## 1 Fiscal Implications: None

### 2 **Department Testimony:** Strongly support

The purpose of this measure is to permit minors over fifteen years of age to consent to medical care related to the diagnosis or treatment of HIV or the prevention of HIV. Parents or legal guardians would not be able to abrogate consent. The minor would not be liable for the payment.

The department strongly supports this measure as it can help reduce the transmission and 7 acquisition of HIV and support the critical treatment of minors diagnosed with HIV. Safe, 8 effective medications for the treatment and prevention of HIV need to be accessible for all 9 individuals diagnosed with HIV or at high risk of acquiring HIV. This measure would allow 10 minors who cannot or will not seek the consent of their parents or guardians to consent to 11 medication intervention to prevent HIV infection, which does not appear to be covered by 12 existing statute. It is essential to the health of the minor and a valuable step in ending the HIV 13 epidemic in Hawaii. 14

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## **1 Offered Amendments:**

2	The department would like to offer amendments which move the provisions of the measure to
3	Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) Chapter 577A that authorizes minor consent for certain medical
4	care and services, including for the treatment of sexually transmitted infections. HIV is a
5	sexually transmitted infection and fits in this HRS chapter. [A new sub section §577A-5 HIV
6	Services to Minors is added.] For consistency, we recommend amending the definitions of
7	"minor" and "health care provider" in SB2025 so that they are consistent with the usage of those
8	[same as those currently] terms in HRS Chapter 577A. The department also requests to make
9	updates in HRS Chapter 577A terminology from "venereal disease" to "sexually transmitted
10	infection." This bill appears to be an appropriate vehicle for such updates.
11	The department has attached an amended SB2025, which includes its placement in HRS Chapter
12	577A, use of the definitions in this chapter, and replacement of the term "venereal disease" with
13	"sexually transmitted infections."

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1 RELATING TO MEDICAL CARE FOR MINORS.

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3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

4 SECTION 1. Chapter 577A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is5 amended to read as follows:

6 "\$577A-1 Definitions. For the purpose of this chapter,
7 the following terms shall be defined as follows:

8 "Family planning services" includes counseling and medical9 care designed to facilitate family planning.

10 "Medical care and services" means the diagnosis, 11 examination, and administration of medication in the <u>prevention</u> 12 <u>or</u> treatment of [<del>venereal diseases,</del>] <u>sexually transmitted</u> 13 <u>infection</u>, pregnancy, and family planning services. It shall 14 not include surgery or any treatment to induce abortion.

15 "Minor" shall be any person from the age of fourteen to 16 seventeen inclusive.

17 <u>"Sexually transmitted infection" means an infection that is</u>
18 <u>commonly transmitted through sexual contact, including, but not</u>

19 limited to, human immunodeficiency virus infection.

20 §577A-2 Consent valid. The consent to the provision of 21 medical care and services by public and private hospitals or 22 public and private clinics, or the performance of medical care

1 and services by a physician licensed to practice medicine or advanced practice registered nurse as defined in section 2 3 457-2.7, when executed by a female minor who is or professes to be pregnant, or by a minor who is or professes to be [afflicted 4 with a venereal disease, ] infected with, or to have been exposed 5 to, a sexually transmitted infection, or a minor seeking family 6 7 planning services shall be valid and binding as if the minor had achieved his or her majority as the case may be; that is, a 8 female minor who is, or professes to be pregnant, or a minor who 9 10 is, or professes to be [afflicted with a venereal disease,] infected with, or to have been exposed to, a sexually 11 transmitted infection, or a minor seeking family planning 12 services shall be deemed to have, and shall have the same legal 13 capacity to act, and the same legal obligations with regard to 14 15 the giving of such consent to such hospitals and such clinics or medical care and services to be provided by a physician licensed 16 to practice medicine or advanced practice registered nurse as 17 18 defined in section 457-2.7, as a person of full legal age and 19 capacity, the infancy of the minor and any contrary provisions 20 of law notwithstanding, and such consent shall not be subject to later disaffirmance by reason of such minority; and the consent 21 of no other person or persons (including, but not limited to a 22

spouse, parent, custodian, or guardian) shall be necessary in
 order to authorize such hospitals or such clinics or medical
 care and services provided by a physician licensed to practice
 medicine or advanced practice registered nurse as defined in
 section 457-2.7, to such a minor.

**§577A-3 Providing information.** Public and private 6 7 hospitals, or public and private clinics or physicians licensed to practice medicine or advanced practice registered nurses as 8 defined in section 457-2.7 may, at the discretion of the 9 10 treating physician or advanced practice registered nurse, inform 11 the spouse, parent, custodian, or quardian of any minor patient of the provision of medical care and services to the minor or 12 disclose any information pertaining to such care and services 13 after consulting with the minor patient to whom such medical 14 15 care and services have been provided under this chapter.

