SB 2723 - RELATING TO AGRICULTURE

Chairs Kim and Gabbard, Vice Chairs Kidani and Ruderman, and members of the Senate Committee on Higher Education and Senate Committee on Agriculture and Environment:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in <u>support</u> of SB 2723 that seeks to fund the GoFarm Hawai'i program. The average age of a farmer in Hawai'i is about 60 years, thus, there is a need to train future farmers for Hawai'i, but where the future farmers will come from is unclear. The College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR) trains students for 4-year degrees in Horticulture, Soil Science, Entomology, Plant Pathology and Animal Science. CTAHR students typically do not go into farming, per se; but are the scientists trained to support agriculture. Of course, they have the skills to farm if they wish, but most do not consider this their future.

The GoFarm Hawai'i program is a fully grant funded, non-degree granting program associated with CTAHR. It is a successful program and its success is based on how the program is organized. The program accepts anyone interested in developing the skills to farm and offers a series of sequential programs that allows participants to proceed through the programs based on their level of interest. Below is a diagram of the series of sequential programs offered by GoFarm Hawai'i, beginning with AgCurious and culminating with AgBusiness.



This bill does an excellent job of outlining the success of this program, which we will not reproduce here. The program has a high rate of success as measured by the number of participants that proceed to farm on their own land, or work on farms. GoFarm Hawai'i has also expanded its program to meet special needs. One example is working with prison inmates to train them to be Agricultural Technicians, with the hope of reducing recidivism.

Chairpersons Mercado Kim and Gabbard, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 2723 that appropriates funds for the GoFarm Hawaii program and requires GoFarm Hawaii to provide the Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture with an annual report of the program's goals and a semi-annual report outlining program outputs and outcomes.

The Department supports this bill and comments that GoFarm Hawaii has been successful in providing more than 130 farmers a path to leading from considering farming as a career and through a series of courses, prepared them to be a commercial farmer.

GoFarm Hawaii is a the only statewide program offering farmers the comprehensive training that includes: **AgCurious** – attracts the interested farmer; **AgXposure** – introduces the interested farmer to the aspects of farming; **AgSchool** – teaches the beginning farmer the spectrum of production topics and includes maintenance of a 1,000 square foot plot of food crops; **AgPro** – retains those beginning farmers that have decided to be a farmer and teaches business planning and practices small-scale commercial production; and **AgIncubator** – rewards the beginning farmer with a ¼ acre of land to start a business and transition off the site.



The appropriation would allow GoFarm Hawaii to meet the demand for the interested farmers as the demand for enrollment often exceeds availability. GoFarm Hawaii has earned the branding of their program as the premier training for beginning farmers and is an example of past success being an indicator of future performance.

The Department supports the bill and asks that its passage not replace or adversely impact the other priorities of the Department.

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawaii Farm Bureau strongly supports SB 2723, which appropriates funds for the GoFarm Hawaii program. Requires GoFarm Hawaii to provide the Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture with an annual report of the program's goals and a semi-annual report outlining program outputs and outcomes.

Hawaii's farmers and ranchers are aging. The average age exceeds 60 years old and if they were in other professions would be retired. Yet many of these farmers are those that provide to KTA, Safeway, Times, Costco, restaurants, and hotels and truly make a difference in reducing imports. Unfortunately for many, succession plans do not exist and as they retire, the lands go out of agricultural production. To maintain and expand production levels, it's clear that we need a new generation of farmers and ranchers equipped to assume the task of growing crops and livestock. There is an urgent need for interns or apprentices that are willing to not only work on these farms but take over their operations.

GoFarm Hawaii's farmer-training program has been training new farmers since 2012. They have grown to become one of the largest and most successful beginning farmer development programs in the Nation. The GoFarm Hawaii program is helping to address Hawaii's agriculture labor shortage by recruiting and training new farmers. This is critical to achieving Hawaii's goal of doubling food production.

