Chairpersons Dela Cruz and Rhoads and Members of the Committees:

My name is James Nakatani, Executive Director of the Agribusiness Development Corporation ("ADC"). The ADC supports Senate Bill No. 2282 SD1, which establishes the agricultural theft enforcement program and agricultural theft enforcement special fund within the Department of Agriculture and authorizes the Board of Agriculture and agricultural theft enforcement officers to exercise police powers. The bill extends to the agricultural theft enforcement program the applicability of certain statutory provisions relating to the law enforcement officer independent review board; possession of electric guns; the law enforcement standards board; emergency vehicles; and worker's compensation for volunteer emergency response personnel, authorizes the use of funds in the agricultural development and food security special fund for protection of agricultural resources, and appropriates funds. ADC strongly supports the bill.

Agriculture theft and other crimes occurring on agricultural lands has become commonplace with the criminals operating without regard to law enforcement. This bill will provide the manpower and statutory framework for investigation and enforcement

that will deter the criminal activity and will instill confidence in the community that their safety concerns are being addressed.

The Department of Budget and Finance offers comments on Senate Bill (S.B.)
No. 2282, S.D. 1.

S.B. No. 2282, S.D. 1: 1) requires the Board of Agriculture (Board) to establish the Agricultural Enforcement Program (AEP) within the Department of Agriculture (DOA); 2) authorizes the Board to appoint or employ agricultural theft enforcement officers within AEP; 3) establishes duties, authority, and standards for officers; 4) establishes the Agricultural Enforcement Special Fund (AESF) under the administration of DOA; 5) amends Section 141-10, HRS, to expand the scope of the Agricultural Development and Food Security Special Fund (ADFSSF) to protect agricultural resources; 6) appropriates an unspecified sum from the ADFSSF for deposit into the AESF for FY 21; and 7) appropriates an unspecified sum from the AESF for FY 21 for operating expenditures and the establishment of one full-time Chief Enforcement Officer position and two full-time Enforcement Officer positions, one each for the islands of Hawai'i and O'ahu.

As a matter of general policy, the department does not support the creation of any special fund which does not meet the requirements of Section 37-52.3, HRS.

Special funds should: 1) serve a need as demonstrated by the purpose, scope of work and an explanation why the program cannot be implemented successfully under the general fund appropriation process; 2) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries or a clear link between the program and the sources of revenue; 3) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 4) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining.

Regarding S.B. No. 2282, S.D. 1, it is difficult to determine whether the proposed special fund would be self-sustaining.

The department defers to DOA regarding program implementation and funding.

RE: SB 2282, SD1 Relating to Agriculture

SB 2282, SD1 does not have a preamble, but its contents reflect the vulnerabilities agriculture has to theft and vandalism. Our news media has documented farmers who have gone out of business because of their losses, and the problem seems to get worse year by year.

The Hawai'i County Prosecuting Attorney's office has had an investigator working on agricultural crimes, and we have received positive comments from the agriculture community about their work. We therefore believe that a statewide program is warranted, based on the results achieved on the Big Island. As to whether a new program needs to be established within the Department of Agriculture, I defer to the wisdom of this Committee. Especially if the DOA does not welcome having such a new program, a more efficient and effective approach could be for the Department of Agriculture to contract with County prosecutors, or for this Legislature to fund county prosecutors directly.

Whatever your decision, we support the idea of a statewide, state-funded, anti-theft program, and urge favorable consideration of SB 2282, SD1.

The Department appreciates the bill's overall goal of strengthening Hawaii's enforcement of laws that are already in place to protect our agricultural community, and welcomes the opportunity to work with a dedicated unit of duly qualified and specialized enforcement officers. That said, given that the changes proposed in S.B. 2282, S.D. 1, will likely lead to a significant increase in the number of cases that need to be screened, conferred and prosecuted, the Department respectfully requests two dedicated positions—one deputy prosecuting attorney and one investigator—which could be adjusted once we have had a chance to assess the actual impacts. The Department is very concerned about the prospect of having an influx of cases being brought to us, without having sufficient manpower to prosecute them in an effective and timely manner.

For all of the foregoing reasons, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu <u>supports</u> the passage of S.B. 2282, S.D. 1.

Chairs Dela Cruz and Rhoads, Vice Chairs Keith-Agaran and Keohokalole and Members of the Senate WAM/JDC Committee:

I am Larry Jefts, owner and operator of Larry Jefts Farms, LLC, which is part of our family-run business of farms on Oahu and Molokai, under the administrative umbrella of Sugarland Growers, Inc. We have more than 35 years of Hawaii farm experience on Molokai and Oahu. I am a volunteer director for the West Oahu Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD).

