A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HAWAII NATIONAL GUARD RETIREMENT BENEFITS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that not only is climate
- 2 change real, but it is the overriding challenge of the
- 3 twenty-first century and one of the priority issues of the
- 4 legislature. Climate change poses immediate and long-term
- 5 threats to the State's economy, sustainability, security, and
- 6 way of life.
- 7 The legislature recognizes that the fourth national climate
- f 8 assessment, released in November 2018 by the United States
- 9 global change research program, analyzed the effects of climate
- 10 change on the environment, economy, and human health, and
- 11 reported the trends in global change with projected major trends
- 12 for the coming decade through the end of the twenty-first
- 13 century. Chapter 27 of the assessment describes climate-related
- 14 risks for Hawaii and the United States-affiliated Pacific
- 15 Islands and increased hazards ranging from increased storm
- 16 frequency, episodic flooding, increased precipitation, drought,
- 17 and wildfire.

2 Guard's state active duty activation rates have increased along 3 with the increase of local hazards relating to Hawaii's changing 4 In 2017, United States General Joseph L. Lengyel, Chief of the National Guard Bureau and member of the Joint 5 Chiefs of Staff acknowledged that America's climate is changing, 6 7 and hazardous storms are "becoming bigger, larger, and more violent." General Lengvel acknowledged that the national guard 8 9 serves as "the military domestic response force." 10 The legislature also finds that the Hawaii national guard 11 was activated multiple times to provide disaster response under 12 the emergency proclamation for Kauai flooding in 2018 and the lava emergency proclamation in 2018 and was extended multiple 13 14 times through supplemental emergency proclamations. These state 15 active duty activations led Hawaii national guard members to 16 serve for as long as six months of continuous service. 17 The legislature additionally finds that states including 18 Alabama, California, Michigan, and Texas have expanded 19 retirement benefits for national quard members who have been activated by their respective state governor through state 20 21 active duty orders.

The legislature further finds that the Hawaii National

- (4) Recommend a program with policies to provide Hawaii national guard members with retirement benefits for any future activations under state active duty orders and retroactive retirement benefits from the events related to the emergency proclamations in 2018; provided that the board of trustees of the employees' retirement system finds that such a program is viable and feasible; and
- (5) Identify and recommend any potential legislation that is necessary to provide retirement benefits to Hawaii national guard members activated by state active duty orders and Hawaii national guard members who are retired.
- (c) The board of trustees of the employees' retirement
 system shall submit a report to the legislature detailing the
 findings and recommendations of the study, including any
 proposed legislation, no later than twenty days prior to the
 convening of the regular session of 2022.
