Department's Position:

The Department of Education supports the intent of SB 762 to establish and fund a P-20 agriculture education coordinator within the University of Hawaii at Manoa college of tropical agriculture and human resources to lead the implementation of a coordinated framework for P-20 agriculture education in Hawaii.

Currently, the Department's Natural Resources pathway promotes student choice, interest and aptitude in conservation and environment, food and non-food production & natural resource management. Student leadership is cultivated through a renewed interest and investment in the Future Farmers of American (FFA) Hawaii that serves as a conduit to promote agriculture as a career. Schools at all levels continue to expand their gardens as a learning laboratory embedded within their unique school design to integrate agricultural experiences across the content areas.

The Department engages with an array of partners to revitalize our island agricultural economy and its contribution to local food systems. There is a collective vision and commitment galvanized by non-profit organizations, higher education, industry and community foundations to leverage supports, resources and services that foster garden-based learning, farm to school initiatives and the Aina Pono Program within Hawaii's public school system.

The Department appreciates the continued collaboration with the University of Hawaii and Hawaii P-20 agriculture education working group. As this proposal includes the need for technical and operational considerations with institutions of higher education, we defer to the

appropriate agency for additional comment.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony on SB 762.

The Hawaii State Department of Education seeks to advance the goals of the Strategic Plan which is focused on student success, staff success, and successful systems of support. Aloha Committee Chair, Vice-Chair, and Member of the Senate Ways and Means,

I was fortunate to attend all the meetings of the P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group that were held over the three year period. To my knowledge, it was the first time there has been a concerted, coordinated statewide effort by all those working directly with agricultural education programs in the Elementary, Middle and High Schools, and the UH system. This work created a coordinated Framework and envisions support for agricultural education P-20 that would raise the level of knowledge and awareness of both programs at all grade levels and seek to remedy the GAPS in the Framework, in the overlapping areas of agriculture, nutrition, health, environment, and their deep connections to culture and community and would greatly assist the States food security needs.

I firmly believe and have evidence, that greater investment in agricultural education will in the long-term, build aware and participatory citizens, develop vibrant community food systems and create a more robust agricultural economy for the State. Our findings are summarized in the Final Report to the Legislature that has been recently submitted and sent to each of you.

This Bill reflects our most important recommendation, that an Agriculture Education Coordinator be placed in CTAHR UH Manoa, to continue the work this group has outlined in the report, and focus it's early work plan on developing more opportunities for Professional Development for our Teachers grades PreK-20 that will afford them the opportunity to integrate these concepts into their core curriculum. In this case as in many others, increased opportunities for education can be looked at as an investment in increased Career Opportunities and life-long healthy habits that will help build our State's Agricultural Economy.

Private family foundations in Hawai'i have supported this work for the past decade. Our State Institutions (The DOE, UH Manoa and UHWO) must now help build this reality through this position. Mahalo for your consideration of this important Bill, the work of so many.

Aloha

This coordinator position will facilitate collaboration between the UH College of Education and CTAHR towards training teachers in agriculture education. It is a logical step following the legislative mandate for the P-20 Ag Education Working Group to develop a framework and curriculum. Furthermore, the timing for support in this academic content area is ideal with governor's Aloha+ Challenge initiatives, the plan to redesign the pre-k – 12 structure and the City and County of Honolulu revisiting Important Agricultural Land designations.

My father was a school principal, my mother a chancellor's secretary and I am a retired teacher and school counselor and now work for the USDA. We farmed part time in Waikane Valley and Waimanalo. Agriculture and education is in our D.N.A.

Unfortunately, I did not guide many students towards agriculture due to past job market forecasts and budget cuts. However, due to climate change and other issues, there is concern regarding our dependence on food imports coupled with a call for increasing local food production and sustainability. The rubric for curriculum ranges from engaging younger students in conserving natural resources, gardening and repurposing to higher education and certification to fill key public and private positions in agriculture and port security.

The critical scope of topics from food safety, invasive species, traditional practices, ag technology, greatening yields, plant pathology, botany, land use, planning, environmental law, ecotourism, business plans and resiliency can be introduced and taught prek – 20. I am inspired when watching the mainland U.S. Future Farmers of America student leaders and alumni on the RFD channel 1211 station. And I believe that Hawaii students can also serve as great practitioners and stewards in agriculture and conservation.

This position in CTAHR can play an instrumental role in that commitment, mission and collaboration between educators, stakeholders and communities.

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,900 farm family members <u>statewide</u>, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawaii Farm Bureau supports SB 762, which establishes and appropriates funds for the P-20 agriculture education coordinator position within the University of Hawaii at Manoa college of tropical agriculture and human resources and specifies the duties of the coordinator and P-20 agriculture education working group.