Agriculture theft has been a long-discussed problem for Hawaii's farmers and the solutions are difficult to implement. Farmers and ranchers often cannot install surveillance equipment or pay for 24/7 security. This leaves agricultural production very vulnerable to persons who steal, and re-sell stolen goods despite laws that require a bill of lading by the purchaser. It's like harvested produce falling off the back of the truck on the way to market or on the way to doubling Hawaii's food production.

Changing the name of the program to Agricultural Enforcement Program and authorizing the Board of Agriculture to determine other enforcement issues besides theft is strongly supported. In addition to ag theft, other criminal activities against farmers and ranchers include trespassing, property crimes such as vandalism and damage to equipment, even releasing or slaughtering of livestock.

The proposed agricultural enforcement program establishes 1 full time Chief Enforcement Officer and 2 full time Enforcement Officers, one for Hawaii Island and the other for Oahu. It's not enough but it is a good start. Dedicated enforcement officers will help in curtailing this crime against farmers and ranchers.

Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawaii Farm Bureau supports HB 2282, SD1, which establishes the agricultural enforcement program and agricultural enforcement special fund within the Department of Agriculture and authorizes the Board of Agriculture and agricultural enforcement officers to exercise police powers.

Agricultural crime is persistent problems facing agriculture. Weather, drought, pests, weeds, disease, unstable markets, transportation, labor issues, and a changing climate all contribute to uncertainty for farmers and ranchers. Few businesses face such challenges, yet we are charged with producing food, fiber, fuel and flowers for the 99% of non-farmers. Add in the constant threat and impacts of trespass, theft, and vandalism, and it's a wonder farms and ranches remain viable.

Sadly, agricultural crime is a growing trend in Hawaii. Farmers and ranchers are often victims of those who are looking for easy targets. Despite our efforts to install cameras, form community ag watch groups, and patrol our farms, these criminals know that being caught and prosecuted is unlikely.

In recent years, not only have crops and livestock been stolen, but also tractors, trucks, farm equipment, and tools. We support all efforts to curb this attack on our viability. In most cases, we bear the cost of these crimes since we cannot pass these costs on to the consumer in the form of higher prices.

Dear Chair Dela Cruz, Chair Rhoads, and Members of the Committees:

My name is Amy Hennessey, and I am the Senior Vice President of Communications & External Affairs at Ulupono Initiative. We are a Hawai'i-based impact investment firm that strives to improve our community's quality of life by creating more locally produced food; increasing affordable clean renewable energy and transportation options; and better managing waste and fresh water resources.

Ulupono supports SB 2282 SD 1, which establishes the agricultural enforcement program and agricultural enforcement special fund within the Department of Agriculture.

In our conversations with farmers and ranchers, one issue that keeps coming up is agricultural theft and how there is little enforcement and punishment for offenders. Agricultural lots are a prime target for thieves as there are many open entry points, farms are often located in rural and isolated areas, and punishments are minor relative to other crimes. For farmers that can afford to, precious money has to be spent on security infrastructure, monitoring, and manpower to defend their agricultural operations vs. producing food. This leads to higher production costs, which result in increased prices for local food at the market when consumers are already price sensitive. We believe this will further hurt local food sales. Profit margins for agricultural operations are already tight and, if a business loses revenue from theft or vandalism and has to invest heavily in security, this could push more local farmers and ranchers out of the agricultural sector. Ultimately, this underrated issue is one that hurts our ability to increase locally grown food in our state.

As Hawai'i's local food issues become increasingly complex and challenging, organizations need additional resources and support to address and overcome them. We appreciate this committee's efforts to look at policies that support local food production.

We believe that through collaboration, we can help produce more local food and support an economically robust homegrown agriculture industry, which strengthens our community with fresh, healthy food.

<u>LURF's Position</u>. LURF fully supports the intent of SB 2282, SD1, which is to protect farmers and other individuals who have been the victims of agricultural theft and vandalism for years and have reportedly suffered losses totaling millions of dollars. LURF understands that it is reportedly difficult for law enforcement agencies to enforce the agricultural theft, vandalism and other laws currently in effect, and that farmers have, in the past, made efforts to work with the police in attempts toward more effective enforcement efforts, but that such undertakings have proved unsuccessful.

The proposed program and funding will assist in, amongst other things, prosecuting perpetrators of, and preventing agricultural theft and vandalism; and identifying areas where agricultural theft and vandalism are most prevalent. The bill confirms the need for collaboration amongst diverse sectors of the community - business, government, and agricultural stakeholders - and the importance for them to work together cooperatively to prevent agricultural crimes and improve the overall economic viability of the State's agricultural industry.

LURF therefore **supports the intent of SB 2282, SD1** as an effort to promote the importance of the issues relating to the enforcement of agricultural theft and vandalism laws. LURF further respectfully requests that the proposed Program allow the opportunity for continued input by all stakeholders, including, but not limited to farmers and ranchers, government and law enforcement agencies, and legal experts in order that all interested parties may contribute to this and any further statewide program that may be developed as a result.
