SENATE BILL NO. 2701 RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL BUILDINGS

Chairperson Yamane and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 2701. This measure grants county agencies the right to enter property to investigate agricultural buildings and structures for violations of and compliance with building code exemption qualifications. The Department of Agriculture supports the intent of this measure that promotes active monitoring and enforcement of these exempted structures. In particular, we point out that exempt structures are required to be "...located on a commercial farm or ranch and are used for general agricultural or aquacultural purposes..." (Bill, page 2, lines 5-7). If a commercial farm or ranch does not exist, the structure should not be exempted from the building code.
