Chair Takumi and Members of the Committee:

My name is Charlene Tamanaha, and I am the Licensing Administrator of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs' (Department) Professional and Vocational Licensing Division. The Department appreciates the intent of and offers comments on this bill.

The purposes of this bill are to: (1) make permanent the regulation of behavior analysts; and (2) exempt the Behavior Analysts Licensing Program from the auditor evaluation requirement.

The Department appreciates the bill's intent to continue providing for the licensure of behavior analysts to protect the public from the unqualified practice of behavior analysis and from unprofessional conduct by behavior analysts.

Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) section 26H-4 requires that for professional and vocational regulatory programs enacted after January 1, 1994, an auditor shall perform

an evaluation of the program, pursuant to section 26H-5, prior to its repeal date. While the Department does not oppose removing the repeal date, the Department respectfully requests that the State Auditor be afforded sufficient time to conduct a sunset analysis on behavior analysts, consistent with the requirements of HRS 26H-5, prior to the law's repeal date of June 30, 2021. In an analogous situation, the Legislative Auditor issued a sunset analysis of athletic trainers in September 2017, and the Athletic Trainer law was made permanent in the subsequent session (Act 58, Session Laws of Hawaii 2018).



Chair Takumi and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii State Teachers Association <u>supports SB 2281, SD1, HD1</u>, relating to behavior analysis. This bill makes permanent the regulation of behavior analysts.

Our teachers sometimes need the support of other professionals who support our students with other areas of expertise; this area is one of them, and these Licensed Behavior Analysts (LBAs) and School Psychologists are essential for our students to access their learning as they have the licensing qualification required by Medicaid for their services to be reimbursable to the state. This is vital and we want to state again, that these license standards should not be watered down. We are extremely supportive that this law requires health plans to cover these services and these services should remain regulated and licensed accordingly. This law should be made permanent.

The practice of behavior analysis includes the empirical identification of functional relations between behavior and environmental factors, known as functional assessment and analysis, as well as the use of contextual factors, motivating operations, antecedent stimuli, positive reinforcement, and other consequences to help people develop positive behaviors.

Act 199, Session Laws of Hawaii 2015, established the behavior analyst program within the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs and created licensing requirements for behavior analysts. Licensing of behavior analysis services was made concurrent with mandated insurance coverage for diagnosis and treatment related to autism disorders. Act 205 further clarified the licensing qualifications for those who conduct Functional Behavior Assessments (FBAs), and design and monitor Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) Plans in our state.

To support access to learning experiences of our most vulnerable keiki, the Hawaii State Teachers Association asks your committee to **support** this bill.

Aloha Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee:

As a licensed special education teacher and a licensed behavior analyst in our State, I am writing today in STRONG SUPPORT OF SB2281, which seeks to make licensure for behavior analysts permanent in our State.

The law, as it stands, has served as a vehicle for increasing protections for consumers of behavior analysis. Hundreds of individuals (413) are now proudly licensed as behavior analysts (DCCA; 6/22/2020) in Hawai'i, which has allowed thousands of individuals to access much needed medical care in the form of applied behavior analysis (https://pvl.ehawaii.gov/pvlsearch/license/BA-413).

At ABC Group Hawai'i, we serve approximately 50 children on Oahu providing a clinic-based ABA treatment center for insurance funded as well as DOE funded clients to receive life-changing medically-rigorous ABA treatment. This life-changing treatment has been a game-changer for many families who are tasked with raising a child with a disability, let alone one with severe and challenging behavior. It allows them to access intensive medically-rigorous treatment, to change the trajectory for what is even possible in their journey towards independence and adulthood.

In my opinion, no substantive changes are needed to the existing language in our licensure law [Chapter 465D]. However, I do believe another date should be removed. I encourage the current committee to consider removing the expiration date for teachers (July 1, 2019), which is believed to unintentionally restrict teachers' ability to implement behavior analysis in direct collaboration with a licensed behavior analyst or licensed psychologist, with ABA in their education, training, and competence (Chapter 465D, Section 7, Exemption 2).

"(2) A licensed classroom teacher or an individual who is working as a classroom teacher and is enrolled in a teacher preparation program working towards licensure who implements but does not design applied behavior analysis services in a school setting in

direct collaboration with a licensed behavior analyst or a licensed psychologist [REMOVE] on or before July 1, 2019".

Honorable Chair Takumi, Vice Chair Ichiyama, and members of the committee:

The Hawai'i Association for Behavior Analysis (HABA) **strongly supports** SB 2281, SD1 HD1, which makes permanent the regulation of behavior analysts under chapter 465D of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes.

Since the enactment of the behavior analyst licensure law in 2015, which was passed together with the autism insurance coverage law, licensed behavior analysts have helped many individuals with autism receive the services they need. The number of licensed behavior analysts in the State has steadily grown since the enactment of the law, and continues to grow to meet the need for these services.

We also note that this is a bill which solely addresses the expiration of a sunset date – HABA is opposed to watering down the existing licensure law by adding any exemptions to licensing requirements, as has been suggested by other testifiers in previous hearings.

We would respectfully request that this measure be amended to include an "upon approval" effective date.
