Chair Takayama, Vice Chair Gates, and Members of the House Committee on Public Safety, Veterans, & Military Affairs.

The Office of Planning <u>supports</u> the intent of this measure offers the following <u>comments</u> on SB 2887, SD 2. In 2018, communities across the State of Hawai'i were affected by flooding, hurricane, and volcano disasters resulting in major damage to land, homes, infrastructure, and the economy. Three federally declared disasters, primarily affecting Kaua'i and Hawai'i counties, require long-term, complex planning and implementation to recover.

The Office of Planning supports the development of a long-term recovery authority to, among other responsibilities, recommend policy decisions and set strategic direction for resilient recovery planning. The Office of Planning finds that this long-term disaster recovery authority is complimentary to the long-range planning goals set in the purpose of the Hawai'i State Planning Act (HRS §226-1) and the long-range comprehensive planning and coordination responsibilities described in HRS §225M-1.

The Office of Planning notes that the Hawai'i State Legislature recently established the State's Sustainability Coordinator position within the Office of Planning, pursuant to the Supplemental Appropriation Act of 2016. The Office of Planning further finds that the 2018 State of Hawai'i's Hazard Mitigation Plan recommended:

"Develop a Sustainability Program at the state-level, headed by the Sustainability Coordinator. Currently, the Sustainability Coordinator position is funded, but has no operating budget. Task Coordinator with developing the program, establishing a clearing house for sustainability information and initiatives, coordinate with departments and agencies, and track implementation of projects and programs."

The Office of Planning's Sustainability Coordinator looks forward to assisting this proposed long-term disaster authority and working in collaboration with the State's Disaster Recovery Coordinator to recover from the impacts from disasters and build resilience and sustainability for the State of Hawai'i.