It is commonly known that the average age of a farmer in Hawaii is approximately 60 years old. For agriculture to be sustainable, and to produce more local crops we, as a society, must cultivate the next generation of farmers and ranchers.

The Hawaii Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, under then-Director Dwight Takamine's and then-HDOA Chair Russell Kokubun's leadership, undertook a series of facilitated meetings with farmers, ranchers, educators and a diverse group of stakeholders across the state between 2007 and 2011 to address Ag Labor. The Hawaii Agriculture Skill Panel Report was the result of the stakeholder meetings. The report made a number of recommendations, of which several common themes emerged. #1 of those themes was "Increasing youth education and training".

In 2013, the Hawaii State Legislature saw fit to establish the Agriculture Workforce Advisory Board via HB 749 of that year. This Board convenes, in part, to execute the recommendations of Hawaii Agriculture Skill Panel Report. This board established a program by which educators and school administrators can be exposed and incentivized

to adopt existing broad-based agricultural curriculums. This is an important step toward the future of agriculture in Hawaii.

In 2015, Hawaii State Senate Resolution No. 80 requested that the UH-Manoa College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR) develop an "implementation strategy and recommendations for the creation of a statewide coordinated framework of support for P–20 agriculture education, including any proposed legislation." SR 80 sought to build upon the expertise of CTAHR and create a coordinated effort to address Ag education. It bears mentioning that CTAHR currently serves on the Ag Workforce Development Advisory Board.

Hawaii Farm Bureau suggests that a relationship continues with the existing Agricultural Workforce Advisory Board and the P-20 agriculture education working group.

Aloha,

The Academy of Natural Resources at Waipahu High School supports Senate Bill 762, to provide an Ag Preschool to College (AgP20) coordinator position at the UH Manoa. In order for the people of Hawai'i to reach current objectives in food security, the new generation must be educated in all aspects of this complicated issue. Not only does today's new generation need to know how food systems are connected to many aspects of their lives, but also know how basic agriscience principals influence food security. As an instructor of agriculture at the high school level, I am concerned with a noticeable disconnect between our new generation and agriculture. For example, many students do not consider agriculture as a viable career option. They are unfamiliar with careers or jobs that support agriculture. If our community is truly concerned with our future food security, we must do more to educate today's new generation of agriculture entrepreneurs, teachers, agronomists, policy makers and agricultural scientists. Given this concern for food security, we cannot afford to lose agricultural education at any level.

By establishing this position, students would be better able to continue their studies within the University of Hawai'i system or at other four-year colleges. Examples within the UH system would be the Sustainable Community Food Systems at UHWO and the College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources at Manoa. In fact, students from Waipahu High School are transferring to Leeward Community College to study plant science and agriculture, and have been subsequently moving on to other related fields of study. My students have engaged in plant sciences and agriculture at Leeward, and have expressed their personal affection for Leeward. Without the agriscience options provided by Leeward Community College and Waipahu High, I wonder what my students would do. Many of my students do not have the ability to transfer directly to

Manoa or a mainland university. These are the same students that could potentially transform our community into becoming more sustainable.

In my 10-year experience in high school agriculture, I have witnessed the decline and noticeable lack of agriculture instructors in our state. Having a position to solve this problem is needed to achieve state objectives of food security. On behalf of Academy of Natural Resources at Waipahu High School, we thank you for this opportunity to submit this letter of support for support of Senate Bill 762, to provide an Ag Preschool to College (AgP20) coordinator position at the UH Manoa. 

SB 762 - RELATING TO AGRICULTURE EDUCATION

Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran, and members of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on SB 762 relating to agriculture education and establishes and appropriates funds for the P-20 agriculture education coordinator position within the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa (UHM), College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR). This bill also outlines the duties of the coordinator and P-20 agriculture education working group. UHM/CTAHR <u>supports with amendments</u> the intent of this bill and we respectfully provide the following information to substantiate our position.

- Preschool through grade 20 (higher education) agriculture education is key to the
 development of future farmers and to a society that values and understands the
 vital role of agriculture, food, fiber, and natural resource systems in advancing
 personal, local, and global well-being and food security.
- UHM/CTAHR convened a working group under Senate Resolution 80 (2015) and developed a coordinated framework of support for preschool through postsecondary (P-20) agriculture education and a plan for implementation.
- The outcome of the working group was the consensus that a P-20 Agriculture Education Coordinator position is needed within UHM/CTAHR for the purpose of overseeing ongoing communication and collaboration of the P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group and spearheading the Implementation Plan that includes:
 - Teacher Development: Teacher training in agriculture and food systems education at all levels (P-20) for those preparing to become teachers ("pre-service teachers"), as well as additional professional development for those already in classrooms ("in-service teachers").

