I. OVERVIEW OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

SB2898SD1 proposes to amend Section 1-28.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) to allow government agencies that are required to give public notice or to publish notices the option to post notices on a central government website.

The DLIR supports this measure.

II. CURRENT LAW

Section 1-28.5, HRS requires that government agencies that are required to give public notice or to publish notices to do so for statewide publication either in a daily or weekly publication of statewide circulation or in separate daily or weekly publications whose combined circulation is statewide, and for county-wide publication, a daily or weekly publication in the affected county.

III. COMMENTS ON THE HOUSE BILL

The DLIR supports allowing government agencies to post notices on a central website. Allowing the posting of notices on a central website will save resources and time, while still providing governmental transparency and public access.

The Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) supports Senate Bill No. 2898, SD 1, which allows government agencies to publish public notices on their official website as an alternative to the newspaper.

Public notices in newspapers are expensive and have limited visibility, especially among those who tend to obtain daily news and information from social media and other online sources. Last year, the DPP spent more than \$18,000 on legal ads that were published in newspapers, and more than \$23,000 in the year prior. The public's access to information has evolved with advancement in internet and mobile technology. It is our responsibility to adapt and accommodate the public, in order to serve them in the most efficient and cost-effective way possible.

This Bill would allow the DPP to accommodate people's preference and reach a wider audience at lower cost, which will increase government efficiency, transparency, and encourage more public engagement.

RE: SB 2898, SD1 Relating to Public Notices

Although SB 2898, SD1 might be superficially beneficial to the operation of government, I submit this testimony in opposition to its provisions.

I think that SB 2898, SD1 would be bad public policy for two reasons which are entirely unrelated to each other:

First, although it may be true that, as SB 2898 states, "electronic posting is more expedient and cost-effective," democracy depends on more than expediency and cost effectiveness. Officials should be careful in spending taxpayer dollars, but we have to balance that against the need for openness and transparency. In the case of public notices, I would argue that all practical sources for disseminating information should be utilized. Declaring that posting on one of innumerable government websites would be sufficient to give all citizens adequate notice of the doings of their government would, I think, be inaccurate, unwise, and contrary to our values.

I also offer a perspective that does not seem to have been presented in earlier testimony. Across the country, local newspapers are going out of business, and I wonder whether our publications in Hawai'i, especially on the neighbor islands, are financially healthy. If we take away the revenue they get from publishing public notices, they will have an even tougher time surviving. Losing local news coverage is bad for democracy, and I do not think this Legislature wants to do anything that might contribute to creating another news desert. SB 2898, SD1 might do just that.

Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran and members of the Committee. My name is Peter Fritz. I am an individual with a disability and offering comments relating to a concern that posting on the state calendar will not provide the proof that the notice was posted on the state calendar the requisite number of days prior to the event and because could discriminate against individuals with disabilities, kupuna and citizens without access to broadband internet.

- The state calendar does not provide legal proof of the date of publication of a notice.
 - o Some statutes require that notices be posted a certain number of days prior to the event.
 - o The State Calendar only records the date that someone edited the page on the State Calendar. The state calendar does not record the date that the agenda was posted. See attachment.
 - Some agencies do not post the notice. Instead, the agency only posts a link to an external
 document which could be amended or changed after the event was posted on the State Calendar.
 To comply with certain laws, notices and agendas cannot be changed after a particular date.
 - Requiring Notices of Rule Making with the Lieutenant Governor would provide an
 accurate date for the posting of the Notice on the State Calendar. Notices of Boards and
 Commissions are required to be filed with the Lieutenant Governor.
 - Alternatively, programing the State Calendar to operate in a manner similar to the Legislature's testimony submittal portal, which allows submission of testimony but no further editing of submitted documents might provide sufficient proof to satisfy the legal time requirements.
- **Disability Discrimination.** This bill could discriminate against the disabled who cannot use a computer. The Department of Justice has consistently interpreted the ADA to cover websites that are operated by public entities and stated that such sites must provide their services in an accessible manner so that individuals with disabilities have an equal degree of access in terms of hours of operation and the range of options and programs available. Based on personal experience, agencies frequently do not post electronic information that is accessible to individuals with disabilities. To ensure that notices do not discriminate, language should be added to the end of paragraph (3), line 18 on page 2 to read:

"Notices posted electronically shall conform to the standards for accessible electronic information and information technology as set forth by s. 508 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, and 29 U.S.C. s. 794(d), including the regulations set forth under 36 C.F.R. part 1194."
