Chair Nishihara, Vice Chair Wakai and Members of the Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, And Military Affairs.

My name is Everett Kaneshige and I am the Statewide Interoperability Coordinator with the Office of Homeland Security at the State Department of Defense. Thank you for the opportunity for our office to submit testimony in **SUPPORT** of SB 3000.

This measure creates a definition for a "telecommunications dispatcher" and further classifies these individuals as an "emergency worker" under section 707-700 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes.

Telecommunications dispatchers play a vital role in partnership with their in-the-field first responder colleagues including police, firefighters, emergency medical services and other public safety personnel. Often these individuals face situations where individuals are in a great amount of distress, harm, fear, or injury. Each of them is called upon to fulfill skills they have learned during extensive training where communications with individuals during a variety of situations means coaching their callers through first aid, collecting important information to relay to officers, and negotiating persons out of difficult situations.

Currently, telecommunications dispatchers are usually classified as an office and administrative support occupation. As a result, these skilled personnel cannot be hired at a level of pay and benefits commensurate with their level of training and expertise. This bill represents an important first step to recognize the importance and specialized functions that telecommunications dispatchers perform on a daily basis so that they can receive the compensation, benefits and recognition that they deserve as first responders.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony in Support of SB 3000.

Our office supports this measure as long as its implementation does not impact or replace the priorities set forth in the Executive Budget.

Dear Chair Nishihara and Members of the Committee:

The Maui Police Department strongly SUPPORTS the passage of S.B. No. 3000.

Telecommunications Dispatchers, otherwise known as Emergency Services Dispatchers (ESD), are placed in critical, life-saving situations on a daily basis. Their career is just as demanding as Emergency First Responders. They work hand-in-hand with police officers, firefighters and paramedics around the clock, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. They are literally the lifeline between the public and First Responders.

Multi-tasking is a crucial and essential element of a dispatcher's everyday duties. Dispatchers are classified into two categories, a call taker and a dispatcher, and they are trained and certified to fill both roles.

As a call taker, they are required to obtain all pertinent information from the caller. At times the caller remains on the phone line with them until the First Responder arrives on scene. For example, there are situations where the person on the line is in a state of panic and has a family member there who is unresponsive and not breathing. The dispatcher will need to first establish a dialogue with the caller and skillfully calm the caller down and at the same time talk the individual through administering CPR. This task requires extraordinary concentration and ability, as every second counts, while at the same time maintaining composure.

As a dispatcher, they provide critical information to first responders entering a scene. For example, in a situation where an armed robbery has just occurred, it is imperative that the dispatcher relay the correct information to the responding police officers, such as whether and what type of dangerous weapon was used in the commission of a crime. For obvious reasons, a dispatcher does not want an officer ambushed by a knife wielding, mentally unstable individual nor walk into a situation where gunshots are being fired.

Another arduous situation which dispatchers encounter involve a rapidly spreading residential fire. Dispatchers are required to pinpoint the exact location of the fire while handling multiple calls regarding the same incident or the calls may involve a different situation. Dispatchers would need to put the pieces of the puzzle together to determine what type of situation is occurring. Radio transmissions with the first responders and providing updates involving evacuation and road closures are also an essential part of their duties. Additional responding units and services with other agencies may also be required, which dispatchers are responsible for coordinating and dispatching.

The daily demand of a Telecommunications Dispatcher is clearly comparable to an Emergency Worker without a doubt. Therefore, it is imperative that the position of a Telecommunications Dispatcher be classified under the correct bargaining unit. This would enhance much needed recruitment and retention within this career field.

The Maui Police Department asks that you strongly SUPPORT the passage of S.B. No. 3000.

As a paramedic, I rely heavily on 911 dispatchers. They are my conduit to the pt before I arrive on scene. Their ability to assess the pts condition,ask questions that are relevant to past medical history and then determine the appropriate EMS response and then dispatch Medics, fire or police. This the most important aspect of the 911 system. Dispatchers must also inform all responding units of the address and any other relevant information that will assist units to get there fast and safe. While assisting responding units they are also calming the parent who is experiencing one of the most stressful days in their lives. Dispatchers are in the eye of the storm the are calming the terrified 911 caller and providing guidance to all EMS personnel who are also trying to get the pt. It 8s obvious to any person being dispatched by 911, that the person taking the 911 call requires a advanced skill set and knowledge base. Because of some archaic classification, 911 dispatchers are considered clerks. The definition of a clerk is "one employed to keep records or accounts or to perform general office work". We require polce, fire and ambulance personnel to all be certified to First Responder level as a minimum. The definition of First Responder is "among those responsible for responding immediately to the scene of an accident or emergency to provide assistance." Dispatchers are the first critical contact to any emergency system. They are the first, First Responders in EMS and deserve to be classified as such.

