In consideration of SENATE BILL 875 MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR STATE LIFEGUARDS

Senate Bill 875 proposes to appropriate unspecified funds salaries and benefits for lifeguards for Kua Bay, Kekaha Kai state park, on Hawai'i, an area under the jurisdiction of the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department). The Department supports this measure provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities indicated in the Executive Budget request.

The Department has supported proposed legislation to provide for lifeguard services since 2015 and currently has a contract with the County of Hawai'i (County) for lifeguard services at Hāpuna Beach State Recreation Area. There is currently no lifeguard protection for visitors to Kua Bay and the Department would have to contract lifeguard services with the County. After Hāpuna Beach, Kua Bay would be the next location to provide for lifeguard services as it has the most reported spinal cord injuries.

The Department supports the appropriation of general funds in the amount of \$400,000 for the establishment of four full time equivalent (4.0 FRE) ocean safety officer positions in Fiscal Years 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 and \$80,000 for equipment purchases in the Fiscal Year 2019-2020.

Dear Chair Dela Cruz and Vice Chair Keith-Agaran:

I am submitting this testimony in full support of SB875 that appropriates funds for the employment of lifeguards at Kua Bay (Kekaha Kai State Park).

Kua Bay is located in a remote location in West Hawai'i that has now become easily accessible to an overwhelming amount of beach goers. The amount of ocean related incidents have increased including spinal injuries and drownings.

According to the Hawai'i Health Department EMS patient care data base, there were 32 patients who required treatment at Kua Bay between 2013 and 2018. Most (94% or 30) of these patients required transport to a hospital with the majority (84%, or 27 patients) being for traumatic injuries. Per the Trauma Registry there were 10 spinal cord injuries suffered at Kua Bay over the 2009-2017 period. The nearest rescue or medical assistance to Kua Bay is approximately 20 minutes away. The absence of lifeguard services and medical equipment at Kua Bay decreases the chance of mitigating or surviving major injury or serious medical events.

I strongly support and urge the enactment of SB875. Mahalo for your consideration.

Testimony of Aha Moku Advisory Committee

In SUPPORT of Senate Bill 875 Making an appropriation for State lifeguards

SB 875 appropriates unspecified funds for salaries and benefits for lifeguards for Kua Bay, Kekaha State Park, on the island of Hawaii, an area under the jurisdiction of DLNR. The Aha Moku Advisory Committee (AMAC) supports this measure.

Under the Aha Moku Process, a traditional land and ocean management system restored from the translation of oral chants of the 9th century, the Kona Moku (District) on Moku O Keawe (the Island of Hawaii) has for centuries retained the traditional practices of *lawaia*, ocean and marine fishing methods that are unique to the Kona Moku. These practices have been kept alive from ancient times to current times by the empirical knowledge of the marine resources of Kona that have been handed down generation to generation by expert Native Hawaiian fishermen of Kona. In this last century, the *lawaia* of the ahupua'a of Kona, particularly the Ahupua'a of O'oma, Kalaoa, and Kau continue to use Mahaiula, the beach area where Kua Bay is located for traditional and cultural practices.

Since the Kekaha Kai State Park (Kua Bay) was publicly opened to all in 1995, Native Hawaiian *lawaia* (fishermen), and other practitioners now share these natural and cultural assets with others. The Kekaha Kai State Park is comprised of Manini'owali Bay (Kua Bay), Makalawena beach at Pu'u Ali'I Bay, and Mahai'ula Bay. Along this stretch of coast, these beaches and bays are well-known for their pristine waters and white sand beaches. They are frequently used by the honu (turtle) who congregate along this coast.

However, Native Hawaiian communities who have traditionally gathered and continued their ocean practices over the decades know, there are definite seasons, changes of currents and wave sizes. In their hospitable Hawaiian culture, local communities who share these beaches with malihini, visitors and tourists often warn people about the currents that are unseen but can be deadly. Locals have often saved the unwary tourist from harm, and usually at their own risk. Resorts that have come up along the Kohala Coast contribute to the popularity of Kekaha Kai State Park, and to possible injury to the unwary.

Since the restoration of the Aha Moku Process by the Legislature in 2012, via Act 288, §171.4-5, the AMAC has successfully strived to bring the voices of the communities and 'ohana of ahupua'a districts forward to work with Hawai'i government in addressing and sustaining the natural and cultural resources of our Pae'Aina. We are attached to DLNR, and through this venue, our people have been able to collaborate with government to address critical issues that are important to the people. A critical issue for the people of Kona is ensuring that the safety of those who come to enjoy some of the most beautiful bays and stretches of coastline in Hawaii can do so safely, especially in a Hawaii public State Park. Adopting this Bill not only provides critically needed lifeguards, equipment and infrastructure that will save lives and reduce injuries, it will also protect and relieve the locals from harm as they currently continue to rescue the unwary when needed. **On behalf of the Moku of Kona, Moku O Keawe, we humbly ask that Senate Bill 875 be passed by the Senate Committee on Ways and Means.**