On behalf of the North Shore Economic Vitality Partnership (EVP), I would like to extend our full support of SB2723, which will appropriates funds to the GoFarm Hawaii program.

The North Shore EVP was formed in 2015 as a result of a comprehensive, community-based economic analysis that identified the need for a regional food hub to fill serious gaps in the food supply chain of the region. Our non-profit organization worked with community leaders to develop realistic strategic plans focused on securing that critical infrastructure and providing new opportunities for business and creation of new jobs in agriculture in the region. Currently, our major projects include 1) statewide expansion of our GropupGAP (Good Agricultural Practices) farmer training program and 2) developing a food hub on the North Shore of Oahu.

In December 2019 two more farms were USDA Harmonized GAP certified through our GroupGAP program and earlier this month our program passed its USDA External audit with flying colors. Our continued success is due in part to our collaborations across the state, including Go Farm.

During the past year we have participated in Go Farm seminars and workshops to being onfarm food safety expertise to the trainees. We value the opportunity to get on front of new farmers, providing food safety training, and interacting with these aspiring farmers. GoFarm Hawaii graduates and clients have been members of our GroupGap program, showing their dedication to quality and food safety, looking to increase production and sales, and seeking access to larger markets that often require food safety certification.

GoFarm Hawaii is developing commercial farmers on the North Shore and across the state that are prepared to supply food for local communities. We look forward to these farmers activitey contirbuting to sustainable agriculture in their communities. We will continue to work together in areas of mutual interest especially in areas where we can leverage each other's expertise in support of Hawai'i agriculture. The North Shore EVP strongly supports this measure that will ensure that the GoFarm Hawaii program continues it's work to support local farmers.

Please recognize my strong support for SB 2723, which appropriates funds to the GoFarm Hawai'i program. Shortly after graduating from the program in 2015, I started a farm in Hale'iwa called Counter Culture Organic Farm on five acres of Kamehameha Schools agricultural land. Primarily due to the experience and connections gained through the GoFarm Hawai'i, I was able to secure that initial lease, a second Kamehameha Schools lease for an additional five acres in 2017, and a few months ago signed a 30 acre lease in Waialua to significantly expand our certified organic produce operation.

Counter Culture Organic Farm currently has about five acres in cultivation, selling \$120,000 in certified organic produce to local restaurants and households through Farm Link Hawai'i and the Kaka'ako Farmers Market. Our farm employs 3 full-time and 2 part-time people. Our impact on the food system and local economy will continue to grow as we expand into our new 30 acre lease in 2020.

I would not be where I am today without GoFarm Hawai'i. The program gave me the appropriate mix of theory, hands-on practice, and, most importantly, a connection to a strong network of resources to draw upon indefinitely. Since graduating, I've regularly communicated and partnered with GoFarm staff and other alumni to increase our impact on local agriculture.

The GoFarm Hawai'i program is a needed and valuable program for the state of Hawai'i. Their ongoing support, educational opportunities, and network continues to provide a valuable support system for my business.

My name is Amy Hennessey, and I am the Senior Vice President of Communications & External Affairs at Ulupono Initiative. We are a Hawai'i-based impact investment firm that strives to improve our community's quality of life by creating more locally produced food; increasing affordable clean renewable energy and transportation options; and better managing waste and fresh water resources.

Ulupono supports SB 2723, which appropriates funds for the GoFarm Hawai'i Program (GFH).

Since 2013, Ulupono has provided \$250,000 in grant funding to GFH for infrastructure and development of operations on Hawai'i Island, Maui, O'ahu, and Kaua'i. With funding from Ulupono and others, we are excited about the growth of the GFH training program.

According to the USDA-NASS Census of Agriculture, there are 7,300 estimated farms in Hawai'i, of which more than 75% earn less than \$25,000 per year. Additionally, of those farms that generate over \$25,000 per year, 65% have principal farm operators that are at least 55 years old. With the high costs of agricultural production here in Hawai'i and the average age of the local farmer climbing, it is of utmost importance for the State to invest in the next generation and to provide a financially viable future for those agricultural operations.