Support for S.B. No. 3000, Relating to Emergency Workers

My name is Davlynn Racadio and I have been with the Maui Police Department Emergency Communications Center for close to 33 years. I started my career as a 9-1-1 dispatcher, trainer, supervisor and currently an administrative supervisor assisting in Communications. Through my years of service, I have helped many people with medical issues, child birth, suicides, domestic violence, residential fires, brush fires that threatened entire towns and families. I have spoken to victims and responsibles, trying to calm down situations and all the time, keeping the police, fire and/or medics apprised of the situation. I draw mental pictures of what these people on the road will find when they reach the location they were assigned to. All responders need to be prepared mentally and physically on what they will see, hear, smell or feel. My job is to keep them safe so that they will be able to come home safely at the end of their shift.

When I took this job, I became a part of a family of men and women that report to work to help save lives and communities. We attend training to build our skills. We learn locations, mapping, laws, beats of the responders (police, fire and medics), learn their etiquette of their respective disciplines, added on to this, learning our Computer Aided Dispatch System (CADS) that each County builds to reflect their respective Island(s). We receive training on how to answer 9-1-1 calls, administrative calls and Text to 9-1-1. Added to this, there is the radio system that we learn so that we can send the appropriate units to the right location.

We utilize multiple applications and monitors to service Police, Fire, and Medics. We read various mapping systems and then we dispatch the Police, Fire or Medics or all of them. We call the electric, water or cable companies when they are needed. We call chaplains to the scene of a motor vehicle accident, to a residence where their loved one has passed on or to a family visiting Hawaii whose loved one drowned. We contact a Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) member to respond to cases when there is a mental health issue. And all of this is done in the background

Each County Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP or Communications Center) are the backup for the Emergency Management for their respective Islands. Since we are 24/7/365, there is always someone there to answer the call. We monitor their lines after hours and make the necessary callouts while they are sleeping.

Maui County is a central dispatch concept, we dispatch all units: Police, Fire and Medics. We work with our Federal partners, State & County agencies. We are certified in CPR and PowerPhone, giving us the ability to give pre-arrival medical instructions while responders are enroute. Each County has their own specifics related to them, unique to themselves and the community they serve.

But we are all one. We all work in Emergency Services. We work the same hours as the police patrol units. At this time, we are working 8, 12 or 16 hours shifts to support our Communications Centers. We are not clerks. The only item we have in common would be a phone and computer. A clerk is not a trained person able to talk someone down from wanting to hurt themselves and then making arrangements to get this person the help he needs. A clerk does not take a call from a boyfriend who just returned from work and found his girlfriend hanging and starts CPR process to see if we can help him bring her back to him.

On behalf of our Maui Police Department 9-1-1 Communications Center, please support S.B. No. 3000. Please recognize these people for the job that they do, every day. Without them, Police, Fire and Medics could not be dispatched. Every Communications Center is the heartbeat of their Department. They are the calm voices that answer the 9-1-1 phone calls and send the help that is needed. We are there when anyone needs us, 24/7/365.

Comments:

My name is Wendi-Liz P.TANCAYO-MEBILLE, Emergency Service Dispatcher II, employed by Maui Police Department – Molokai Communication PSAP for 26 years.

I'm testifying in favor of SB3000, Relating to Emergency Workers.

As a Telecommunications Dispatcher for 26 years, we at the Molokai Communications PSAP answer all the Non-emergency, Emergency calls and Dispatch various emergency units – Police, Fire and Medical at a given time with only one Emergency Service Dispatcher on duty. As a Emergency Service Dispatcher, we have various duties as a dispatcher from calling taking – Non-Emergency to Emergency Calls, combination of police, fire and medical emergency dispatcher while using the 9-1-1 automatic system, utilizing lifesaving procedures, obtaining important information and analyzing information from the caller and utilizing a specialized mapping system to send the appropriate and closet available emergency unit and to assist the caller with any actions prior to the arrival of the first responder. At a given time, at the Molokai Communication PSAP is operational with only one Emergency Service Dispatcher.

As a single dispatcher on duty, there has been a time when I had two emergency at the same time. Having taken a call from a juvenile female saying, her grandmother is unresponsive, doesn't know how to do CPR and willing to do CPR while emergency units respond to her residence. While instructing the CPR procedure to the caller and dispatching the appropriate units to the residence, I received an emergency call of a male shooting a firearm at a farm tractor with one occupant within. Having to put the juvenile female on hold and reassuring her I will return to her call as there is another emergency.

