The Administration of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) will recommend that the Board of Trustees <u>SUPPORT</u> SCR54. This resolution urges 1) the Governor and County of Kaua'i to protect the wahi pana of Waimakaohi'iaka and the traditional and customary practice of making salt beds in Hanapēpē, Kaua'i; 2) the Legislature of the State of Hawai'i to stand in solidarity with the Hui Hana Pa'akai o Hanapēpē as protectors of this wahi pana; 3) the Department of Transportation (DOT) to order the relocation of the operations of Smoky Mountain Helicopters, Inc., (Smoky Mountain Helicopters¹) from Burns Field to the more appropriate Līhu'e Airport; 4) the Department of Land and Natural Resources and the County of Kaua'i to regulate, control, and enforce illegal beach access impacting the salt ponds; and 5) the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to investigate the use of an unpermitted restroom facility utilizing a cesspool at Burns Field by Smoky Mountain Helicopters.

As the constitutionally-established body tasked with protecting and promoting the rights of Native Hawaiians, OHA serves as the principle public agency in the State of Hawai'i responsible for the development and coordination of programs and activities related to Native Hawaiians, assessment of policies and practices impacting Native Hawaiians, and advocacy on behalf of Native Hawaiians. It is with this kuleana in mind that OHA highlights the significance of the lo'i pa'akai of Hanapēpē in the perpetuation of Native Hawaiian traditional customary practices uniquely associated with these sites.<sup>2</sup>

The Loʻi Paʻakai ʻo ʻUkulā ma Hanapēpē form a rich cultural hub for the production of salt, a culturally significant resource traditionally cultivated and gathered by Native Hawaiians. These loʻi paʻakai are among the very few remaining sites where Native Hawaiian families can perpetuate their traditional salt-making practices and continue to pass these practices down to future generations. For its unsurpassed value to the Native Hawaiian people and overall

significance in Hawai'i's history, the Lo'i Pa'akai 'o 'Ukulā ma Hanapēpē are listed on the Hawai'i State Register of Historic Places.

Port Allen Airport bears a close proximity to the Loʻi Paʻakai ʻoʻUkulā ma Hanapēpē, and its threats of particulate pollution and chemical runoff have been particularly concerning to Native Hawaiian paʻakai practitioners who wish to maintain the quality and safety of their product for consumption and cultural use. Native Hawaiian individuals, families, and community organizations have endeavored to work with the former airport operator to mitigate the negative impact of aircraft operations to the loʻi paʻakai. However, recent proposed³ expansions of Smoky Mountain Helicopters′ operations have the potential to threaten and upend the compromises already made and create new and increased impacts from a higher volume of airport activities. Community scrutiny of the Smoky Mountain Helicopters operations has further increased after reports by the Hawaiʻi Department of Health (DOH) and EPA regarding an unpermitted restroom facility using a cesspool in close proximity to the Hanapēpē salt beds. As detailed in the resolution, the DOH has already issued a field citation for the helicopter company to abandon the cesspool and obtain a proper building permit for a restroom facility, among other orders.

It is also OHA's understanding that the County of Kaua'i Planning Department has already questioned whether existing commercial airport uses at Port Allen are incongruent with existing zoning ordinances that call for a 1,000-yard buffer from residential, conservation, and agricultural lands.<sup>4</sup> As detailed in the resolution, the County of Kaua'i Planning Department has sent certified notices of violations of Kaua'i's comprehensive zoning ordinance and Special Management area rules for illegal improvements. In line with the intent of SCR54, the County of Kaua'i should work with the DOT on a relocation plan that better aligns airport use with existing zoning ordinances.

Given the particular cultural sensitivity of the area surrounding the Port Allen Airport as well as the longstanding concerns that have been raised regarding the airport's potential impacts to the adjacent lo'i pa'akai, and to demonstrate its commitment to the preservation of pa'akai practices and protection of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary rights, **OHA** encourages the Governor and County of Kaua'i to take actions that protect this precious resource and for the DOT to consider relocating helicopter usage at Port Allen to Līhu'e Airport. As further proposed in SCR54, appropriate agencies should take necessary actions regarding illegal activities and unpermitted uses.

For the reasons set forth above, OHA respectfully urges the Committees to **PASS** SCR54. Mahalo piha for the opportunity to testify on this important measure.

The Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs **SUPPORTS** SCR 54, as it supports and sustains the traditional and customary practice of making and gathering of pa'akai. At its 60th annual convention, the Association adopted Resolution 2019-54 which shares the same title as SCR 54; the Association stands in solidarity with its Kaua'i Council and the Hawaiian Civic Clubs and club members in that council who are in strong support of this measure.

The effects of nearby commercial activity, climate change, and other environmental impacts make this site and the cultural practices at these salt beds in Hanapēpē vulnerable. As stated in the resolution, this is the only area in all of Hawai'i that continues to make the salt beds and harvest pa'akai using these traditional methods.

The civic club movement was founded in 1918 by Congressional Delegate Prince Jonah Kūhiō Kalaniana'ole with the creation of the Hawaiian Civic Club; the Association was formally organized in 1959 and has grown to a confederation of over sixty (60) Hawaiian Civic Clubs located throughout the State of Hawai'i and the United States. The Association is the oldest Hawaiian community-based grassroots organization. The Association is governed by a 16-member Board of Directors; advocates for improved welfare of Native Hawaiians in culture, health, economic development, education, social welfare, and nationhood; and perpetuates and preserves language, history, music, dance and other Native Hawaiian cultural traditions.

# ASSOCIATION OF HAWAIIAN CIVIC CLUBS

#### A RESOLUTION

No. 2019 - 54

STRONGLY URGING THE STATE OF HAWAI'I AND THE COUNTY OF KAUA'I TO PROTECT THE WAHI PANA OF WAIMAKAOHI'IAKA AND THE TRADITIONAL AND CUSTOMARY PRACTICE OF MAKING THE SALT BEDS AND GATHERING PA'AKAI (SALT) IN HANAPĒPĒ, KAUA'I FOR ALL FUTURE GENERATIONS

WHEREAS, Waimakaohi'iaka, in the 'ili of 'Ukulā, in the ahupua'a of Hanapēpē, in the moku of Kona or also known as the salt ponds of Hanapēpē is a wahi pana, a culturally significant sacred site specifically for the making of pa'akai (salt), which has been traditionally cultivated and gathered by Native Hawaiians since time immemorial; and

WHEREAS, Waimakaohi'iaka, is the only area in all of Hawai'i that continues to make the salt beds and harvest pa'akai using these traditional methods which are passed generation to generation by Native Hawaiian 'ohana who are exercising their constitutionally protected traditional and customary salt-making knowledge and skills; and

WHEREAS, Article XII §7 of the Hawai'i State Constitution provides: "The State reaffirms and shall protect all rights, customarily and traditionally exercised for subsistence, cultural and religious purposes and possessed by ahupua'a tenants who are descendants of native Hawaiians who inhabited the Hawaiian Islands prior to 1778, subject to the right of the State to regulate such rights."

WHEREAS, in keeping with centuries-old traditions, the pa'akai gathered at this location cannot be bought nor is it sold, but is generously shared or traded by the 22 families who are the lineal descendants of past salt-makers, resulting in this resource being distributed throughout Kaua'i, statewide, nationally and internationally for subsistence, cultural and religious purposes; and

WHEREAS, the Hawai'i Register of Historic Places is an official list of properties that have been recognized for their significance to the history, architecture, archaeology, or culture of Hawai'i communities, and the Hanapēpē Salt Pans have been listed in the State Inventory of Historic Places as SIHP #50-30-09-00049 since September 30, 1988; and

WHEREAS, the Waimakaohi'iaka parcel is zoned for conservation, and is identified as an Open/Special Treatment Resource and Cultural District by the County of Kaua'i; and

WHEREAS, urbanization, commercial, and recreation activities adjacent to Waimakaohi'iaka cause threatening factors such as dust, noise, and contamination from sources ranging from an ill-placed helicopter operation sited at Port Allen Airport, also known as Burns Field, and vehicles accessing the beach, to broken beer bottles and trash left by beach users; and

WHEREAS, June 25, 2019, the Kaua'i Planning Commission considered an application submitted by Smoky Mountain Helicopters, Inc. (SMI) for after-the-fact permit applications during which over 100 people testified in person, producing over 100 written testimonies and generating 34,000+ signatures on an online petition found at <a href="http://change.org/protectpaakai">http://change.org/protectpaakai</a>, to protect this last of its kind salt making tradition in Hanapēpē; and

