Please accept this testimony on behalf of the West Hawaii Humane Society in strong support of SB239.

SB239 would prohibit manufactures and contract testing facilities in the state from using animal testing methods for the testing of cosmetics or household products WHEN a scientifically valid alternative to the animal test is available. Medical research is exempted from the requirement. Fortunately Hawaii, and specifically the University of Hawaii, do not currently perform testing on animals for cosmetics or household products.

In the past 35 years, due to innovations in science, animal tests for cosmetics and household products and other chemicals are increasingly being replaced with alternatives that are cheaper, faster and can better predict human response.

This bill is need as unfortunately, there is no US law that requires that available non-animal tests be used in favor animal tests. In contrast, the European Union has required that available scientifically satisfactory non-animal tests be used instead of animal tests since 1986. Hawaii would join California, New York, New Jersey and Virginia in ensuring that animals are not harmed in outdated cosmetic and chemical product tests when accepted modern alternatives are available.

Dear Committee members,

On behalf of Cruelty Free International, a leading organization working to promote the use of modern non-animal testing methods around the world, I write in support of SB 239. This bill will provide clear state guidance to any manufactures or contract testing facilities in the state now or in the future that modern non-animal tests are to be given priority thus ensuring that animals are not harmed in outdated tests in Hawaii for cosmetics or household products.

Historically, animals have been used in painful tests to assess the safety of certain chemicals used in products cosmetics and household cleaners. However, in the past 35 years, due to innovations in science, animal tests are increasingly being replaced with non-animal approaches that use engineered three-dimensional human skin tissues or other types of cells and sophisticated computer models.

Modern approaches that are cheaper, faster and better able to predict human reactions are now are widely available. Internationally, the in-vitro toxicology testing market is expected to reach \$8.74 billion (USD) by 2022 – up from an estimated \$6.34 billion (USD) in 2017 with the US expected to hold the largest share.

Modern alternatives are required to go through a rigorous process to demonstrate that they are as or more effective than the animal tests they replace. SB 239 requires the use of alternatives that have been approved for use by regulatory agencies or validated for use by bodies such as the U.S. Inter-Agency Coordinating Committee for the Validation of Alternative Methods (ICCVAM), or the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) which publishes international test guidelines relevant for safety testing of chemicals. This published list of accepted alternatives makes is simple for manufactures and contract testing facilities to determine whether an accepted alternative to an animal test is available. The availability of this list also provides a resource for the enforcement of the law.

Unfortunately, there is no US law that requires that available non-animal tests be used in favor animal tests. In contrast, European Union has required that available scientifically satisfactory non-animal tests be used ahead of animal tests since 1986.

Inaction at the federal level compels states like Hawaii to lead the way in ensuring that animals are not needlessly harmed in outdated tests. Four other states, CA, NY, NJ an VA have enacted similar laws.

By setting forth a clear regulatory mandate to implement modern non-animal methods whenever they are available SB 239 can prevent animal suffering and ensure that the best available scientific tests are utilized in Hawaii now and in the future.

# **Testimony in Support of Bill SB 239**

Senate Committees on Agriculture and Environment/Commerce, Consumer Protection and Health February 5, 2019

To the Honorable Mike Gabbard and Rosalyn Baker, Chairs,

And members of the combined Committees:

On behalf of the National Anti-Vivisection Society and our supporters in Hawaii, **I** would like to state our strong support for SB 239, legislation that would end the use of live animals for chemical safety testing when a non-animal alternative is available.

The Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act does not *require* manufacturers of cosmetics, personal care and other household products to test their products and ingredients on animals for safety. In fact, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), which administers the Act, actually encourages the use of testing techniques that do not use whole living animals.

While some progress has been made at the federal level with regard to fostering the development of alternatives to animal testing, especially through the Interagency Coordinating Committee on the Validation of Alternative Methods (ICCVAM), the U.S. Congress has failed to act to require manufacturers to end the use of animals where alternatives already exist to establish reliable safety standards. We applaud the Hawaii legislature for taking up this issue and joining other states to move forward on this matter.

NAVS' opposition to the use of animals in cosmetics testing is based on credible scientific evidence that animal testing can produce invalid, misleading results that can ultimately be harmful to people. Animals are used in scientific experimentation based on a presumption that similarities between animals and humans enable data from animal models to be extrapolated to humans. However, the differences between other species and humans make translating data from animals to people problematic, as different species can respond to the same chemicals in different ways. Therefore, overreliance on animal models is actually counterproductive; it often sidetracks meaningful scientific progress while wasting millions of taxpayer dollars and other resources.