Gathering the information from the caller on the shooting incident who wasn't at the scene but received the call from the tractor operator. With limited information of the suspect, type of firearm being used and only of the exact location is the only information that was able to dispatch to the responding units. Having to go between both emergency calls is a task that is not easy but must be done as you are an emergency service dispatcher whether there is one or more of you.

As an Emergency Service Dispatcher – Telecommunications Dispatcher, I strongly in favor of SB3000, Relating to Emergency Workers, we do the work of the as related Emergency Workers and not as Clerk – Clerical.

I urge the committee to pass SB3000. Thank you for this opportunity to testify.

- Operate a multi-line telephone console system, alerting system, and TDD system for the deaf and hearing-impaired
- Determine and assign the level of priority of the call and enter the data into a computer-aided dispatch system
- Perform emergency medical dispatch and crisis intervention services
- Ask vital questions and provide pre-arrival instructions for emergency medical calls
- Monitor and operate a radio console and computer equipment
- Receive and respond to a variety of emergency and non-emergency services and complaints
- Ask questions to interpret, analyze and anticipate the caller's situation as to resolve problems, provide information, dispatch emergency services, or refer callers to other agencies
- Dispatch and coordinate the responses of public safety agencies
- Identify appropriate number and type of equipment or apparatus to dispatch

Training lasts for over a year the attrition rate is horrendous in every dispatch center in the State of Hawaii. The responsibility, level of expectation, stress, and difficulty of the job are excessive. If any position deserves to be considered an emergency responder, our dispatcher deserve it.

I support senate bill 3000 on behalf of being a first responder for emergency response. I have been employed with Hawaii County Fire Department for over 15 years. I have worked as a state certified EMT/Firefighter and a State certified and Nationally registered Paramedic. Protecting our dispatchers is important as they truly are the "First Responders." They receive the call first, they deal with the distress of the caller in need. Sometimes, the call may be a minor injury ie sprained ankle sorts injury. Radio dispatchers need to instruct the caller, calm the caller down, take hatred curse remarks because the caller wants an ambulance but dispatch needs to ask protocol questions that a terrified caller wont care about ex. name, location, age, callback number etc. Dispatchers take a great deal of the work load so i support SB 3000 because our radio dispatchers need to be classified as first responders and they need the liability protection that we as first responders deserve.

RE: I support SB3000, section 707-700, Hawaii Revised Statues, amending the definition of "emergency worker".

I respectfully request that clarification is provided so that this amendment does not include 911 dispatcher EROs aka switchboard operators who receive initial calls only to transfer them to telecommunication dispatchers. The job duties of 911 Emergency Response Operators (EROs) do not require use of any specialized training or skillsets, robust lifesaving procedures and technologies to complete. Hence, inclusion of 911 EROs into SB3000 // HB2474 as "emergency workers" will only hinder further progression towards our status as 911 First Responders for Police Radio Dispatchers.

As a public servant of the City and County of Honolulu for 15 years, I continue to proudly serve our community as a telecommunications Police Radio Dispatcher with the Honolulu Police Department.

Currently our union has us classified as "secretaries and clerical workers", which by no means is accurate considering the length of background checks and scutiny it takes to get hired, along with the amount of specialized training and skillsets required to perform our job.

Less the physical fitness portion of hiring Honolulu police officers, we, Police Radio Dispatchers undergo the same hiring process. This process takes months to complete and includes a pass or fail civil service exam, indepth background checks, credit checks, psychological exams lasting anywhere between 4 to 6 hours, personal history questionaires which ask for information about our families, addresses, employment and educational history, alcohol and drug use, criminal records and the ability to perform secretarial/clerical tasks, to name a few. The psychological portion of this hiring process also includes a one on one interview at a later date with a police psychologist who basically sizes you up, analyzing all informaton submitted in order to see if you are fit for duty and have what it takes to perform the job. Towards the tail end of this

process, we are scheduled a clarification interview with a police detective and given a polygrah exam to ensure truthfulness and accuracy.

Having successfully completed the "job interview" process, one is now hired and set for a year's worth of classroom and on the job training. Our City and County job description states, "receives extensive training in the methods and procedures for police radio dispatching and performs a variety of difficult clerical work in conjunction with police communications activities. Receives training in the use of computerized police telephone and radio dispatching equipment; receives telephone complaints and other requests for police assisance from the public, elicits and summarizes necessary facts. Operates a computer-aided dispatch (CAD) system, mapping system, and multiple video display terminals and coordinate communications between the public, police units in the field, and other communications personnel independently. Deals directly and verbally with public and on-duty police officers in what may be life-threatening situations, while at the same time inputting the information received into a computer via keyboard. As police radio dispatchers, we must be able to handle tasks in rapid succession, communicate clearly and make sound decisions under stressful conditions. We are required to work during natural disasters and other major events and incidents."

