Aloha Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Ruderman, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawaii Farm Bureau supports HB 2707, which appropriates additional funding to continue the agricultural theft and pilot projects in Hawaii and Maui Counties.

Agricultural crime is persistent problems facing agriculture. Weather, drought, pests, weeds, disease, unstable markets, transportation, labor issues, and a changing climate all contribute to uncertainty for farmers and ranchers. Few businesses face such challenges, yet we are charged with producing food, fiber, fuel and flowers for the 99% of non-farmers. Add in the constant threat and impacts of trespass, theft, and vandalism, and it's a wonder farms and ranches remain viable.

Sadly, agricultural crime is a growing trend in Hawaii. Farmers and ranchers are often victims of those who are looking for easy targets. Despite our efforts to install cameras, form community ag watch groups, and patrol our farms, these criminals know that being caught and prosecuted is unlikely.

In recent years, not only have crops and livestock been stolen, but also tractors, trucks, farm equipment, and tools. We support all efforts to curb this attack on our viability. In most cases, we bear the cost of these crimes since we cannot pass these costs on to the consumer in the form of higher prices.

In working with our members, HDOA, and law enforcement, we have collectively concluded that a dedicated enforcement officer housed in the county prosecutor's office is a giant step forward in minimizing agricultural crimes and enhancing public safety. HFB continues to work with both the police and prosecutor's office to find ways we can work together to help deter, apprehend, and convict individuals that are committing agricultural theft and vandalism.

Mahalo for the opportunity to support SB2707 Relating to Agricultural Theft and Vandalism.

Our farm sells lychee, longan, and grass-fed beef in Rural South Hilo. Several times during peak Lychee Season our farm has been "raided." Thieves cut whole large branches off of mature lychee trees, stealing about \$1,000 worth of ripe fruit, probably in a few minutes. When we have purchase orders to fill, the loss of ripe fruit can mean the loss of a whole account and business relationship—not just one order. Worse, these trees will not fully recover for years, compounding the losses for our farm. As long as we have been growing, our farm has been a target of theft and vandalism, fruit and equipment, and every community association meeting in our small town includes time for a litany of farm theft reports.

During the lychee season, thieves stake-out either end of our rural access road, using cell phones to alert one another when farmers are coming and going from our farms. We set out motion sensor lights, camp out in fields, but can't always defend our farm while going to our day jobs or running errands in town. They steal our security cameras, cut our fences, and break through our gates. It doesn't seem to matter how remote or how busy the area is, or if we know them by name.

After my neighbor was held at gunpoint by a lychee thief last year, I felt completely vulnerable, with the nearest police station 30 minutes' drive away. When officers do arrive, they are unaware of state agricultural theft laws and sometimes refuse to take action. These laws lower the dollar amount that triggers a felony offense, and require that produce in transit be accompanied by a bill of lading (documentation of whose produce it is, and who has a right to transport it). In the past, officers had not been trained to take it seriously and believed the theft would not be prosecuted, so they maybe thought following through would be a waste of time.

Since the agricultural theft investigator began working on the Big Island, things have improved. He has taken the time to visit our town and introduce himself to the farmers and community association. We now have someone to work with in the prosecutor's office that will take our losses seriously. We know that this position is a temporary one, and appreciate your efforts to make sure the program continues, and hopefully becomes permanent.

This bill would make it clear that ag theft *is theft*, has a serious impact on a farmer's bottom line, and *will be prosecuted*. Thank you for your consideration.
