Subject: Senate Bill (SB) 2130, Senate Draft (SD) 1 Relating to the State Fire Code

I am Manuel P. Neves, Chair of the Hawaii State (State) Fire Council (SFC) and Fire Chief of the Honolulu Fire Department (HFD). The SFC and the HFD support SB 2130, SD 1, which proposes to amend the adoption process of the state fire code to conform to other State building codes.

One of the SFC's responsibilities is to adopt the state fire code, which is required to comply with the requirements of Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), Chapters 91 and 92. Chapter 91 requires navigating through the numerous steps in the administrative rules process, including public hearings that cost approximately \$2,000 to post notices in the five different Hawaii news publications. Chapter 92 requires that meetings and discussions on the state fire code comply with Sunshine Law requirements in an open public forum.

HRS §107-24 (c) requires State building codes, which include building, residential, plumbing, energy, and electrical codes, be adopted, amended, and updated from the National Codes and Standards "pursuant to chapter 92, and exempt from the requirements of chapter 91."

Since the state fire code is one of the State building codes, the SFC suggests the following statutorily uniform revision:

§132-3 Adoption of state fire code. The state fire council [shall, after public hearings pursuant to chapter 91], pursuant to chapter 92, and exempt from the requirements of chapter 91, shall adopt a state fire code setting forth minimum requirements relative to the protection of persons and property from fire loss including without limitation:

(1) [the] The storage, handling and use of hazardous substances, materials and devices; and

(2) [the] The control of conditions hazardous to life or property in the design, use or occupancy of buildings and premises.

The SFC believes adequate comment opportunities can be provided without public hearings through the following methods:

- 1. Conduct public meetings in an open forum under HRS Chapter 92.
- 2. Publicly post the state fire code Investigative Committee meetings that initially review and amend the national fire code.
- Notify state fire code stakeholders during the review and adoption process.

The SFC and the HFD urge your committee's support on the passage of SB 2130, SD 1 with the recommended revision.

I am David C. Thyne, member of the Hawaii State Fire Council (SFC) and Fire Chief of the Maui Fire Department (MFD). The SFC and the MFD support SB 2130, SD 1, which proposes to amend the adoption process of the state fire code to conform to other State building codes.

One of the SFC's responsibilities is to adopt the state fire code, which is required to comply with the requirements of Hawaii Revised Statues (HRS), Chapter 91 and 92. Chapter 91 requires public hearings that cost approximately \$2,000 to post public notices in five different Hawaii news publications. The administrative rules process in cumbersome and time-consuming in addition to the time and effort it takes to review and amend the national fire code. Chapter 92 requires that meetings and discussions on the state fire code is one of the State building codes, it must also be approved by the State Building Code Council (SBCC) after being approved by the SFC. Other State building codes, which include residential, plumbing, energy, and electrical codes are adopted by the SBCC under Chapter 92 without public hearings or the administrative rules process.

Chair Takumi, Vice Chair Ichiyama, and members of the committee:

My name is Dwight Mitsunaga, 2020 President of the Building Industry Association of Hawaii (BIA-Hawaii). Chartered in 1955, the Building Industry Association of Hawaii is a professional trade organization affiliated with the National Association of Home Builders, representing the building industry and its associates. BIA-Hawaii takes a leadership role in unifying and promoting the interests of the industry to enhance the quality of life for the people of Hawaii. Our members build the communities we all call home.

<u>BIA-Hawaii is strongly opposed to SB 2130 SD1</u>, which proposes to amend the process for adoption of the state fire code.

The purpose of the bill is to repeal the requirement for the state fire code to be adopted after public hearings pursuant to chapter 91, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and instead require the state fire code to be adopted pursuant to chapter 92, Hawaii Revised Statutes, which is more of an governmental administrative process, thus does not require public input.

At a time when there is a need for more government transparency, we question why the adoption of the fire code should not involve a public hearing. Government mandates such as these add to the cost of housing, which in Hawaii is already unaffordable for many local families.

We are finding more and more mandates which impact housing affordability hidden in various codes that are being adopted at the national level with very little, if any, public input. Agencies and manufacturers who benefit from the new codes have been actively involved at the national level. Once the new codes are adopted at the national level, the state and/or county could amend the code prior to adoption at the local level. The state review is conducted by the State Building Code Council, made up of a majority of government interests. The only real public opportunity to comment is at the county level where the respective County Council must adopt the new code.

We would caution against disallowing a full public vetting of the State Fire Code prior to adoption as some of the elements in the code, such as mandating the installation of fire sprinklers in all new one and two family dwellings, will have a significant impact on future home prices.

We are strongly opposed to SB 2130 SD1, and appreciate the opportunity to express our views on this matter.
