 as they guard our state beaches. Kē'ē Beach located in Hā'ena State Park is one of the four state beaches protected by county lifeguards. In 2014 there were 22 rescues, 10,649 preventions, 116,423 beachgoers, and zero deaths; in 2015 there were 11 rescues, 15,533 preventions, 149,640 beachgoers, and zero deaths; in 2016 there were 28 rescues, 24,936 preventions, 184,823 beachgoers, and zero deaths; in 2017 there were 12 rescues, 21,010 preventions, 208,784 beachgoers, and zero deaths; and in 2018 with our beach and park with limited access after the April floods there were 10 rescues, 5,410 preventions, 50,924 beachgoers, and zero deaths.

Our lifeguards put their lives on the line to protect our keiki, our kupuna, our locals and our visitors. With each prevention and rescue, our lifeguards prevent the heartbreak that parents, children, family and friends are dealt when losing someone to drowning. This bill protects those who protect us. It is a means to return the favor.
