- 1 **Fiscal Implications:** Unknown. This measure may impact the priorities identified in the
- 2 Governor's Executive Budget Request for the Department of Health's (Department)
- 3 appropriations and personnel priorities if the Department and counties are required to establish
- 4 significantly more redemption centers using the Deposit Beverage Container Special Fund.
- 5 **Department Testimony:** The Department supports SB2727 to amend Hawaii Revised Statutes
- 6 (HRS) Section 342G-113, subsections (b)(1) and (d) to exempt dealers (retail establishments that
- 7 sell deposit beverage containers) that are within one mile of a certified redemption center from
- 8 having to operate their own certified redemption center and for the Department to partner with
- 9 the respective County to establish certified redemption centers within a one mile radius. This will
- reduce the distance between certified redemption centers from two miles to one mile.
- The Department respectfully requests that this proposal's effective date be amended by 11 three years, to July 1, 2023, to allow the Department to convene an advisory committee per HRS 12 Section 342G-122 and revise Hawaii Administrative Rules (HAR) Section 11-282-31 to update 13 14 the dealer exemptions to operate redemption centers. Amending HAR Section 11-282-31 in conjunction with the passage of this proposal should effectively increase the number of certified 15 16 redemption centers throughout the State and meet the purpose of the proposed legislation. Increasing the number of certified recycling centers should make it more convenient for the 17 18 public to participate in the recycling program, improve the State's recycling rates, and help

Testimony in Support of SB2727 Relating to Deposit Beverage Containers

Aloha Honorable Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Ruderman, and Members of the Committee:

Reynolds Recycling, as Hawaii's largest bottle and can recycler, strongly supports SB 2727.

This bill would encourage the creation of new certified redemption centers to enable consumers to more easily redeem their HI-5 Deposit Beverage Containers (DBCs).

While it was many years ago, Reynolds Metals previously conducted a survey about recycling, and found that convenience was the number one requirement for people to regularly recycle. As more Certified Redemption Centers (CRCs) were developed within the state of Hawaii the redemption rate also increased, and from 2008 onward that rate was over 70%. When various CRCs closed due to the lack of financial viability (due in part to low world market prices for recycled commodities, and lack of increases in DBC Handling Fees from the State) the total number of CRCs dropped from over 100 to the current 67 locations, and the redemption rate correspondingly dropped to the current 63.8%.

This bill would encourage beverage dealers to either develop CRCs of their own, or to work with the recycling community to create new CRCs on their properties to fulfill their legal requirements. This would ensure that it is just as easy to recycle a beverage container as it is to purchase a beverage in the first place.

Because of the above we **strongly support SB 2727.**
