A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that education is the
- 2 bedrock of a healthy democracy. To advance the fundamental
- 3 democratic principles of equality, liberty, and justice for all,
- 4 a quality school system must deliver instruction that is
- 5 historically and scientifically accurate and free from
- 6 discrimination.
- 7 The legislature further finds that the department of
- 8 education used the Acellus Learning Accelerator to facilitate
- 9 virtual learning during the COVID-19 pandemic. However,
- 10 teachers, parents, and community members found that the Acellus
- 11 Learning Accelerator curriculum contains content that engages in
- 12 racial, sexual, gender-based, and religious discrimination.
- 13 Teachers and parents also expressed concerns that certain
- 14 content provided by Acellus Learning Accelerator is historically
- 15 prejudicial and scientifically inaccurate. In October 2020,
- 16 these concerns prompted the board of education to direct the

1	department of education to phase out the Acellus Learning
2	Accelerator curriculum by the end of the 2020-2021 school year.
3	The legislature additionally finds that social justice
4	issues are a growing concern for Hawaii and the rest of the
5	United States. In 2020, large protests were coordinated in
6	Hawaii and throughout the nation to highlight systemic racism,
7	economic inequality, and police abuse faced by minority
8	communities. These demonstrations highlighted the urgency of
9	establishing structural reforms to address socioeconomic
10	inequality. The legislature therefore finds that to prepare
11	students to participate in the development of a more equal
12	society, it is important to create educational content that is
13	culturally relevant, nondiscriminatory, and inclusive of the
14	historical injustices endured by marginalized populations.
15	The purpose of this Act is to advance equality in Hawaii's
16	public education system by requiring:
17	(1) The board of education to adopt performance standards
18	that are culturally relevant, historically and
19	scientifically accurate, and nondiscriminatory;
20	(2) A standards-based curriculum and educational materials

that are nondiscriminatory with regard to race,

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1		ethnicity, sex, gender identity or expression, sexual
2		orientation, color, religion, ancestry, or disability;
3		and
4	(3)	School complexes to develop, to the greatest extent
5		possible, a standards-based curriculum that includes
6		content on the injustice endured by the indigenous
7		people of Hawaii and other historically
8		underrepresented populations.
9	SECT	ION 2. Section 302A-201, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended to	o read as follows:
11	"§30:	2A-201 Statewide performance standards. The board
12	shall est	ablish statewide performance standards and the means to
13	assess the	e standards based upon the recommendations in the final
14	report of	the performance standards commission established
15	pursuant	to Act 334, Session Laws of Hawaii 1991; provided that
16	the board	may review and modify the performance standards, as
17	the board	deems necessary, to reflect the needs of public school
18	students	and educational goals adopted by the board $[-]$; provided
19	further t	hat the performance standards adopted by the board
20	shall be	culturally relevant, historically and scientifically
21	accurate.	and nondiscriminatory "

1	SECT	ION 3. Section 302A-321, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended t	o read as follows:
3	"[[]	§302A-321[+] Standards-based curriculum. (a) When
4	developin	g a standards-based curriculum and implementing it in a
5	school or	complex, at the minimum, the curriculum and any
6	<u>related e</u>	ducational materials shall:
7	(1)	Be specific in its standards-based scope and sequence
8		over a school year for each grade level and course;
9	(2)	Be consistent in course content;
10	(3)	Be aligned across all grade levels;
11	(4)	Specifically address the state content and performance
12		standards and related benchmark maps; [and]
13	(5)	Be implemented in all appropriate classrooms in the
14		school or complex[+];
15	(6)	Be historically and scientifically accurate; and
16	(7)	Be nondiscriminatory with regard to race, ethnicity,
17		sex, gender identity or expression, sexual
18		orientation, color, religion, ancestry, or disability.
19	(b)	School complexes may choose to develop an articulated
20	and align	ed K-12 standards-based curriculum in one or more of
21	the follo	wing core content areas:

- 1 (1)Language arts; 2 (2) Mathematics: 3 (3) Science; and 4 (4) Social studies. 5 (c) School complexes shall provide professional 6 development. 7 School complexes that develop a standards-based 8 curriculum shall use standards-based formative assessment tools to monitor student progress, not less than on a quarterly basis 9 10 throughout the school year. 11 School complexes shall develop rigorous 12 classroom-based performance assessments. 13 School complexes may implement software programs at 14 the school level to help to align school course material with 15 Hawaii content and performance and federal educational 16 standards.
- 17 (g) To the greatest extent possible, school complexes

 18 shall develop a standards-based curriculum that includes content

 19 on the historical injustice, cultural subjugation, and

 20 discrimination faced by the indigenous people of Hawaii and

1	other his	torically underrepresented populations as applicable to
2	units of	study."
3	SECT	ION 4. The department shall submit a report to the
4	legislatu	re regarding the implementation of this Act no later
5	than twen	ty days prior to the convening of the regular sessions
6	of 2022 a	nd 2023.
7	The	report shall include:
8	(1)	Efforts made to improve the cultural relevance,
9		historical and scientific accuracy, inclusivity, and
10		nondiscrimination of Hawaii's performance standards
11		and standards-based curricula;
12	(2)	Policies adopted to assist teachers, parents, and
13		community members in reporting inaccurate or
14		discriminatory educational content;
15	(3)	Opportunities for increasing teacher engagement in the
16		development of culturally relevant, historically and
17		scientifically accurate, and nondiscriminatory
18		performance standards and standards-based curricula;
19		and
20	(4)	Any proposed legislation.

- 1 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 2 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 3 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.

Report Title:

Statewide Performance Standards; Standards-Based Curriculum; Nondiscrimination; Education Equality

Description:

Requires the board of education to develop statewide performance standards to be culturally relevant, historically and scientifically accurate, and nondiscriminatory. Requires a standards-based curriculum and its related educational materials to be nondiscriminatory. Establishes certain requirements for school complexes when developing standards-based curricula. Requires reports to the legislature. Effective 7/1/2050. (HD1)

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
