Aloha Chair Nishihara, Vice-Chair Wakai and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Emergency Management Agency (HI-EMA) supports Senate Bill 2885.

Senate Bill 2885 establishes the hazard mitigation special fund for the HI-EMA.

HI-EMA has had funding to implement entering property to remove dangers to public safety, after taking appropriate measures with the landowners. This funding is nearly exhausted, making the program mute. This measure would provide funding and to slightly expand program authority to allow the agency to continue its work in cutting, trimming, or removing dangerous trees or branches that pose a hazard to public safety; stabilizing or removing unstable rock and soil hazards; and cleaning streams and waterways to mitigate or prevent flooding or other hazards.

Note: My comments represent HI-EMA concerns at the state emergency management level only. I would defer to the separate comment/testimonies of the county emergency management agencies, as they would be the jurisdictions impacted by this legislation at the local level.

The Department of Emergency Management **STRONGLY SUPPORTS** SB2885 which would amend HRS 127A to establish the hazard mitigation special fund and appropriates moneys to the fund. ## In SUPPORT of SB 2885 RELATING TO THE HAWAII EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY.

Chair Nishihara, Vice Chair Wakai, and members of the Committee. The Hawaii State Energy Office (HSEO) supports SB 2885, which establishes the Hazard Mitigation Special Fund for the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency. This measure will increase public health and safety by providing funds to support the management and implementation of state hazardous mitigation projects under Chapter 127A-18, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

Positive impacts of mitigation projects could support more resilient energy delivery in a disaster by providing specific funding to address identified hazardous conditions that can improve response time to roads and utilities that may otherwise be affected by (1) cutting, trimming, or removing dangerous trees or branches that pose a hazard to other properties; (2) stabilizing or removing unstable rock and soil hazards; and (3) cleaning streams and waterways to mitigate or prevent flooding or other hazards.
