SB 762 SD1 – RELATING TO AGRICULTURE EDUCATION

Chairs Woodson and Creagan, Vice Chairs Hashem, Perruso and DeCoite, and members of the House Committee on Lower and Higher Education and House Committee on Agriculture:

Thank you for this opportunity to testify on SB 762 SD1 relating to agriculture education and establishes and appropriates funds for the P-20 agriculture education coordinator position within the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa (UHM), College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR). This bill also outlines the duties of the coordinator and P-20 agriculture education working group. UHM/CTAHR supports with amendments the intent of this bill and we respectfully provide the following information to substantiate our position.

- Preschool through grade 20 (higher education) agriculture education is key to the development of future farmers and to a society that values and understands the vital role of agriculture, food, fiber, and natural resource systems in advancing personal, local, and global well-being and food security.
- UHM/CTAHR convened a working group under Senate Resolution 80 (2015) and developed a coordinated framework of support for preschool through post-secondary (P-20) agriculture education and a plan for implementation.
- The outcome of the working group was the consensus that a P-20 Agriculture Education Coordinator position is needed within UHM/CTAHR for the purpose of overseeing ongoing communication and collaboration of the P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group and spearheading the Implementation Plan that includes:

- Teacher Development: Teacher training in agriculture and food systems education at all levels (P-20) for those preparing to become teachers ("pre-service teachers"), as well as additional professional development for those already in classrooms ("in-service teachers").
- Curricular Integration: Integrating agriculture education into the core curriculum in all subject areas at all levels (P-20).
- Agriculture Educators: Helping to establish and fund positions at the state, community, and school levels that directly support teacher development and curricular integration around agriculture and food systems.

The report highlights the large number of organizations working in this area. What is evident is the amount of overlap and lack of coordination between organizations. More effective effort on this topic could be had if there was some level of coordination among groups; and this position could also seek to provide that. We fully agree with, and support, the amendment that this position be required to provide an annual report to the legislature.

We support the intent of this bill. CTAHR is pleased be the recipient of the position if that is the desire of the legislature. Our support is based on the condition the bill's passage be understood to be an addition to the budget priorities of the University of Hawai'i Board of Regents Approved Budget.

We also suggest two amendments to the budget based on the legislative intent:

<u>Amendment 1:</u> If the intent of the bill is to have this coordinator position for a period of two years, then the bill as written is appropriate. If the intent is for the position to be permanent, then it would be important to clarify that the P-20 agriculture education coordinator position is a permanent Administrative Professional Technical (APT) with UHM/CTAHR, and includes a position number.

<u>Amendment 2:</u> We suggest that an advisory group be formed from members of the P-20 resolution group that participated in the resolution, and that wrote the final report. The intent of the advisory group would be to provide oversight, suggestions, and evaluation of the programs developed by the coordinator.

Aloha Chairs Woodson and Creagan, Vice Chairs Hashem, Perruso and DeCoite, and Members of the Committees:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,900 farm family members <u>statewide</u>, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawaii Farm Bureau supports SB 762, SD1, which establishes and appropriates funds for the P-20 agriculture education coordinator position within the University of Hawaii at Manoa college of tropical agriculture and human resources and specifies the duties of the coordinator and P-20 agriculture education working group.

It is commonly known that the average age of a farmer in Hawaii is approximately 60 years old. For agriculture to be sustainable, and to produce more local crops we, as a society, must cultivate the next generation of farmers and ranchers.

The Hawaii Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, under then-Director Dwight Takamine's and then-HDOA Chair Russell Kokubun's leadership, undertook a series of facilitated meetings with farmers, ranchers, educators and a diverse group of stakeholders across the state between 2007 and 2011 to address Ag Labor. The Hawaii Agriculture Skill Panel Report was the result of the stakeholder meetings. The report made a number of recommendations, of which several common themes emerged. #1 of those themes was "Increasing youth education and training".

In 2013, the Hawaii State Legislature saw fit to establish the Agriculture Workforce Advisory Board via HB 749 of that year. This Board convenes, in part, to execute the recommendations of Hawaii Agriculture Skill Panel Report. This board established a program by which educators and school administrators can be exposed and incentivized to adopt existing broad-based agricultural curriculums. This is an important step toward the future of agriculture in Hawaii.