If the minor patient is not diagnosed as being pregnant or [afflicted with [a] venereal disease,] having a sexually transmitted infection, such information as well as the application for diagnosis may be disclosed, at the discretion of the treating physician or advanced practice registered nurse after consulting with the minor patient.

1 **§577A-4** Financial responsibility; counseling. (a) If a minor consents to receive medical care and services, the spouse, 2 3 parent, custodian, or guardian of the minor patient shall not be liable for the legal obligations resulting from the furnishing 4 of medical care and services provided by the public and private 5 hospital, public and private clinic or physician licensed to 6 7 practice medicine, or advanced practice registered nurse as defined in section 457-2.7. A minor who consents to the 8 provision of medical care and services under this section shall 9 10 assume financial responsibility for the costs of such medical 11 care and services [-]; provided that if a minor consents to 12 receive medical care and services related to HIV pursuant to this section, the minor shall not be liable for payment. Any 13 other law to the contrary notwithstanding, no spouse, parent, 14 15 custodian, or guardian whose consent has not been obtained or who has no prior knowledge that the minor has consented to the 16 provision of such medical care and services shall be liable for 17 the costs incurred by virtue of the minor's consent. 18

19 (b) Medical care and services shall include individual
20 counseling for each minor patient by a physician licensed to
21 practice medicine or advanced practice registered nurse as

defined in section 457-2.7. Such counseling shall seek to open
 the lines of communication between parent and child.

3 §577A-5 Limitation of actions. Notwithstanding any other
4 law to the contrary, an action to recover any debt founded upon
5 any contract, obligation, or liability made pursuant to this
6 chapter shall not commence until a minor has reached the age of
7 majority, provided that said action shall commence within two
8 years of the date a minor reaches the age of majority."

9 SECTION 2. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed10 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

11 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

## Strong Support for SB 2025

Dear Senator Rosalyn H. Baker, Chair and Senator Russell E. Ruderman Chair and members of the committees

The Hawaii Health & Harm Reduction Center (HHHRC) strongly supports SB 2025 which will increase access to HIV medical care for minors. HIV prevention and care have transformed over the past decade and it is essential that young people also have access to these emerging medical interventions so that they can either prevent acquiring HIV or if they are living with it, get the care they need to live well and not transmit the virus to others.

HHHRC's mission is to *reduce harm, promote health, create wellness and fight stigma in Hawaii and the Pacific.* We focus our efforts on those disproportionately affected by social determinants of health, including but not limited to: people living with and/or affected by HIV, hepatitis, substance use, and the transgender, LGBQ and the Native Hawaiian communities. We foster health, wellness, and systemic change in Hawai'i and the Pacific through care services, advocacy, training, prevention, education, and capacity building. HHHRC's roots are working with people living with and at-risk for HIV and has been at the forefront of "Hawaii to Zero". Hawaii to Zero is a coalition of members who are committed to getting to zero new HIV infections, zero HIV-related deaths and zero stigma. This bill, SB 2025 addresses all three components. Specifically, HHHRC launched Hawaii's first PrEP program which provides HIV antiviral to HIV negative people to prevent infection. HHHRC has had to turn away several young people who did not have parental consent for this important drug.

## Comments:

I have humbly and proudly worked in the LGBT community for more than two years. I am a nurse practitioner and have personally seen gay, bisexual, and transgender youth in situations where they are at high risk for HIV infection through unprotected sex. I believe this is due, in part, to fear of parental reactions and treatment.

Evidence-based medical intervention demonstrates that effectively prevents HIV transmission and builds rapport with primary care provider around other sexual health issues. The intent of this bill is not to disrupt meaningful and supportive parental and family realtionships, but rather to provide opportuntiies for youth facing stigma and discrimination when seeking heatth care. This bill is critical to ensuring that at-risk youth identifying as sexual or gender minorities in Hawaii can attain access to life-saving prevention services without fear or other barriers to care.

I am writing in my personal capacity to **strongly support** SB 2025, which would allow minors to consent for HIV care and prevention services, including access to pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP), without parental consent. Authorizing adolescent access to PrEP will help prevent HIV infection among those who use it, particularly among those who are sexual and gender minorities.

It's an astonishingly dangerous posture of stubborn foolhardiness that Hawaii public schools do not offer comprehensive science-based sexual health education at regular intervals from at least grades 7 through 12. Even with information broadly available on the internet, professional person-to-person instruction from qualified presenters is vital in lowering unwanted pregnancy rates and sexually transmitted infections (STI's).

Hawaii's disproportionately high rates of STI's among youth can be addressed by an embrace of science-based education and additional prevention measures, including the free on-demand distribution of condoms and lube by a school's health office.