As you can see, telecommunications dispatchers aka police radio dispatchers are by no means your average secretaries. Using multiple life saving procedures and technologies to obtain critical information from the public, we are able to service our communites. We are the first emergency workers to make contact with you. We are the voice of reason during the storm. We are 911 First Responders.

Tragic, heartbreaking and forever imprinted in my mind. When I handled a call from a young man that shot himself after his girlfriend and mother of his children left their residence, pleading for me to save his life because he didn't want to die. They are as essential any other first responder and in most cases, they are the first to respond. We would not be able to do our jobs without them. I have always considered them emergency workers and I believe the legal definition should as well.



COMMENTS RE: SB3000/HB2474 Relating to Emergency Workers

Senators and Representatives:

While I provide testimony only on my own behalf and do not intend to represent any agency or entity, it is relevant that I have been an EMS provider since 1992.

This type of measure is long overdue, and I heartily support it. 9-1-1 telecommunicators are truly the 'first' first responders. In a medical emergency, 9-1-1 telecommunicators quickly establish incident location, callback number, and whether the patient is awake and/or breathing normally. Based on those findings, they immediately dispatch the appropriate level of response. Subsequently, they gather additional information, and provide pre-arrival and post-dispatch instructions that can be life saving. These include critical instructions on bleeding control, relieving choking, providing CPR, or even talking someone through emergency childbirth. They also protect responders like me by providing information about potential threats or hazards on or around the scene.

Hawaii's 9-1-1 telecommunicators have a long tradition of service, but have been terribly under-recognized. In addition to my work as a paramedic, twice during my career I cross-trained as an Emergency Medical Dispatcher (EMD). As much respect and appreciation the EMDs may afford me as a paramedic, I hold them in equal esteem. Their job is incredibly challenging, and the physical distance between them and the patient can be stressful in a unique way, different but no less weighty from the stressors that face me on the scene. In 2006, I served as the EMD Coordinator for another state that realized and legislated the need for increased professional recognition and support of EMDs. Before returning to Hawaii, I helped them establish training curricula, a statewide EMD protocol, and licensing standards.

Fast forward 14 years, and here in Hawaii a federal review of Hawaii's Emergency Medical Services (EMS) system was just published in 2020. While site visitors from NHTSA's Office of EMS commended various aspects of our EMS system, they had some strongly worded observations and recommendations. The NHTSA auditors noted that Hawaii's "current EMS system appears more focused on the provision of ambulance transport. There are many more elements to a comprehensive EMS system . . . and [it] should be expanded with inclusion of dispatch [and other assets]." The report went on to recommend that Hawaii, like these other states, license EMD centers as EMS agencies and their personnel as state EMDs.

This measure is a simple but important first step in the type of improvements in professional recognition, support, and advancement needed for our 9-1-1 centers and their personnel who provide the backbone for EMS, Fire, and Law Enforcement response. Thank you for your consideration.

As an Operations Battalion Chief with Hawaii Fire Department, however, I witness on a daily basis the critical role that our Emergency Dispatchers play in the emergency response system. They are far more than just support or clerical staff. The decisions that dispatchers make not only impact the lives of the callers, but the lives of first responders as well. At any given moment, they could be rerouting critical lifesaving resources to a difficulty breathing call, or providing instructions for cardio-pulmonary resuscitation, or filtering out and providing our response units with information that could prevent them from walking in to a potentially life-threatening situation.

Initial and ongoing training is a vital part of a 911 dispatcher's career, and these requirements clearly demonstrate that dispatchers must possess a level of knowledge and education that far exceeds what is generally required of administrative personnel. This is a specialized position that requires skilled professionals to use extensive training to make quick decisions in life or death situations.

I strongly urge the legislature to the adopt the language as stated in item 7, Section 1 "Emergency Worker" definition in SB3000.

Aloha,

I would like to thank all the House and Senate members who have taken the time to entertain this Bill.

My name is Albert Battease and I am a Supervising Police Radio Dispatcher with the Honolulu Police Department. I am currently assigned to the 3rd watch as an Operations Supervisor.

