Chair Mizuno, Chair Ohno, and Members of the Committees:

My name is Christopher Fernandez, and I am the Executive Officer of the Board of Speech Pathology and Audiology (Board). The Board supports this bill.

The purposes of this bill are to: (1) establish a provisional license for speech pathologists; (2) specify the requirements for a provisional license; and (3) limit the validity of the provisional license to one year with the ability to renew the provisional license for an additional one year if needed to fulfill the requirements of Hawaii Revised Statutes section 468E-5.

This provisional license would allow candidates for licensure to practice under the guidance of an American Speech-Language-Hearing Association certified supervisor. The Board believes that this would enhance the quality of supervision and therefore ensure public safety. The Board also acknowledges that individuals who apply for the provisional license should be those working toward eligibility for permanent licensure. Thus, the Board agrees that the term of the provisional license should be for a one-year period, with a possible extension of an additional year.

The Healthcare Association of Hawaii (HAH), established in 1939, serves as the leading voice of healthcare on behalf of 170 member organizations who represent almost every aspect of the health care continuum in Hawaii. Members include acute care hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, home health agencies, hospices, assisted living facilities and durable medical equipment suppliers. In addition to providing access to appropriate, affordable, high quality care to all of Hawaii's residents, our members contribute significantly to Hawaii's economy by employing over 20,000 people statewide.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in **support** of SB 307 SD 1, Relating to Speech Pathology. There is a shortage of speech language pathologists (SLPs) to serve in medical settings, which is likely in part because Hawaii is in the minority of states that do not issue a provisional license. (There are 42 states that issue a provisional license, with one more state in the process of implementing the law.)

The reason that provisional licenses are important is because SLPs must complete a clinical fellowship for a year to obtain their Certificate of Clinical Competence. As noted, Hawaii is one of the few states that does not have a provisional or temporary license during that clinical fellowship year. Unfortunately, without that provisional license, these fellows cannot bill Medicare and some other insurance providers for patient services provided under the direct supervision of a licensed SLP. This means that there are fewer Hawaii-based opportunities for SLP fellows, who often then go to the mainland for their training. This law would help to provide more opportunities for students to get training in Hawaii-based settings and help to increase access to needed services.

I support SB 983 with amendments, to further expand the incentive program to include Speech-Language Pathologists (SLPs) and Audiologists employed by the State of Hawaii Department of Education (DOE). Teachers who seek to obtain National Board Certification complete a rigorous certification process, which is comparable to the national certification of Speech-Language Pathologists and Audiologists.

The Certificate of Clinical Competence, conferred by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA), is the national certification to demonstrate that a SLP or Audiologist has voluntarily met rigorous academic and professional standards in the fields of Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology, respectively. Speech-Language Pathologists have, at minimum: a Master's Degree from an accredited program, completed 400 hours of clinical practicum, passed a national Praxis exam, and completed a minimum of 36 weeks of a supervised clinical fellowship prior to achieving national certification with ASHA. Audiologists have, at minimum: a Doctoral Degree, from an accredited program, completed 1,820 hours of supervised clinical practicum, and passed a national Praxis exam. In order to maintain national certification, SLPs and Audiologists must complete a minimum of 30 contact hours of professional development for every three-year cycle.

Obtaining and maintaining this national certification demonstrates that a SLP or Audiologist possesses a high level of competency in the fields of Speech-Language Pathology or Audiology, which directly benefits students. Currently, across the state, there are severe shortages of SLPs and Audiologists to provide necessary habilitative and rehabilitative services in the areas of communication. In order to address these shortages, costly contractual employees are hired to fill these vacancies. Expanding this incentive program to include SLPs and Audiologists should assist in the recruitment and retention of highly qualified Speech-Language Pathologists and Audiologists to the State of Hawaii Department of Education.

Support for SB 307

Aegis Therapies, headquartered in Frisco, TX, is a provider of contract therapy services to patients in multiple states around the country, and proudly provides speech therapy services to patients in Hawaii. We strongly support SB 307.

Like other medical professionals, speech-language pathologists have to be licensed through a state licensing authority in order to practice their specialty. The licensing process helps to establish and maintain high standards for licensure candidacy and practice. It also assures the public that practitioners have been through a thorough vetting process that involves qualifying candidates through education, supervised experience and examination. A component of the academic training for all Speech-Language Pathologists to be credentialed for the American Speech-Language and Hearing Association is to complete a 9 month Clinical Fellowship Year (CFY).

SB 307 would permit properly trained speech language pathologists to provide services to patients under a provisional license of up to one year, but only under the supervision of a therapist appropriately licensed by the state of Hawaii. This measure would establish a Provisional License for speech language pathologists during their supervised clinical fellowship year. It will address the shortage of such professionals in today's market and provider quicker and more widely available access to speech therapy to Hawaiian patients. Hawaii is one of few states nationally that do not provide provisional licensure for speech language pathologists. Individuals needing to complete their Clinical Fellowship are often forced to migrate to the mainland to do because of the lack of provisional licensure in Hawaii.

Oversight and licensure of speech language pathologists in Hawaii is provided by the Board of Speech Pathology and Audiology. We understand that the Board was fully briefed on the provisions of this bill at their most recent meeting and does not oppose its passage.

The practice of speech language pathology in Hawaii and the patients receiving such services will be greatly enhanced by passage of this legislation, which does not require the expenditure of state dollars. We urge you to vote yes for SB 307.

Thank you for this opportunity to testify in **strong support** of SB 307 (Relating to Speech Pathology), which would provide a provisional license for speech-language pathologists during their clinical fellowship.

Currently, Hawai'i is one of the few states that do not offer licensure to Clinical Fellows, who are transitioning from being a speech-language pathology student to being a provider. When Clinical Fellows are not licensed, they are often not recognized as qualified clinicians for the purposes of reimbursement and are therefore unable to bill Medicare and most insurance companies.

The lack of a provisional license for Clinical Fellows also negatively impacts the shortage of speech-language pathologists here in Hawai'i, especially in the medical field, as recent graduates are more likely to look for jobs in states that offer licensure.
