STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO HOUSE BILL NO. 515

Honorable Members Thirty-First Legislature State of Hawai'i

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 515, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to the Department of Education."

The purpose of part I of this bill is to require the Auditor to audit the Department of Education's School Food Services Branch to determine the amount of local produce that is being purchased and served to students and to identify the sources of the purchased produce. The purpose of part II of this bill is to require that the Board of Education prioritize for the Superintendent of Education position candidates who have the minimum qualification of ten years of employment in a department of education, including no less than five years serving as a principal or in a higher-level position, and a desired qualification of having a working understanding of the State's trilevel system of educational administration.

This bill is objectionable because the Department of Education's School Food Services branch is already conducting its own system-wide audit of local produce purchased and served in school cafeterias. Requiring the State Auditor to conduct another audit would be a duplication of effort and is unnecessary. The administration fully supports increasing the amount of local produce served in schools as demonstrated by the signing of HB767. Through the Aina Pono program, DOE is increasing local food in student meals as well as connecting our keiki with the 'āina through their food, using products from the local agricultural community. The 'Aina Pono program was created to combine the Farm to School Initiative with our other educational programs, including 'Aina Pono Harvest of the Month, test kitchens, meal programs, menu planning, health and food education, nutrition, and school gardens.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS HOUSE BILL NO. 515 Page 2

Regarding part II, the Board of Education (Board) is the primary government entity charged with determining educational policy and appointing the Superintendent of Education. Part II effectively usurps the Board's discretion over hiring, thereby interfering with the Board's statutory obligation to appoint the Superintendent, and may have an unintended consequence of limiting the supply of future candidates for the position.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 515 without my approval.

RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to require the
3	auditor to conduct an audit of the department of education's
4	school food services branch to determine the current baseline of
5	the amount of local produce that is purchased and served to
6	students in school cafeterias. The intent of this Act is to use
7	the audit to provide the legislature with information on what
8	type of food is being purchased by the school food services
9	branch for school meals to help determine what amount of the
10	purchased food is locally sourced.
11	SECTION 2. (a) The auditor shall conduct an audit of the
12	department of education's school food services branch to
13	determine the current amount of local produce purchased and
14	served to students by the branch and to identify the sources of
15	the purchased produce to establish a baseline amount of produce
16	which is locally sourced.

- 1 (b) The auditor shall submit a report of the auditor's
- 2 findings and recommendations, including any proposed
- 3 legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior
- 4 to the convening of the regular session of 2022.
- 5 PART II
- 6 SECTION 3. Hawaii has a unique, statewide public education
- 7 system. The state educational agency and local education agency
- 8 are one and the same, and its leadership requires a unique
- 9 perspective and experience. Hawaii is also the only state that
- 10 provides all public school funding without any additional
- 11 support from the counties.
- 12 The purpose of this part is to require that the board of
- 13 education prioritize, for the superintendent of education
- 14 position, candidates that have the minimum qualification of ten
- 15 years of employment in a department of education, including no
- 16 less than five years serving as a principal or in a higher-level
- 17 position, and a desired qualification for a candidate is having
- 18 a working understanding of Hawaii tri-level systems of
- 19 educational administration.
- 20 SECTION 4. Section 302A-1101, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 21 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

1	"(b) The board shall appoint, and may remove, the
2	superintendent by a majority vote of its members. The
3	superintendent:
4	(1) May be appointed without regard to the state residency
5	provisions of section 78-1(b);
6	(2) May be appointed for a term of up to four years; and
7	(3) May be terminated only for cause[-];
8	provided that for the position of superintendent,
9	notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the board shall
10	prioritize candidates having a minimum qualification of ten
11	years of employment in a department of education, including no
12	less than five years serving as a principal or in a higher-level
13	position; provided further that a desired qualification for a
14	candidate for the position of superintendent is having a working
15	understanding of the State's tri-level systems of educational
16	administration.
17	For purposes of this subsection, "tri-level systems of
18	educational administration means the systems of administration

19 at the State, complex area, and school levels."
