# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Act 263, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, is 1 2 amended by amending section 1 to read as follows: 3 "SECTION 1. (a) There is established within the department of health a working group to evaluate current 5 behavioral health care and related systems and identify [steps that may be taken to promote effective integration to more 7 effectively respond to and coordinate care for persons 8 experiencing gaps in services, coordinate funding sources, and 9 establish and identify outcome measures for persons experiencing 10 behavioral health or substance abuse[ - mental health] conditions, and resultant consequences, including homelessness. 11 12 The working group shall consist of the following 13 members: 14 The director of health, or the director's designee, (1)who shall serve as chair; 15 One representative from the behavioral health services 16 (2) 17 administration of the department of health;

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1	(3)	One representative of the department of public safety;
2	(4)	One representative from the med-QUEST division of the
3		department of human services;
4	(5)	One representative of the judiciary;
5	(6)	One representative from the insurance division of the
6		department of commerce and consumer affairs;
7	(7)	[One or more representatives of the Hawaii Opioid
8		Initiative executive steering committee; ] The
9		governor's coordinator on homelessness, or the
10		<pre>coordinator's designee;</pre>
11	<u>(8)</u>	The administrator of the office of Hawaiian affairs,
12		or the administrator's designee;
13	<u>(9)</u>	One representative from the University of Hawaii
14		John A. Burns school of medicine department of
15		psychiatry who is affiliated with the American Society
16		of Addiction Medicine;
17	[ <del>(8)</del> ]	(10) One representative from each entity operating a
18		health plan in the State, who the director of health
19		shall invite to participate on the working group;

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1	[ <del>(9)</del> ]	(11) One or more members of the Hawaii Substance Abus
2		Coalition, who the director of health shall invite to
3		participate on the working group;
4	[ <del>(10)</del> -]	(12) One representative of the Hawaii interagency
5		council on homelessness;
6	[ <del>(11)</del> ]	(13) One clinical social worker licensed under
7		chapter 467E, Hawaii Revised Statutes; and
8	[ <del>(12)</del> ]	(14) Others as recommended by the working group.
9	(c)	The working group shall evaluate:
10	(1)	Inventory of funding streams and their metrics;
11	(2)	Currently existing barriers to treatment access;
12	(3)	Policies and practices that perpetuate or
13		substantially contribute to access barriers;
14	(4)	Practices that would improve care coordination and
15		increase access to care;
16	(5)	Policies or legislative actions that are recommended
17		to effectuate coordinated entry and coordinated
18		systems of behavioral health care; and
19	(6)	Defined roles and responsibilities recommended of
20		state, county, and community entities.

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- 1 (d) Members of the working group shall serve without
- 2 compensation, but shall be reimbursed for reasonable expenses
- 3 necessary for the performance of their duties, including travel
- 4 expenses. No member of the working group shall be subject to
- 5 chapter 84, Hawaii Revised Statutes, solely because of the
- 6 member's participation in the working group.
- 7 (e) Two or more members of the working group, but less
- 8 than the number of members [which] that would constitute a
- 9 quorum for the working group, may discuss between themselves
- 10 matters relating to official business of the working group to
- 11 enable them to faithfully perform their duties to the working
- 12 group and the organizations they represent, as long as no
- 13 commitment to vote is made or sought. Such discussions shall be
- 14 a permitted interaction under section 92-2.5, Hawaii Revised
- 15 Statutes.
- (f) The working group shall submit a report of its
- 17 findings and recommendations, including any proposed
- 18 legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior
- 19 to the convening of the regular session of  $[\frac{2020.}{2020.}]$   $\underline{2022.}$

- 1 (g) The working group shall be dissolved on June 30,
- **2** [<del>2021.</del>] 2023."
- 3 SECTION 2. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 4 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 5 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on June 29, 2021.