In 2015, Hawaii State Senate Resolution No. 80 requested that the UH-Manoa College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR) develop an "implementation strategy and recommendations for the creation of a statewide coordinated framework of support for P–20 agriculture education, including any proposed legislation." SR 80 sought to build upon the expertise of CTAHR and create a coordinated effort to address Ag education. It bears mentioning that CTAHR currently serves on the Ag Workforce Development Advisory Board.

Hawaii Farm Bureau suggests that a relationship continues with the existing Agricultural Workforce Advisory Board and the P-20 agriculture education working group.

The Hawaii State Teachers Association <u>supports SB 762, SD1</u>, relating to agriculture.

This purpose of this Act would be to establish and appropriate funds for 1 FTE P-20 agriculture education coordinator position within the University of Hawaii at Manoa College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources. It also specifies duties of the coordinator and P-20 agriculture education working group.

We need to restore the balance in our public educational system in Hawaii. Hawaii's Career and Technical Education programs need to be expanded to provide greater opportunity to prepare young people to design their own futures including those in agriculture. The agriculture workforce needs have changed over time, and expanding our ag-tech industry, including the addition of an agriculture education coordinator to help coordinate the changing agricultural needs for career development, such as sustainability, aquaculture, hydroponics, vertical farming, organic farming etc. According to the Hawaii Agriculture Skill Panel Report from the Workforce Development Council, the average age of Hawaii's commercial farmers is over 60 years old. Interest in agriculture is waning in our youth and this is worrisome to the industry and to the economy and selfsustainability of our state.

There is a common misconception that farming is a low-paying, low-skilled trade. Our youth need to understand that there are a variety of careers within the agricultural industry that need to be filled. They need more workers that are not only technical in nature, but also those who will help to solve the problems listed in the report such as developing new technology and developing ideas for innovation that are critical components to the growth and expansion of the agricultural

industry in Hawaii, especially in the areas of sustainability.

Passage of this bill would help provide a much needed Agriculture Educational Coordinator to help guide our youth to expand their knowledge and help them navigate the various opportunities within agriculture to gain the knowledge they need to pursue the ever expanding ag-tech career paths as a possible career choice.

Hawaii, like most states, is working toward the goal of getting their students 'college-and career-ready,' but CTE experts are concerned that what we mean by 'career-ready' is not always clear, and the supply of quality career-technical education programs has not kept pace with demand. Students must have several options available to them in order to explore a variety of career options, one of them being in innovation in agriculture. This bill supports these efforts.

According to a national study, The Shocking Truth About The Skills Gap (2015), only 25 percent of polled job seekers reported receiving career path in high school, and 41 percent said they wished they had received more guidance.

Because a robust education involves developing all aspects of learning for our everchanging world including the changes in agriculture, the Hawaii State Teachers Association asks your committee to <u>support</u> this bill.

Kōkua Hawai'i Foundation strongly supports SB762, which establishes and appropriates funds for the P-20 Agriculture Education Coordinator position within the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (UH CTAHR).

The Kōkua Hawai'i Foundation is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization that supports environmental education in the schools and communities of Hawai'i. Our 'ĀINA In Schools program is a farm to school initiative launched in 2006 that connects children to their local land, waters, and food to grow a healthier Hawai'i. We work directly with 23 O'ahu elementary schools that have implemented the program and have also trained an additional 500+ educators from over 250 schools and organizations from across the state in the use of our 'ĀINA garden, composting, and nutrition curricula. While most of our work has focused on K-6 students, we have seen a huge need for increased agricultural education resources and teacher training for educators reaching students from preschool through college.

SB762 SD1 puts forth the recommendations of the P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group as detailed in DC149: the Final Report on a Coordinated Framework of Support for Preschool Through Post-Secondary (P-20) Agriculture Education in Hawai'i pursuant to S.R. No. 80 (2015). To gather input and recommendations to respond to this resolution, CTAHR invited members stakeholder groups that address Agricultural Education (Ag Ed) to participate in a series of Work Group meetings and gathered a listing of existing P-20 Ag Ed programs.