- Curricular Integration: Integrating agriculture education into the core curriculum in all subject areas at all levels (P-20).
- Agriculture Educators: Helping to establish and fund positions at the state, community, and school levels that directly support teacher development and curricular integration around agriculture and food systems.

The report highlights the large number of organizations working in this area. What is evident is the amount of overlap and lack of coordination between organizations. More effective effort on this topic could be had if there was some level of coordination among groups; and this position could also seek to provide that.

We support the intent of this bill and offer the following suggested amendments provided that its passage is an addition to the priorities as indicated in our University of Hawai'i Board of Regents Approved Budget:

- clarify that the P-20 agriculture education coordinator position is a permanent Administrative Professional Technical (APT) with UHM/CTAHR, and
- appropriates out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaiii the sum of \$65,000 as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020, the same sum for fiscal year 2020-2021, and the same sum for future fiscal years should the position be required.

Kōkua Hawai'i Foundation supports SB762, which establishes and appropriates funds for the P-20 Agriculture Education Coordinator position within the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (UH CTAHR).

The Kōkua Hawai'i Foundation is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization founded in 2003 to support environmental education in the schools and communities of Hawaii. Our 'ĀINA In Schools program is a farm to school initiative launched in 2006 that connects children to their local land, waters, and food to grow a healthier Hawaii. We work directly with 23 O'ahu elementary schools that have implemented the program and have also trained an additional 500+ educators from over 250 schools and organizations from across the state in the use of our 'AINA garden, composting, and nutrition curricula. While most of our work has focused on K-6 students, we have seen a huge need for increased agricultural education resources and teacher training reaching students from preschool through college.

SB762 puts forth the recommendations of the P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group as detailed in DC149: the Final Report on a Coordinated Framework of Support for Preschool Through Post-Secondary (P-20) Agriculture Education in Hawai'i pursuant to S.R. No. 80 (2015). The P-20 Agriculture Education Coordinator will focus on integrating agriculture education into pre-service teacher development programs for all levels (P-20) in order to produce a greater number of teachers, students, and citizens with an awareness of and interest in agriculture. The Coordinator would also continue to convene stakeholders through the P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group and facilitate curricular integration and the development of increased numbers of dedicated agriculture educators at the state, community, and school levels.

This bill puts forth the recommendations of the P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group as detailed in DC149: the Final Report on a Coordinated Framework of Support for Preschool Through Post-Secondary (P-20) Agriculture Education in Hawai'i pursuant to S.R. No. 80 (2015).

Convened by UH CTAHR, the P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group has met for three years to develop the report and recommendations. Agriculture education at all levels (P-20) is key to strengthening Hawaii's food security and food self-sufficiency through the development of future farmers and a supportive citizenry. Fundamental to expanding student interest in agriculture is the infusion of agriculture education into teacher development programs.

The P-20 Agriculture Education Coordinator would coordinate and support teacher training in agriculture and food systems education at all levels (P-20) for those preparing to become teachers ("pre-service teachers"), as well as professional development for those already in classrooms ("in-service teachers"). The Coordinator would also continue to convene stakeholders through the P-20 Agriculture Education Working Group and facilitate curricular integration and the development of increased numbers of dedicated agriculture educators at the state, community, and school levels.

Agriculture education strengthens Hawaii's farm to school movement by directly connecting more students to where their food comes from and involving them in creating a vibrant local food system in Hawaii.

UH CTAHR is in a unique position to help strengthen agriculture education in Hawai'i. This bill is essential to increasing their capacity to do so.

Establishes and appropriates funds for the P-20 agriculture education coordinator position within the University of Hawaii at Manoa college of tropical agriculture and human resources. Specifies duties of the coordinator and P-20 agriculture education working group.

Chair Lee, Vice Chair Buenaventura, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Dale Sandlin, and I am Managing Director of the Hawaii Cattlemen's Council. The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council, Inc. (HCC) is the Statewide umbrella organization comprised of the four county level Cattlemen's Associations. Our 150+ member ranchers represent over 60,000 head of beef cows; more than 75% of all the beef cows in the State. Ranchers are the stewards of approximately 25% of the State's total land mass.

The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council <u>supports</u> SB 762 as this measure would support agricultural education in the state.

The average age of our farmers is increasing nationwide and while the cattle industry has been able to produce more beef using fewer inputs, fewer cattle, and with little impact on our natural resources, developing younger generations to ranch is one of the biggest challenges our industry faces.