I am a retired veteran who served in the U.S. Army for 15 years. When I retired in 1994 I was looking for a job where I could still serve the public. A family member told me about the "Dispatch" position within the Honolulu Police Department. I applied and started as a Police Radio Dispatcher in December of 1995 and was promoted to Supervising Police Radio Dispatcher in April of 2002.

Like most people I had a preconceived notion of what being a dispatcher entails. Answer a 911 call, type the information into a computer and send an officer. That is the basics of the job in a nutshell but it is so much more. The number of computer systems you need to operate in the job, the plethora of programs and data bases, and all the codes needed would surely separate us from an ordinary clerk position. But when you add in the stress of being the first contact that people have when they are calling 911 for an emergency our position is clearly unique. I wish I had a dollar for every time an officer has told me over the years that he or she could not do our job. (I would probably be able to retire earlier than the 30 years required).

We truly are the ultimate first responders. We are the first contact that the public has with Law Enforcement when they call 911. Telecommunicators are responsible for calming the caller and obtaining all the vital information needed while ensuring the caller that help will be sent. While not every call is considered a life threatening in-progress call, we still take nearly 2,000 calls a day for police assistance. We all have those calls that have stood out with us throughout our career. My most memorable one that still haunts me from time to time happened years ago before I was promoted. I was working an evening shift and got a call from girl who was about 9-10 years old. She had gathered her 2 younger siblings and was hiding in a closet as her Dad was beating on their mother. As she was on the line with me the father had stabbed the mother. All I

could think of was these poor kids who had now just lost both their parents. But, there was no time to dwell on it right away because there were other calls waiting to be answered.

As a supervisor, I have been working when several tragic incidents have occurred. Including the most recent loss of two of our finest. When these events are happening you go into auto-pilot mode and make sure everything you are responsible for is being done as well as anticipating what those on the scene will need. Throughout the entire situation is unfolding you are checking on the calltakers and dispatchers to ensure they are holding it together to get the job done. Unfortunately the feelings don't go away after you leave for the day. As you all can see this is no ordinary clerk job we are first responders who deal with so much more. The cumulative emotional stress of the job alone separates us. All of this is being done with the expectation that we are responsible for asking all those right questions knowing in the back of our mind that every call can be subpoenaed and/or released to the media. Perhaps the harder thing is dealing with the irate public that no matter how polite you are or how well you try to explain things to them will never be satisfied and will yell and cuss at us. We are expected to maintain our professional demeanor. This is truly tested at times as we are all human and no one likes to be yelled and cussed at for something they have no control over.

I feel this Bill is a positive step forward in giving recognition to all the telecommunicators out there for all their hard work and the special talent that it takes to be able to handle all the demands that come along with the job.

I suport S.B NO. 3000

I'm in favor of S.B NO. 3000 .I believe that the Emergency Response Operator (911 operators) can be dropped from the language because they are not specialized like the other positions listed. The ERO only answer the 911 calls and transfer to the specialized personnal of Police, Fire, or EMS. They do not enter any case for service.

I have been a police Dispatcher for Honolulu Police Department for twenty years. In my years of service, I've handled homicides ,shooting ,stabbing, home invasions, robberies, kidnapping, missing children , and an array of other type of cases. I receive calls for police service and need to determine what other types of service is needed at a scene whether it is fire or ems co response. We are the critical link between the public and the police.

While handing the call for service I have to use specific skills learned during a year long training. I have to get the information a caller is giving into the computer and send to the radio in less than a minute. We often have cases where a critical incident or time sensitive situation is going on and we need to get emergency assistance to the scene as soon as possible. Once we have assistance on the way we often have to continue to stay on the phone with the caller for in progress cases to get additional information for injuries, suspect information, and weapons. This information is critical for the safety of the agencies responding. During your shift you never know what kind of in progress case you going to have, where you are going to have to stay on the phone with the caller. I have had homicide suspects calling in they have just killed someone, people threating to jump off building or over passes, children calling that a grandparent isn't breathing, and people calling a suspect broke in the house & is still there. There are so many that we handle daily.

When working on the radio section we need to maintain the status of between 15 till 50 units (officers) depending on district and what type of incident is going on. You need to multitask, talk, type & listen all while units are talking and often running checks. Need to make sure all-important information is being correctly entered and time stamped while

its occurring. Need to make sure you are giving responding units (officers) any additional information that is coming in verbal or via computer message.

Police Radio Dispatchers work 24/7 365 days a year. We are subject to consistently forced overtime on top of the volunteer overtime. We have to work during all emergencies. These are a few that I have had to work thru, hurricane, tsunamis, earth quakes, island wide power outages, phone service outage and ballistic missiles attacks.

