Chair Baker and Members of the Committee:

My name is Esther L. Brown, and I am the Acting Complaints and Enforcement Officer of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs' (Department) Regulated Industries Complaints Office (RICO). RICO offers enforcement-related comments on this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to provide an exemption from the licensure requirements in Hawaii Revised Statutes chapter 453 for out-of-state physicians who accompany a sports team to a sporting event in Hawaii or are invited by a national sport governing body to provide services to sports team members at a national sport training center or at an event sanctioned by a national sport governing body.

This measure does not require an out-of-state physician using the exemption to notify the Hawaii Medical Board or any other licensing authority prior to practicing in the State, unless the out-of-state physician seeks to practice for longer than ten days per individual sporting event under subsection (b) of this bill. Without adequate notice, it

would be difficult for RICO to ensure compliance with the limitation of ten days per individual sporting event, as well as the limitation of 30 days in a calendar year under subsection (c) of this measure.
