The Office of Planning (OP) **supports** SB 2701 which amends Hawaii Revised Statues, Section 46-88 (c) to allow appropriate county fire and building permit agencies the right to enter exempted agricultural buildings to investigate allegations of violations and compliance with this section. This amendment would allow county agencies to exercise their enforcement powers and help to prevent the misuse of agricultural buildings and structures which sometimes are illegally transformed into residential uses. The amendment would also allow the counties to apply to the district court for a warrant, and to direct a police officer to provide assistance to the department or agency in gaining entry to the property.

RE: SB 2701, Relating to Agricultural Buildings

A year ago, the Senate passed SB 940 which recognized that there needs to be a method of verification if exemptions to a Building Code are conditional, and if those conditions are to be taken seriously. SB 2701 would seem to be substantially the same.

I believe that SB 940 and SB 2701 provide an appropriate balance between the need for verification and the right of privacy. Inspection is limited to agricultural buildings, it is limited in the personnel who can investigate, it is limited as to purpose, and puts the burden on government to seek court oversight if there is a dispute.

I support SB2701 and urge its adoption.

SENATE BILL NO. 2701 RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL BUILDINGS

Chairpersons Nishihara and Gabbard and Members of the Committees:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 2701. This measure grants county agencies the right to enter property to investigate agricultural buildings and structures for violations of and compliance with building code exemption qualifications. The Department of Agriculture supports the intent of this measure that promotes active monitoring and enforcement of these exempted structures. In particular, we point out that exempt structures are required to be "...located on a commercial farm or ranch and are used for general agricultural or aquacultural purposes..." (Bill, page 2, lines 5-7). If this fundamental requirement does not exist, the exempt agricultural building should not be permitted.
