Chair Wakai, Vice Chair Taniguchi and members of the Committee. The Hawaii State Energy Office (HSEO) supports SB 3005 with amendments, which appropriates funds for Fiscal Biennium 2019-21 as it relates to BED 120 special fund and trust fund ceilings.

The adjustments for BED 120 are necessary for the HSEO to carry out its mission to promote energy efficiency, renewable energy, and clean transportation to help achieve a resilient clean energy decarbonized economy. An increase of the special fund ceiling will allow the HSEO to pay Special Fund Assessments for fiscal years 2020 and 2021, provide support for the Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Commission and the Greenhouse Gas Sequestration Task Force, and fund projects that promote and advance energy efficiency, renewable energy, and greater energy security and resiliency. A trust fund ceiling would serve the Volkswagen Environmental Mitigation Trust funds to implement eligible mitigation actions which aim to reduce vehicle emissions and provide solutions for clean transportation.

The HSEO respectfully requests the addition of \$65,000 (MOF A) to cover an anticipated payroll shortfall for a variance which resulted when an Energy Program Specialist position was re-described and filled with the Chief Energy Officer prescribed by Act 122, SLH 2019.

The Office of Planning (OP) **supports** SB3005, <u>specifically</u>, the Greenhouse Gas Sequestration Task Force's request to appropriate \$200,000 out of BED 120, the Energy Security Special Fund (ESSF), for the Greenhouse Gas Sequestration Task Force (GHGSTF), as directed by the Legislature in Act 122 SLH 2019.

The Legislature established the Greenhouse Gas Sequestration Task Force within OP in 2018 through Act 15 (Chapter 225P-4) to undertake five specific tasks to increase sequestration of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gas emissions within Hawaii's agricultural and natural environment.

The Task Force has 21 members who are committed to supporting research to establish a baseline, short- and long-term benchmarks, and criteria of soil health and increased product yield and quality and other benefits of soil health, agro-forestation, and use of compost, such as climate resiliency, and cooling urban areas.

The Task Force has initiated three studies with funds from FY2019, but did not receive funding in FY2020. The Task Force is requesting the Legislature's assistance to appropriate funds for FY2021 to continue the work plan mandated by the Legislature.

The Hawaii Technology Development Corporation (HTDC) supports SB3005 as it relates to appropriating funds to support the programs of the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation.

As part of HTDC's vision to create 80,000 new innovation jobs in Hawaii earning \$80,000 or more by 2030. HTDC supports initiatives aimed at promoting technology and innovation jobs. SB3005 appropriates \$1,000,000 for HTDC's Hawaii SBIR program, \$500,000 for the Manufacturing Assistance Program, \$300,000 for the Accelerator (excelerator) program, and \$36,000 for operations. Last session, these core HTDC programs were appropriated the same amounts but only for FY20. HTDC has administered these programs since 2016.

HTDC believes, at the very minimum, continuation of our existing programs is essential for growing the innovation economy. The programs have a proven track record and every year there are more qualified applicants than available funds.

For the Hawaii SBIR phase 2/3 program, in FY19, six out of the 12 applications were funded. \$4.5 million was requested and \$1.425 million was awarded. The applicants brought \$11.0 million of Federal SBIR awards into the State. The reported economic impact of the HSBIR program for 2018 was \$150 million with 589 jobs in Hawaii. For the MAP program, in FY19, 37 out of 69 applicants were funded. \$1.3 million was requested and \$898 thousand was awarded. The companies invested \$13.5 million. The reported impact of the MAP program for 2018 was \$748 million with 2.387 jobs in Hawaii. With the \$500k available in FY20, fewer companies will be awarded and the amounts will be lower. For the accelerator programs, 5 accelerators were funded in FY19. The accelerators were required to provide a minimum of a 1:1 match. All applicants exceeded the minimum requirement. HTDC comments that FY20 awards for all the programs will be made soon. HTDC believes increased funding for all 3 programs would be appropriate. The additional funding for operations would allow HTDC some capacity to host events and activities at the Entrepreneurs Sandbox. The Sandbox facility hosts events almost every single day of the month. Because HTDC does not have dedicated budget to host activities there, very few events are sponsored by the State. HTDC believes applying more resource will accelerate the facility.

HTDC supports this bill as it aligns with the Executive Budget request. Thank you for the opportunity to offer these comments.

Premier Solutions HI LLC, a Honolulu-based, SBA-certified disadvantaged minority-owned and woman-owned small business writes to offer our SUPPORT of SB3005, which appropriates funds to the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism for supporting funding for Hawaii Technology Development Corporation programs: Small Business Innovation Research program, Manufacturing Assistance Program, Accelerator program, and HTDC.

Premier Solutions HI (PSHI) provides innovative IT solutions and services to Federal government customers such as the US Navy. PSHI has benefited greatly from the programs offered by HTDC such as the Hawaii SBIR matching grant and HTDC events. PSHI has grown from 8 full-time employees to over 65 FTEs in the past five years.

In 2017 PSHI was awarded our first Small Business Innovation Research contract from the Naval Supply Systems Command. Since then we have won more than \$2 million in SBIR funding, and an additional \$8 million in revenue from Navy customers. Using SBIR funding, PSHI has developed a military logistics IT system that is currently used by every vessel in the Navy Fleet, and we support that system worldwide from our headquarters in Honolulu.

We attribute our success with the Navy in large part to 2 things:

- 1) The creativity and knowledge of our Hawaii-based research, development and engineering team.
- 2) Hawaii Technology Development Corporation HSBIR Phase matching funds for our Phase I and Phase II efforts which allowed us to travel from Hawaii to our mainland-based Navy customers, build invaluable relationships with our Federal

sponsors, and develop product prototypes that exceeded our customer's expectations.

In 2019 we anticipate moving into Phase III production of our SBIR-developed technology, bringing additional Navy and DoD program funding to Hawaii. Production will involve light manufacturing and assembly of system components, and our plans involve engaging HTDC's assistance through the Manufacturing Assistance Program. Over the next few years, we plan to accelerate our growth and are looking to hire more Hawaii-based engineers, software developers, technicians and innovators.

Access to state SBIR matching funding for Phase II and Phase III efforts is vital to our strategy of attracting more SBIR funding and other Federally-funded projects to leverage our current success.

We are very thankful for the support provided by HTDC and the State of Hawaii, and respectfully ask that the legislature pass SB3005.

The HSBIR program provided by the State is valuable to me as an employee and program manager of a local technology firm and as a resident of the state.

Grants from the HSBIR program have helped us hire 3 developers in our 60-person tech company. I say helped because the grants have provided the funding to bridge between contracts without having to ask people to take time off. That means I can hire quality people and keep them even when DoD contracting is slow (as it always seems to be).

We also use the grant money to get more face-time mainland customers. My mainland competitors are able to drive or quickly "hop" in to see Navy people on the East and West coasts at a much lower cost. The SBIR grant money has helped level that playing field to a degree, allowing me to see the customer more often and get their interest. I'll be on a plane in three weeks to follow up on Navy interest in Hawaii-built software and solutions. Thank you HSBIR!

Grants from the SBIR program also represent another element of the State's efforts to reverse the "brain drain". We have hired an absolute hot-shot developer who was returning to the islands after working in the Seattle start-up scene, and we kept an excellent UH grad from leaving for the mainland. That's two successes directly fueled by the HSBIR program.

This is a good program. It helps us hire and maintain high-paying jobs in the state and be with our mainland customers more often. What's not to like about that?