The same hiring process Police officers go thru to become an officer is the same process a Police Radio Dispatchers goes thru. Those include a performance exam, personal history statement, back ground checks, criminal history checks, credit checks, psychological evaluations (written & verbal), polygraph test, medical exam, and a drug test.

This job is extremely hard to do. We have continuous recruitment, and many find the nature of work too hard and emotional draining to pass the one-year long training.

The Honolulu Police Department handles about one million calls for service yearly. The Communications center takes over 2000 calls a day. We have about ninety Police Radio Dispatchers and about 35 openings.

- Operate a multi-line telephone console system, alerting system, and TDD system for the deaf and hearing-impaired
- Determine and assign the level of priority of the call and enter the data into a computer-aided dispatch system
- Perform emergency medical dispatch and crisis intervention services
- Ask vital questions and provide pre-arrival instructions for emergency medical calls
- Monitor and operate a radio console and computer equipment
- Receive and respond to a variety of emergency and non-emergency services and complaints
- Ask questions to interpret, analyze and anticipate the caller's situation as to resolve problems, provide information, dispatch emergency services, or refer callers to other agencies

Our dispatch center is a constant high stress environment moving at a fast pace to handle bad situations at any and all times of the day. The job itself has evolved over at least the last decade from an operator that answered a phone to gather information and relay to responding units, to a specialist that needs multiple skills and wear several hats in order to provide the best care until help arrives. Tasks that our dispatch personnel include:

- Operate a multi-line telephone console system, alerting system, and TDD system for the deaf and hearing-impaired
- Determine and assign the level of priority of the call and enter the data into a computer-aided dispatch system
- Perform emergency medical dispatch and crisis intervention services
- Ask vital questions and provide pre-arrival instructions for emergency medical calls
- Monitor and operate a radio console and computer equipment
- Receive and respond to a variety of emergency and non-emergency services and complaints
- Ask questions to interpret, analyze and anticipate the caller's situation as to resolve problems, provide information, dispatch emergency services, or refer callers to other agencies
- Dispatch and coordinate the responses of public safety agencies
- Identify appropriate number and type of equipment or apparatus to dispatch

Our dispatchers deserve to be considered an emergency responder. They are the first contact that a patient, friend, family member or good Samaritan talks to when there is trouble, and they need to be able to collect much needed information and provide help as best as possible while maintaining their own composure until responding units arrive on the scene. As a Police Sergeant and current supervisor for the Kauai Police Department Communication Section for nearly 8 years, I am in support of the proposed HB2474.

911 Is the most universally known phone number across the Country. When someone is in need of police, fire or medical services the VERY FIRST person to provide assistance is the dispatcher. They are the unseen, often forgotten calming voice in the midst of chaos and crisis. They often walk callers through CPR instructions to save a loved one's life even before medical personnel arrival. They might even help deliver a new born child, and more often than we want to think they become the person a child can count on when a family member is being abused. They hear cries for help along with and the sigh of relief when the field responder arrives. Without our dispatcher the field first responders would NEVER arrive. Without our dispatchers the safety of our field responders would be in jeopardy. Without our dispatchers those seconds of survival for our callers before the field responder's arrival would be lost. Every day that at dispatcher sits at a console is a potential day that they too just might save a life just like a police officer, paramedic, or fireman.

As a telecommunications dispatcher for police, fire and medical personnel each dispatcher must overcome approximately six (months) of classroom and on the job training. During their training, they must become proficient in multiple state, county and federal software applications. They must also maintain multiple training certifications in order to provide Emergency Medical techniques used to assist in emergencies to provide over the phone triage prior to medical and fire personnel arrival. They are also

required to memorize various codes and laws in order to properly classify incoming crimes all the while making sure that our field responders arrive at the proper location.

There are countless scenarios that could describe why dispatchers should be recognized as emergency workers. Recognizing that they are no longer merely clerical staff is imperative. They deserve the recognition and I believe we owe it to each and every dispatcher to support and pass the proposed bill.

Recently in 2019, the State of California and Texas have passed and are now recognizing Dispatchers as "First Responders" allowing for both higher pay and access to training they were previously not afforded. Like California and Texas, Hawaii, Massachusetts and Kentucky are proposing similar bills to recognize dispatchers as first responders. This is an opportunity for Hawaii Law Makers to support the many men and women throughout the state who has answered the call and will continue to answer our calls no matter how big or small.

Good Afternoon Senators

I understand that this is in the Senate and has Passed the House. Can you check and see what the status is today.