WHEREAS, subsequently, the Kaua'i Planning Commission was planning for a contested case hearing for the after-the-fact permit applications and granted intervenor status to the Hui Hana Pa'akai o Hanapēpē, a Native Hawaiian organization organized in 1964, comprised of the 22 'ohana that continue the salt-making and gathering practice; and

WHEREAS, on August 1, 2019, the Hui Hana Pa'akai o Hanapēpē sent a certified letter to the State of Hawai'i Department of Health and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) urgently requesting them to investigate immediately the use of an unpermitted restroom facility utilizing a cesspool at Burns Field, Kaua'i by SMI; and

WHEREAS, on two occasions in August 2019, the County of Kaua'i Planning Department sent a certified notice of violations of Kaua'i's comprehensive zoning ordinance and Special Management Area Rules and Regulations and orders to pay fines to the State of Hawai'i Department of Transportation, Airports Division (Owner), SMI (Lessee), D & J Air Adventures, and Maverick Helicopter citing the illegal development within the SMA District, failure to secure required SMA permit determination and violations of the comprehensive zoning ordinance on Executive Order No. 931(P); and

WHEREAS, in response to inquiries sent by State Representative Dee Morikawa and Kaua'i Councilman Luke Evslin, the State of Hawai'i Department of Health Wastewater Branch (WWB) investigated the site on August 21, 2019 and found that: an illegal cesspool was constructed but not in use, the Maverick Helicopter facility was utilizing two portable toilets, plumbing fixtures (toilet, sink and associated piping) were recently removed from the facility's restroom, no wastewater was observed being discharged to the illegal cesspool, and the WWB will be issuing the facility a field citation for the construction of an illegal cesspool; and

WHEREAS, additional WWB investigations found: SMI had previously utilized an unapproved cesspool for an unpermitted restroom, the cesspool was not in use and the fixtures from the restroom were removed before the inspection, two portable toilets were provided at Maverick Helicopter facility for employees and customers, the WWB will be issuing the Maverick Helicopters a field citation for the construction and use of a cesspool that was not approved by the Director of Health, and Maverick Helicopters will be ordered to: (1) properly abandon the cesspool; (2) obtain a building permit for the restroom; (3) construct a new

individual wastewater system (IWS) to serve the restroom; and (4) remove the two portable toilets after the IWS is issued an approval to use from the WWB; and

WHEREAS, on August 30, 2019, the County of Kaua'i Director of Planning received a copy of a letter from Belles Graham LLP representing SMI in receipt of the Planning Department's letter dated August 5, 2019 informing the client of a Notice of Violation and Order to Pay Fines, as well a Petition to Appeal Decision of the Planning Director as provided for by Chapter 9 of the Planning Commission Rules; and

WHEREAS, the Hui Hana Pa'akai o Hanapēpē has developed a web strategy to share updated and relevant information with the community (see <a href="http://protectpaakai.org">http://protectpaakai.org</a>); and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs at its 60th Annual Convention in Lahaina, Maui, in the malama of Welehu and the rising of Lā'au Pau, this 16th day of November 2019, strongly urging the State of Hawai'i and the County of Kaua'i to protect the wahi pana of Waimakaohi'iaka and the traditional and customary practice of making salt beds and gathering pa'akai (salt) in Hanapēpē, Kaua'i for all future generations; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs stand in solidarity with the Hui Hana Pa'akai o Hanapēpē as protectors of this wahi pana; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the State of Hawai'i Department of Transportation move the operations of Smoky Mountain Helicopters, Inc. from Burns Field to the more appropriate Līhu'e Airport where all other Kaua'i helicopter tour businesses operate, then close the Port Allen Airport, and provide adequate security to prevent illegal trespassing and camping in the areas under its jurisdiction; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the State of Hawai'i Department of Land and Natural Resources, and the County of Kaua'i also control, regulate and enforce illegal beach access impacting the salt ponds in the areas under its jurisdictions, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) urgently investigate the use of an unpermitted restroom facility utilizing a cesspool at Burns Field, Kaua'i by Smoky Mountain Helicopters, Inc. and send a response to the Hui Hana Pa'akai o Hanapēpē, and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that a certified copy of this resolution be transmitted to the County of Kaua'i Planning Commission and Planning Director, State of Hawai'i Department of Transportation, State of Hawai'i Department of Land and Natural Resources, the United States Environmental Protection Agency, the County of Kaua'i Council, the Kaua'i Representatives and Senators, as well as the Governor of the State of Hawai'i, President of the State Senate, Speaker of the State House of Representatives, Chair of the State Senate subject matter committee on Hawaiian Affairs, Chair of the State House subject matter committee on

Hawaiian Affairs, Chair of the Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, and all County Mayors.

