Chair Kidani, Vice Chair Kim, and members of the Committee:

The State Public Charter School Commission ("Commission") appreciates the opportunity to submit this testimony providing **COMMENTS on SB 2254**, which extends the enrollment exemption for University Laboratory School (ULS) from July 1, 2020 to July 1, 2022.

While the Commission recognizes the school's service and dedication to its students, there are concerns regarding the school's enrollment policy and procedures. First, it is unclear, through any published research, that ULS' enrollment exemption has increased student outcomes or added any value to the school's education system. Second, it is unclear how the selection of students allowed by the enrollment exemption aligns with requirements pertaining to equity in access to quality public education.

The Commission is available to provide any needed assistance to the committee and other interested stakeholders as this legislation moves forward.

The Governing Board of the University Laboratory School (ULS) **STRONGLY SUPPORTS SB2254**, which will allow ULS to continue to conform its student enrollment profile to meet the research needs of the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa College of Education.

ULS is a unique state charter school with two interlocking missions: to design and deliver the best possible education to our own students, and to serve the educational research and development community as a seedbed of curriculum research and development. With our purposive enrollment, heterogeneous classes, emphasis on innovation and research, and provision of ongoing professional development for educators, our school serves as an experimental site for teaching, learning, and assessment in grades K–12.

Currently, ULS utilizes a weighted admissions lottery and process to create a student body reflecting the ethnic distribution of Hawai'i and that is inclusive of students across a range of academic achievement and family socioeconomic levels. This admissions system allows our school to maintain a student body that is representative of students statewide, which is needed by the College of Education in its research and testing of curriculum and assessments being developed for use in Hawai'i's schools. Through the flexibility afforded under an enrollment provision in the state charter school law, ULS has continued its long-standing collaborative relationship with the College of Education, which has in turn contributed to the development of educational materials that have been successfully implemented across the State of Hawai'i school system and beyond.

The underlying statutory basis for ULS's unique curriculum testing environment is set to be automatically repealed on July 1, 2020. Without this statutory provision for ULS enrollment found in HRS 302D-34(d), ULS would be forced to shift to a basic enrollment lottery and would be severely limited in its ability to adjust enrollment in order to maintain the student demographics necessary under the College of Education's research standards.

Therefore, ULS strongly supports the repeal or extension of the sunset date for its enrollment provision under the state charter school law. We believe our current admissions system, as authorized by HRS 302D-34(d), affords ULS the best chance to meet our school's missions and fulfill our unique role as a Hawai'i charter school, which in turn benefits the state's education system overall.