Every day, in 9-1-1 centers throughout the country, Public Safety Telecommunicators provide lifesaving emergency medical instruction, deal with suicidal persons, assess scene safety for arriving responders, and have a critical role for active shooter incidents, building collapse, officer down, firefighter maydays, and a variety of other emergencies. Reclassifying these professionals as Protective Service Occupations has broad support from the 9-1-1 community and others familiar with the lifesaving work of Public Safety Telecommunicators.

By way of background, federal agencies rely on the Standard Occupational Classification, a vast catalog of I understand that a bipartisan effort is underway to recognize the valuable work of our nation's 9-1-1 call-takers and dispatchers (collectively known as Public Safety Telecommunicators). The federal government currently classifies these occupations as administrative/clerical in nature, which is inaccurate and a disservice to the lifesaving work and dedication of these professionals. Congresswoman Norma Torres (D-CA) and Congressman Brian Fitzpatrick (R-PA) are seeking support for a bill that would fix the federal classification by appropriately grouping Public Safety Telecommunicators with other "Protective" occupations. I respectfully ask that you support the 9-1-1 SAVES Act, a simple zero-cost legislative fix. Public Safety Telecommunicators should be categorized as Protective Service Occupations, which includes a broad range of "protective" occupations: lifeguards, fish and game wardens, parking enforcement workers, firefighters, and playground monitors, among others. Reclassification is common sense, and about getting Public Safety Telecommunicators the recognition they deserve for the work they do every day to protect and save the lives of the public and first responders.

Dear Senator Moriwaki,

We are Michael & Bonnie Kim and we both work as Police Radio Dispatcher's II with the Honolulu Police Department. We are writing this letter to support Senate Bill #3000 relating to Emergency Workers. We have a 39 combined years of service. This is an attendance critical position which requires each of our three watches to have a minimum number of employees to operate. When this number falls below that requirement (due to sick calls, personeel on vacation, injuries, etc) the previous watch personnel based on how many are needed could be mandated to stay for an additional four hours. This situation has been going on at least since we started working. We are also required to be mandated to work during natural diasters. The most recent in August 2018 when Hurricane Lane was posing a threat to the island of Oahu. We were told to be prepared to stay at the main police station, possibly for days if Oahu took a direct hit. There is no way that this position can be categorized as a "clerical worker"

Besides the position being attendance critical, there are many duties that we perform that keep the public safe on Oahu. A dispatcher must call upon their experience and training to decipher what needs to be done to render aid to the caller within seconds of picking up the phone line and skillfully relay this information to the Police Officers with our complex computer system.

*The kind of stress that Police Radio Dispatchers experience is not something the kind of stress that everyday people deal with. It has been said that we experience PTSD. This results after years of helping callers and officers who are experiencing difficult situations. We answer the phone calls not knowing what is coming on the other end. Sometimes it's silence and crying, people screaming and the sounds of someone getting beaten, a suicidal person asking for help & hoping the officer gets there in time or gunfire. This goes on for hours, days, weeks, years and a career. Cumulative stress can affect work performance, work attendance, personal relationships and social relationships, in addition to causing physical illness. A dispatcher is a first responder.

Police Radio Dispatchers are the life line to our Police Officers. We are at the other end of the radio for whatever they need. Recent events of January 19, 2020 have proved that our Police Radio Dispatchers are a vital link to our officers.

Police Radio Dispatchers exhibit extraordinary communication and computer skills while under extreme pressure and still remain calm and do our job. We work short handed and still manage to make sure every call gets answered, every transmission from an officer gets acknowledged.

We are Police Radio dispatchers. We are Emergency Workers. We are First Responders.

RE: I support S.B. NO. 3000 Section 707-700, Hawaii Revised Statutes, amending the definition of emergency worker to include telecommunications dispatchers.

In August of 2019, I began working in Communications for the Honolulu Police Department. Prior to being hired, I had the incorrect notion that I would just answer phone calls and type whatever the caller says. Naturally, that is what most people assume when they think of us. After all, that is why we are considered clerical workers or secretaries instead of what we truly are -- emergency responders. Literally, we are the very first, first responder. We are the essential link between the caller needing assistance and the responding police officers. I quickly learned that dispatching is much more than answering phones and inputting data, which is why an entire year of training is required. Let me share a few things that I learned about police dispatching in hopes that you would also support us to be considered emergency workers.

