RELATING TO LAW ENFORCEMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

3	enforcement is	s critical to ensuring justice for all under the
4	law. The legi	islature further finds that the difficult and often
5	dangerous job	of law enforcement is safer, easier, and more
6	effectively ex	kecuted when citizens trust those empowered to
7	serve and prot	tect them.
8	The purpo	ose of this Act is to enhance the public's trust in
9	law enforcemen	nt and standardize best practices between the
10	counties by:

15		officials;
16	(B)	Require members to serve four-year terms; and