The P-20 Agriculture Education Coordinator will focus on integrating agriculture education into pre-service teacher development programs for all levels (P-20) in order to produce a greater number of teachers, students, and citizens with an awareness of and interest in agriculture. The Coordinator would also continue to convene stakeholders through the P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group and facilitate curricular integration and the development of increased numbers of dedicated agriculture educators at the state, community, and school levels.

We are a part of the P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group and feel that CTAHR is the most appropriate entity to host the P-20 Agriculture Education Coordinator position. CTAHR has led the convening the Working Group with the support and oversight of the last three Deans. Being based at the University of Hawai'i, the Coordinator would be well positioned to work with both CTAHR and the College of Education to strengthen preparation and retention of teachers focusing on agriculture education.

We urge you to vote in support of SB762 SD1 to help strengthen agriculture education and in turn, increased food security and self-sufficiency for Hawai'i.

My name is Keith Ideoka and I am an Agriculture Teacher and FFA (Future Farmers of America) Advisor at Lahainaluna High School. As a high school ag teacher for 30 years, I have experienced many ups and downs in my long career. In the years prior to when WSF (Weighted Student Formula) funding to our public schools and when budget and position cuts were made at UH CTAHR (College of Tropical Agriculture & Human Resources), we had many thriving ag education and FFA programs in our state. However, every since that time, I have seen many ag programs with long and storied histories and legendary ag teachers (who were great role models to me) close and just become a memory. At one time, we had over 30 strong and successful ag and FFA programs in our state. Now, we have about only 15. I believe that the main reasons for this drastic and devastating decline in ag programs are the cuts in funding in the DOE that went directly to help and support our ag and FFA programs and also the loss of advisors at the UH CTAHR and the UH College of Education that recruited, advised ,and supported new potential (highly-qualified) high school ag teachers. In the years that followed the loss of funding and support from the DOE and at UHCTAHR, many ag teachers retired and our high school Principals struggled with finding permanent ag teachers at their schools, but many could not. Thus, many ag programs across our state closed permanently.

However now, with the goal of Governor Ige and his administration to achieve food security and with the growth and sucess of our school garden programs, I believe we now have a great opportunity to once again fund and support our ag education programs through SB 762. I was fortunate to attend all the meetings of the P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group that were held over the three year period. To my knowledge, it was the first time there has been a concerted, coordinated statewide effort by all those working directly with agricultural education programs in Pre-K, Elementary, Middle and High Schools, and the entire UH system. This work created a Coordinated Framework and envisions support for agricultural education P-20 that would raise the level of knowledge and awareness of both programs at all grade levels and seek to remedy the GAPS in the Framework, in the overlapping areas of agriculture, nutrition, health, environment, and their deep connections to culture and community and would greatly assist the States' food security needs. Utimately this would form a firm foundation for a whole new Food Systems Workforce, and raise will the level of agricultural production something that the Legislature is currently envisioning in a Strategic Planning process at the State Level.

This coordinator position will facilitate collaboration between the UH College of Education and CTAHR towards training teachers in agriculture education. It is a logical step following the legislative mandate for the P-20 Ag Education Working Group to develop a framework and curriculum. Furthermore, the timing for support in this academic content area is ideal with governor's Aloha+ Challenge initiatives, the plan to redesign the pre-k – 12 structure and the City and County of Honolulu revisiting Important Agricultural Land designations.

My Name is Michael Barros, I have recently retired from the Department of Education as the State Educational Specialist for the Career and Technical Education (CTE). I also was an Agriculture Education teacher at Waialua High and Intermediate for 10 years before moving into the state position. The following table shows the number of students who have been enrolled in courses within the Agriculture, Food Innovation, and Natural Resources (AFNR) Career Cluster in the Department of Education. This indicates that there is significant student interest in the AFNR career cluster. However, as agriculture teachers are retiring, programs are not continued due to the lack of trained teachers. Of the number of schools listed below offering AFNR courses, I estimate that only 11 teachers have completed an Agriculture Education teacher education program through a state approved program.