Innovative, animal-free alternative cosmetics testing methods, including human cell-based tests and sophisticated computer models, are available and offer advantages over traditional animal tests. Animal-free alternatives offer significant cost savings benefits over animal models, are able to generate data more quickly and are better able to predict how these products will affect people.

NAVS' opposition to the use of animals in cosmetics testing is also based on compelling ethical arguments against animal testing, as these tests are cruel and unnecessary and can cause high levels of animal suffering.

We commend the sponsors of this legislation and urge members of both committees to follow the example of California, New Jersey, New York and Virginia, as well as the entire European Union and countless other countries around the world, in ending the unnecessary cruelty of using animals for chemical safety testing.

My name is Heather Carpenter. I am the Western Regional Director for The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) and I appreciate the opportunity to submit this written testimony on behalf of our Hawaii members and supporters urging the committee to pass SB 239, which requires the use, where available, of methods that avoid or reduce the use of animals for testing of cosmetics and household products.

HSUS strongly supports both animal protection and public health. We have active programs to promote what are known as the three R's: to *reduce* the number of animals used for research purposes; *refine* research so it causes less suffering; and ultimately *replace* animals with non-animal methods that are faster, less expensive and more relevant to human health than animal studies.<sup>1</sup>

Technologies will continue to improve while animal tests will always have massive constraints. By minimizing animal testing and focusing on the use of faster, cost effective, and more reliable testing methods, companies can save lives, time and money. 21st century science is rapidly moving away from outdated animal tests. Many effective alternatives to animal testing exist including 3-D printing, construction of artificial human tissue, and the generation of sophisticated computer programs that can make accurate predictions about chemical safety. With more and better data comes the promise of improved risk-based chemical assessments and more predictive information on safety. This view is supported by the head of NIH,<sup>2</sup> the leaders at EPA<sup>3</sup> and by a panel of scientists convened by the National Academy of Sciences to design a better chemical assessment program that resulted in the now seminal report: *Toxicity Testing for the 21*<sup>st</sup> *Century: a vision and a strategy.*<sup>4</sup> This report calls for the development of human-based cell and tissue assays instead of whole-animal tests for hazard assessment and regulatory decision-making.

The HSUS is a member organization of the Coalition for Consumer Information on Cosmetics, which administers the

Leaping Bunny Program. Cosmetics and household product companies certified through the Leaping Bunny Program must verify that none of their finished products, formulations, or ingredients have been subjected to new animal testing. More than 1,000 companies in North America have obtained Leaping Bunny approval by either using ingredients with a history of safe use or testing new ingredients with non-animal alternative test methods. These companies are able to produce safe products without animal testing.

In 2016, Congress took action to minimize animal testing through bipartisan support and passage of the "Frank R. Lautenberg Chemical Safety of the 21st Century Act", which revised the Toxic Substances Control Act and included provisions to minimize animal testing and to continually update scientific best practices. Hawaii should join California, New Jersey, New York and Virginia, which have all passed laws requiring companies to use alternative test methods. By applying the best available science to protect human health and transition away from outdated animal testing, SB 239 will benefit both the science and animals in Hawaii.

The Humane Society of the United States requests that SB 239 be reported favorably.

Dear Honorable Committee Members:

Please support SB239, which would prohibit manufacturers and contract testing facilities from using laboratory animals to test cosmetics and household products if alternative methods are available.

The use of alternatives does not mean putting human patients at risk or halting medical progress.

Reduction practices to animal testing are often cheaper and quicker. Many are also more reliable since results of animal tests may not apply to humans.

Due to innovations in science, animal tests are being replaced in areas such as toxicity testing, neuroscience and drug development. Cruel and unreliable shellfish toxin testing on live mice, for example, has now been fully replaced with a far superior analytical chemistry method that is better at protecting humans.

Another alternative is the use of cell cultures. Many types of human and animal cells can be grown in the laboratory, including the culturing of "organs-on-chips," which are used instead of animals to study biological and disease processes, as well as drug metabolism.

Donated human tissues by volunteers who have undergone surgery or post mortem are also available. Companies now produce these types of tests in easy to use kits for companies to use to test their cosmetics and other substances. Volunteer studies are also used in scanning machines, microdosing, to safely study human volunteers.

Also used are computer models that replicate cells and organs in the human body in 3D. Improved statistical design allows investigators to get the most out of the data generated by each animal they use and so need fewer animals. Another type of reduction method involves sharing research animals and control groups.

Although some important kinds of testing can't be done without animals at this time, researchers have a variety of alternatives to reduce the number of animals used in a given study.

The EU has refined lab animal standards to make it more humane for animals routinely subjected to pain or distress, and four states now have similar standards in place as well. There's no reason why Hawaii can't join in reducing needless animal suffering.

Replacing animal testing will improve the quality as well as the humaneness of our science.