We appreciate that GFH has developed a broad spectrum of classes designed for those with an interest in agriculture. GFH offers the most comprehensive new farmer training program in Hawai'i, including classroom education, hands-on training, business planning, and incubation opportunities.

GFH has a well-received reputation with training the next generation of local producers in the State. Over the past 3 years, 58% of the 127 program graduates have either started their own agricultural businesses (60 graduates) or began working in (14 graduates) the agricultural industry. By training the future agricultural workforce, GFH is directly supporting the State's local food production goals and the creation of a more sustainable Hawai'i.

The undersigned organizations are writing to **SUPPORT SB2723**, which proposes to appropriate funds out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii for the GoFarm Hawai'i program to provide agricultural workforce development and support services in business consulting, technical assistance, and beginner farmer training.

Since 2013, GoFarm Hawai'i has trained 330 aspiring farmers at five training sites on four islands. The program has five key activities: 1) Support agribusiness development statewide; 2) Educate agribusinesses and create industry tools; 3) Develop new farmers for Hawai'i; 4) Incubate program graduates; and 5) Train agricultural workers.

I am writing in support of SB2723. As someone from the islands, I have long been concerned at our lack of food sustainability, the steady deterioration through disuse of agricultural lands our constitution promises to preserve and protect, and the lack of a varied local economy. There has long been a significant gap between our ambitions for a better economy and a more vibrant local food supply. The GoFarm program serves as one of our few bridges across that gap. As a student, the GoFarm program has provided me with invaluable experience and knowledge both scientific and practical. It attracts students that reflect the diversity and promise of our state; there are in my cohort librarians, engineers, landscapers, and educators, old and young, and people from the many ethnic groups that make up our culture. It has connected us to the land, deepened our sense of civic duty-as evidenced by this testimony-and provided us with the network, skills and connections to succeed in our ambitions. Studies from UHERO and other institutions have pointed out the necessity of developing strong economic clusters before there is cost competitiveness and export growth potential. The GoFarm program is doing just that here and now. Support for SB 2723, Relating to Agriculture

Dear Chairs Gabbard and Mercado Kim, Vice Chairs Ruderman and Kidani, and members of the Senate Committees on Agriculture and Environment, and Higher Education:

My name is Charles Kinoshita. I retired from the University of Hawaii, College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources, one month ago, and I'm presenting testimony as a private citizen in support of SB 2723, which calls for appropriation of funds to support the GoFarm Hawaii (GFH) Program.

Decades ago, prior to joining the University of Hawaii, I was an engineer for, and part of the management team of, the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association (HSPA) Experiment Station. When I first joined HSPA, sugarcane was being cultivated on four Hawaiian islands, covering more than 200,000 acres, and yielding roughly one million tons of sugar per year. Today, no cane is grown in Hawaii for the manufacture of refined sugar.

While sugarcane has disappeared from our landscape, the majority of the lands that once supported cane, though now fallow, still are zoned agricultural and have great potential for diversified crops. These lands can be brought back into commercial agriculture to create the green landscape that is important to the health of our environment and our visitor industry, and support our local economy and food security, if new farmers are able to cultivate those lands skillfully and profitably. In order to increase the number of farmers in Hawaii's diversified agriculture and ensure their success, we need to provide aspiring farmers with the knowledge and skill sets to grow crops better and to operate their agribusinesses more profitably.

GoFarm Hawaii has assembled infrastructure and professionals to grow new farmers on all four islands that previously grew commercial sugarcane. GFH, which offers training in both crop production and business management quite likely is the largest and most successful new farmer training program in the nation. In the last three years, more than 100 trainees graduated from the GFH training program, approximately 60% of the graduates started farm businesses or are supporting other agribusinesses in Hawaii, and 18 farm businesses were incubated on our own program lands. Complementary to the highly successful new farmer training program, the GoFarm Hawaii AgBusiness consulting arm provides one-on-one support to new and existing

farmers statewide, and in 2019 helped more than 60 farmers apply for loans, leases and grants, and develop business plans and value-added products.

