<u>DEPARTMENT'S POSITION</u>: The Department of Human Services (DHS) supports this administration measure.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: The purpose of this bill establishes the Hawaii State Fusion Center as a program under the Office of Homeland Security and establishes the position of Hawaii State Fusion Center Director who shall be state-funded, responsible to the Director of Homeland Security, and accountable to manage the operations of the Center.

The Fusion Center and the Fusion Center Director are vital to the security and health and well-being in Hawaii. The Fusion Center provides access to cross-sector and cross-government communication. DHS is a partner agency with the Fusion Center and DHS staff actively participate in training and briefings that are easily accessible and available on a variety of issues. In the past year, DHS staff have attended training and discussions addressing cyber security, efforts of on-line law enforcement to identify sex trafficking, active shooters, debriefs of significant events to inform planning, and most recently a presentation by the CDC regarding procedures in place to address the coronavirus.

SUBJECT: Senate Bill 2889 Relating to Homeland Security

Senate Bill 2889 amends HRS128A to establish the Hawaii State Fusion Center in the Office of Homeland Security, State of Hawaii Department of Defense. The Fusion Center is already serving a critical public safety function, and the proposed amendments will codify it in to state law to ensure that it can continue to support the growing need for actionable intelligence by law enforcement and other public safety agencies across all levels of government as well as the private sector. Subject: Senate Bill 2889 Relating to Homeland Security

The Board of Water Supply (BWS) strongly supports Senate Bill (SB) 2889. As a water utility serving almost one million residents and visitors, the BWS is designated as part of Hawaii's critical infrastructure by the Department Homeland Security. The BWS recognizes potential terrorist threats may significantly impact the health, safety and livelihood of every resident and visitor on the Island of Oahu.

Safeguarding our operation from these potential threats is the reason the BWS has become a partner of the Hawaii State Fusion Center (HSFC) under the direction of the Hawaii Department of Defense, through the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in June 2016. The MOU establishes efficient and timely sharing of information between two organizations to increase situational awareness of possible cyber-security issues and concerns.

With the current and actionable threat intelligence, coordinated and timely information dissemination, access to critical information sharing amongst Federal, State, County agencies and public-private entities is a critical component of our situational and operational programs for protecting against cyber and physical attacks. SB 2889 provides the mechanism to provide the necessary staffing for the HSFC to become operational and to meet its intended mission.

Should the HSFC, its Center Director, no longer be in existence, the BWS would lose a valued partner and ally in its mission to provide safe, dependable and affordable water now and into the future.

Good morning Chairperson Nishihara and members of the Senate Committee on Public Safety Intergovernmental & Military Affairs. I am Tina Yamaki, President of the Retail Merchants of Hawaii and I appreciate this opportunity to testify.

The Retail Merchants of Hawaii (RMH) is a statewide not-for-profit trade organization committed to supporting the retail industry and business in general in Hawaii. The retail industry is one of the largest employers in the state, employing 25% of the labor force.

The Retail Merchants of Hawaii **STRONGLY SUPPORTS SB 2889 Relating to Homeland Security**. This measure formally establishes the Hawaii State Fusion Center as a program under the Office of Homeland Security and establishes the position of Hawaii State Fusion Center Director who shall be state-funded, responsible to the Director of Homeland Security, and accountable to manage the operations of the Center.

For many years, the Retail Merchant of Hawaii has been working in partnership with the Hawaii State Fusion Center. They are very influential in formulating partnerships between not only federal, state and county government agencies, but with business community partners like us that share information to combat safety and security problems and issues facing not only our industry but our community and government as well.

As property crimes continue to plague retailers, the Hawaii State Fusion Center has been instrumental in establishing the Hawaii Organized Retail Crime Alliance (HIORCA) website that is open only to law enforcement and retail investigators in an effort to share cross jurisdictional information to identify, disrupt, and apprehend Organized Retail Crime (ORC) crews. HIORCA operates like a business "crime watch" that allows law enforcement and retailers to communicate on a real time basis through alerts about criminal activity and incidents impacting their business or geographic area, as well as prevent other retail partners from being victimized.

The information that we receive from the Hawaii State Fusion Center is invaluable through their dissemination of information on leads, tips, trends, suspicious activities and more. It is only by continuing to work in partnership that we can maintain a Hawaii that is not only safe to visit but to live and work as well.



Honorable Chair Clarence K. Nishihara, Vice Chair Glenn Wakai, and Members of the Committee:

The Kaua'i Police Department **supports** the passage of Senate Bill No. 2889, Relating to Homeland Security.

The Kaua`i Police Department feels strongly that establishing the Hawaii State Fusion Center as a program under the Office of Homeland Security and the position of the Hawaii State Fusion Center Director will greatly enhance the sharing of intelligence and threat-related information between law enforcement and public safety partners at the local, state, federal, and international levels.

If established, the Hawaii State Fusion Center through its Director, will be able to provide support and assistance to public safety and law enforcement agencies by closing existing information gaps. Fusion centers typically have access to sensitive databases to perform queries, have expert staffing on hand to receive intelligence and threat-related information from various sources, perform critical analysis, and disseminate intelligence to the appropriate agency or the public safety community as deemed necessary.

Some benefits of having a fusion center based in the State of Hawai`i include but are not limited to: improved collaboration and networking between law enforcement and homeland security agencies, identification of crime patterns and threats that may affect national security, mitigate vulnerabilities associated with infrastructure and cybersecurity, assist with deployment of resources and assets in emergency situations, and provide specialized training for law enforcement and public safety agencies.



In closing, the Kaua`i Police Department supports the passage of Senate Bill No. 2889 for these reasons and we urge the committees to support this Bill.
