Aloha Chair Shimabukuro, Chair Chang, and members of the Committees:

The Department of Hawaiian Home lands (DHHL) submits comments on these resolutions strongly urging the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and the United States Congress to allow Hawaiian homesteads to be direct recipients of federal Native Hawaiian Housing Block Grants (NHHBG) under the Native American Housing Assistance and Self-Determination Act (NAHASDA). DHHL appreciates the first be it resolved clause urging HUD and Congress to provide additional federal funds for the NHHBG under NAHASDA. However, the resolutions proposal to allow individual Hawaiian homesteads to be direct recipients of NHHBG wouldn't necessarily result in expediting the utilization of these funds or expand affordable housing opportunities for low-income families and individuals living on, or desiring to live on Hawaiian homesteads.

Utilization of NHHBG under NAHASDA requires strict compliance with many federal regulations and requirements including but not limited to eligible affordable housing activities in accordance with section 810 of NAHASDA and consistent with the Native Hawaiian Housing Plan as required under section 803 of NAHASDA, labor standards per section 805 of NAHASDA, environmental review as provided in section 806 of NAHASDA, annual performance reports as stipulated in sections 819 and 820 of NAHASDA, and quarterly federal financial reports. These requirements are met by a number of DHHL staff with specific expertise in our fiscal, land development division, and planning office beyond the staff specifically assigned to NAHASDA. It is important to note that DHHL has in the past solicited project and program proposals from eligible entities for NAHASDA funding through the community grant program. The expenditure of funds under this program were smaller in amount and at a slower rate.

- 1. Hawai'i is experiencing a critical affordable-housing shortage and more funding is needed to support infrastructure development, home construction and rehabilitation programs, direct loans, and housing subsidies for Native Hawaiian families.
- 2. Designating individual Hawaiian homesteads in Hawaii to be direct recipients of Native Hawaiian Housing Block Grants, in addition to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, could expedite the effective use of these funds and expand affordable-housing opportunities for low-income families and individuals living on, or desiring to live on, Hawaiian homesteads.
