Chair Nishihara and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General (Department) supports this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to extend the deadline for the county police departments to adopt and utilize an electronic tracking system for sexual assault evidence collection kits.

Act 113, Session Laws of Hawaii 2018, required each county police department to establish an electronic tracking system for sexual assault evidence collection kits no later than January 1, 2020. The tracking system is intended to ensure that the kits are properly accounted for and that the victims have the ability to follow up on the testing of their kits. The county police departments, in coordination with the Hawaii Sexual Assault Kit Initiative, have been working with the Portland police department to implement the sexual assault management system (SAMS), a tracking system developed by the Portland police department. But due to various operational and technical issues, the police departments were unable to implement SAMS by January 1, 2020. Because of the difficulties in implementation of SAMS, the police departments are now working with the department of the attorney general and the Portland police department to utilize SAMS-Track, a simplified version of SAMS that may not have the same implementation issues, and may be established as a statewide system, rather

than four independent county systems. An extension of the January 1, 2020, deadline is necessary for this purpose.

The Department respectfully requests that this measure be passed.

Dear Chair Nishihara, Vice Chair Wakai, and Honorable Members,

The Hawai'i State Commission on the Status of Women supports SB2315, which extends the deadline for each county police department to adopt and utilize an electronic tracking system for sexual assault evidence collection kits.

One in every six women in the United States will be the victim of a rape or an attempted rape in her lifetime. Only a small percentage of these women will report their assault, and an even smaller percentage of the assaults reported will produce a sexual assault kit ("rape kit), A rape kit is a package of items gathered painstakingly from an invasive examination of a victim's body following a reported sexual assault. This thorough and grueling process can last on average between four to six hours. A rape kit is often crucial to establishing the identify of a perpetrator or corroborating the victim's account. The Commission applauds efforts to implement a tracking system to inform victims of their rights and to end the rape kit backlog.

Accordingly, the Commission asks the Committee to pass SB2315.

Honorable Chair Nishihara, Honorable Vice Chair Wakai and Members of the Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, and Military Affairs. The Office of the Prosecuting Attorney, County of Hawai'i submits the following testimony in SUPPORT of Senate Bill No.2315.

This measure extends the deadline for each county police department to adopt and utilize an electronic tracking system for sexual assault evidence collection kits.

The Hawai'i Police Department moved expeditiously to implement a sexual assault kit management system, adopting a recommendation by Hawai'i Sexual Assault Response Training (HSART) multi-disciplinary group that county police departments install a sexual assault management system (SAMS) developed by the Portland Police Department.

SAMS was shared across the country utilizing federal grant funding through Sexual Assault Kit Initiative (SAKI). This system was designed to interface with police department records management system (RMS). After installation, we encountered numerous problems, primarily the loss of data.

Portland Police Department has since developed an improved and simpler product "SAMS Track" which does not require interface with the police department's RMS. Its success in Portland since May 2019, has led to its adoption statewide in Oregon by the end of July 2020.

Like SAMS, the technology is available to us at minimal cost due to federal funding through SAKI. In addition to tracking sexual assault cases, SAMS Track is easy to use through a mobile app and has the added feature of a victim portal which will enable people to track their kits anonymously to determine if the evidence was submitted for testing.

The Office of the Prosecuting Attorney, County of Hawai'i SUPPORTS the passage of Senate Bill No. 2315. Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this matter.

To ensure that victims remain informed of the status of their sexual assault evidence collection kit, law enforcement members of this group have been working to establish an electronic tracking system. As a member of HSART, the SATC has witnessed much effort put forth by each county police department to achieve this goal. However, unexpected operational and technical challenges have presented, and there is a need for an extension of the system's implementation date.

It is strongly hoped that the House Judiciary Committee will pass S.B. 2315. With this needed extension, victims of sexual assault will soon be able to utilize the tracking system and will be empowered to access needed information on their own.
