Honorable Chair Nishihara, Vice Chair Wakai, and Members of the Committee:

The State Fire Council (SFC) and the Kaua'i Fire Department (KFD) **support** SB 2129. This bill will authorize the SFC to utilize the Reduced Ignition Propensity Cigarette (RIPC) program special fund dollars to pay for key statewide programs and activities that support the primary mission of the SFC. It will also authorize the SFC to employ additional staff personnel to implement and coordinate those programs.

The SFC was established by the Hawaii State Legislature in 1979 to replace the State Fire Marshal's office. It is comprised of the four county Fire Chiefs and is administratively attached to the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations (DLIR).

In accordance with Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS) §132, the SFC's primary mission is to develop and support a comprehensive fire service emergency management network for the protection of life, property, and the environment for the State. Through the collaborative and unified efforts of each county fire chief, the SFC promotes the standardization of fire service reporting, training, sharing of technology, resources, and best management practices. The SFC may advise and assist the county fire departments where appropriate; prescribe standard procedures and forms related to inspections, investigations, and reporting of fires; and advise the Governor and State Legislature on issues relating to fire prevention and protection, and life safety.

The SFC is responsible for reviewing national fire code and adopting them into Hawai'i's state fire code. The SFC is responsible for administering federal fire-related grants, managing the RIPC program, and coordinating statewide fire training, education and data collection. It also oversees a statewide program for testing and certifying individuals who perform maintenance and testing of portable fire extinguishers, fire protection systems, and fire alarm systems.

Between 1979 and 2001, the SFC relied entirely on county funding and personnel to accomplish its mission. In 2001, the Governor directed the DLIR to allocate \$35,000 to fund the SFC's first part-time employee. In 2011, the legislature appropriated an additional \$71,000 for the SFC to hire two additional employees.

On July 6, 2008 during the twenty-fourth Hawai'i State Legislature Regular Session, Act 218 was passed and Hawai'i became the 36th state requiring that only reduced ignition propensity cigarettes be sold in Hawai'i. This law took effect on September 30, 2009. More than 700 brand/style cigarettes were certified by the SFC as being RIPC compliant. A \$375 fee was also attached for each brand/style cigarette that was certified for sale in our state. Almost \$660,000 in RIPC certification fees were collected before a RIPC Program specialist was hired on January 16, 2014.

Since then, a plan has been formulated and instituted to properly administer Hawai'i's RIPC Law. Besides paying for the RIPC program specialist's salary, money from the RIPC Special Fund has been used to defray office expenses, field inspections, and random independent testing by certified laboratories.