First of all, the hiring process is lengthy, which is expected considering we are employees of a police department. We go through the exact hiring process as our police officers, except for the physical test. We take a pass-or-fail performance exam to ensure that we meet basic requirements, such as the ability to multitask and type. If we pass, we fill out a Personal History Statement which includes, but is not limited to, information about our families, prior addresses, employment and educational history, any drug-use or criminal record history, and more. Then we meet with a Detective for a clarification interview and are sent to get fingerprinted. We are subjected to a credit check, a handwritten psychological exam that can last anywhere between 4-6 hours, a psychological interview to review our answers to the exam, a polygraph exam to ensure we didn't lie during any of the steps in the process, and a drug test.

Once hired, new dispatchers train for ten weeks in a classroom environment where we learn the basics of call-taking, then we train on-the-job for a month on each of the three shifts. Then we go back to class to learn how to dispatch police officers, and back onto the floor for hands-on experience for each shift. I quickly gained respect for dispatchers because of all of their different responsibilities. Our work is not easy -- my training class began with four people and I am the only one left. Not only is it difficult to fill these positions, but keeping them filled is challenging. Since our work deals with public and police officer safety, we need a minimum amount of people working at a time, so if we drop below that minimum we have mandated overtime and can be forced to stay an additional four hours.

There are four different positions that we rotate: radio dispatcher, non-emergency or emergency call taker, and administrative roles (commonly referred to as Backroom). In the Backroom, we assist either the town or country radio operators with different service requests,

update Law Enforcement (LE) files for stolen/towed vehicles or missing/wanted people, and answer calls from police officers or even media stations. Some requests from the radio operators could be to notify a caller of a delay in police response, to contact different agencies for things like dead animal pick-up, fallen trees blocking roadways, low-hanging wires, or to request a coresponse from the fire department or emergency medical services. We also receive phone calls from tow companies because they need to notify us prior to towing any vehicle for trespassing; we need to verify that the car is not stolen/wanted and that it matches the Motor Vehicle Registration information. We also update files for repossessed or abandoned vehicles. When police officers call the Backroom, they may ask us for their report numbers, what time that they arrived or departed at a particular location, when they made a positive ID on a suspect, and more.

We answer phone calls from the public for a variety of reasons: noise complaints, nuisance complaints, car accidents, arguments, stabbings, shootings, suspicious activity and lots more. We memorize over a hundred Incident Type Codes (ITCs) in order to classify the call so that responding police officers know what to expect. For example, we have different codes for an argument, a family argument, a non-family argument and an argument between a landlord and tenant. There's even a difference between a basic noise complaint, a loud party, a vehicle noise, animal noise and construction noise. Sometimes callers say that they were robbed but, by our definitions, it was a theft or burglary. If the caller says they were robbed, we need to ask if a weapon or physical force was used. If they say they were burglarized, we need to verify if the item was taken from an enclosed space. If the item was taken from a vehicle, then it's considered Unauthorized Entry into a Motor Vehicle (UEMV). We need to send the case out effectively and efficiently because sometimes lives are on the line. Other times, there's no one on the phone line but the phone connection is open. During these "open-line" situations, we try to use our mapping system, Intrado, to get a location of the caller while listening for any background noise that may signal someone in distress, such as heavy breathing, scuffling or yelling.

Oahu is divided into eight police districts. There is only one radio operator for each district. The radio operator documents majority of the transmissions that come in from the police officers and they sometimes speak in rapid succession and request for things all at once. Police officers ask their radio operators to run checks on the people that they are with. The radio operator needs to efficiently inform the officer if the person has any warrants or arrest history. It's important for the police officer's safety because someone with a warrant may run away or resist arrest, and an arrest history can tell the officer if the person has a history of abuse, carrying a concealed weapon, driving under the influence, and more. Some other checks are seeing if a vehicle is reported stolen, if someone has registered firearms, if they have a valid Hawaii driver's license or out-of-state driver's license, if they are a registered sex offender, or to see if they are wanted for a crime in another state using the National Crime Information Center (NCIC). We have access to NCIC, which is managed by the FBI for law enforcement agencies. NCIC users need to receive certification every two years. We also have access to the Criminal Justice Information Center (CJIS) and Juvenile Justice Information Center (JIIS).

Our Communications Division also operates as Oahu Warning Point and assists the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency and Department of Emergency Management with announcements from the National Warning System and National Weather Service. We receive weather announcements, track nearby hurricanes and assist with the monthly emergency sirens.

Lastly, if any type of local or national emergency were declared, we would be required to work just like police officers, fire fighters and emergency medical services. If there was a bomb or fire threat against us, we would be one of the last divisions to evacuate. Despite all of this, we are not considered "essential" personnel.

Please amend S.B. NO.3000 Section 707-700 to include telecommunications dispatchers.