The Hui Hana Pa'akai o Hanapēpē is a Native Hawaiian Organization made up of representatives from 22 'ohana (families) that are cultural practitioners, kia'i (stewards) of this wahi pana (traditional place), cultural and lineal descendants of Waimakaohi'iaka or more commonly known as Salt Pond. The Hui was formed in 1964 by the salt making 'ohana. For many generations these cultural practitioners have been exercising their traditional and customary practices, a historic site on the State Inventory of Historic Places.

Waimakaohi'iaka is a wahi pana (sacred place), that form a rich cultural hub for production of pa'akai (salt), a culturally significant resource traditionally cultivated and gathered by Native Hawaiians since time immemorial. The Salt Ponds of Hanapēpē is the only area in all of Hawai'i that produces pa'akai in this manner and it is where Native Hawaiian 'ohana continue to exercise their constitutionally protected traditional and customary salt making practices. These practices are passed down from generation to generation and into perpetuity. Hanapēpē Salt Ponds are the only traditional salt production center in existence that is not used for profit or Sale. The Hanapēpē Salt Ponds are listed on the Historic Register site #00049 and state site #50-30-09-00049.

Pa'akai is not only used for culinary purposes including food preparation and preservation but more importantly it is used ceremonially and medicinally. Pa'akai plays a very critical role in the preservation and perpetuation of many other Native Hawaiian traditions and customary practices. The continued traditional practice of preparing the salt beds and gather salt, interwoven into the expansive fabric of Native Hawaiian Culture, has far reaching effects.

In addition, it is important to also recognize the existence of a leina-a-ka-uhane at  $P\bar{u}$  olo Point in the area adjacent to the Port Allen Airport. This is a portal that exists only in certain places on our islands that also have a significant role in our cultural and religious ceremonies. It is a leaping off point where spirits transition to  $p\bar{o}$  (darkness, or the next world).

The close proximity of Port Allen Airport to the leina-a-ka-uhane and the Hanapēpē Salt Ponds and its potential contribution to the pollution, noise, and heavy metals contamination and chemical storm water runoff has been a longstanding concern for pa'akai practitioners and the community.

Immediate protection is needed for Waimakaohi'iaka because any further development in the area will adversely affect this 'āina, our makuahine that is calling for protection. The impacts include, but are not limited to, the following: direct, indirect, and/or cumulative negative impacts to historic sites; direct, indirect, and/or cumulative negative impacts to Hawaiian traditional and/or customary practices; increased drainage and run-off into State of Hawai'i conservation lands, which includes a fragile coastal ecosystem.

Do what is right for the 'āina, for the community, for the people of Hawai'i and PASS SCR 54 as a first step to protect this wahi pana.

Many of our members are salt practitioners and their 'ohana have been a part of this practice for many generations. They are also very committed to doing all that they need to do to protect this wahi pana that is in a very vulnerable state. As stated in the resolution that this is the is the **only area in all of Hawai'i** that continues to make the salt beds and harvest pa'akai using these traditional methods which are passed generation to generation by native Hawaiian 'ohana who are exercising their **constitutionally protected traditional and customary salt-making knowledge and skills.** In addition, these salt practitioners are on the frontlines of experiencing how climate change, other environmental changes, commercial, and recreation activities are having a direct impact on the cultural practice. Some of the 'ohana have not been able to produce any salt for the last 6 consecutive years.

Therefore, Moku o Manokalanipō respectfully STRONGLY URGES the Committees to immediately PASS SCR54 as a first step to protecting this wahi pana. Kuaʻāina Ulu 'Auamo (KUA) is a State of Hawai'i 501c3 organization that works to empower grassroots rural and Native Hawaiian mālama 'āina groups to celebrate their places and pass on their traditions to better care for Hawai'i and achieve 'āina momona— an abundant, productive ecological system that supports community wellbeing.

KUA SUPPORTS SCR 54 WHICH STRONGLY URGES THE STATE OF HAWAI'I AND THE COUNTY OF KAUA'I TO PROTECT THE WAHI PANA OF WAIMAKAOHI'IAKA AND THE TRADITIONAL AND CUSTOMARY PRACTICE OF MAKING THE SALT BEDS AND GATHERING PA'AKAI (SALT) IN HANAPEPE, KAUA'I FOR ALL FUTURE GENERATIONS.

