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- 2 **Department Testimony:** The Department of Health (DOH) thanks the Senate President for
- 3 sponsoring and the Chair for hearing Senate Bill 2904 (S.B. 2904) that was requested in the
- 4 Governor's Package. Although the title, report title, summary description, and justification sheet
- 5 all contain the correct language, the body of the text contained in the bill is inconsistent with the
- 6 original legislative proposal. The Department is submitting suggested language from the
- 7 legislative proposal, HTH-11-20, and requesting the Committee's support to remedy the
- 8 situation. The Department supports S.B. 2904 with the inclusion of the attached suggested
  - Senate Draft 1 that would correct the text error.

The suggested S.D. 1 removes the ambiguity of simply referring to a "person" and replaces it with "employee of a retailer, permittee, or registrant" who illegally sells to persons under 21 and reduces the fine from \$500 to \$100 for the first offense. Subsequent offenses within five years or not less than \$100 nor more than \$500. The retailer, permittee, or registrant in violation or whose employee illegally sells to persons under 21 years is to be fined \$500 for the first offense. Subsequent offenses within five years start at \$500 and can go to \$5,000. Further, a third or more offense results in license suspension. The proposal holds licensees responsible for the actions of their employees, reinforces supervisory responsibility and on-site employee training and education while reducing youth access and subsequent addiction. The proposed change also aligns with the amended Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act which

raised the federal minimum age of sale of tobacco products to 21 years.

Currently, retail clerks are the only persons facing penalties. The requested S.D.1 clearly establishes the legal responsibility of the retailer, permittee, or registrant who sells tobacco products and the liability incurred when illegal tobacco sales are made to anyone under 21 years of age. The Department supports this measure as a result of meeting with representatives from the four county Office of the Prosecuting Attorney, because of the concerns with youth ESD use. The prosecutors requested clarification to Section 712-1258, Hawaii Revised Statues, to help standardize enforcement across counties, and to increase compliance with the identification checks and required signage, and hold accountable those persons who allow or influence the sale or consumption of tobacco products to a person under the age of 21.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

"Tobacco product" includes but is not 13 limited to a cigarette, cigar, pipe tobacco, chewing tobacco, 14 snuff, snus, e-liquid, or an electronic smoking device. 15 "Tobacco product" does not include drugs, devices, or 16 17 combination products approved for sale by the United States Food and Drug Administration, as those terms are defined in the 18 Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act." 19 SECTION 2. This Act does not affect rights and duties that 20 21 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were

begun before its effective date.

The Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawai'i, a program of the Hawai'i Public Health Institute<sup>i</sup> provides **Support for SB 2904.** Based on the description, the bill would clarify that liability for illegally selling tobacco products to persons under 21 is borne by the retail entity rather than the employee. However, the language in the bill would end the sale of flavored tobacco products.

The Coalition supports both shifting the responsibility from an individual employee to the retailer or permittee and prohibiting the sale of flavored tobacco products in Hawai'i, but is unclear on the impact and purpose of the bill based on the conflicting description and bill language. Therefore, our testimony is limited at this time.

Chair Baker, Vice Chair Chang, and Members of the Joint Committee:

The Hawaii Primary Care Association (HPCA) is a 501(c)(3) organization established to advocate for, expand access to, and sustain high quality care through the statewide network of Community Health Centers throughout the State of Hawaii. The HPCA <u>SUPPORTS</u> Senate Bill No. 2904, RELATING TO THE SALE OF TOBACCO PRODUCTS.

The bill, as received by your Committee, would prohibit the sale or distribution of all flavored tobacco products, including products with menthol, in the State of Hawaii, and prohibit the mislabeling or sale of any tobacco or e-liquid product containing nicotine as nicotine-free.

By way of background, the HPCA represents Hawaii Federally-Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs). FQHCs provide desperately needed medical services at the frontlines in rural and underserved communities. Long considered champions for creating a more sustainable, integrated, and wellness-oriented system of health, FQHCs provide a more efficient, more effective and more comprehensive system of healthcare.

FQHCs have long seen first-hand how tobacco has literally destroyed the lives of our patients and their families. Chairs Baker and Kidani, Vice Chairs Chang and Kim, and members of both Committees,

I am Kimo Haynes, president of the Hawaii Petroleum Marketers Association ("HPMA"). HPMA is a non-profit trade association comprised of members who directly market liquid motor fuel products across the Hawaiian Islands. Our membership includes individuals and companies who operate as independent marketers, jobbers or distributors of petroleum products and who buy liquid motor fuel products at the wholesale level and sell or distribute products to retail customers, other wholesalers, and other bulk consumers.

Senate Bill 2904, Relating to the Sale of Tobacco Products, establishes a schedule of penalties for employees and holders of retail tobacco permits or persons registered to sell electronic smoking devices who illegally sell tobacco products and electronic smoking devices to persons under 21.

HPMA opposes SB 2904 because it goes too far by prohibiting the sale, distribution and marketing of all flavored tobacco products to persons of legal age.

HPMA fully agrees with stricter enforcement of laws that prohibit the sale and distribution of tobacco products to underage buyers. However, we ask that your Committee conform SB 2904 to language found in the House companion bill, HB 2348, Proposed HD 1 that is limited to prescribing penalties for employees of a retailer, permittees or registrants who violate subsection (1) or (4), or both, of §712-1258 Tobacco products and electronic smoking devices; persons under twenty-one years of age.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony.

