The Maui County Department of Water Supply (MDWS) **strongly supports** SB935. The proposed funding to develop a means to repurpose up to 9 million gallons of water annually at Kanaha Beach Park is an important step to address water reuse and conservation issues. Please consider revising the description for funding in Section 2.1 as follows:

[Installation] Design, Permitting, and Approvals_	<u>\$200,000</u>
[Updates and Improvements] Materials, Installation, 6 month Maintenance	<u>\$250,000</u>
Total Funding	\$450,000

The proposed greywater reuse project will demonstrate that potable water can be repurposed and not wasted. By redirecting water from the park's showers, sinks, spigots, and hose bibs, and intercepting additional runoff from bioswales planted with native Hawaiian plants, we hope to reuse up to 40% of the potable water being consumed at the park. Appropriate signage and interactive stations will help educate the general public about how this greywater system works.

The greywater system includes an irrigation network fed by recycled, R2 or R1 quality water. Depending on the intensity of potable water use at the park, it will be flexible enough to produce tens of thousands of thousands of gallons of reuse water for daily irrigation purposes, instead of providing on potable water. This approach also makes the park much more resilient in times of drought. The proposed project will allow for less water stressing the park's septic system. Runoff interception by bioswales, will reduce surface runoff that would normally find its way to the ocean.

The Nature Conservancy of Hawai'i is a non-profit conservation organization dedicated to the preservation of the lands and waters upon which all life depends. The Conservancy has helped protect more than 200,000 acres of natural lands in Hawai'i and Palmyra Atoll. We manage 40,000 acres in 13 nature preserves and work in over 30 coastal communities to help protect the near-shore reefs, waters and fisheries of the main Hawaiian Islands. We forge partnership with government, private parties and communities to protect forests and coral reefs for their ecological values and the many benefits they provide to people.

### The Nature Conservancy supports SB 935 SD1

Easily available fresh water is not a limitless resource here in the middle of the Pacific. Several locations in the state have experienced prolonged drought in recent years. Science indicates that the likely effects of climate change in Hawai'i will include:

- > More frequent and more severe storms that can increase runoff and siltation; but
- > Overall, less rainfall in many locations and therefore less fresh water; and
- > Higher temperatures that affect watershed health and can be beneficial to pests.

Hawai'i is already exhibiting telltale signs of climate change. UH's Rainfall Atlas catalogues a century of declining rainfall and fewer trade wind days. Summer temperature records have been broken across the state and a record number of storms have taken aim at Hawai'i over the last few years.

In response to these conditions, we must plan and implement mitigative and adaptive measures to ensure the resilience of our natural and human systems. Healthy Hawaiian forests that are not overrun by invasive species act like a sponge, collecting rain and moisture, slowly delivering fresh water into streams and aquifers, absorbing greenhouse gases, and reducing runoff and siltation into near shore waters during storm events.

Additionally, we must improve our efficiencies and reuse of our fresh water resources, including the types of reuse demonstration projects proposed in HB 935.