KUA employs a community-driven approach that currently supports three grassroots community-based natural resource management networks; 1) more than 36 community-based stewardship groups collectively referred to as E Alu Pū (moving forward together), 2) over 40 fishpond projects and practitioners called the Hui Mālama Loko I'a, and 3) a new and growing hui of native seaweed gatherers/practitioners called the Limu Hui. Collectively these networks touch on over 75 nearshore communities from across our state.

The networks KUA facilitates currently focus on Hawaiian fisheries management, fishpond and coastal restoration and farming practices as vital to the success of natural resources management in Hawaii. While the Hui Hana o Paiakai and their work at Waimakaohiiaka are not direct participants in the networks we facilitate, the issues and circumstances they confront in caring for their place resonate. Indeed many network participants have used and benefitted from the traditions Waimakaohiiaka and the paiakai harvested at Hanapēpē. Many of our practices rely both directly and indirectly on their work and generosity.

The Salt Ponds of Hanapēpē are the only place in all Hawai'i that produce pa'akai in this manner; alaea salt, is produced only on Kaua'i. Members of our community networks on Kaua'i and across the state have been fortunate to receive salt from Hanapēpē for ceremonies, food preparation, and for medicine. These benefits are unique and traditional; harvested salt cannot be sold, only shared.

As impacts of over-tourism, over development and a shifting climate become of greater concern to Hawai'i's people Kaua'i has led the way in addressing issues we all must to build a better, more sustainable Hawai'i. As with the Hā'ena Community-based Subsistence Fishing Area (CBSFA), communities across Hawai'i look to set a standard for how we welcome visitors, to ho'okipa, and fundamentally to promulgate the multiethnic, community spirit of being good neighbors to one another and good neighbors to the natural resources on which we all depend. In Hanapēpē, Kaua'i - as it is across Hawai'i - it is the spirit of the people, indigenous and local knowledge and practices, that continue guide us all in "walking the crooked path straight."

We support this first step in uplifting the wahi pana of Waimakaohi'iaka and the values and traditions practiced there.

A cesspool, is an antiquated system and especially on areas of lava basalt or the compact clay that is found in the area, does not properly filter and can directly overflow into the surrounding area. It's not a good fit for this area, and the State has banned new cesspool creation, and is mandating the removal of existing cesspools by 2050. This is especially crucial for a place that is developing salt for consumption through trade only through the families, which they've been doing for generations.

This is only one of the many challenges the Hui Hana Pa'akai o Hanapepe has to deal with, and they've been well equipped with not only their cultural and geneterational knowledge but also by their ability to navigate the State departments for collaboration.

The state should support this as a wahi pana because of it's historical and existing cultural practice and significance, it is unique in the island of Kaua'i, and is unique to the island chain and is a place that others recognize Kaua'i for having.

My name is Makana Garma and I was born and raised in Pakala, Kaua'i.

Having grown on on the west side of Kaua'i, I spent many a childhood days with friends and 'ohana at Salt Pond Beach Park at Waimakaohi'iaka. As a child I inqured a lot about the lo'i pa'akai or salt beds there and my 'ohana would always say that we do not cause harm to the place but to honor it as a traditional storied place where HanapÄ"pÄ" families continue the traditional HanapÄ"pÄ" way of making pa'akai. I remember there being a KAPU sign which my 'ohana always honored.

Fast forward to 2004 when in my occupation at the time I was tasked to develop place-based Hawaiian culture-based educational opportunities for Kaua'i island 6th graders. While planning, I was counseled by many kūpuna of the island. One well known kÅ«puna is Aunty Janet Kahalekomo of HanapÄ"pÄ". What she shared is that many Kaua'i families have started neglecting and mistreating Waimakaohi'iaka and so she strongly felt the students in the program should learn the story of the place, its cultural connection to who they are, and if anything, its direct connection to the mainstream classroom. Additionally, when keiki learn of the place and how it connects to them, they well up with pride and are compelled to protect the tradition, and the place.