VOLCANO Fine Electronic Cigarettes is the largest retailer & wholesaler of vapor products and vaping accessories in the State of Hawaii. We currently own and operate 15 locations statewide and employ over 110 full-time workers to support sales of our products not only here in Hawaii, but to all 50 states as well as over 30 International countries. We stand in opposition to SB2904 for the following:

- SB2904 falsely states, "Establishes a schedule of penalties for employees and holders of retail tobacco permits or persons registered to sell electronic cigarette smoking devices who illegally sell tobacco products and electronic smoking devices to persons under 21. Effective January 1, 2021." However, the verbiage of this bill is entirely related to the ban of the sale of flavored vaping products. The members of the Hawaii vape retailers would support bills that enact strict fines and enforcement measures to ensure vape products stay in their respective market of adults 21 and over pre federal and state laws.
- SB2904 would decimate the Hawaiian vapor industry by banning the sale of all electronic cigarette liquids and cartridges. Every electronic cigarette available on the worldwide market is "flavored." Because they do not contain tobacco, electronic cigarettes have no "natural tobacco" taste, or any taste for that matter, without the addition of flavorings. Even electronic cigarettes advertised as coming in "tobacco flavor" are actually just the result of the blending of several different flavorings such as caramel and nut flavors in an attempt to mimic the flavor of tobacco. As a result, SB2904 will act as a de facto ban of the manufacture and sale of all electronic cigarettes.
- Even if SB2904 permitted the sale of electronic cigarettes flavored to taste like tobacco, its enactment would still ban the manufacture and sale of the vast majority of our products. This bill would present more than just a competitive disadvantage for local suppliers and retailers. It would be a death knell for vapor industry in Hawaii. Local consumers will either flavor liquids themselves or purchase from out of state, causing a loss of jobs and tax revenues for the state. Similarly, we will be forced to close our stores and move all or most of our business and operations to the mainland, taking with us jobs and tax revenue that has grown every year since our founding.
- Enactment of SB2904 will deal a similar fate to our competitors in the electronic cigarette industry. Between them these businesses have likely created 1000 jobs in Hawaii.



All or more of these jobs will be lost as a result of this legislation. Additionally, convenience stores and other businesses that sell vapor products will feel the impact of consumers purchasing products from the mainland.

- The baseless claims that electronic cigarettes flavors are made to attract children must be weighed against the significant evidence that electronic cigarette flavors are very popular with adult users. The International Journal of Environmental Research and Public Research recently published the most expansive survey performed on the subject. We urge you to read the full text of this study, which we have attached to our testimony. Below are some highlights:
- Researchers conducted an Internet survey of over 4,500 adult electronic cigarette consumers. The participants' average age was 40 years old. The vast majority (90%) of those surveyed were ex-smokers, with the average respondent having been cigarette-free for approximately one year.
- Among the survey respondents, the most commonly used flavors were fruits, followed by sweets and tobacco.
- Those electronic cigarette users who were still smoking ("dual users") were actually more likely to use tobacco flavors than those vapers who had quit smoking.
- On a scale of 1-5, the average score given by the respondents for the importance of flavor variability in reducing or quitting smoking was 4 ("very important").
- Almost 50% of the respondents answered that a lack of flavor availability would increase their cravings for tobacco cigarettes and would decrease their chances of remaining abstinent from smoking.

- The use of flavorings in electronic cigarette liquids is one of the driving factors in helping prevent adult former smokers who switch to e-cigarettes from going back to traditional cigarettes. Most users report that after switching to electronic cigarettes and experiencing the pleasant tastes one can enjoy with an electronic cigarette, they no longer find the taste of traditional tobacco cigarettes appealing.
- Enactment of this bill will actually benefit Big Tobacco by stifling their competition. Analysts credit electronic cigarettes, not government intervention, nor traditional nicotine replacement therapy products, with causing cigarette sales to experience larger than forecasted declines in the U.S. and Europe. Regardless of the good intentions involved, every step taken to reduce adult access to electronic cigarettes is really a step towards protecting cigarette markets.
- SB2904 exempts traditional Nicotine Replacement Therapy (NRT) products that



contain nicotine even though electronic cigarettes have been shown to be a much more effective tool for helping people quit smoking and have been demonstrated to have a similar risk profile as NRT's.

- A recent study published by the New England Journal of Medicine concluded that **ECigarettes**
- are twice as effective for smoking cessation than traditional nicotine replacement therapy products which are not taxed or controlled the same way this bill proposes to tax and control E-Cigarettes. The state should be creating easier access for adult smokers to these products, not tighter regulations that steers current vapers back to tobacco cigarettes

- If flavors are not important in helping adult smokers switch from, or quit traditional cigarettes, why is GlaxoSmithKline's nicotine gum exempt from this bill and sold in flavors?





• SB2904 would not successfully remove all flavored e-liquid products from the market. It would simply force local customers to go online and purchase them from vendors across the 49 other states who would not be subject to this ban. It would severely impact local based businesses from competing with businesses from the 49 other states who would not be subjected to this law further lowering jobs and revenues already being created in the state. While we agree that curbing youth usage and enforcing our current laws prohibiting the sale and use of vapor products is of utmost importance, doing so at the detriment to adults who use these products every day as an alternative to traditional tobacco is not the right way to do it. This bill is not in the best interests of the State of Hawaii.

This legislation took freedoms away from adults, has failed horribly and has made the problem worse. Why hasn't any legislator spoken of this failed law? This bill will only hurt Hawaii business, take away peoples freedoms and open up the black market to flavored vapes. This is INSANE! A prime example is the fireworks ban how is that working? Prohibition does not work!