Let's be clear... to achieve such high levels of success and positive impacts is costly. GFH has been very successful in competing for contracts and grants at the national, state, and local levels, and has garnered strong support from generous and committed partners in the private sector, government agencies, and philanthropic organizations, but additional funding, as called for in SB 2723, is needed to continue this successful farmer-training and agribusiness-support program.

In closing, I'd like to point-out that I believe so strongly in GFH that, in retirement, I have volunteered to be an uncompensated part of the GFH team so that I may make my own small contribution to the future success of agriculture in Hawaii. I strongly encourage you to support SB 2723 and help GoFarm Hawaii train and provide consulting services to our state's future successful farmers and agripreneurs.

Upon completing the program, I established a small farm business, Bear Claw Farm LLC, in 2016 which currently grows diversified vegetables on 1 acre of land in Waimanalo. I sell produce to local restaurants and via farm stand pop-ups in Waimanalo, Kahalu'u, and Kalihi each week. The GoFarm program solidified my production skills, provided business support, and gave me a network that allows my business to continue growing. I would not be where I am today without the GoFarm program. I am currently on incubator land rented from GoFarm. Without this land option, I would not have been able to start my farm business as the investment and risk would have been essentially impossible. I am now working on my business full-time, happily self-employed, growing hundreds of pounds of produce each month, and am looking forward to a long term commitment of growing food for Oahu.

After graduating, I hope to find land to begin to manifest my dream and place all my acquired skills to practice.

For Hawai'i, whose goal is to increase local food production dramatically, GoFarm Hawaii is the first step to obtaining that goal. Farmers face huge challenges in this state. For me, GoFarm Hawaii mitigates some of those challenges through education. Please give your support to GoFarm Hawaii.

Dear Chairs Mercado Kim and Gabbard, Vice-Chairs Kidani and Ruderman, and Committee Members:

We **strongly support SB 2723**, which appropriates funds to the GoFarm Hawaii program. My husband and I are graduates of the GoFarm Hawaii program and currently participate in the AgIncubator program.

As you know, farming in Hawaii is a tough proposition between the cost of land, labor and the resources needed to provide our communities with fresh and affordable produce. Our farm, known as De La Mesa Farms, has always had a mission to strengthen our communities and environment by applying organic practices to deliver fresh and affordable produce. Without the GoFarm Hawaii program, we would not have been able to deliver on our mission as quickly and as impactfully as we did.

We launched our business in 2017 with a small urban farm in Kailua producing exclusively microgreens. During that first year, we struggled to supply the market with 4 lbs. of microgreens a week and ended the year in the red (like many new businesses). That same year, however, we were admitted into the GoFarm Hawaii program. Through GoFarm Hawaii's courses and fieldwork, mentorship and networking, we were able to apply the lessons learned directly to our farm operations. Over the last 3 years, we have substantially expanded our operations – thanks in large part to GoFarm Hawaii – such that we regularly supply 2 farmers markets' weekly with over 100 lbs. of salad greens, microgreens and specialty crops such as radishes, beets, carrots, broccoli, tomatoes, cucumbers, etc.; sell produce to local restaurants and hotels; and, also sell community-support agricultural (CSA) subscriptions directly to local families. We are able to provide all this produce as a result of the approx. ¹/₄ acre of land that we currently lease via the GoFarm Hawaii program in Waimanalo.

The GoFarm Hawaii program is the most important driver for creating new commercial farmers in the State of Hawaii. If legislators are committed to food security and expanding our local food system, then support of the GoFarm Hawaii program is absolutely necessary. Their ongoing support, educational opportunities, network and mentorship continues to provide a valuable support system for our farm.