She later pointed me to Aunty Helene Kanahele who is a descendant family who took care of several salt beds. She was gracious enough to welcome the students every week to share her knowledge around pa'akai, the place, and how to continue the legacy of making, harvesting, sharing, and protecting Waimakaohi'iaka. Approximately 2000K + students throughout Hawai'i had an opportunity to put their feet in the ground, learn how to make salt beds, transfer kai water from the wells to alternating wells until they were able to relocate to the salt beds. It was awesome to see the students eyes light up when they learned the importance of pa'akai making and protecting the site. The hope was for students to understand Waimakaohi'iaka and to later make well-informed decisions on how to best protect the site.

For me personally, I am overwhelmed with appreciation whenever I am gifted with pa'akai from Waimakaohi'iaka. Therefore, I am submitting this testimony urging the

State of Hawai'i and Kaua'i County to protect Waimakaohi'iaka not only for 'ohana today but, those not yet born and into perpetuity.

The Department of Transportation (DOT) offers **comments** to S.C.R. 54 which urges the DOT to order the relocation of the operations of Smoky Mountain Helicopters, Inc. from Burns Field to the more appropriate Līhu'e Airport where all other Kaua'i helicopter tour businesses operate, then close the Port Allen Airport, and provide adequate security to prevent illegal trespassing and camping in the areas under its jurisdiction.

The DOT is aware of the sacredness of the pa'akai salt making process. However, Port Allen Airport serves as an alternate airport during emergency situations if Lihue Airport was to become inoperable. In addition, forcing an aeronautical tenant from Port Allen would be a discrimination and a violation of Federal Grant Assurance 22.

Aloha Kakou,

I am STRONGLY IN SUPPORT of SCR 54.

Pa'akai has been harvested at PÅ«'olo in HanapÄ"pÄ" since ancient times. During the summer months members of families who are recognized practitioners cultivate pa'akai (sea salt) and 'alae (mineral) for use in cooking, for medicine, ceremonies, for sharing or trade. The 'alae pa'akai or salt enriched with a red mineralized clay, is only produced in this area. Pa'akai was a vital commodity during ancient times, and is still valued "as high as gold" by people all over the world.

During the update of the West Kaua'i Community Plan (August 2018 to November 2019) the community of Kaua'i expressed the following concerns relating to negative impacts to the Salt pans:

- The continued impact of the adjacent airfield and commercial tour businesses;
- Vehicle use along the area where pa'akai is cultivated;
- Runoff from agricultural activities mauka of PÅ«'olo;
- Destruction of salt making area by people and animals, over exposure, trash and pollutants; and
- Sea Level rise (wave over wash), coastal erosion, and other coastal hazards.

A hydrology study of the salt pans area is currently being conducted in partnership between the County of Kaua'i, UH Sea Grant, and Hui Hana Pa'akai o HanapÄ"pÄ" to ascertain the sources and impacts of runoff, sea level rise, and other factors to the quality of salt making.

Port Allen Airport, which is locally referred to as "Burns Field" opened in 1929 to serve as a military airfield. In 1931 the airfield became a territorial airport. On March 29, 1941, Governor's Executive Order No. 931 set aside 180.97 acres for Port Allen Airport to be under the control and management of the Superintendent of Public Works. However, after the outbreak of World War II, the airport was taken over by the military. The runway was plowed to prevent enemy planes from landing. The runway was replaced in 1948 and commercial aviation activities ensued. 122 acres of Port Allen are ceded

lands under the Public Trust. <a href="http://aviation.hawaii.gov/airfields-airports/kauai/port-allen-airport/">http://aviation.hawaii.gov/airfields-airports/kauai/port-allen-airport/</a>

Today, the State Department of Transportation's Airports Division leases space and use of the airport to two recreational aviation companies.

Conflicts over the expansion and continued use of the airport has escalated over the decades between the salt makers (Hui Hana o Paʻakai HanapÄ"pÄ") and the State DOT Airports and their lessees. Noise, debris, gas, and other pollutants from activities at the airport have impacted the quality of salt making and salt produced at the loʻi paʻakai. In June 2019 over 50,000 people (locally and all over the world) signed a petition in opposition to allowing an after-the-fact permit for restroom facilities (and commercial activities) at PÅ «ʻolo. Over a hundred members of the community from a wide range of backgrounds provided oral testimony verifying the deep cultural significances of the area and the cumulative and secondary impacts of continued commercial aviation activities to hana paʻakai (the making of salt). No one testified in favor of continuing commercial aviation activities or use the runway. The majority of the testimony centered on protection of the salt pans and restoration of the area.
