In consideration of **SENATE BILL 2417** RELATING TO SUSTAINABILITY

Senate Bill 2417 proposes to require the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) to recognize that game mammals and game birds are a sustainable food source and that the State's unique relationship with the ocean provides the opportunity to integrate the local fish and game industry into the State's food security profile and to establish and maintain fish propagation facilities. The Department appreciates the intent of this measure and offers the following comments.

Free-ranging introduced mammals such as pigs, goats, deer and sheep provide recreational hunting opportunities and meat for some of Hawaii's residents. These animals will also, if left to their own devices, create significant environmental degradation to both farmland and the natural environment. When considering whether these animals are "sustainable", the costs and threats to farming, forest, wildlife and near-shore fishery habitats should be considered.

Conflating introduced game mammals and native fisheries is problematic, especially as the former has a negative impact on the later.

With regard to proposed SECTION 4 of this measure, please note that the addition of "fish propagation facilities" appears to be unnecessary. Section 187-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes,

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) **OPPOSES** SB2417, which would require all state agencies to promote the hunting and fishing industry, including through mandatory rule amendments that could significantly impact natural and cultural resources of critical importance to Native Hawaiian traditional and customary and subsistence practices, and that may inadvertently undermine the state's overall sustainability and self-sufficiency goals.

As a preliminary matter, OHA recognizes that hunting and fishing may provide a critical source of subsistence for many of its beneficiaries, and may be particularly relied upon by Native Hawaiian rural communities, such as those found on the island of Moloka'i. Certain hunting and fishing activities may also constitute Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices recognized and protected by the state constitution. Accordingly, OHA appreciates the intent of this measure insofar as it may seek to recognize the role that hunting and fishing may play in meeting the subsistence and other needs of local residents, including OHA beneficiaries.

However, OHA also understands that the maintenance of game mammals in potentially sensitive watershed areas to promote the "local game industry" may have significant and severe impacts on native species and habitats that themselves serve as the foundation of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices; may impair the water security and climate change resilience functions of native watersheds; and may exacerbate runoff events that can further impact nearshore reefs and coastal ecosystems relied upon by Native Hawaiians for their subsistence needs. Moreover, the promotion of commercial fishing in nearshore waters may also substantially conflict with or otherwise impair Native Hawaiian traditional and customary and subsistence practices informed by an intimate and daily relationship with the nearshore environment, and that rely on the health and abundance of coastal fisheries that can be easily overexploited by commercial harvesting.

Accordingly, OHA must oppose this measure, insofar as it would require, through rulemaking and otherwise, the unqualified promotion of game mammals and commercial fishing that can substantially impair Native Hawaiians' ability to engage in traditional and customary and subsistence practices, and that may in fact undermine the sustainability and self-sufficiency of our islands. Again, while OHA appreciates the apparent intent of this measure, and strongly believes that hunting and fishing

opportunities should be maintained and managed in appropriate areas and circumstances, OHA cannot support and must oppose the unqualified and mandatory elevation of the hunting and fishing industries by all state agencies via rulemaking and other means.

Should the Committees choose to move this measure forward, OHA respectfully recommends adopting the following amendments, to address the above concerns.

First, OHA recommends deleting sections 2 and 3 of this measure, concerning mandatory rulemaking to "integrate the local hunting and fishing industries" in their food security and sustainability strategies. Such a deletion would ensure that agencies are able to maintain their ability to determine if and when hunting and commercial fishing may be appropriately accommodated.

Second, OHA recommends amending the language found on page 1, lines 11 thru 15, to read as follows:

"(3) Recognize that game mammals and game birds can provide a sustainable food source when properly managed in appropriate areas that minimize their impacts to important watershed areas and functions as well as to Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices and the resources those practices rely upon, and that the State's unique relationship with the ocean requires a careful consideration and management of land and ocean activities that prioritize the public trust responsibilities of the State, including but not limited to the conservation of natural resources for future generations and the protection of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices pursuant to article XI, section 1 and article XII, section 7 of the Hawai'i state constitution;"

Therefore, OHA respectfully urges the Committees to **HOLD** SB2417, or to adopt the amendments recommended above. Mahalo nui for the opportunity to testify.

In the 2018 Legislative session, HCR 22 was won with strong support from legislators. SB 2417 is a bill derived from HCR 22, hopefully a Bill with teeth, as the resolution has had little effect.

The Hawaii County GMAC supports this bill, as we represent the hunting and fishing communities of Hawaii Island. Our game resources are an important part of culture, history, recreation, and local sustainablity.

Game are an important local food resource. Hunters and fishermen suppliment their tight food budget, in these times of inflated food cost. Local fish and game also provide an emergency food resource. Imported food can be interrupted for many reasons. Canned goods will last so long, but wild game resources are renewable. Properly managed game can insure a good back up plan in the event of food shortage, as was their original purpose.

Properly managed game can also bennifit native speicies and eco-systems, as game mammal provide an effective and cost efficent control of invasive weeds

and grass fire fuel. Goats and sheep have been successfully used in land management for centuries all over the world, and are still today, mitigating the danger of wild fire.

Classic game management includes establishing a game population count for each game species, that can be sustained in each particular public hunting area, and kept in balance with the eco-system. Game management plans include consideration of water, food, refuge and habitat for healthy herds and their propigation. Game seasons and bag limits are important tools for proper game management.

The DLNR has been intrusted with our game resources, to preserve, protect and promote. As the DLNR has never had a game management plan, game has at times become over populated and a threat to endangered species. On the other hand, now our game are subject of heavy eradication, and are in many locations becoming non-existant. With proper management this valuable resource can be a bennifit to all, and provide food security and sustainability. Please support this bill.

Conservation Council for Hawaii (CCH) opposes Senate Bill 2417, which would allow for the importing of game mammals, birds and ocean wildlife to grow our states food source. CCH supports food security and believes that we should be doing more to decrease the amount of food imported into the state. CCH does however acknowledge that there has already been extreme desecration to Native Forests and Watersheds due to unmanaged ungulate populations. We firmly believe that there are other strategies that could bolster our food source that would not negatively impact our islands land and ocean resources and encourage the committees to consider the importance of preserving our natural resources for future generations.

As a retiree, hunting and fishing are very important to me and my family both for food and for recreation. They are also a very important part of our local culture and lifestyle, especially on the outer islands.

Like many in the community I feel that the state administration is becoming increasingly hostile to hunting, promoting the eradication of game animals like sheep and goats that have been here over 200 years (introduced in the late 1700's), axis deer that have been her for 150 years (introduced in the 1860's), and pigs that arrived with the first Polynesians. The harvest of these animals for food is, and has been for centuries, an integral part of the island culture.

Meanwhile, ocean warming is having an increasingly negative effect on fishing and other marine resources.

Other states actively manage their fish and game resources, using seasons and bag limits to balance them to their environments. When necessary, they invest in propagation. This bill will hopefully motivate DLNR to properly manage these critical resources so that our children can enjoy them into the future.
