**Purpose of Bill:** Appropriates funds for a scholarship program to be directed and administered by the Department of Education to make awards to students pursuing teaching degrees at state accredited institutions of higher education who successfully complete one course in computer science. ## **Department's Position:**

The Department of Education (Department) supports the intent of SB 971, SD1 and respectfully offers comments.

The Department is committed to equitable and expanded access to computer science learning opportunities for all students. A critical element of this forward momentum is to advance innovation and engagement across instruction while embracing a shared response to the growing demand in Hawaii's computing jobs.

This proposal to award scholarships to aspiring teacher candidates serves to boost interest and heighten the importance of computer science skills, knowledge, and dispositions.
